Windfarm Expected to Blow In 20 Years of Benefits to Herscher Area

Money may not grow on trees but it does float in on the wind.

Windpower will cause additional tax money to flow into the budgets for the Herscher Unit 2 school district, Kankakee County, fire districts for Pilot and Otto Iownships, and other taxing bodies as beneficiaries of additional tax revenue starting next year through 2036. The extra revenue is being generated by increased property value due to the recent completion and start of operations at the Pilot Hill Wind Farm project. Herscher Unit 2 Superintendent Rich Decman said last month that he estimates will be roughly there

\$142,000 in additional funds to the district from the windfarm next year. The following year, the first full year of operation for the project, generate roughly will \$814,000, Decman said.

But schools are only a piece of the overall puzzle, although the largest chunk, with additional funds going into other municipalities and townships, fire districts and the Kankakee Community College coffers. For example, EDF Renewable Energy, the project developer and operator, is spending an estimated \$8 million in road improvements in the area for the twophase windfarm.

Two Gardner Residents Assaulted at Gunpoint, One Injured

Two Gardner residents were held at gunpoint Saturday, Oct. 24, after arriving home late at night from a hayride for children.

Grundy County Police arrested Gardner resident Cody Miles, 18, and Noel Cottrell, 21, with an address listed as Joliet.

Both were arrested for assault and battery, but the State's attorney's office charged them with battery only.

The incident took place at the home of Terri Balcom, in the 300 block of Pine Street, while her father, Robert Dewitt, was visiting.

When Dewitt and Balcom attempted to break up a fight, at 11 p.m. that night, they were held at gunpoint and Dewitt was beaten to the point that he needed to be hospitalized, Balcom told The Paper.

Dewitt was treated and was released, but is unable to

return to work as of deadline, she reported.

She told The Paper she is planning to circulate a petition to evict the residents where the two arrested men reside.

"I was at the house, and my dad stopped over," she recalled. "Two people whom we didn't know were fighting in our front yard."

She said she had children in the home and wanted the fight stopped, but she and her father ended having guns pointed in their faces and the father was physically assaulted.

The next court date for the two arrested was to be Nov. 3 for reduction of their bond of \$10,000 each, according to Grundy County Sheriff Kevin Callahan.

Callahan said the charge of battery is a Class A misdemeanor, with a penalty of up to one year in jail and a fine.

"Cottrell is a self-admitted gang member," Callahan told *The Paper* on Monday.

A year ago at Lent, she said she started making cookies and froze them for Easter.


She gave them to family and friends who raved about them.



Member SIPC **Thinking of Adopting? Be Prepared for Expenses**

November is National Adoption Awareness Month. If you're considering adoption, you know that it will change your life in many ways. And you'll need to prepare for many of these changes - including the financial ones, because adoption can be expensive.

The average U.S. adoption costs between \$8,000 and \$40,000, while the range for international adoptions is \$15,000 to \$30,000, according to the Child Welfare Information Gateway, a U.S. government-funded adoption information service.

Given these numbers, you might think you'll have a tough time paying for an adoption. However, you can get some financial help in the form of tax benefits, which include both a tax credit for qualified adoption expenses and an exclusion (from your taxable income) of employer-provided adoption assistance. In 2015, the maximum tax benefit you can claim is \$13,400; this amount is reduced if your modified adjusted gross income (MAGI) exceeds \$201,010 and is completely phased out if your MAGI is \$241,010 or more. The adoption tax credit is nonrefundable, which means it's limited to your tax liability for the year.

Here's an example of how you might use the tax benefits. Suppose you pay \$13,400 in qualified adoption expenses in 2015 and your employer reimburses you for \$3,400 of those expenses. Assuming you meet the MAGI guidelines, you can exclude \$3,400 from your gross income for 2015 and can claim \$10,000 (\$13,400 minus \$3,400) for the adoption tax credit. (Tax credits reduce your income tax liability on a dollar-for-dollar basis.)

