## Ransom Village Board Cracks Down on Ordinance Disallowing Chickens

Ransom village residents were blindsided by a sudden letter they received asking them to remove their live chickens from their residence.

The Ransom Village Board had its attorney Sheryl Churney send out three letters to residents who are housing live chickens at their homes in the village.

"Chickens are not allowed to be kept within the village," the letter states, citing ordinance 97-06-03.

"I have been advised that you are keeping chickens on your property," the letter dated Dec. 23 continues. "Therefore you are in violation of this Ordinance. You are hereby directed to remove the chickens from your property on or before Jan. 31, 2016."

The letter further states that if the chickens are not removed from their property, the village will "act to enforce the ordinance."

ing about it," prior to her receiving the letter, she said.

Her ex-husband, Randy Stillwell, who is a trustee with the village board, also has chickens, which were divided as community property as part of the divorce, the wife said.

He had given Denise a "heads up" that the village may be forcing them to get rid of their chickens. According to Village Attorney Sheryl Churney, Randy's letter was received a month earlier and that the village has been trying to work with Randy for several months to eliminate the chickens.

Denise said she attended a meeting of the village in November due to the issue.

However, she said the board did not say she must be rid of the chickens at the November meeting, and was surprised to learn she had them.

Randy, however has a first court date today (Jan. 6) at which time he will either plead guilty or ask for a trial.

"I am going to court Jan. 6," Stillwell said. "I've had chickens for 30 years."

"I gave away 177 dozen eggs to people in town over the last two years," he added.

He said he was aware of the ordinance against such animals, which he voted for years ago. At the time, the village wanted one resident to get rid of a goat he had at his home.

But he also said before voting for the ordinance, he was told as long as his chick-

ens were "penned up," the village had no problem with his chickens.

"I am grandfathered in," he said. "What part of 'grandfathered' do they not understand?"

"I have a 12 foot by 24 foot outside pen," he explained. "I have not heard one complaint in 30 years."

"I've had these chickens in town 11 years before they passed that ordinance," he added.

Churney said she had no knowledge that the Stillwell chickens were "grandfathered in."

One thing that may have changed, Denise said, is Randy now has a rooster too.

"I do have one rooster," he explained, referring to the noise early in the morning by a rooster crowing. "But we have trains blowing their horns through town every 18 minutes. So that can't be it."

Randy thought this was more of a political move on the part of other board members who did not agree with Stillwell's past voting decisions.

"I feel there is some type of political reason," he said, for enforcing the ordinance now.

However, the ordinance states clearly that live chickens are not allowed at a village residence.

"No resident shall keep within the Village of Ransom any cattle, cows, horses, sheep, swine, goats, chickens, ducks, turkeys geese or other livestock," the ordinance states.

The third resident who received a similar letter could not be reached by *The Paper*, but Churney said both his letter and Denise Stillwell's letter were dated Dec. 23 while Randy Stillwell's was sent a month earlier.

According to Denise Stillwell, one of the people who received the letter, this makes no sense as she has had the chickens in town for more than two decades.

"I have five chickens in the back part of my garage," she explained. "They have heated water and a light on them 24 hours a day. No one in town ever had a problem with it."

She said she uses the chicken eggs to bake dozens of cookies for people at Christmastime, and would not be able to afford to do so without the poultry, which she described as "pets."

"The day after Christmas I get a letter from the village attorney," she said.

"Nobody ever said noth-

## Ice Storm Causes Blackouts Followed by Mild Snowstorm

Mother Nature unleashed her fury on *The Paper*'s circulation area last week with an ice storm causing massive power failures for 91,000 customers, rivers rising above flood level, and a report of a vehicle submerged in a creek in rural Dwight resulting in a fatality.

An ice storm rolled through the area Monday, Dec. 28, resulting in trees loaded with ice falling on power lines in addition to power poles snapping in strong winds.

"Ice on the lines and multiple poles snapped from the wind and ice," Liz Keating, Commonwealth Edison spokesperson said to *The Paper*.

Reports of 1.9 inches fell north of Coal City and between 1 to 2 inches in areas covered by *The Paper*, according to David Beachler.

ler, meteorologist for the National Weather Service of Romeoville.

And although the snow fell on the area, it was not likely to exacerbate the Vermillion River, already two feet above flood level in both Pontiac and north of Streator, Beachler said.

He said as of Dec. 30, the Vermillion River at Leonore was at 23.5 feet. Flood stage is 21 feet. The NWS projected it to be below flood stage as of Jan. 1.

