# Brad Elliot Steps In As New Herscher High School Principal

A 2002 graduate of Herscher High School will now be the administrative head of the school.

The Herscher Unit 2 school board hired him for the 2016-17 school year as principal, replacing George McKenna who resigned March 14.

McKenna turned in his notice after the December controversy involving high school wrestling coach David Murphy who was accused of alleged drinking

with students and other alleged abuse.

Elliot has been serving as assistant principal at the school for three years, having taught junior high math at Limestone before taking the assistant principalship.

"I'm excited for the opportunity," Elliot told The Paper last week.

"I understand there are new challenges coming my way but I am up for the challenges. This is truly a dream job for me. I hope to serve the district in this capacity for a long, long time."

He said he has some general goals in mind including: "Building trust in the staff and community, being service-minded and supporting teachers with instructional needs.'

He said another goal is building the relationship between the different schools in the district.

"We want to make it a welcoming place," Elliot continued. "We're really all on the same team and want to do what's best for the students."

Elliot and his wife Timoney have one threemonth-old daughter, Charle-

Dwight Township High School Board of Education has approved a one-year contract renewal with food services provider Arbor Management for the 2016-17 school year.

At its May 18 session, the DTHS BOE approved the contract which includes a 2.6% increase in Arbor Management fees. Breakfast / Lunch price list increases were approved with student breakfast remaining at \$1.75 and plate lunch increasing to \$2.90. Ala carte items will see an increase of ten cents each on most items as recommended.

In another matter, the board discussed this summer's softball dugout project. The board approved the concept of block wall structures for the proposed new softball dugouts with an estimated cost of \$51,344. The district will be formally going out to bid on the project at the end of this month. The DTHS BOE will have a

special meeting in early June to discuss approvals of the bids on concrete footing / flatwork and block construction of the home and visitor dugouts. The board also discussed fencing options to help protect private property adjacent to the field.

# **Auditor General of Illinois** Is Being Audited

Former State Representative Frank Mautino, who was appointed Illinois Auditor General last fall upon the retirement of William Holland, is facing an audit of his past campaign spending habits.

His appointment as State Auditor General attracted the attention of a downstate government accountability group, the Edgar County Watchdogs, as well as that of OpenThe Books.com, a government watchdog group established by one-time candidate for Governor, Adam Andrezjewski, a 1987 graduate of Herscher High School.

Both of the above watchdog groups went public early this year with questions about Mautino's campaign spending while he served as Representative. Mautino is from Spring Valley.

A spokesman for **Auditor General Frank** Mautino confirmed Thursday, May 19, that a Federal investigation is also underway on Mautino's campaign spending while Mautino was an Illinois state representative.

That statement followed a report in the Springfield, **Illinois** Times that a federal grand jury had issued subpoenas to former campaign Mautino workers.

Newman explained that Illinois 76th District State his committee oversees the campaign disclosure documents that must be filed with the Board of Elections to Streator -- former Dwightite insure they reflect the source of funding and purpose for the expenditures made by political committees like Mautino's. The disclosure documents are made public.

Cooke said that Newman Cooke told *The Paper* last told him someone would plaint for the Mautino matter to go any further.

A hearing officer for the Board of Elections decided in a closed hearing that Cooke's complaint was filed on justifiable grounds.

Another closed hearing was set by the Board for May 16, at which time the complaint was reaffirmed as being filed on justifiable grounds, and Mautino was given until July 1 to provide more information on his questioned campaign spending and disclosure reports.

The Board of Elections will then determine if Mautino has sufficiently answered questions, or if the matter must go to a public hearing.

The primary focus of the Division of Campaign Cooke's complaint involved more than \$200,000 in funds expended Mautino's campaigns at a Spring Valley auto repair shop, and more than \$200,000 in expenditures being made to the Spring Valley City Bank in slightly over a 10-year period.

> Cooke wrote in his complaint: "Of particular interest is the documentation of expenditures made directly to a Spring Valley Bank. It is apparent that the bank could not be providing the services for which the expenses were

### The Keeley Readies for Prohibition

by the Dwight Historical Society

Note: The Paper continues its articles about the Keelev Institute culminating with the Dwight July 14-17 Alcohol and Drug History Society conference.

The year is 1916. The Keeley Co. treasurer, Curtis Judd, has retired leaving chemist, John R. Oughton as sole owner. His oldest son, Dr. James H. Oughton, Sr. is the medical director. There are now only 35 franchised institutions in 27 states and two countries. Mexico City will close later this year, and London will close the next year. The number of patients being treated in Dwight is less than 50 a day.

