Shannon Shores Man Killed, Multiple **Gunshot Wounds**

A Shannon Shores man was pronounced dead at his home by Kankakee County Coroner Bob Gessner on Tuesday, Nov. 17.

The victim is Theodore Rockwood, 49, of the 18000 block of 3000N road. The home is in Shannon Shores, a resort four miles north of Reddick.

Rockwood was found after his daughter became worried.

He was pronounced dead at 11:59 p.m., Nov. 17.

Gessner told The Paper that the autopsy was performed Nov. 18, and "it appears to be a homicide."

He said he cannot release the number of gun shot wounds found on the body, and that the crime remains under investigation by the Kankakee County Sheriff's Department and the Illinois State Police crime scene investigation task force.

The coroner has not yet ruled it a homicide, awaiting final results of the autopsy, as of press deadlines, but said results will "probably be the same."



Jim, Cheryl Berta Retire, **Sell Hardware Store after 32 Years**

by Myke Feinman Managing Editor Nothing could stop Jim and Cheryl Berta from keeping their business open and thriving for more than three decades - except the effects of aging.

After moving from Main

The Essex Fire Protection District station is running out of room.

So a new building is being constructed just north of the existing station.

The existing station, located for more than 50 years on the corner of Main and Linden streets in downtown Essex, currently houses seven pieces of firefighting equipment like tankers and fire trucks, plus Emergency Medical Services equipment, and a boat for rescues on the district's many lakes, like Shannon Shores and Mazonia.

While Essex is the only village in the district, he estimates at least 300 reside in Shannon Shores, some of whom are only there during spring, summer and fall.

The district also includes Tammen Treeberry farm plus the surrounding agricultural land between Braidwood and Reddick on the north and south.

There is also a board room, office, kitchen, two bathrooms.

The 20-person volunteer

fire department covers a 48 square mile area including the village of Essex, and rural Reddick north of Route 17.

It stretches north to Braidwood just south of the nuclear power plant.

"There's not enough room for the equipment we've got," said Fire Chief Austin Vining.

A pumper is housed at the home of the assistant fire chief and an ATV rescue vehicle is housed in a nearby small building.

Among the equipment is a brand new pumper which arrived in late summer and still has a magnetic sign on the side because it has not been painted yet, Vining explained.

The new \$764,000 structure, built by Morton buildings of Watseka, will include a 54 by 60 foot bay area for equipment with three bay doors.

There will also be an adjoining 54 by 60 foot office space with a radio room, kitchen, lounge area, and media room.

Gas Drops Below \$2

Drivers in The Paper's circulation area have something extra to be thankful for this year. Regular unleaded gasoline prices dipped below \$2.00 gallon for stations in this area, just under the state average of \$2.02

gallon as of Monday, Nov. 24. GasBuddy projects that by Thanksgiving Day the national average will be \$1.99 gallon, nearly 80 cents gallon cheaper than last year and \$1.29 cheaper than 2013.

"November gas prices have slid significantly lower and holiday travelers will certainly be the beneficiaries," said Patrick DeHaan, a senior petroleum analyst with GasBuddy.





Braceville Man Arrested for Heroin **Possession** in Raid

arrested for possession of heroin after a search warrant was executed at his Braceville home around noon, Friday, Nov. 13.

According to Grundy Sheriff County Kevin Callahan, the Sheriff's Department assisted the Metropolitan Area Narcotics Squad, of which a Sheriff's Deputy is a member.

"There were 42 baggies heroin recovered,' of Callahan said. He estimates they equate to about two ounces of the controlled substance.

Grundy County State's Attorney Jason Helland said he is charging Schwartz with unlawful possession of a controlled substance with intent to deliver, which is a Class 1 felony, punishable by four to 15 years in state prison. Bond was set at \$10,000.

Online Videos Cause Dwight's Sunnyside Tanning & Video to Close

by Myke Feinman Managing Editor Sunnyside Tanning and Video, a Dwight business located for nearly 16 years at 126 E. Main Street, will be closing its door by the end of the year.

Jim and Diana Kinnamon began renting VHS videos and video games and offering tanning services believing both services combined would provide enough traffic to support the business.

For several years, things went well.

Then two changes started to put a dent in the bottom line: The switch to DVDs from VHS videos and a law banning individuals under age 18 from tanning, even with parental supervision.

The DVDs are more convenient than videos, and tended to preclude renting, according to Jim Kinnamon.

But what really put the nail in the coffin for the business was the advent of new technology offering people the chance to download movies and games online, Kinnamon said.

"Technology is our downexplained. fall," he "Business isn't what it used to be."

He said the younger crowd is tech savvy, preferring to download a movie



How Can the Fed's Actions Affect You?

When will the Federal Reserve raise interest rates? This question has been on the minds of economists and financial market prognosticators for quite some time now. But what does it mean to you, as an individual investor?

First of all, it's important to understand just what is meant by "raising rates." The Federal Reserve, or the "Fed," directly controls short-term interest rates, although, through various measures, it can also affect longterm rates. Typically, the Fed will lower short-term rates to stimulate the economy. Conversely, the Fed will raise rates to slow down the economy if it seems to be "overheating" and threatening to push inflation to excessive levels.

Since the end of 2008, when the financial crisis hit, the Fed has kept short-term rates close to zero. But now, following several years of reasonably strong economic growth, the Fed appears poised to raise rates. No one can really predict the exact timing of the rate hike, but statements from the Fed indicate that it seems to be a matter of "when," not "if."