In Pontiac, the river was 16.8 feet Dec. 30 while flood stage is 15 feet.

"It crested in Pontiac midnight Tuesday, Dec. 29," Beachler said.

### February

R.R. Donnelley recently announced it will end phone book production at its Harrisburg Pike plant in Lancaster, Pennsylvania. The production of phone books at Lancaster will cease during the last two weeks in March of 2015,

eliminating some 90 jobs.

Godley Park District received its first OSLAD grant for improvements, in the amount of \$400,000.

Dwight Principal Dan Kaiser presented information to the board about a program available to those students needing an alternative way to achieve their high school diploma and achieve their individual, academic, and employment goals.

Fifteen Dwight Township High students, along with two teachers, took on the challenge of freezing cold waters and plunged into Miller Park Zoo Lake to raise money for this year's Special Olympics.

### March

Illinois Governor Bruce Rauner cut funding for Amtrak some \$16-million in his proposed budget for fiscal year 2015-16, while last week the GOP-dominated

House of Representatives in Washington, D.C. approved a bill to grant \$1.4 billion to the rail passenger carrier for each of the next four years.

Dwight added \$12,000 more to its municipal sales tax coffers in 2014 than it did in 2013.

Correctional facilities in Illinois are over capacity, and supporters say a bill under consideration in Springfield would help reduce the prison population. House Bill 218, introduced by Representative Kelly Cassidy of Chicago, decriminalizes possession of small amounts of marijuana.

The Dwight Village Board of Trustees approved an Ordinance adopting the Fiscal Year 2015-2016 budget as presented following a Public Hearing on March 23. Village Administrator Kevin McNamara highlighted several aspects of the budget in a summary



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## Car Sinks in Dwight Creek Causing Fatality

The body of Shawn Beaupre, 49, of Bourbonnais, was found Wednesday, Dec. 30, roughly half a mile downstream from where his vehicle went into Gooseberry Creek just off the Campus Blacktop at the intersection of 3300 E and 3100 N Road in rural Dwight.

Mr. Beaupre was found in the west flooded ditch of 3300 E just north of 3100 N in Round Grove Township.

Livingston County Coroner Michael P. Burke pronounced him dead at 11 a.m. Dec. 30.

Livingston County Sheriff's Police received a call the day before at 8 a.m. that a vehicle was submerged in the creek at the intersection.

The first departments on the scene were Dwight Fire Protection District and Campus-Emington Fire Department, sent to the car which was submerged in water off the roadway on the morning of Dec. 29.

Tow trucks from several businesses assisted with pulling the vehicle out of the water using recovery cables.

While rescue crews on a boat made several attempts to attach the cable to the car, the vehicle was moved by the current and became fully submerged.

Additional dive rescue teams were dispatched from multiple fire departments in Grundy County and Will County.

"By the time the divers arrived, the water was moving at a pace that made diver operations unsafe," a news release issued by the Dwight Fire Department said.

Crews were able to remove a Blue 2011 Hyundai Sonata from the creek but no occupants were found.

"Ground searches for the missing driver were conducted on foot and by air with the assistance of an aerial search team in an airplane," the news release continued.

Livingston County Sheriff's Deputies and Dwight Police Officers were searching roadways and checking in with area residents for any details.

All searches were unsuccessful by nightfall on Dec. 29.

Searching resumed at 8 a.m. Dec. 30 with the use of both emergency responders and civilian volunteers.

There were 40 firefighters and EMS personnel, 30 civilians, and a large number of law enforcement officers participating in the search operation Dec. 30, which lasted from 8:30 to 10:30 a.m. when the body was found downstream from the original accident.

Other units involved in the search for Beaupre included the Illinois State Police Air Operations, Dwight Fire, and Campus-Emington, Cornell, Odell,

Fairbury, Forrest-Strawn-Wing, Saunemin, Cullom, Readings fire departments and EMS agencies from Dwight, Duffy and Selcas.

The Livingston County Sheriff's Department continues an investigation of the accident.

Burke said an autopsy has been scheduled.

Beaupre was a correctional officer at the Pontiac Correctional Center for the past 18 years.

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### Motorists Save in 2015

National regular gasoline prices at the pump are averaging \$1.988 gallon this week, 20 cents lower than the start of 2015.

Just 18 states had averages above \$2 gallon, and 75% of the nation's 130,000 gas stations are selling gasoline for under \$2 gallon, according to GasBuddy.com.