The United States, under the tutelage of newly elected President Wilson, is slowly recovering from the economic panies of 1907 and 1914, and he resists joining in Europe's war. Support for Dr. Leslie E. Keeley's theory that addiction is a curable disease his greatly eroded. The Temperance movement that alcoholism is a moral sin is regaining national prominence. The demand for total abstinence is a distraction from the war's carnage, as it unites the nation in a common cause. Thirty-four states have enacted some form of prohibition.

The U.S. entered the war in June 1917. In August 1917, the U.S. Senate authorized the submission to the states for a prohibition constitutional amendment. The 18th Amendment was ratified by 46 states on June 16, 1920.

The annual gross revenue for The Keeley Co. in 1892 was \$727,000 but steadily declined each year, earning only \$180,000 in 1900. The average annual gross remained constant at approximately \$175,000 for the next 15 years, declining to \$120,000 in 1918. The V.A.'s urgent need for beds



depicting patients lounging on the front porch of the Livingston Hotel, now the Fox Center.

Keeley now had only 30 franchises and less than 50 patients a day at Dwight. Undoubtedly, the Oughtons foresaw that nationwide prohibition would reduce the company's income below the maintenance costs of its large Dwight institution.

Amnesty was declared on Nov. 11, 1918. The U.S. suffered 274,300 wounded. many requiring immediate medical care. The Oughtons' good friend, banker and real estate agent, Col. Frank L. Smith, was elected to the U.S. House Representatives in 1918. He initiated negotiations with the Veterans Administration, and in Jan. 1919, it entered into a five year lease of the Keeley administration building, The Livingston Hotel and The Grand Hotel to be occupied as a hospital and medical staff living quarters.

After four years the

had diminished. The Keeley buildings were not designed as a typical hospital, so, it was closed on Feb. 1, 1923. The Village lost a major economic engine, and The Keeley Co. regained possession of unwanted buildings. Again, Col. Smith's political influence was employed, and in May 1923, General Frank T. Hines, Director of the War Veterans Bureau, inspected the closed facilities. He concluded that it was one of the best constructed V.A. hospitals and ideally located. In June, he announced that the Dwight hospital would reopen, but this time Col. Smith negotiated a purchase. Later that summer, \$243,200 was paid to The Keeley Co. for its buildings, and \$20,000 was paid for The Grand Hotel. Local contractor, Clausen, was hired to remodel all into a modern medical campus.

### **Public Meeting on Proposed Crop Land Assessments June 2**

meeting on the proposed certified crop land assessed values for the 2017 assessment year at 9:00 a.m. Thursday, June 2, in the Livingston County Historic Courthouse Assessment Office meeting room, located on the first floor.

The purpose of the meeting is to inform the public of the changes that will be occurring in 2017 based on the recent change in the law on farm land assessments.

The Farmland Assessment Law changed for the 2015 assessment year, as amended by Public Act 98-0109. 35 ILCS 200-10-115 now limits the annual change in farmland assessments to 10% from the preceding year's median soil productivity index certified assessed value with an addi- year, the Farmland Technical the public.

There will be a public tional \$5.00 per acre reduction for the 2015 assessment year only.

> The median productivity index for the State of Illinois is 111. As a result, farmland assessed values, on a per parcel basis, can change by more than 10%, with soils that have lower productivity indexes than the median increasing more than 10% and those with higher productivity indexes than the median increasing by less

The goal for the change in law is to close the gap between the poorer soils and the better soils. For 2015, there was a 22:1 ration between the highest and lowest PI. The ultimate goal is to get that ratio to 2:1 by ty indexes. the year 2029.

For the 2017 assessment

Advisory Committee has adjusted the certified values to limit the change to 10% from the preceding year's median soil productivity index certified assessed value. The median soil productivity index is 111, which results in an increase in the assessed value for each productivity index \$24.05/acre from the 2016 assessment.

The effect of this law is to increase those productivity indexes below 111 at a faster rate than those above 111 to create a more narrow range of certified crop land assessed values. The 10% limit in the past has distorted the ratio in assessed values over the range of productivi-



### Talk to Your Adult Children **About Smart Financial Moves**

If you have children who are finishing college or embarking on their first full-time job, you obviously want them to get off to a good start in their adult and working lives. And by virtue of your years of experience, you probably have some good advice to offer - especially when it comes to making smart financial

While they might feel good about lowering that debt, you may want to point out that an argument could be made for putting money in assets that will likely be more liquid, such as stocks and bonds. For one thing, if your children were to lose their jobs, and they needed cash to tide them over until they were once again employed, they'd likely find it much harder to get money out of their homes than their investment accounts. Also, in terms of accumulating resources for retirement, they might bed better off building up their investment portfolios, rather than sinking every extra dollar into their

Using credit wisely – Urge your children to avoid taking on excessive credit card debt and taking out non-essential loans. As you know, having a good credit score can pay off in several ways, including getting better rates on mortgages. You may want to risk sounding "old fashioned" by encouraging your children to live within their means. And consider pointing out that it's often the people who are the most frugal today who may end up with the most money tomorrow.

