Herscher Unit 2 to Write Letter On Issues Related to GLB Railroad Plans

The Herscher Unit 2 School board will relay possible negative consequences to the school district of the proposed Great Lakes Basin railroad.

Stopping shy of a resolution against the proposed railroad, the board directed Superintendent Rich Decman to draft a letter to the railroad at its meeting May 9.

The project will be shipping crude oil across northern Kankakee County through the Reddick-Essex area as well as Bonfield and Limestone. It is expected that there will be hundreds of trains a day, each loaded with hazardous crude oil.

The purpose of the railroad, the first new railroad built in the United States in more than 100 years, is to avoid the congested, densely-populated Chicago metro areas.

"There will be 15 miles of track in our district," Decman explained.

He said the railroad would increase transportation times of students, already riding on the bus for an hour.

"The longest rides could be going from an hour to 70 minutes," Decman said.

Decman added that the board is also concerned about trains rambling through the school district every 15 minutes, containing more than 100 tanker cars filled with flammable

crude oil.

One citizen spoke about other issues involving the railroad, including slicing through farms and possibly making part of the farm inaccessible by roads. He asked that the board oppose the railroad.

The board also made some personnel decisions including hiring Assistant Principal Brad Elliot as principal at Herscher High School.

Jeff Brureur will be high school social science teacher and Jill Decman will be high school chemistry and physics teacher.

Futures Unlimited Enters the Plant 'Ballz' Business

Little balls of organic material will soon be blooming into herbs, vegetables, and flowers with the help of a company that employs disabled workers in Livingston County.

The directions are fairly simple: plant in ground or a planter, water regularly, and watch them bloom.

Futures Unlimited of Pontiac owns Seedballz, a company that produces the seedling balls. Staff makes the organic material which is then processed by disabled workers who roll the seed

material into balls, dry it overnight, package it, staple the bags and label the bags for shipment to retailers.

The Seedballz are currently on sale at retailers in Pontiac, Fairbury, and at Franklin Corner in Dwight.

Plans are to get into other Livingston County retail shops.

In March, Seedballz was selected from one of eight new national products for a cleaner, greener lifestyle at the Natural Products Expo in California.

The Seedballz Garden Cookie Kit was selected as a national standout product by

the W. blog Editorial board from: NewHope360.com

Vegetable varieties include lettuce, tomatoes, cucumbers, spring onions, spinach, mesclun mix, and swiss chard. Herbs include basil, cilantro, dill, and an herb mix of parsley, chive, cilantro and basil. Flowers in bloom are bachelor button, black-eyed susan, calendula, coreopsis, cosmos, edible flowers, forget-me-nots, hummingbird mix, poppy, seeds of hope, sunflower, and wildflower mix.



Dwight's Renfrew Park to Be Site for 2016 Harvest Days Celebration Bonds Approved for Improvement Projects

The use of Dwight's Renfrew Park for the 2016 fall Harvest Days festival has been approved by the Dwight Village Board of Trustees. At its May 9 meeting, the Board's concerns were addressed as it reviewed the proposed layout and heard preliminary details from Harvest Days President Jerry Beier as to how the event would be handled.

Due to planned construction this fall on Dwight's downtown railroad crossings and streets, Harvest Days activities normally held in the downtown area will have to move to an alternate location with Dwight's Renfrew Park area being the space now designated for this year's family entertainment including the flea market, craft vendors, food vendors, and daytime stage entertainment.

No alcohol will be allowed in Renfrew Park during the festival. The plan is also for the carnival to be set up in the vicinity of Dwight's swimming pool.

The annual car and tractor show will also remain at the park as in previous years. At this time, any nighttime adult entertainment, such as music/bands, will be left up to the individual local downtown establishments to provide as desired.

Safety was one large concern that Beier addressed.

"All emergency officials have agreed that the park will work for what they need it to do," Beier told the Board explaining that there will be a designated emergency entrance with emergency vehicles and supplies stationed at the park.