Of course, while these tax benefits can reduce your overall cost of adoption, you still have to come up with the money - which, as we've seen, can amount to many thousands of dollars - in the first place. How will you do it?

Your first step is to plan ahead - as far ahead as possible. Since the adoption process can often take a year or more, you will generally have some time to prepare. When you find the adoption agency that best meets your needs, get an estimate of the total costs involved. Once you've got this figure, you can determine how you'll meet these costs.

You might be tempted to take out a loan from your 401(k), but you should try to avoid this move - a 401(k) loan will likely reduce the growth potential of this account, which is designed for retirement. You might also consider a loan from a bank - but debt is debt, even if it's for the purpose of expanding your family, and it's always a good idea to keep one's debt level down.

If you knew you wouldn't need the money for, say, two years, you could consider putting away a certain amount each month in a special "adoption fund" in an investment that's highly liquid and offers significant preservation of principal. If the circumstances of your life allow you to plan even farther ahead, such as three to five years, you can find a savings or investment vehicle that may be appropriate for providing the money just when you need it.

Adopting a child will change your life. Planning ahead, and carefully considering your options for paying for the adoption, can help you reach this major milestone in a manner that makes financial sense - now and in the future.

Park by GGS May be Reorganized, Will Remain Gardner Open Space

The Gardner Village Council quickly responded at its meeting Oct. 26 to a rumor that a park in Gardner was being closed.

Commissioner James Riley suggested the park equipment be condensed, moving the swings near the jungle gym and other equipment, while the space where the swings are will be turned into a grass area.

One member of the audience that night, Dan Bell, said he had heard that the park was being closed and asked that the village retain its green spaces.

"Open space is the most valuable thing you have in town," Bell said. "Don't give up something you have been given."

He also suggested the green area may be turned into a small softball diamond for smaller children, which Mayor Mike Serena said was a "good idea."

Commissioner Riley said the cost would involve moving the swings and seeding over the area where the swings are with grass. The condensing of the equipment to one spot will

reduce maintenance costs, Riley said. "I'm not in favor of elim-

inating the park," Mayor Serena said emphatically. "We're just condensing

it," Riley responded. The council said it will consider the matter further

before taking action. The board learned in a report from Guy Christensen, Chamlin and Associates, that the permit to continue the construction of a new storm sewer line in Gardner has been issued by the Illinois Department of Transportation.

Christensen said IDOT stopped the project just when they were about to cross Illinois Route 53, concerned about flooding issues in the state route's ditches.

The purpose of the line is to eliminate standing water in some areas of the village.

IDOT was satisfied that the capacity of the state's ditches can handle flood waters. The \$500,000 storm sewer line project will run on the south side of Main Street to Jackson and on Jackson south to Dwight street.

The contractor has 100 days to finish the work, but it may not be completed before winter weather sets in.

Christensen estimates that restoration work such as grass reseeding or some resurfacing of roads may be held up once winter hits. But he is hopeful most of the work will be completed before that. Work was to resume Nov. 2.

In other action, the board: • heard a complaint from Bell about burning in the village, suggesting that people not burn leaves, but mow or rake them up.

• Learned the all-town cleanup will be Nov. 9 with residents allowed to leave large items at the curb.

• Learned the Gardner Festival of Trees will began Nov. 16 and run through Nov. 29, per Ida Schopp. She said 10 trees have been donated so far and that proceeds go to the village park funds.

Region Prices Volatile

The price of regular gasoline in *The Paper*'s circulation area was volatile again, with the trend down in some places and up in others.

"We expect the week ahead may be a slightly bumpy one as whole gasoline prices across nearly the entire country have perked up slightly," said Patrick DeHann, senior petroleum analyst for GasBuddy.

"While we can't eliminate the possibility of relatively small price adjustments in the short term, we expect princes to generally be lower by the arrival of the holidays," he added.