It's not always easy for young people to get off on the right foot, financially speaking. But as someone who knows a thing or two about controlling debt, saving and investing, you can help your children out by imparting a few words of wisdom.

Board Listing Report #887, representing all due bills for the Village for May 2016, and Report #888, all due bills for Tourism for May, were presented for payment approval; Trustee Johnson moved to approve and pay all due bills, and Trustee Verdun seconded; all approved by roll call vote.

Sgt. Mitchell reported that according to the May Police Activity Report there were 32 calls; three warnings; with no citations issued. He also reported that the Sheriff's Office has had no recent reports of underage golf cart drivers on the streets.

Under old business, Attorney Legner reported that IDOT and DNR are considering entering into an intergovernmental agreement which would create a way by which funds can be passed on to the entities that have grants on hold; however no action was taken on the Route 66 Project due to the hold put on Trails Grant by the state; and no action was taken on the proposed interest rates received from two

Michael Perrott, Superintendent of Gardner South Wilmington High School, presented the 2015-16 Amended Operating Budget at the Budget Amendment Hearing Wednesday, May 18.

He reviewed the amended spreadsheet with board members, and stated that the increase in the Education Fund was due to the receipt of more Title I money this year. The funds from the working cash bond are reflected in the new budget.

There was no public comment regarding the amended budget.

During public comment of the regular meeting of the board, Mrs. Terry Schultz, South Wilmington Village Clerk, asked the board for support from GSW High School, with student volunteers to help run Party in the Park, annual Easter Egg Hunt, park cleanup day, etc.

Mrs. Schultz asked if the sports teams and clubs could volunteer at the park during the various events. She stated that the VFW Park has always supported GSW High School and allows field use for the

girls softball games. Mr. Perrott asked for a list of times and events that help is needed, and he will work with coaches and students to find volunteers for the activities. He expressed the fact that GSW is very appreciative of the use of the ball diamond, and the support the Village of South Wilmington gives the school.

Brian McElroy asked Mr. Perrott if he had checked into a gas detector or an automatic device to shut off burners in the chemistry room, second floor lab. McElroy had asked about the switch at the April meeting, and was assured by Mr. Perrott there is a gas shutoff switch, which meets code and is inspected yearly by the

Fire Marshall and the Regional Office of Education.

GSW received a letter from Anne Mankowski, parent of a graduating senior, applauding Mr. Leone, band instructor, for the great work he has done for the GSW band.

Board members were informed of a June 10 bus trip given by Grundy County Farm Bureau, an opportunity for a board member interested in touring area farms and greenhouses, supporting farming and agricultural education.

Principal John Engelman reported the following:

- One boy and one girl attended the RVC Scholar Athlete banquet May 3
- One boy and one girl attended the Illinois Principal's Breakfast/Banquet May 6
- Handbook update made changes and added wording to reflect Senate Bill 100

- Nine incidents of discipline; 96.1% attendance in April.
- Adademic Awards night was May 3; Athletic Awards, May
- Finals were May 20 and 23, with a Teacher Institute Day May 24.

Board member Cindy Gerber suggested a senior survey for exiting students to fill out through Google Forms or Survey Monkey. Mr. Engelman said it could be created for next year's graduating class.

Board Policy Revisions/ Additions were distributed for first review.

It was suggested that GSW could fund-raise by putting birthdays and other public information on the Marquee, and board members will think about the idea, getting back at a future meeting. Coal City intends to with-

draw from the Special Ed Coop, which would not happen until fall 2017. Mr. Perrott stated that GSW benefits from services provided by the co-op.

Board member Wepprecht said she has a concern with too many salutatorians and valedictorians. She has received lots of complaints about too many speeches during the graduation ceremony, which lost the audience.

Gerber said two years ago a diverse committee was formed to change the percentage over to a 4.0 scale, a change made because colleges want the 4.0 GPA. She said the committee talked about giving the system a few years, then looking at how it is working at GSW.

Wepprecht said it should be looked at again and narrowed down to the top students. Mr. Perrott suggested creating another committee to re-visit the GPA at the start of the 2016-17 year. Wepprecht questioned the

alphabetical order of the graduating class instead of the height order. Several complained about not being able to see the shorter, smaller students. She suggested moving back to height order - and also asked why the risers were not used. Mr. Perrott said he did not want them used due to: no room to store them every year; too much stair-climbing and someone could fall; too much weight on them which could collapse on the stage; and too much work putting them on and off the stage. It is planned to dismantle the risers and use the wood for other projects for the play. GSW appreciates the time Al Jackman donated to build the risers for the school

Mr. Perrott reported on the following: Bleachers in gym will be installed at the end of July by Larson Company; Garaventa Lifts will install the wheel chair lift in the east stairwell, going to the third floor; New lighting will be put in the locker rooms, and ceilings in cafe, library.