The yearly average last year in the U.S. was \$2.402 gallon compared to \$3.342 in 2014 and \$3.489 in 2013. 2015 was the third consecutive decline in the yearly national average.

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
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## 2015 Year In Review

After nearly 25 years of service to the Dwight Township High School Board of Education and its community, Board President Irv Masching stepped off of the Board.





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## Odell Receives Extension on Trail Grant Due to State Budget Woes

The Village of Odell will receive a one-year extension for the grant to be used to fund a Route 66 Trail in town.

Mayor Terry Joyner told his board at its regular meeting December 14, that the state is still without a budget and is withholding the grant funds.

Route 66 Trail Bids were tabled until the meeting this month.

In addition to tabling the opening of the bids, the board took no action on the proposed interest rates received from two banks on the Route 66 Trail project due to the hold put on the project.

In other business:

- Officer Brian Hoffmeyer from the Livingston County Sheriff's Department

ment reported that the village had a total of 112 calls and one citation issued in November.

- Joyner announced he is recommending Mark Tissiere as a new board member to replace Gary Wykes who resigned last month. Tissiere was voted onto the board by the trustees.

- Monty and Amy Jensen and Courtney Tjelle, representing Jensen's Amoco, requested that the village amend its liquor ordinance which requires the license holder live within the municipal boundaries. The board decided to defer the request to its attorney, Ed Legner, for revision to the ordinance.

- Adam Dantz explained the proposed Enterprise Zone, which includes Odell, Dwight, Chatsworth, Fair-

bury, Flanagan, Pontiac, in Livingston County and Dwight in Grundy County. A developer would be exempt from sales tax on new construction building materials, sales tax on personal property or equipment, utility tax and the Illinois state investment tax.

The Odell board approved the ordinance establishing the Enterprise Zone, with the approval of legal counsel. A special board meeting with legal counsel was to be held before December 31.

- Hoffmeyer, representing the Fraternal Order of Police, advised the board that the FOP would like to sponsor a 5-K run in Odell on May 21. The board agreed to the date.

## New 2016 State Laws Passed to Tackle Crime, Health, Safety

The Illinois Senate and House of Representatives are scheduled to return to Springfield on Jan. 13.

Meantime, the legislators passed many new laws last year that will be in effect in 2016 including:

- Crack down on drunk drivers.** Individuals who repeatedly drive under the influence of alcohol will have another barrier that can prevent them from getting back behind the wheel. The new law requires individuals convicted of two or more DUIs or reckless homicide convictions to install a Breath Alcohol Ignition Interlock Device as a condition of a Restricted Driving Permit.

- Designer Drug Manufacturers.** A new law combats dangerous synthetic or designer street drugs by targeting how they are made.

The law also allows prosecutors to reduce their wait for lab tests to show if the synthetic drug involved was illegal.

### Powdered caffeine crack down.

The sale of powdered caffeine to anyone younger than 18 and the sale of products consisting of or containing powdered alcohol will be prohibited under two new state laws.

### 9-1-1 false or prank calls.

Individuals convicted of making false or prank calls to 9-1-1 call centers or making other false reports to emergency responders could be held responsible for reimbursing the costs incurred by the responding emergency agency under a new law.

### New rules for police cameras.

As more police officers start to use body cameras, a new law establishes new rules and regula-

tions for officers who use the technology. The new law requires police officers who wear a body camera, to keep it on when conducting any law enforcement activities, among other rules.

### Measles, Mumps and Rubella vaccines.

Any child-care facility that cares for children six years or younger must show proof their employees received a vaccine for various diseases such as Measles, Mumps and Rubella.

### Private airport breast-feeding areas.

Major airports in Illinois will have one year to establish a private breast-feeding area set up behind the security screening process in 2016. The law also requires this area to include a chair and an electrical outlet and be outside the confines of a public restroom.

### Right to Try law.

A new law allows terminally-ill patients in Illinois to have access to clinical-trial, experimental medical treatments and medications.

### Pro-business, pro-growth legislation.

A new law will allow businesses to file and receive a permit directly from the state, instead of going through the federal government. That will speed up the application time and provide for more certainty for job creators, legislators believe.

### Bobcat hunting.

Hunters will be able to hunt bobcats to control overpopulation and keep the animal at healthy numbers under a new law. The season is Nov. 1 through Feb. 15. Also youth hunting licenses are now for youth up to 18, not 16.



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### Will the Presidential Election Affect Investment Outlook?

