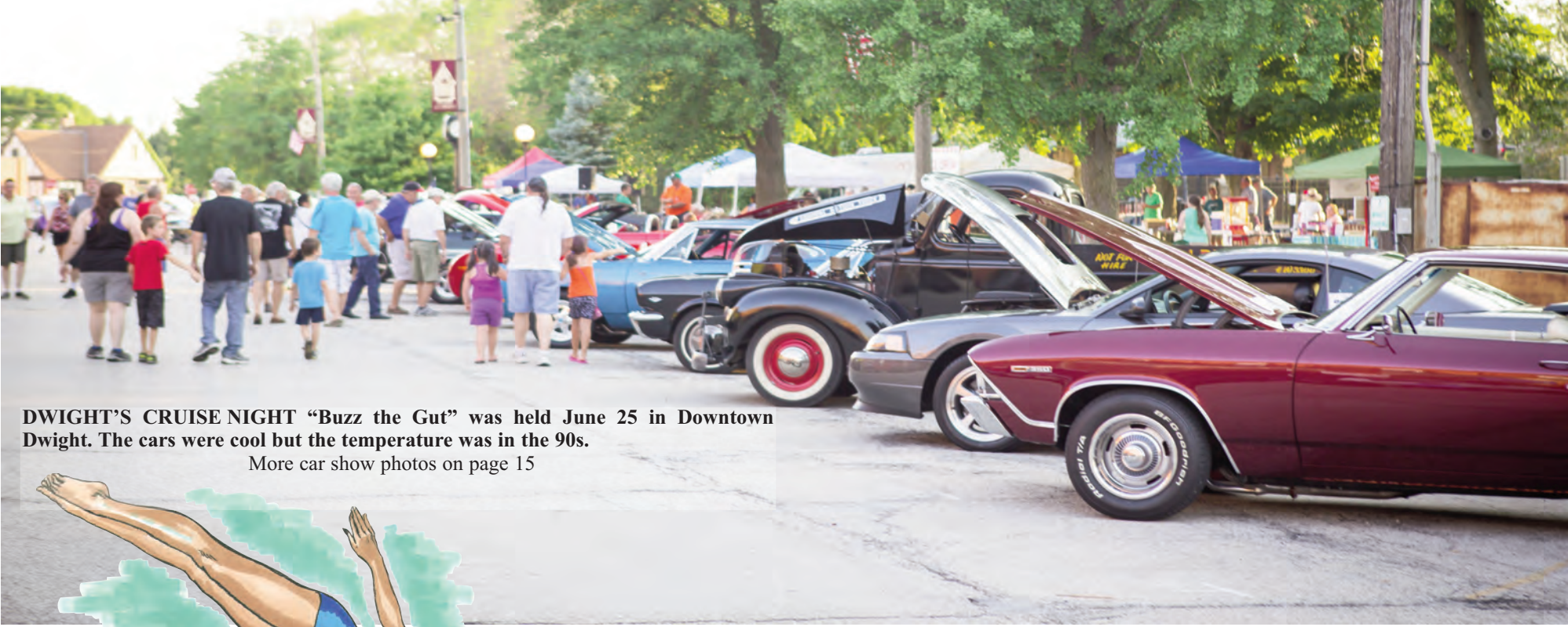

A new shuttle service is working out of Route 66 Tire and Auto in Dwight. Tri-Point Board May Seek One-Year Financial Remedy Next Year

The Tri-Point School board June 20 authorized Superintendent Jeff Bryan to prepare a budget for the 2016-17 school year which may include a one-year financial remedy other than tax anticipation warrants. "We're borrowing a little bit against next year already," Superintendent Jeff Bryan told *The Paper* last

week. The less than \$1 million in tax anticipation warrants utilized to meet ongoing expenses this year is being borrowed against revenue which is supposed to be spent next school year, he explained. "I expect we would need to do a small bond," Bryan said. "I am always concerned about borrowing money to meet ongoing operating expenses." He said he is in uncharted

territory, not needing the revenue for more than one school year. There is good news down the proverbial road as the wind turbine farm comes online next year and revenue from it begins to flow into district coffers by the 2018-19 school year. Bryan said the turbines will not be assessed until 2017 and the levy request for that revenue will come in December of 2017 for the

following school year. With that in mind, the district had an amicable agreement reaching a two-year collective bargaining agreement with school staffers. The base salary for certified staff was increased from \$30,000 to \$30,250 and every certified staffer also received an \$800 annual raise. So all certified staffers salary increased by \$1,050 unless the teacher was at the (continued on page 4)

