## Dwight Sales Tax Increase Effective July 1 Spring Cleanup Weekend and Free Yard Waste Pickup Date Set

Official election results from the Livingston County Clerk's Office were certified on April 1 authorizing a one percent municipal sales tax for the Village of Dwight. At its April 11 meeting, the Dwight Village Board of Trustees passed Ordinance #1370 making the Non Home Rule Municipal Service Occupation Tax imposed and effective July

Results from the March 15 General Primary Election showed that a total of 1,308 votes were cast with regard to Dwight's Sales Tax Referendum. The referendum passed with 964 "yes" votes cast with 344 "no" votes confirmed. The Non-Home Rule Tax increase applies only to non-titled or non-registered tangible personal property. It does not apply to the sale of qualifying food, drug, and medical appliances (for example food purchased at the grocery store or prescription and non-prescription drugs) and vehicles. Since visitors make up an estimated 60-65 percent of the shoppers in Dwight that would be impacted by the types of purchases affected by the additional sales tax, it is believed to be a valuable opportunity to generate revenue without putting the entire burden on local taxpayers. Revenues from the local tax increase will be used strictly for infrastructure repairs, specifically, streets, alleys and sidewalks.

In other matters, Spring is here, and yard cleanups are underway. On Saturday, April 23, the Village will have a town wide cleanup day starting at 9 a.m. Everyone is encouraged to come out and help. There will also be a free electronics recycling event on April 23. Residents can bring their unwanted electronic items to the downtown area where the recyclers will be set up to receive items.

Dwight residents are reminded that the Village offers free stick/branch pickup. Sticks should be placed out by the curb in neat piles with branches and sticks going in one direction to allow for ease of pick up. Root balls are not accepted and will not be picked up by the village. On the South side of town, sticks/branches are picked up on Monday and Friday of the designated recycling week. On the North side of town, sticks/branches are picked up on Monday and Friday of non-recycling weeks. Public Works Director Steve Kinkade told *The Paper* that while this schedule is adhered to as much as possible, water main issues or other urgent matters could cause the need for an occasional last minute change to this schedule.

In conjunction with the cleanup day, Dwight will sponsor one FREE yard waste pickup on Monday, April 25. In addition, yard waste (leaves, etc) pickup is every Monday throughout the summer. All yard waste must be in Kraft style biodegradable bags or loose in rigid containers. Other than the free pickup on April 25, stickers are required on each bag/container and can be purchased at the Village Hall and Ace Hardware. Stickers are \$3.65 each. Yard waste must be at the curb by 6 a.m. to ensure pickup. The next free yard waste pickup will be in the fall. Yard waste is picked up

by Republic Services. Police Chief Tim Henson updated the board on police efforts with regard to continued area burglaries.

"We are getting hammered with burglaries and the county is getting hammered - it is all around," said Henson. "We have a full court press put on trying to handle them and we have some evidence that has been sent to the lab to be analyzed."

## Gardner FPD Board Questions Railroad Plans

Gardner Protection District board discussed issues related to the proposed Great Lakes Basin Railroad at its meeting April

According to one of the trustees, the GLB is estimating that as many as 110 trains a day will use the track, which is planned to cut through land south of Gardner in Grundy County.

Due to the number of trains, the board has questioned how this will impact Gardner and the surrounding fire districts.

"How many lines will be going through? How will it affect property tax and the value of farm land? Will they be transporting hazmat materials? How many crossings will be put in? How will it affect Gardner's response times?'

trains using the tracks daily, response could be severely impacted," the believes.

They said more than one Gardner Fire trustee will be attending the meeting of the proposed railroad at Seneca High School, 5:30 p.m., Thursday, April 21.

In a related matter to response times, the board heard from Deputy Chief Brian Jensen that calls to other districts will be increasing due to the fact that Braceville, Dwight, Mazon and South Wilmington are struggling for manpower.

Gardner is "more than willing" to help its neighbors but Gardner is putting wearand-tear on its ambulance responding to surrounding district calls and doesn't receive any tax revenue in return, creating a hardship on local taxpayers.

Dwight and Gardner may share training to cut down on expense for both fire districts, the trustees heard.

## Gas Jumps to \$2.12

The average price of regular unleaded gasoline in the U.S. jumped to \$2.12 this week, an increase of 6.8 cents from a week ago.