The Library stage will be converted to an office/meeting/storage space this summer;

### **Dwight Schools Approve Four-Year Contract** May 18 Joint BOE Actions

The Boards of Education for Dwight Grade School District #232 and Dwight Township High School District #230 have approved a four-year contract agreement with the Dwight Education

Association effective begin-

ning with the 2016 - 17

school year. "We are happy to have a long term contract in place with our teachers," Dr. Richard Jancek, Superintendent of Dwight Public Schools, told The Paper following a special joint session of the BOEs on

May 18. Highlights of the contract, which is effective through the 2019-2020 school year, include the following:

- The current salary matrix with base of \$36,068 and all lanes and steps remain the same for all four years of the contract.
- DGS: For Year One, full time teachers will receive a one-time payment of \$2,000 in September 2016 (prorated for fulfilling one full year of service) with this \$2,000 not added/compounded to their base salary. Part-time teachers will receive a one-time payment prorated to their percentage of FTE.
- DGS: For years two, three and four, teachers who are eligible to move a Step will receive a \$1,443 salary increase each year for the remainder of the contract. Part-time teachers receive a prorated salary increase. Teachers currently on Step 19 (highest) will receive a one percent salary increase each year for the remainder of the contract.
- DTHS: For years one, two, three and four, teachers who are eligible to move a Step will receive \$1,443 salary increase each year for

the remainder of the contract. Part-time teachers will receive a prorated salary increase. Teachers currently placed on Step 19 (highest) will receive a one percent salary increase each year for

- the remainder of the contract. • Insurance allowance: All teachers will receive a \$605 monthly insurance allowance. This amount will remain \$605 all four years of the con-
- Changes were also made to the extra-curricular salary schedules for both Dwight Grade School and Dwight High School; DTHS will see changes to the Cheerleading stipends, Drama director stipends and the addition of ACT/SAT Coaches at \$400 each. Both districts will see changes to the evaluation

process for tenured and nontenured employees.







### **Jesse White Announces Security** Upgrades to Driver's License/ID Card and Changes to the Issuance Process Illinois Secretary of State applicant after punching a motorists opted for and hole in it.

Jesse White announced that his office is upgrading security features to the Driver's License/ID card design and expanding the central issuance process for driver's licenses and ID cards to all applicants. With implementation of these changes, Illinois has moved closer to achieving full REAL ID compliance, which is a federal mandate of the U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS).

By the end of July, applivisiting Driver Services facilities will no longer be issued a new permanent DL/ID card at the end of the application process. Instead, they will leave the facility with a temporary secure paper driver's license, which is valid for 45 days and will serve as their DL/ID for driving purposes and proof of identification. The temporary, secure paper driver's license or ID card will contain a photo and the basic information that appears on the permanent driver's license or ID card. In addition, the facility employee will return the old DL/ID card back to the

Meanwhile, the applicant's information will be sent to a centralized, secure facility in Illinois. After fraud checks have been conducted to ensure the applicant's identity, a higher quality, more secure DL/ID will be printed and sent via U.S. mail within 15 business days to the applicant's address.

Central issuance provides better fraud and identity theft prevention by allowing the office to investigate possible fraud before applicants receive their DL/ID - and preventing its issuance and mailing. In addition, the design of the DL/ID card has been upgraded with important features that over-thecounter technology simply cannot produce. These types of anti-counterfeiting security features help prevent and deter fraud.

The transition to central issuance will take place in phases. First, beginning this week, Safe Driver Renewal applicants will receive by mail their new driver's license with the upgraded security features. These

expect to receive their driver's license via mail. Second, through a gradual rollout, Driver Services facilities throughout the state will implement central issuance using the newly designed card. By the end of July, all Driver Services facilities will have transitioned to central issuance. It is imperative that appli-

cants ensure their address is updated with the Secretary of State's office in order to receive the permanent driver's license or ID card. By law, address changes must be reported within 10 days. Illinoisans can update their address online www.cyberdriveillinois.com . If an applicant does not receive their new permanent driver's license or ID card after 15 business days of visiting a facility, they can check the status www.cvberdriveillinois.com or call 217-782-7044. While the driver's license and ID card upgrades are being implemented, there will be more than one valid driver's license/ID card until the old design format is phased out. Fees remained unchanged.