DGS Bond Terms Set/Approved June 23 Special BOE Session

At a special June 23 session, the Dwight Grade School Board of Education passed a Resolution providing for the issuance of General Obligation School Bonds (Alternative Revenue Source) Series 2016A in the amount of \$300,000 for the purpose of a new heating system for the school. Bond terms include a two-year payment schedule beginning June 1, 2017 with a net interest cost of 1.0072% and a total fiscal debt service of \$304,339.21. Funding for the heating project comes from Capital Projects Fund 60, Operations & Maintenance Fund, and Health Life Safety. Monies used for physical building improvement projects are not tied to

education or salaries. In another matter, the BOE approve an intergovernmental agreement with the Livingston County Sheriff's Department allowing police access to the school's security camera surveillance system in defined emergency situations and with agreed-upon stipulations. The agreement may be terminated with 30 days written notice. In other business, the Board:

• accepted the resignation of Donita Forneris, Basketball & Softball coach.

• accepted the resignation of Marla Eltrevoog, Middle School Teacher.

• was notified that district bus drivers have petitioned for unionization.

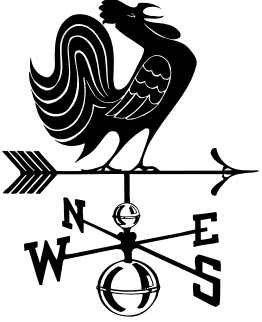
Two Pets Perish in Rural
Dwight Fire June 20

Fire engulfed a home causing pets in the home to perish in a rural house fire just south of Dwight on 3100 North road around 7 p.m. June 20, according to the Dwight Fire Department. Two firefighters were sent to Morris Hospital for evaluation and treatment. Both were treated and

released. The cause of the fire is undetermined at this time and is under investigation by the MAB AS division 15 investigation team. Multiple agencies from Livingston County, Grundy County, Will County and Kankakee County responded to the fire. “First arriving fire companies encountered heavy fire and smoke on the first floor

with heavy smoke throughout the entire structure,” said Justin Dyer, deputy fire chief for the Dwight Fire Department. “First-in fire companies made an aggressive interior fire attack limiting the fire spread significantly,” Dyer continued. At the time of the emergency there were no occupants inside, but there were two pets that perished.

How Can You Declare Your

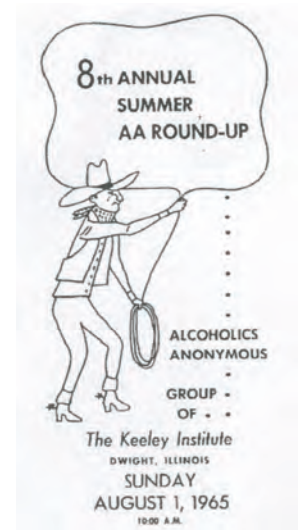

Dwight to Celebrate Keeley Institute Anniversaries

Note: The Paper continues its articles about the Keeley Institute culminating with the Dwight July 14-17 Alcohol and Drug History Society conference.



This summer will mark three important events in Dwight's history. Dr. Leslie E. Keeley, M.D., a Union Civil War surgeon, observed that many wounded soldiers became addicted to opiates and whiskey given as anesthesia. He was one of the first to propose that such addictions are a disease. Dr. Keeley, in 1866, 150 years ago, chose Dwight to start his medical practice and a clinic for inebriated soldiers. He announced in 1879 the discovery of the "Gold Cure" for opiate, alcohol, and tobacco addiction. Within 15 years, his successful human treatment gained world reputation, and 126 franchised institutions were opened throughout the U.S. and foreign countries. By 1892, the Dwight Institute was treating as many as 1,000 patients daily, resulting in great prosperity for the prairie village. The Institute closed 50 years ago on Sunday, June 5, 1966, after 87 years of continuous operation. To commemorate these anniversaries, the Alcohol and Drug History Society, an international organization, is holding a members only off-

