Odell Struggles to Prepare Town for Economic Development Projects

Note: This is part of a series about towns in The Paper's circulation area looking back at 2015 and looking forward.

Odell Mayor Terry Joyner and his board of trustees have been fighting to make Odell more attractive to prospective developers.

One of the ways they have done that is to pass a property tax abatement program which was in force as of this year.

But the town has not received any bites on economic development yet.

"I believe it in part has to do with the state – no budget," Joyner explained.

He said a \$250,000 grant for a walk/bike path was okayed by the state, but no money was released due to the state budget impasse.

But even more important is keeping the town looking attractive for prospective developers.

"The main issue I'm having is with IDOT and Union Pacific maintaining inside the fence."

He said he fights constantly with U.P. to have them mow their property inside the fence, which the railroad will not allow the village to mow due to liability concerns.

Joyner said this becomes an eyesore in the summer, so he mows it anyway, at his own expense.

The grass gets so high, and attracts mosquitoes, which could lead to a West Nile Virus health situation in town.

He is also trying to get FS to "clean up" abandoned grain elevators in town.

"In the summer kids play there, and it attracts animals," Joyner explained of the abandoned elevators.

He is also concerned about safety issues if the abandoned buildings fall down onto the railroad, especially while a train is traveling through town.

"Odell doesn't need to be known for the Great Train Derailment," he said.

Gardner Watching Bottom Line as Village Improves Infrastructure

Note: This is part of a series about towns in The Paper's circulation area looking back at 2015 and looking forward.

The village of Gardner continues to move forward on infrastructure projects, while keeping a sharp eye on spending to avoid debt, according to Mayor Mike Serena.

"A big stumbling block has been our storm sewer project," Serena explained.

He said some of the lines needed replacing because the pipes were egg-shaped from pressure or were bursting.

The lines which will be going under Interstate 55 were delayed this year because an agency wanted more engineering studies done to show there would

not be flooding in drainage ditches along the highway.

That project has resumed, currently involving pipe being placed on Main Street in front of the Gardner-South Wilmington High School.

But the delay will likely mean that the line replacement is not done until next spring.

"We got put on hold for two months," Serena said.

The new lines are being installed from Main Street to Jackson and south to Odell Street, he explained.

This project will cost between \$850,000 and \$900,000, paid through the general fund and Tax Increment Finance district funds.

Another controversy in town this year was related to the storm sewer plant capacity.

Bookwalter Woods, a

manufactured home community outside the Gardner village limits, wants to connect roughly 140 households into the village sewer system.

Since the system is at capacity now, a storm has been brewing in town about the project.

But Serena explained that it is not up to the village to stop the Bookwalter people from spending their own money on a feasibility study.

"We've had a lot of people question it," Serena said. "Even my uncle, ex-Mayor Ray Serena, has been outspoken about it."

Mike Serena said that even if the village does not agree with such a project, they are obligated to allow Bookwalter to research it and come up with a plan – on their own dime, that is.

Governor Bruce Rauner signed House Bill 3213 into law Dec. 4, that preserves the stand-alone emergency room status for the hospital in Streator, currently known as St. Mary's Hospital.

jeopardy."

Earlier this year, it was announced that Peoria-based OSF would purchase St. Mary's Hospital owned by Springfield-based HSHS and take control of the Streator facility in early 2016.

In-patient services are planned to be eliminated.

Without a change in law, OSF would not have been allowed to operate an emergency room without in-patient services.

House Bill 3213, however, now allows St. Mary's to keep its ER without providing in-patient services.

Out-patient services, those not requiring overnight

stays in the hospital, will continue at the Streator location, OSF has said.

There will also be lab services along with the ER.

"With the size of Streator, it doesn't make sense to not have an emergency room," Rezin said.

"People would have to drive up to 30 miles to get to the nearest emergency room without this legislation. Time means everything when it comes to saving lives."

Rezin said the new law is imperative in maintaining jobs, doctors, and high technology for the Streator area.

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

Livingston Co. Public Health Dept. Attains Recertification

The Livingston County Public Health Department has received notification from the Illinois Department of Public Health indicating the department has achieved recertification status. This certification is effective for a five-year period, which began November 2. Certification status means the health department is in compliance with codes established by IDPH for local health departments, and that Livingston County's Community Needs Assessment and Health Plan for 2015-2020 has been approved.

The Health Plan priorities, identified by a committee of local stakeholders, to be addressed over the next five years include: education awareness and training, mental health, obesity, and substance abuse – including illegal drugs, prescription medications, alcohol and tobacco. The plan includes goals, objectives, and activities for each priority.