Fed chairperson Janet Yellen has indicated that when the increase comes, it may be relatively small, and that further increases will be spaced out enough to avoid potential "shocks" to the economy. Still, as an investor, you need to be aware of the potential impact of any interest rate increase. So, consider the following:

Review your bond holdings. As short-term rates rise, shorter-term bonds, and even some "cash" instruments, may eventually become more attractive than longer-term bonds, which tend to be more volatile. A selloff of longer-term bonds can push their prices downward, so make sure these bonds don't take up too large a percentage of your fixed-income portfolio

Build a bond ladder. A bond ladder may prove beneficial to you in all interest-rate environments. To construct this ladder, you need to own bonds and other fixed-rate vehicles, such as certificates of deposit (CDs) of varying maturities. Thus, when market interest rates are low, you'll still have your longer-term bonds, which typically pay higher rates than short-term bonds, working for you. And when interest rates rise, as may be the case soon, you can reinvest your maturing, short-term bonds and CDs at the higher rates. Be sure to evaluate whether the bonds or CDs held in the ladder are consistent with your investment objectives, risk tolerance and financial circumstances.

Be prepared for volatility. Certain segments of the financial markets don't like interest rate increases - after all, higher rates mean higher borrowing costs, which make it harder for businesses to expand their operations. Therefore, depending on the composition of your portfolio, be prepared for some volatility when rates start moving up. However, since the Fed has already indicated it is likely to raise rates fairly soon, such a hike may already be largely "priced in" to the market, so any turbulence may be somewhat muted.

Tax Levy Increase Considered by Dwight High School BOE November 18 Board Actions

The Dwight Township High School Board of Education is considering a recommendation to maximize its tax rate in an effort to protect itself from uncertainty ahead.

At the November 18 BOE session, Superintendent Dr. Richard Jancek reviewed information and potential impact regarding two active Bills (SB318 & HS4247) related to property tax limitation laws. Either Bill would impose a statewide property tax freeze if passed. Due to provisions in the two proposed bills currently before legislatures, the District may be at financial disadvantage by not increasing its 2015 tax rate to the maximum. Dr. Jancek recommended the Board take steps to build capacity and put safeguards in place so that, should one or both bills pass, the District is protected.

Another financial concern facing the District is a decreasing EAV. The current projected total EAV for the Dwight High School District is \$123,600,000 which represents a 1.4% overall decrease in EAV over last year and an \$11 million decrease since 2009. The District is facing deficit spending of \$120,000 this

year in its Education Fund. However, with a current surplus in the District's

Education Fund of over \$3 million, some board members are reluctant to maximize the tax rate and potentially increase an already healthy surplus while others are concerned about whittling away at funds and losing the District's strong financial edge.

Over the next month, the Board will continue to review cause and effect scenarios of levy rates by fund and overall rate which will lead to a final extension request. The final tax levy must be agreed upon by the Board at its December meeting in order to meet the required filing date with the County Clerk's office.

Dr. Jancek has encouraged anyone with questions regarding PTELL (Property Tax Extension Limitation Law) to contact the District office at 815-584-6216.

In other business, the Board learned that the State of Illinois will not be funding the ACT test for students this year. The ACT is a college readiness assessment. Cost of the ACT is approximately \$57. DTHS Junior and Senior students are encouraged to take the test on Saturday, April 9 at Pontiac High School, which is the nearest testing site.

In his report to the board,

Dr. Richard Jancek informed the board that on November 23, the Dwight Police Department along with the Illinois State Police would be using drones to take pictures of the school area which would assist in developing a crisis plan. Dr. Jancek also reported

that WJEZ has requested that the school District participate in a periodic ten minute radio spot, County Spotlight, to communicate school news.

The Board also approved: • the employment of Linda Dawson as a District level Office Administrative Assistant at a starting wage of \$13.78.

• Clark Reamer as Scholastic Bowl Volunteer Coach.

• the school's Wellness Program as updated and submitted.

(continued from page 1) divided duties in a workable partnership.

"We just had to get organized," Cheryl said. After those first two

years, business kept growing and the couple decided it was time to expand.

This despite utilizing three buildings with the address of 118 E. Main.

"With the sidewalk in front and a road behind, you could not put out any bagged goods," Cheryl said of the old location.

"We couldn't expand our lawn and garden section," she added.

So they thought moving to the new Subdivision with a newly built store would be a solution.

But the residents did not like the idea, and the village required that they "jump through many hoops," Jim explained.

"We were the first building out in Watters Subdivision," Jim said. "We had more guts than brains," he joked.

Due to being first, the village officials were tougher on them, requiring that they

have a larger parking lot and other issues.

But more importantly, some people thought Berta's was moving "out of town."

"People said they would never shop with us again," Cheryl said. "They told us we were moving out of Dwight."

But soon, Dempsey Dodge opened up nearby and others followed. So did the business from their former location.

The next hurdle came when the people running True Value Hardware were found to be doing "an Enron" as Cheryl described it, with two sets of books.

The Bertas lost all the retirement they had been putting away at that time and had to search for a different hardware franchise.

"True Value lost our retirement money," Cheryl said. "In the year 2000 we switched to Do It Best."

Meantime, they had to switch over to a new computer system at their own expense and pay off debts left behind by the True Value co-operative.

Over the 32 years, they

have had to switch the computer system three times, Jim said.

Other changes were competing with big box store chains which have been building closer and closer to Dwight over the years, and competing with younger customers who are ordering off the Internet

"But we're not leaving because the business is bad," Cheryl said.

The Bertas are selling the store at a time when business is steady and their debts are paid off.

"We want to thank all our loyal customers from Dwight and the surrounding areas," Cheryl said. "We've had an opportunity to meet so many great people and

"I think we have a lot of experience with this team," Leigh stated. "I think we have a lot of good shooters and just a desire to win ball games.