year conference in Dwight from July 14-17. Dr. Timothy Hickman, professor of addiction history at Lancaster University, London, England, is leading the "I've Been To Dwight" event. It will be conducted at The Country Mansion restaurant, 101 W. South Street, which, as The Lodge, housed patients of The Keeley Institute from 1930 to 1966. The Dwight Village Board has proclaimed Sunday, July 17, to be Keeley Institute Day, and the Dwight Historical Society has planned activities for the general public. A special Keeley exhibit has been made for the Society Museum in the 150-year old railroad station between Dwight's two main streets. It will be open for no charge between 11:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. that Sunday, and Saturday, July 16, and Friday, July 15, from 5:00-8:00 p.m. Throughout the day, the Society is offering hourly, narrated bus tours of Keeley sites for a monetary contribution, which includes a souvenir booklet. Call 815-584-3728 for reservations. Other items commemorating the event will be for sale. A simulated, open A A Round-Up will start at 1:00 p.m. on The Mansion grounds, formerly the Keeley campus. These were held in Dwight from 1958-1965, only for those in recovery; however, everyone is invited to attend this July 17 free event. The program will open with a temperance sermon followed by addiction recovery related speeches. The speakers will have a panel discussion as to The Keeley's continuing influence on the treatment of addiction and address audience questions. This will be held in The Mansion's Garden Room if there is bad weather. A time capsule was buried on the grounds as part

of the 1939 celebration to commemorate the 60th anniversary of The Keeley Institute. It will be opened at approximately 4:00 p.m. that afternoon for public viewing. The Country Mansion's Sunday breakfast brunch buffet runs from 8:30-10:30 a.m. The regular brunch is

from 11:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m., and menu dining is from 1:00-8:00 p.m. that evening. The garden patio will be open for all three. Reservations should be made at 1-800-892-5969 or online at www.countrymansion.com. Dwight's other fine restaurants will be offering specials that Sunday also.





GSW Will Start School on Time in Fall, But Needs State Funding

Superintendent Michael Perrott told the Gardner-South Wilmington School board that GSW High School will open in time this fall, but may have financial difficulties if state revenue does not come in next school year.

The State Comptroller is limiting the release of funding until the state budget is set, Perrott told the board at its June 15 meeting.

"Since 30 to 35% of GSW's revenue comes from the state of Illinois, how will school start or afford to run?" Perrott asked, saying this is the question many schools are asking.

He said GSW has enough reserve to start school, but how long it will stay open depends on how soon funds are depleted or replenished if released by the state.

"There are many schools that would not be able to open at all," Perrott said.

Band director Mr. Leone discussed the opportunity for the Gardner Area Band to travel to Washington D.C. to participate in the National Memorial Day Parade. The band includes students from Braceville Elementary School, Gardner Grade School, South Wilmington Grade School and GSW High School. The GSW board approved the trip.

The Gardner Area Band was invited to participate by the Governor of Illinois

Office. Students will leave Friday night, May 26, 2017. They will spend Saturday and Sunday touring, sight-seeing and doing other activities. The Memorial Day parade is Monday, broadcast in the United States, and overseas for troops to watch.

To participate, the cost is \$560 per student. The fee may go down after fundraising and donations, Leone said. Costs will include motor coach travel, most meals, hotel, t-shirt, video of the parade, and other items.

Leone said he needs 35 to 40 students to participate to march in the parade. He will also be working with the grade school boards to approve the trip at the grade school level.

In other business, the board:

- learned that Katy Wepprecht gave Leone a clarinet donated by GSW Alumni and former band member Teresa (Bexson) and her husband Ryan.
- approved the Joliet Junior College and GSW High School agreement to teach college credit classes at GSW. Susan Heerdt is qualified/eligible to teach English 101/102 at GSW to GSW students for which they will receive 6 hours of college credit. Only teachers who have a master's degree in that subject area are eligible to teach the course.
- heard a report on the following building and grounds projects:

Bleachers – new bleachers should arrive at the end of July and will take 3-5 days to install

Wheelchair Lift – should arrive the first week of August and will take up to 5 days to install

Café – drop ceiling and new lighting is almost complete

Library – working on new ceiling tiles, leveling ceiling and new lights

Room 305 – leveling ceiling, new tiles and lights

Rooms 300/301 –updating lighting

Locker Rooms – installing lights that were removed from Rooms 300/301

Library stage area – still looking into this project. Making stage area into a new meeting room.