The average U.S. gallon of regular unleaded gasoline price is made up of several factors including roughly 17% in state and local taxes, 19% in distribution and marketing, 25% in refining and 40% for refining costs.

Dougherty Resigns as Dwight Trustee October 26 Board Meeting

Tim Dougherty has resigned his post as Dwight Village Trustee. At its October 26 session, the Board of Trustees approved the resignation.

"Due to my disillusionment with the actions of the Village board and administration, I am resigning the Village as village trustee," said Dougherty in a statement to *The Paper*. "I would like to thank my voters for voting for me in the last two elections."

Dougherty was serving his second term having been on the board since 2011. Following the resignation of an elected trustee, the Village President has the authority to appoint a trustee to fill the position until the next scheduled Village election. No appointment was made at the meeting.

In other business at the board session: Saturday, November 28, has been proclaimed Small Business Saturday in Dwight as a day to celebrate and support small business that creates jobs, boosts the economy and invigorates neighborhoods. Special promotions may be offered and residents are asked to shop locally on this day and throughout the year.

The board approved street closures as the Dwight Economic Alliance prepares to hold its annual Christmas parade on Friday, December 4, beginning at 6 p.m. Parade entries will line up on North Prairie Avenue from Mazon Avenue to North Street beginning at approximately 5:00 p.m. The parade will head south on Prairie to West Main, crossing the railroad tracks at Mazon Avenue, and travel down East Main Street. The parade will end at East Main and Chippewa. Temporary street closures in the area will be in effect as necessary. In his report to the board, Dwight Chief of Police provided an update on

recent residential and car burglaries and cautioned residents to secure valuables, lock vehicles, homes and garages. Chief Henson also alerted residents to vandalism that has taken place at Renfrew Park and Lions Lake. Henson asked for everyone's help.

"If you see or hear anything, please give us a call," said Henson. "We will make sure to follow up on it and, hopefully, it will lead to more information for us."

In public comment, *The Paper* requested clarification regarding Schultz Media's services for maintaining the Village's website. At an earlier board session, and following a complaint about the website not being updated, the Village Clerk indicated that Schultz Media is not paid for its service to maintain the website. However, Village Administrator Kevin McNamara stated that Schultz Media is paid \$250 annually for the Village website's dominion name, web hosting, and site maintenance.

In response to other public comment, it was clarified that while the Village has made payments to Vissering Construction for the new High Speed Rail depot, that money is being reimbursed by IDOT – the village is not responsible for the construction cost. However, the cost of the day to day and long term maintenance of the new depot will be the Village of provides television pickup and neither does the Village's waste disposal provider, Republic Services. • a Zoning Board recommendation for a variance filed by Larry and Kathryn Turner allowing a side yard reduction from ten feet to eight feet to allow for the construction of a garage addition to 202 Susan Drive, Dwight.

• a long term lease agreement with Union Pacific Railroad for the new Amtrak station allowing a 25 foot ease-



He said laser therapy, for example, while it does generate some heat, is used to "stimulate cells at the cellular level like medication but with no side effects."

The laser therapy can be used for muscle spasms or joint pain, and decreases swelling.

The services expansion opened for business in August, but he described it as a "soft opening," to "work out the kinks."

Smith attended school in Davenport Iowa at the Palmer College of Chiropractics, and spent an extra three years in the college's post-doctorate program.

He is versed in several methods for chiropractic physical body adjustments, and several therapies, making his practice "unique," he said.

He came to the Dwight area in 2000 and opened his "cash only" practice called Chiro 25 featuring cash visits for \$25.

The original business featured walk-ins with no appointment needed.

But customers sought services that could be billed to their insurance or Medicare, thus the motivation for opening a second business next door.

"Quite a few people wanted to use their insurance," Smith explained.

When first visiting his office, the patient will be given a full exam, fill out medical history forms, and he will provide findings for treatment or a referral to a different physician.

"We may do a two- or three-week trial, and if the patient is not responding, I will refer them out," he added.