Community efforts may include: individual citizens taking steps to improve their own health and the health of their families,

businesses finding ways to improve the health of their employees, and towns identifying ways they can be healthier places to live. Health care providers and community agencies can lead the way, but without active participation by the community, at every level, success of the 2015-2020 work plan will be limited.

Steps to address obesity might include: personally getting to or maintaining a healthy weight, starting a company wellness program, or becoming a walking community.

Addressing substance abuse could include: if you smoke or vape – call 1-800-QuitYes for assistance with quitting, not selling or supplying alcohol to minors, educating your employees about the growing problem of prescription medication abuse by youth and adults. Similarly, addressing mental health could include educating yourself and/or your employees about mental health issues, warning signs to watch for in yourself, family, friends, or co-workers, and mental health resources available throughout the county.

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Check Out These End-of-Year Investment Tips

Who knows where the time goes? Although 2015 is almost in the books, you can still make some year-end investment and financial moves that may help you get off to a good start in 2016. Here are a few suggestions:

Boost your 401(k) contributions. Ask your employer if you still have time to add more to your 401(k) before the year ends. If not, at least increase your contributions in 2016, especially if your salary goes up.

Consider "tax-loss" selling. We experienced considerable turbulence in the financial markets this past year, so you may own some investments that have lost value. Generally speaking, it's a good idea to hold these investments if they still meet your needs, but if you do decide to sell them, you can use the loss to offset capital gains taxes on investments you've sold that have appreciated. If the loss from the sale was greater than your combined long- and short-term capital gains, you can deduct up to \$3,000 against other income. And if your losses exceed your capital gains by more than \$3,000, you can carry the remaining losses forward to future tax years.

Review your asset allocation. Make sure your asset allocation – that is, your investment mix – is still appropriate for your time horizon and goals. You might consider being a bit more aggressive if you're not meeting your financial targets, or more conservative if you're getting closer to retirement. If you want greater diversification, you might think about adding an asset class that tends to react to market conditions differently from your existing investments. Diversifying your portfolio may help reduce the impact of volatility; however, diversification, by itself, can't guarantee a profit or protect against loss. If you do need to adjust, or "rebalance," you can do fairly easily in tax-deferred accounts, such as your IRA or 401(k) – but for those investments held in a taxable account, you should talk to your tax advisor on how to manage the tax consequences of rebalancing.

Evaluate your insurance situation. This past year, did you undergo any changes in your personal life, such as marriage, divorce or the addition of a new child? If so, review your life and disability insurance to make sure they are sufficient for your needs, and list the proper beneficiaries on all insurance policies.

Start an emergency fund. If you don't already have one, start an emergency fund before the year is out. Ideally, you'd like to have between six and 12 months' worth of living expenses in such a fund; without it, you might be forced to dip into your long-term investments to pay for unexpected costs, such as a new furnace, a major car repair or a big medical bill. For this fund, you're less interested in return than in preservation of principal, so put your money in a low-risk, liquid account.

Making these moves can help you close out 2015 on a positive note – and ring in the new year with greater confidence in your financial future.

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
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U.S. Gas Prices Dip

The national average for the price of regular gasoline began declining again last week after a brief round of price increases, as markets reacted to Turkey downing a Russian fighter jet two weeks ago.

GasBuddy said the decline has resumed and Monday's national average is \$2.032 gallon.

"The U.S. average needs to fall just seven-tenths of a penny from its current \$2.032 per gallon to \$2.025 gallon to be the lowest prices since March 25, 2009," said Patrick DeHaan, GasBuddy senior petroleum analyst.

The Paper publishes last week's and this week's averages as of Mondays each week for the towns listed below.

Trustees in Odell are Brian Verdun, Jamie Johnson, Joan Bullard, Brian Mills, Gary Wykes, and Phaela Hodges. The village clerk is Iris Thorne.

On the positive side, the Odell Route 66 historic gas station was featured in two television commercials and a Japanese movie this year.

He joked that when the Japanese crew was in town to film, there was

only one person on the crew he could understand when they spoke.

Looking forward, Joyner wants to see the return of the summer "Odell Days" celebration and other town festivals to attract visitors.

"In 2016 we want to concentrate on making the town cleaner, making the town nicer," he said.

He and the trustees will also be looking at upgrading infrastructure such as replacing aging drainage tiles, which in some cases are 100 years old

and made of cracking clay.

The water treatment plant needs to be upgraded.

One selling point is two schools in town, the public Odell Grade School and St. Paul Catholic School.

"This gives residents in town a choice, which is unique in a small town," Joyner said.

"If the town looks nice and presentable, the business will come," Joyner believes.

ball is in their court at the moment. If the plan is not feasible, that will be the end of it, Serena explained.