Tuck-pointing – this summer

Exterior Band Stairwell – drawings have been finished.

- GSW has been approved for Life Safety funds from the State of Illinois – those projects listed will be completed using Life Safety money. The tuck-pointing and the exterior band stair-well are part of the life safety plan.

The board approved the following personnel decisions:

- Hired Kevin Ward as history/social studies teacher.
- accepted the resignation of softball coach, Erin Galloway.

ENOUGH

Illinois' budget standoff must be resolved, and must be resolved now.

For a year, our state's elected leaders have engaged in what can only be called political malpractice.

Illinois is the only state in the country that doesn't have a budget. For a year, because of that failure, it has stiffed small businesses, social service agencies and its higher education system, leaving them trying to operate without money they're owed. State operations have been cobbled together through a patchwork of court orders, and the mounting backlog of money owed gets deeper by the minute.

On Monday, Gov. Bruce Rauner said the state was on the verge of crisis, and that it would be an "outrageous, tragic failure" if schools don't open on time this fall.

With all due respect, Governor, the state is already in crisis and the budget standoff has already been an "outrageous, tragic failure."

As legislators return to Springfield today -- for the first time this month -- Illinois' historic, serious problems have been made even worse by the failure to compromise on a balanced, long-term spending plan.

The political war between Rauner and House Speaker Michael Madigan has been confounding and unconscionable. Rauner has insisted on passage of the so-called Turnaround Agenda, a series of pro-business measures, as a condition of the budget. Madigan and Senate President John Cullerton have seemed focused primarily on thwarting the governor.

Neither the governor nor the legislature has put forth a balanced budget. Decades of delaying action and willfully ignoring issues like the state's epically ballooning pension obligations have devastated its financial stability. The state must make cuts, and yes, more revenue will be needed to stanch the economic bleeding.

The consequences of having no budget have been harsh and far-reaching.

The state's colleges and universities, which ought to be linchpins for growth and economic development, instead have been starved. Hundreds have been laid off, programs have been shuttered. High school graduates look at this mess, fear for their future, and enroll in out-of-state colleges. Our best and brightest may not come back after they complete their education elsewhere.

Meanwhile, more than 130,000 low-income students have had financial aid snatched away. Do these students who wish to better themselves and their future job prospects through education have other resources to continue? In most cases, no.

One million of Illinois' most vulnerable people -- the poor, the at-risk kids, the elderly, the mentally ill, the homeless, the victims of domestic abuse or sexual assault -- have been directly harmed by the state's dereliction of duty, as social service agencies cut services.

Hospitals and medical providers are owed hundreds of millions in unpaid state employee medical bills and delayed Medicaid payments.

Countless business owners, large and small, have struggled to survive because they haven't been paid. Cities and small towns have been left holding the bag for unpaid state bills.

And yet, it could get even worse.

More than \$2 billion in active road construction projects might be shut down, leading to as many as 25,000 workers losing their jobs.

The state's corrections system says it's on the verge of not being able to feed inmates and operate prisons.

Social services agencies will continue to turn away the ill, the homeless, the elderly.

The state's schools were spared last year by a separate appropriation. But this year, many districts face the very real possibility of not opening or not being able to stay open.

But what have citizens seen from the Capitol? We have seen political posturing. We have seen a governor who campaigned as a practical business leader dedicated to finding fixes instead act as an ideological purist. We have seen their elected representatives apparently unable to stand up to Madigan, Cullerton and Rauner to demand a resolution to the crisis. We have not seen compromise.

Perhaps the most damaging long-term effect is the toxic cynicism and frustration this crisis has created among its residents, who have to wonder at this point if Rauner, Madigan and Cullerton simply view the toll on Illinois' people as mere collateral damage. At a recent Better Government Association panel on the impasse's impact, multiple social service providers said flatly they don't believe leaders care about their plight.