"Neighborhood safety is one of our biggest concerns every year because, every year, Harvest Days is in somebody's neighborhood," said Beier. "I don't think our plan here changes that we are going to be next door to somebody."

However, Beier told the board that Dwight's Police Chief has indicated he is comfortable with the plan and that police officers will be out and visible with an officer in the park all night long. A temporary six foot high, 600 foot long chain link fence is being proposed to run along the north property line of the park to protect against trespassing onto personal property that is adjacent to the park's north side.

Fence rental is an expected additional cost to Harvest Day's of \$1,500. "Over the years that I have been part of Harvest Days, we have had very little, if any, complaints of people getting out of hand," said Beier. "I can promise you we will be set up for a lot of 'what ifs.'"

The park will be well lit with four generator-run, low noise, light poles placed strategically in the park and

pointed in a way that will not be intrusive to neighboring homes.

Traffic flow and parking in the park area were also discussed with the current plan showing Morris Road as two-way traffic with parking allowed on the East side only; no parking allowed on E. North Street; Franklin Street offering handicapped parking on the left side and one way traffic only;

Spencer Street will have normal two-way traffic and no parking will be allowed since this is actually railroad property.

Park damage was another concern to which Beier expressed confidence that the park may actually be left in better condition due to hours of pre-work to fill holes and make the grounds conducive to hosting the event along with many post-event hours to cleanup and make repairs.

One drawback is the probable need to rent generated power to supply electricity for the weekend at an estimated expense of \$14,000. The proposed need is 1200 amps.

Harvest Days activities at Renfrew Park will wind down with most concluding by 7 p.m. with the exception of the carnival which will run until 10 p.m., and food vendors which may be encouraged to stay open during carnival hours.

Source of Water: MAZON To determine Mazon's susceptibility to groundwater contamination, the following documents were reviewed: a Well Site Survey, published in 1990 by the Illinois EPA and the Source Water Assessment written in 2003. Based on the information obtained in this document, there are 7 potential sources of groundwater contamination that could pose a hazard to groundwater utilized by Mazon's community water supply. They are all abandoned or improperly plugged wells. In addition, information provided by the Leaking Underground Storage Tank and Remedial Project Management Sections of the Illinois EPA indicated sites with on-going remediation that might be of concern. Based upon this information, the Illinois EPA has determined that the Mazon Community Water Supply's source water is susceptible to contamination. As such, the Illinois EPA has provided 5-year recharge area calculations for the wells. The land use within the recharge areas of the wells was analyzed as part of this susceptibility determination. This land use includes predominantly agricultural properties. 



WHEREAS, it is necessary for the best interests of the Village that the Project be completed, and in order to raise funds required for such purpose it will be necessary for the Village to borrow an aggregate principal amount of not to exceed \$5,500,000 and in evidence thereof to issue alternate bonds, being general obligation bonds payable from (i) all collections distributed to the Village from Retailer's Occupation Taxes, Service Occupation Taxes, Use Taxes and Service Use Taxes, including the Non-Home Rule Infrastructure Municipal Retailers' Occupation and Service Occupation Taxes (collectively, the "Sales Taxes" or the "Pledged Revenues") and (ii) ad valorem taxes of the Village for which its full faith and credit have been irrevocably pledged, unlimited as to rate or amount (the "Pledged Taxes"), in an aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$5,500,000, all in accordance with the Act; and

WHEREAS, if the above-mentioned revenue source is insufficient to pay the alternate bonds, ad valorem property taxes upon all taxable property in the Village without limitation as to rate or amount are authorized to be extended to pay the principal of and interest on the alternate bonds;

WHEREAS, pursuant to and in accordance with the provisions of Section 15 of the Act, the Village is authorized to issue alternate bonds, in one or more series, in an aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$5,500,000 for the purpose of providing funds for the Project and to pay the Costs;

NOW THEREFORE, Be It Ordained by the Board of Trustees of the Village of Dwight, Livingston and Grundy Counties, Illinois, as follows:

Section 1. Incorporation of Preambles. The Corporate Authorities hereby finds that all of the recitals contained in the preambles to this Ordinance are full, true and correct and does incorporate them into this Ordinance by this reference.