We're just a few weeks away from the first caucuses and primaries, so presidential election season is in full swing. As a voter, you may be keenly interested in the election process. But as an investor, should you be concerned?



## 'I've Been To Dwight'

The above statement could refer to a tour of the Mother Road with a stop at the Texaco Station. It could, also, be uttered by former residents of, or visitors to, the Dwight Correctional Center.

From 1879 through the 1970's, this declaration had a significant meaning. "I've been to Dwight" was a catch phrase for tens of thousands of satisfied patients from around the globe who were convinced that The Keeley Institute's "gold cure" had rid them of their alcohol and drug addictions, and it confirmed their continuing sobriety.

Though nearly forgotten today, the Keeley Company, based in Dwight, distributed this cure for addiction in Dwight and franchised clinics across America, Europe, and Australia between 1880 and 1966. The Institute's popular and international success insured that its founder, Dr. Leslie E. Keeley, was among the world's most famous physi-

cians at the turn of the 20th century. Dr. Keeley, however, faced constant accusations of quackery from biomedicine professionals, particularly the BMA and AMA.

The Trojans, missing their big man Drew Travers,


came out of the gate strong in the first quarter, and would go into the second leading 17-15.

## Kankakee Co. FB Foundation Applications Available; Support Expanded

The Kankakee County Farm Bureau Foundation is offering financial support to those furthering their education in an agriculturally-related field. The Foundation board of directors met November 6 and announced an expansion of their financial support. In order to complement the scholarships being available to graduating high school seniors, the program this year is being expanded to include support for those other than high school seniors. Through generous contributions from Farm Bureau members, businesses, and other organizations, this financial support is made possible.

To date, \$60,500 in scholarships has been awarded to Kankakee County students who are furthering their agricultural

education. Last year, nine \$1,000 scholarships were awarded to Kankakee County students, with five being high school graduates. The other four recipients were students in their second year of post-secondary education receiving the Kevin Yohnka Memorial Renewable Scholarship.

### Scholarships for High School Seniors

Scholarships of \$1,000 each will be made available to the 2016 graduating class. Applications are available from high school guidance counselors, agriculture advisors, and at the Kankakee County Farm Bureau office. Electronic copies of the application may also be requested by contacting the Farm Bureau office. Completed applications will be due at the office (or post-marked) by March 31.

The scholarships are offered to high school seniors whose primary residence is in Kankakee County or are a Kankakee County Farm Bureau member family. Applicants must be accepted to an accredited post-secondary educational institution with an agriculture-related field of study. Accredited post-secondary schools include colleges, universities, junior and community colleges, and technical and vocational schools. The applications will be assessed on four categories: demonstrated interest in agriculture, character and personality, academic performance and honors, and financial need.

The scholarship recipients will be notified in May but the funds will not be disbursed until the student has completed his or her first

grading period at the post-secondary school with a "C" grade point average or better. During the grading period, the recipient also must be a full-time student at his or her educational institution. The scholarship funds will then be disbursed to the scholarship recipient to be applied to post-secondary education expenses. Recipients are to submit official grade transcripts proving a "C" GPA or better by March 1, 2017, or the scholarship will be forfeited.

### Renewable Scholarships

The Foundation is again making available a one-time renewable scholarship for 2015 scholarship recipients. This renewable scholarship is known as the Kevin Yohnka Memorial scholarship and will be in the same denomination matching the recipient's first year scholar-

ship amount. To be considered for this renewable scholarship, the recipient must submit an essay no longer than one page to the Foundation when they submit their first grading period grade transcript which is due by March 1, 2017. The essay should detail experiences of their first semester. Based on the essays, the Foundation may choose recipients for this renewable scholarship.

### Expansion of Financial Support

For the first time, the Foundation is making scholarships available to those other than high school seniors. These scholarships are in the amount of \$1,000 each. To be eligible for consideration, the applicant must be accepted or enrolled as a full-time student at an accredited post-secondary school to study an agricul-

turally-related field. These applicants include transfer students, students who have changed their field of study to an agriculturally-related field, those who wish to return to school to further their agricultural education, and others. Applicants with ties to Kankakee County, Illinois, or a Kankakee County Farm Bureau member family will be given preference. Applications for this scholarship are available at the Farm Bureau office. As with other scholarships and financial assistance, final judgment of applications and qualifications will be at the discretion of the Foundation board.

Those who are participating in agriculturally-related workshops, conferences, and classes, should know that financial assistance for those programs is available.