'Gasoline prices increased in 49 of 50 states, thanks to a sudden jump in the prices of crude oil tied to speculation of a change or freeze in oil output at this weekend's meeting in Koha, Qatar," said Patrick DeHann, GasBuddy analyst.


'The lack of a clear vision to cut or even freeze crude oil production will likely lead to a sharp sell off in oil markets to start this week as global oil production continues to outpace demand," he added.



Reduce, Reuse, Recycle: A Theme for Investors?

On April 22, we observe Earth Day. Like many people, you might participate in some activities to help the health of our planet. But you can also do some things to improve your personal investment environment.

In fact, you might want to follow a key environmental theme: reduce, reuse, recycle. How can these elements be applied to investing? Here are some ideas: Reduce - You don't want to waste time, effort and money on investment decisions that will ultimately not benefit you much, if at

These techniques may have some validity, but, unfortunately, some investors zigzag from one to another, hoping to eventually find that "sure ticket" to investment success. You need to develop, and reuse year after year, an investment strategy created just for you, based on your individual needs, goals, comfort with risk and investing time horizon. Of course, you may well need to adjust this strategy over time to reflect changes in your life — but "adjusting" isn't the same as "abandoning." Sticking with a long-term, personalized strategy is an effective - and less stressful - way of pursuing your financial objectives.

Recycle - When you put money in some investments, you don't just make a one-time payment and then hope to eventually make a profit when you sell - you can actually "recycle" your investment earnings and put them to good use. To illustrate: If you invest in dividend-paying stocks, you can typically sign up for a dividend-reinvestment plan and, as the name suggests, reinvest the dividends back into the stock. 

## Teddy Roosevelt Illuminates Lavish New Livingston Hotel

by the Dwight

Historical Society

Note: This is part of a weekly series of articles about the Keeley Institute that will be appearing in The Paper until the July 14-17 Alcohol and Drug **History Society conference** in Dwight.

After the February 1902 fire, the Leslie E. Keeley Co. commenced immediately to rebuild more elaborate administration and laboratory buildings, as well as a world-class new Livingston Hotel.

This time, however, the boiler would be housed in a separate Power House to provide heat and electricity to the buildings.

In June 1903, President Theodore Roosevelt arrived at the Dwight Depot, greeted by cannon fire, the Dwight Band and the cheering of thousands. A wire was run from the Keeley Power House to the depot, and following remarks, Roosevelt pushed a button and illuminated the new Livingston

Hotel for the first time. The the hotel. president had been to Dwight months earlier as Vice-President, and perhaps also in 1892 to visit his brother, Elliott (Eleanor Roosevelt's father), who took the Gold Cure without a positive outcome.

Designed by Julian Barnes of Chicago, the new featured Livingston columns, porches, reading, music and amusement rooms, and a library. A private entrance, reception room and parlor again allowed ladies to avoid public exposure on occasions of respite from the nearby Ladies Home.

The dining room featured a fireplace, chandeliers, columns, and mosaic floors. Silverware, china and glassware bore the Keeley company monogram. The modern kitchen was wellequipped. Dwight water works served the Keeley complex, while filtered, chilled drinking water supplied by an artesian well was piped to faucets throughout

The second floor housed the manager and guest suites with private bathrooms, and additional sleeping rooms. About 100 sleeping rooms were on the third floor. Sleeping rooms had telephones connected to the hotel's switchboard. The basement housed the laundry, employee retiring rooms, a staff dining room, and state-of-the-art barbershop.

The Livingston Hotel was thoroughly fireproof, with iron staircases and wood used only for doors and window frames.

The night after the lights were lit at the Livingston, Dwight residents braved rainy weather to tour the hotel while the local Mandolin Orchestra played in the music room.

Upon leaving, each lady was presented with an aluminum pin tray featuring a picture of the Livingston Hotel, Laboratory and Power House as a souvenir of the opening night.



CONSTRUCTED WITH AN eye to beauty, and a commitment to providing excellent service to patrons, every room from the top floor to the basement of the new Livingston Hotel was decorated in a different color scheme and outfitted with madeto-order furniture and the most modern of conveniences. Each floor offered suites with private baths and porcelain bathtubs. The beds were all brass or metal and each room had a telephone connected to the hotel switchboard. Submitted photo

have on such a use downtown.