Windfarm Expected to Blow In 20 Years of Benefits to Herscher Area – -

(continued from page 1) Farmers receive "rent" for the use of their land during the 20-year life of the turbine, and also benefit from the land virtually locked in as farmland for the next 20 years. Developments for housing or other purposes would be unlikely to gobble up the farmland while the wind turbines are present.

After 20 years, the turbines will either be upgraded with new technology or closed down, at no cost to the farmers, Baker said.

This is phase one of a two-phase project. The second phase will involve another 100 wind turbines, but be located mostly in the Tri-Point School District.

The Tri-Point project, known as Kelly Creek, is scheduled to go online in late 2016, according to Jon

electrical generation. Tri-Point Superintendent Jeff Bryan said the project is expected to bring in \$1.5 million in tax revenue, for a district that has a \$5 million total budget.

Farmland will be negligibly impacted by the project. For every 160 acre farm parcel, roughly four to five acres are taken out of production during the life of the turbines.

But some people object to the windfarms for various reasons, which Baker said are not based in reality.

He said communities reap financial and environmental benefits, as every megawatt produced by wind power is offsetting electricity generated by coal fired plants or some other fossil fuel.

"We want to make sure the benefits are generated locally," Baker said, "for

1,500 feet from any buildings and therefore windfarms tend to be located in open areas to avoid being too close to structures.

Illinois has a rule that at least 25% of electricity be generated from renewable sources by 2025, which accounts for several windfarms being located in Illinois.

It has been seven years since the project was begun. Most projects take four years in development, at least, Baker said.







Soldier Returns From Iraq With Broken Mind, Body; Strong Spirit

U.S. Army veteran Eric Roebuck, 29, of Verona, said he returned from Iraq to America with knee problems, a mild traumatic brain injury, and repeated nightmares attributed to Post Traumatic Stress Disorder.

"I came back with the body of a 90 year old," explained Roebuck, half joking.

PTSD develops after a ordeal terrifying that involved physical harm or the threat of physical harm, according to the National Institute of Mental Health.

Roebuck's PTSD and other injuries trace back to May 14, 2011 in Iraq.

"Me and my buddy were walking around on base,' Roebuck remembered.

He said a rocket-propelled weapon came in, with a warhead kill-blast radius of 175 feet.

He and the older soldier, a large fellow described by Roebuck as weighing 300 pounds, were standing roughly 100 feet from where the weapon exploded.

The blast blew Roebuck 10 feet away, and knocked him unconscious, but neither he nor the other soldier were hit with any shrapnel.

"There was shrapnel all around us," he said.

Roebuck said his friend picked him up, thrust him over his shoulder and called for medics.

"The doctors said 'I don't know how you survived," Roebuck explained.

"I now have to have a

explained of his sleep apnea. The machine forces air into his nose should he stop breathing.

The Army gave Roebuck a full medical discharge and medical benefits.

Before the injury, Roebuck served as a scout for the 1st Cavalry, 3rd Battalion, 8th Cavalry regiment.

He had enlisted, inspired to help after the terrorist attack of Sept. 11, 2001.

His unit was called the 'White Horses" and the unit's motto was "honor and courage."

Honor and courage were required for his specialty, assigned as a sniper attached to top secret missions in

Iraq. "I was a scout, so on my sleeping machine," Roebuck first tour, I would go out

[U.S. Navy] Seal team," Roebuck said.

"As a scout, I was a Battalion asset," Roebuck said.

On his missions with Army Rangers or Seal Teams, the soldiers searched for bomb makers and enemy cell leaders.

Of the 10 enemy targeted individuals assigned, "we nabbed seven of 10," he said.

His first tour was from Jan. 1 to Nov. 14, 2009. The second was from Jan. 12 to Nov. 21, 2011.

"I had a lot of fun on missions," he said, with his tongue planted firmly in his cheek.

He said some missions involved knocking on doors to seek the bomb makers or cell leaders, not knowing if they would be greeted by gunfire through the door.