Soon a new ordinance will be passed to prevent unwanted uses in the downtown district. A business opened up downtown which was against zoning ordinances and included a residence in the downstairs.

Serena said it took a long time and legal fees to eliminate the problem.

The solution is a new business registration ordinance, not yet ready for action, that will require each new business to be inspected by the city inspector, Dean Rankovich.

Meantime, spending money is being watched closely by the commissioners. He said Finance Commissioner

Dick Hileman "has a way with conserving money."

"If a snow plow breaks down, our guys fix it," instead of purchasing brand new equipment, he said, as an example of saving taxpayer revenue.

He talked about how the village constructed a salt storage facility for roughly \$20,000, a building that would have cost \$75,000 if the village had to contract the work out. It was done with all volunteer and city labor.

"Now we can store 150 tons of salt," and not have to purchase it every year with wildly fluctuating prices, he explained.

"We are saving our money, paying our bills," Serena said.

He said he gets a dozen bids on projects because the village has a reputation for paying its bills quickly.

Road improvement projects are done as money is accumulated in the motor fuel tax fund, he said, generally every three years or so.

In the meantime, cold patch is used to fill potholes or make minor repairs as needed.

This year, the biggest issue was Mayor Tom Wise passing away, leaving a leadership gap.

Serena, who had been a commissioner, stepped up to replace Wise.

Other commissioners along with Hileman are James Riley, parks and recreation; Terry Jensen, streets and alleys; and Rob Wolf, sewer and water.

Village Clerk is Pat Malinowski, with assistant Kaitlyn Marks.

Village maintenance employees are Brad Kingman and Joe McMeen.

Old business reminded the group that there will be no Jan. or Feb. meetings, in anticipation of inclement weather.


The Dec. lunch is usually hosted by the Garfield Township Board – Lorraine is checking on that.

Currently, nearly 9,000 sophomores, representing as many high schools nationwide, attend the Leadership Seminars annually.

For the fourth year in a row, DTHS is partnering with the Dwight Woman's Club to cover the cost of the weekend long seminar for two Dwight students.

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

After a 35-Year Career, McBeath to Leave Dwight Implement Dealership

Royce McBeath, 70, who has been working at the John Deere implement dealership in Dwight (now AHW), will retire at the end of this month after a 35-year stretch.

McBeath, who has been selling farm equipment in Dwight since he lost a job when Don Marx gave up the Dodge, Chrysler and Plymouth dealership in 1980, has been serving the local farming community through those 3½ decades, watching farms grow from small family farms to at least 15,000 acres.

"Which also means less clients," McBeath noted.

And he started his career in selling farm equipment due to a car customer, Steve Mayberry, who bought Chryslers from Don Marx.

Mayberry knew Marx was giving up the auto dealership.

"Mayberry came to me and said come to talk to Sean Hogan," McBeath remembered. At the time, Mayberry was a representative for John Deere. Mayberry "linked it up," with Hogan.

McBeath, a lifelong Dwight resident, remembers

telling Sean Hogan that he would only stay at the implementation dealership for a short time.

"I told him I probably won't be here that long."

That was 1980.

"You just get involved with it," he said of his reasons for staying. "I grew up on a farm. We had John Deeres on the farm."

When McBeath began, there was Sean and Dan Hogan, and McBeath in sales, and Mike Hogan did service work.

In addition to working for Don Marx's Garage previously, McBeath also rented two service stations in Dwight.

"Phil Becker worked for me at the Texaco Station," McBeath said, the historic Route 66 station at the intersection with Mazon Avenue.

Becker since had the station preserved as a historic site along Route 66.

McBeath said he likes working in sales because he gets along well with people.

"I went out to the farms and saw what I sold in operation," he said.

Over the years, he saw the agriculture business change and have dips and highs depending on economy.

ic conditions.

"When ag was down, we sold lawn and garden equipment," McBeath said. "We just kept growing."

The dealership, formerly Hogan Implement, joined with Walker and later Arends to form AHW in 2012, now up to 13 stores, including three in Indiana.

In addition to changes in the dealership, McBeath lost two friends and fellow employees over the years, Fred Drendel and Jim Thies.

"In those years I've lost two fellow employees, and good friends, and of course, many of my faithful customers," McBeath explained. "I will miss my fellow low employees and all of my customers, but it's time to have some new adventures. Looking forward to what lies ahead."

The company will be holding a retirement party for McBeath this month.

McBeath and Nancy, his wife of 50 years, continue to reside in Dwight, with a daughter, Lisa, married to Craig Long, and a son, Craig, married to Carrie. The McBeaths also have two grandchildren, Heather Long, 21, and Brandon Long, 19.

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