In another matter related to zoning, the board discussed six non-conforming legal multi-family dwellings in town where zoning only allows single-family use.

The board decided that to have those six parcels changed to single family or to become permitted uses, the homeowners will have to

go through a zoning hearing at their expense.

Belt pointed out that it was legal for the village to zone those parcels at the time as non-conforming legal uses, but as of 2010, those types of properties will be unable to be sold for a bank mortgage or a loan for remodeling due to changes in banking regula-

## Summer Projects Under Review by Dwight Grade School

Arbor Management Contract Renewed/April BOE Actions

by Madelyn Fogarty

Summer projects were again discussed when the Dwight Grade School Board of Education met on April

Last month, a mechanical inspection report on the existing HVAC systems at Dwight Grade School was also reviewed with the BOE deciding to move forward with the bidding process to replace the current boiler heating system as well as explore what the costs would be to add air conditioning to the building. With the bidding process currently underway, it is expected that recommendations for moving forward will be presented at the May meeting. As part of the process, there will be some asbestos abatement that will need to take place over a period of approximately ten days this summer prior to the HVAC project starting. While the new heating solution and new controls is the main RFP, there is also an addendum for a cooling solution for the building and a third addendum for removing the water tank associated with the old boiler system. Currently the board has not committed to any project and each piece of the proposed HVAC project will be approved, or rejected, individually. If approved to proceed, an early fall completion date is expected with HVAC project. Approved HVAC related projects will be funded by County Facility Sales Tax revenues (1 cent sales tax) and not funded by local

received in sales tax revenue. Monies used for physical building improvement projects are not tied to education or salaries.

Also discussed last month was the possible need for extensive roof work. However, following a roof inspection, the architect has advised district officials that the current roof can be utilized for two or three more years before the work is needed. There is currently one year left of the roof's warranty.

In other business, the Dwight Grade School BOE approved a contract renewal with Arbor Management as the school's food service provider at a cost of \$158,657 for the 2016/17 school year – an increase over 2015/16 of approximately \$4,000. Arbor Management is currently on year five of a five year contract with the Dwight district. The new contract can be annually renewed for four more years, but must be approved by the board each

Coolant lasts a long time, but keeping track of when it was last changed, especially in older cars, can help you avoid overheating as the temperatures gradually

How often do you wash your car? Every week? Once a month? Whenever you feel like it? Some of us wash our cars more regularly than others. We take it to an automatic car wash, or if we are feeling energetic, we pull it into the driveway, get out the hose and bucket, and wash it ourselves. If you choose the latter, keep in mind that there is a right and a wrong way to wash a car. For the ultimate protection, you should wash your car on

a regular basis. Don't wait until it is covered in bugs, dirt and other debris. The longer contaminants sit on the surface, the more damage they do. If you commute a long distance or live in an area with acid rain, rinse off your car often to remove contaminants and prevent damage to the finish.

No matter how much rinsing you do, you need to wash your car from time to time. Do so in the morning while your car is still cool to the touch. Don't wait until the late afternoon when it is hot. The heat on the surface will dry the soap and water quickly, leaving behind a dull film on the finish.

Select products made for washing cars. Don't use regular household detergents, which could scratch the finish, remove the protective wax coating and dull the paint. If you have a lot of bugs and tar on your car, you may need to purchase a product for that.

To wash your car, fill up two buckets, one with soapy

water and the other with rinse water, and use several large sponges or wool's mitts. Rinse off the car first to remove all loose debris. This will prevent the debris from getting scrubbed into the finish and scratching the paint. Then wash the car in sections, leaving the tires and wheels for last.

When you have finished with the body of your car, it's time to attack the tires and wheels. Use a clean sponge and wipe away all of the dirt and grime. For tough spots, use wheel cleaner and

When you have completed washing your car, rinse it off all over one more time, using a fine spray at a low angle. Then dry it with terry cloths. Don't let your car dry on its own. Water spots will appear, and after a while. these can wear into the paint and become permanent marks.

Depending upon the size of your car, it should take you anywhere from half an hour to a couple of hours to wash your car. Don't forget about the interior. You might as well clean it too, or at the very least, remove all of the trash from it.

A clean car is a happy car. Keep yours happy and looking its best by washing it regularly.