"We went on a lot of raids," he added.

Roebuck married a Verona native, Danielle, and the couple has a boy, now age 10. His son was just a baby when his father deployed to Iraq.

But unlike the days of World War II or Korea or even Vietnam when there were only letters from home for communication from soldiers, today's soldiers are allowed to see their loved ones "face to face", thanks to the Internet.

So Roebuck did not come home to a son who did not know who he was.

However, after a secret

with a Ranger platoon or a mission, if there was a casualty, there would be blackouts for communications with family until next of kin was notified.

> Which made for some tense moments back home, he said.

"If someone was killed, we couldn't talk to our families for two or three days," Roebuck said.

Danielle tolerated the blackouts and welcomed her husband home after his final deployment. She tried to console him when he suffered with the nightmares.

"She really didn't know what to do," Roebuck said.

But a great uncle in Ohio who is actively working with veterans helped Danielle learn to help her husband cope.

Roebuck proudly sports a tattoo on his hand in remem-

brance of a soldier friend he lost in Iraq.

But the violence in Iraq is not over. He said he feels angry that all of the sacrifices made by him and his fellow soldiers were "for nothing."

ISIS took over Mosul in Iraq and destroyed priceless archeological treasures.

"When ISIS took Mosul in the middle of last year, they destroyed everything,' Roebuck said. He said he fought to protect that city from just such destruction.

"You feel bad," he said. But, "I'd go back in a heartbeat," he added, although his medical discharge would prevent it.

Roebuck's body and mind may be injured but his spirit remains strong.



World War II B-17 Pilot soared Over Atlantic, Europe But Saw No Action

You'd think that a veteran of World War II who flew B-17 bombers would have seen some action in missions over Germany.

But one such pilot, Willard Perkins of Gardner, now 89, was too late to be sent to the European Theater of War.

Instead, he flew on B-17 search and rescue missions over the Eastern Seaboard and out to Cuba. "It was good duty," Perkins said. "I loved to fly, but I felt guilty," because his fellow soldiers were flying bombing missions over Europe.

"What good did I do anybody?" he asked. "Nothing!"

He flew as the engineer on the search and rescue missions and "spent most of the time looking out the window," he explained. "When you get up that high above water and looking down, I don't know how they'd find anybody. It was like finding

' a pebble in a gravel pit."

Perkins joined the U.S. Army Air Corps in late 1943, and was too late to serve as a pilot.

So he was a cadet in Biloxi, Mississippi, but at first was not even on an airplane.

"There were 10 of us setting at a table changing radio frequencies," Perkins said. "I said to myself, this is not what I joined the Air Force for."

So he went to a commanding officer who gave him the number of a B-17 plane to serve as a member of the crew. After that he went to B17 school and learned the ropes.

After the war ended, still serving in the U.S. Army Air Force, he worked with General Scheider who promoted him to Corporal.

He served as the general's crew chief.

In February of 1946, his job was to sell off surplus C-47s, which were the same as civilian DC-3 aircraft. "We flew to Sweden with

planes," Perkins explained. After the sale, the person-

nel "flew back with me." On one flight with the

General and his wife, he was piloting the plane back to base when he was having trouble with the landing gear.

He was not sure if the hydraulics were working and did not know if the landing gear was locked in place.

He dove down to try and click the gear in position, but was still unsure.

He took a chance and landed on the runway instead of grass (customary for a belly landing without gear) and was fortunate that the gear was locked in place.

"They thought I was worried," before they landed he explained. "What I was more worried about was tearing up my plane on a belly landing."

He mustered out in 1947 and married Dorothy Papach of Central City, (between Gardner and Coal City).

He never flew an airplane after the war.

In 2013, he was asked to join as a passenger an Honor Flight for World War II veterans to Washington D.C. to

see the memorials, museums and other sites.

The event included Andrew Sisters impersonators, and a "mail call" at the end with a box of mail from family and friends who has been asked in advance to send them letters.