Section 2. Determination To Issue Bonds. It is necessary and in the best interests of the Village to complete the Project and paying the Costs, alternate bonds, in one or more series, of the Village are hereby authorized to be issued and sold in an aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$5,500,000, known as "General Obligation Bonds (Alternate Revenue Source), Series 2016C" (the "Bonds") of the Village, said Bonds being payable from (i) all collections distributed to the Village from Retailer's Occupation Taxes, Service Occupation Taxes, Use Taxes and Service Use Taxes, including the Non-Home Rule Infrastructure Municipal Retailers' Occupation and Service Occupation Taxes (collectively, the "Sales Taxes" or the "Pledged Revenues") and (ii) ad valorem taxes of the Village for which its full faith and credit have been irrevocably pledged, unlimited as to rate or amount (the "Pledged Taxes").

Section 3. Publication. This ordinance, together with a notice in the statutory form, shall be published once within ten days after passage hereof by the Corporate Authorities in The Paper, being a newspaper of general circulation in the Village, and if no petition, signed by 200 electors (said number being the greater of (i) seven and one-half percent (7½%) of the registered voters in the Village or (ii) the lesser of 200 registered voters or 15% of registered voters), asking that the question of the issuance of the Bonds be submitted to the electors of the Village, is filed with the Village Clerk of the Corporate Authorities within thirty (30) days after the date of the publication of this Ordinance and said notice, then this Ordinance shall be in full force and effect and the Bonds shall be authorized to be issued. A petition form shall be provided by the Village Clerk at the principal office of the Village, located at 209 South Prairie Avenue, Dwight, Illinois, to any individual requesting one.

Section 4. Additional Ordinances. If no petition meeting the requirements of applicable law is filed during the petition period hereinabove referred to, then the Corporate Authorities may adopt additional ordinances or proceedings supplementing or amending this Ordinance providing for the issuance and sale of the Bonds and prescribing all the details of the Bonds, so long as the maximum amount of the Bonds as set forth in this Ordinance is not exceeded and there is no material change in the purposes described herein.

DGS Moves Forward with Boiler System; AC Costs Leave Chill in the Air

Summer maintenance projects at Dwight Grade School will soon be moving forward, but adding air conditioning to the over 50 year old building will not be part of this summer's project list.

Following a public hearing on May 11, to which there was no public comment with regard to the possible issuance of general obligation bonds in the amount of \$3 million for potential use towards a heating/cooling system, the DGS Board of Education reviewed bids for replacement of the current boiler heating system along with the costs to add air conditioning to the building.

While most board members felt air conditioning would be a nice improvement, some were concerned that it might send a bad message to taxpayers in the financially-strapped district. Another concern was that, if sales tax revenues should fall short of expectations, it could mean an additional financial hardship for the district posing risks many board members simply were not willing to take. No motion was made by the Board with regard to an A&R Mechanical bid of \$1,510,000 for installation of air conditioning.

"I think it sends a really bad message," said BOE member Joel Funk. "Air conditioning is a luxury more than a necessity at this point."

Board member Nick Stipanovich agreed that now was not the right time to make the \$1.5 million financial commitment towards air conditioning the Dwight Grade School building.

"I think we shoot for that goal, but not right now," said Stipanovich.

The BOE did approve a low bid of \$331,519.00 from A & R Mechanical, Inc. for installation of a new boiler and controls. An A&R Mechanical bid was also accepted for the removal of existing piping at a cost of

\$9,250. Along with the new boiler system, an area of asbestos abatement will be necessary with a bid cost of \$46,430 from Midwest Service Group approved for the abatement work.