## **DIY Spring Car Care**

Through preparation, time, money and mechanical skills, your vehicle survived the winter. Spring has arrived, and once again, you will need to prepare your vehicle for the upcoming season. Many people will take their vehicle to a shop and say, "Call me when it's done," while others won't maintain their vehicle at all. But you, you're different. You're going to pop the hood and get your trusty steed ready to take to the road.

Checking the tire pressure and wiper blades and cleaning the interior are maintenance 101 for you. You're more concerned with the inner workings of the vehicle. Start with the battery. Check the posts and connections. Make sure they are free of corrosion and making good contact. The same goes for the spark plugs—clean them if necessary. Spark plugs can fire three million times every

1,000 miles, so proper oper-

Check the oil and oil fil-

ation is crucial.

ter. Your vehicle's manual will have recommendations on how often to change the oil and filter. A good rule of thumb is every 3,000 to 5,000 miles. Make sure you are using the correct grade of oil. The outside temperature is now warmer, and as you probably know, oil gets thicker when it's cold and thinner when it's hot. Using an oil grade of 10W40 means that the oil will flow at a 40 viscosity rate during

the warmer spring months.

Another filter to check is your vehicle's air filter. The air filter keeps dust and other debris from getting into the engine's moving parts. Dust and debris in your vehicle's engine can cause it to be less efficient and underperform. It is a good idea to replace the air filter annually or every 12,000 to 15,000 miles.

Next, check the coolant level. The radiator on a cold engine should be completely full. The reservoir should be at the "cold" level. Again, check the vehicle's owner's manual to determine when the system should be flushed and fresh coolant added.

The next level to check is the brake fluid level. If the level has fallen below the "low" mark, it may indicate excessive brake wear or a leak somewhere in the system. Unless you are certified to repair brake systems, you should take the vehicle to someone who is. This function of the vehicle is too important to not be overseen by a professional.

Check all the belts and hoses. Winter could have damaged these parts. Replace any fraying belts or bulging hoses.

Being a do-it-yourselfer can be rewarding and save you money. But keep in mind that your vehicle is one of the most expensive things you own. It can also be dangerous if not properly maintained. Do your best to do it yourself, but consult a professional if you're not sure what you are doing.

## Here comes the rain: Expert tips for wet weather driving

When it comes to driving in the rain, windshield wipers, headlights and brakes will only get you so far. More than 1 million car crashes occur each year as a result of weather conditions, according to the Federal Highway Administration. Most of them have to do with wet roadways, and many of them could likely be prevented by the right set

As El Nino looms in the West, and the inevitable April showers approach elsewhere, drivers across the United States should turn their attention to the rubber that meets the proverbial and also very literal - wet

Nearly a quarter of all car crashes are caused by weather, according to the Department U.S. Transportation. Of those, nearly three quarters can be attributed to wet pavement. When roadways are slick, dangers such as skidding and hydroplaning quickly become concerns. Tires can be the best defense against such hazards, as a healthy, reliable set of tires will give your vehicle the traction it needs to safely stop and corner on slick roadways. Before the tires can do their job, drivers will need to take a few steps of their own.

Before you hit the road, know what to look for on your tires.

Tire tread helps to channel rainwater safely between your tires and the road - but only if there's enough tread available to do so. When new, tire tread runs 9/32 of an inch deep. Tires are legally worn out with just 2/32 of an inch of tread remaining, but this doesn't leave enough depth in wet conditions.

Tire Rack, America's largest independent tire tester and consumer-direct source for tires, makes an even safer recommendation. "When rain is a concern, as it will be for much of the U.S. throughout the spring, drivers should replace their tires when they reach 4/32 of an inch of remaining tread depth," says Woody Rogers, product information specialist at Tire Rack. "By the time you reach 2/32 of an inch. your tires won't have enough tread to avoid hydroplaning.'

To make sure that your tread is deep enough to keep your tires firmly rooted on the surface of the road, Tire Rack recommends a simple quarter test. Place a quarter upside down into the grooves on your tires. If some part of George Washington's head is covered by tread, then you have at least 4/32 of an inch left. "The difference between



2/32 of an inch and 4/32 is admittedly very small," Rogers says, "but the impact on safety is quite large."

If hydroplaning occurs, coast carefully.

Hydroplaning happens when water on a roadway and vehicle speed combine to cause one or more of your tires to lift from the surface

of the road. When this happens, the vehicle's steering wheel will likely jerk, and the vehicle could pull abruptly toward the puddle.