The BOE will issue \$300,000 in bonds with the balance needed for the heating project coming from Capital Projects Fund 60, Operations & Maintenance Fund, and Health Life Safety. Monies used for physical building improvement projects are not tied to education or salaries.

In other business, the BOE approved Brandon Owens as Dwight Grade School's new Assistant Principal / Athletic Director starting with the 2016-17 school year. Mr. Owens comes to Dwight bringing six years of teaching experience at the middle school level and three years of administrative experience in Kindergarten through 8th grade. He earned his Bachelor Degree from Olivet Nazarene University and his graduate level degrees in Administration and Curriculum and Instruction through American College of Education.

"Mr. Owens' past experiences in the classroom, as a coach, and as an administrator will be a great assets to our school community," DGS Principal Ben Bailey told *The Paper*.

"He has already scheduled time to shadow Mr. Fox before the school year ends and is eager to bring his abilities and attributes to the Dwight Redbirds!"

Mr. Owens will replace Mr. Jon Fox who has accepted a position in another district.

After discussion, the BOE voted to continue services provided by the School Resource Officer. For more than two decades, Dwight's School Resource Officer has provided a wide variety of programs such as Drug Abuse Resistance Education, intruder training, and gang prevention along with simply giving students, the community, and

police an opportunity to build positive relationships. While school officials view the SRO as a valuable asset, some board members feel the program might need to be reevaluated for effectiveness. The DGS BOE passed a motion to enter into a three-year intergovernmental agreement with the Village of Dwight for the SRO program services at a cost of \$11,000 for year one, and \$12,000 for years two and three. In addition, extracurricular event officers will be paid at a rate of \$35 per hour for the 2016/17 school year and then \$40 per hour for the 2017/18 and 2018/19 school years. The contract can be dissolved at any time with 60 days' notice. Board member Kim Frauli opposed the move.

The board also:

• set date for the Board retreat as June 23.

• discussed Triple-I Conference attendees with expenditures approved for registration only.

• re-employed Track Coaches for 2016-17 including Tammy Stolzenbach, Stinnett Gettinger, and Jamie Oelschlager.

• agreed to summer school programming and staffing needs

• approved IASB Board Policy Update Recommendations.



Gardner Village Attorney: Gardner Can't Require Sales Tax Payments

The Village of Gardner cannot require a business within the village to collect and pay sales taxes to the state.

That was the message of Village Attorney Scott Belt when asked May 9 by Gardner Commissioners regarding an issue with one business in town.

Earlier this year, the com-

missioners passed an ordinance requiring new businesses to register so the village can monitor proper use of the property as pertains to zoning laws.

But when Sharon Pickles spoke to the board and pointed out a new business that had not registered and was collecting sales tax, commissioners questioned what authority they had.

Mayor Mike Serena explained that collecting sales taxes were the responsibility of the state.

Belt said if they know of a business not paying sales tax, they can report it to the state, but the state has jurisdiction.

He added that handing

out the license plates as souvenirs was successful and many towns may request this as a souvenir again in 2017.

Dan Alexander, in charge of the car show, applauded the use of music provided by Don Phillips, and the Rock-a-thon collected a pickup truck full of food for the needy in town.

Alexander asked if his group could do the car show again, to which the board said a resounding "yes."

Pickles asked about cleaning up commercial property such as a towing facility and boat dealer.

The board also discussed a plan to seek an additional 25 feet of space from Union Pacific from Division to Washington Streets when the railroad installs a protective fence for high speed rail.

In other action, the board:

- chose not to raise the water and sewer rates by 5% to save citizens money.

- heard a report from the Grundy County Sheriff's Police that during April, there were four thefts and 31 arrests made.

- learned from Belt that the village has title to Roots Street and therefore can choose to vacate it for a business located there which wishes to park trucks on the unused street.