Many long-term changes are needed to restore Illinois to solid ground. Redistricting reform is a critical piece of restoring true political competitiveness that will lead to legislators facing more accountability to the voters they represent.

A stopgap budget bill simply staves off emergency. It's the bare minimum that needs to be done. Even if lawmakers pass one, they still have a long road toward developing a sensible plan for the state's long-term survival.

But the day has come. Illinois' people cannot be held hostage for a second year without a budget.

Voters must revolt and demand better.

Enough.

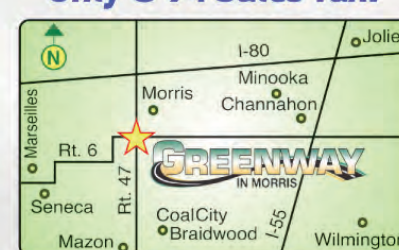

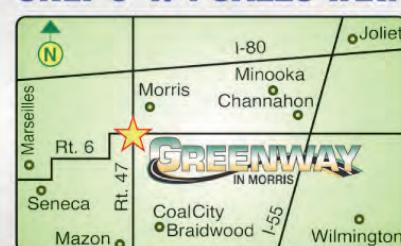

I'm baaaaccekckkkk. Sort of.

I have been absent for several weeks, recovering from open heart surgery performed in Peoria on May 16. It seems that since birth, one of my heart valves was defective, causing a heart murmur at first, and building up calcium in my arteries.

In 2008 I had to have a stent put in one artery due to blockage (90% blocked artery) and was told at that time that in 10 years I would have to have surgery to replace one valve.

It was not 10 years, but just eight when my heart doctor, Dr. Nomani, determined that the valve was leaking and causing other issues.

For those of you who don't know, Dr. Nomani was the doctor killed in a car accident near Dwight just after I was told by him to get tests to confirm I would need surgery this spring.

In addition to the bad valve, I also had a main artery 80% blocked (different from the one that I had a stent put into back in 2008).

So, I had my surgery May 16, waking up dying of thirst, hooked up to a respirator, about 10 hours after I went in for my surgery. And I felt like an elephant was sitting on my chest, which by the way, had three big tubes sticking out.

My wife Cathy was there, and said I was white as a ghost. She brought my friend Dusty along, and I "relaxed" as soon as Cathy gave me Dusty, she said.

The nurse put some balm on my chapped lips and

allowed me to have sips of water. Sips of water. I am dying of thirst and they give me sips of water.

Well, to make a long story short, by the third day in the hospital I was allowed to eat real food and started taking "walks" around the hospital floor.

After five plus days, they allowed my wife to drive me home.

I have been home ever since, mostly sleeping and walking on my treadmill, and just starting physical therapy.

When I got home from the hospital, I was able to walk a quarter of a mile in about 13 minutes, and was out of breath.

A week, later I was walking longer, half a mile and not winded, walking twice as fast.

I am up to two-thirds of a mile in 18 minutes. I won't win any Olympic gold medals, but I am definitely recovering.

I have been doing some stories from home and even was able to do the Comfort Dog story in Dwight for last week's paper involving Elaine Mortensen.

I will be back on the job in Dwight as of July 5.

Thank you all for your kind words, patience, and especially to the staff at *The Paper* for putting up with my long absence. I want to publicly thank Mark and Mary Boma, and a special thank you to Caleb for his land-scaping skills.

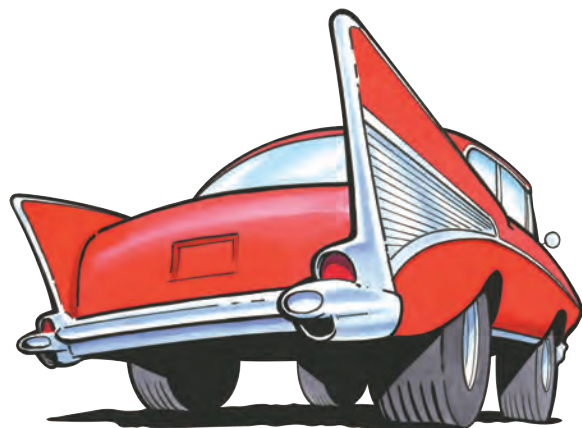

Section 2. Nothing herein contained shall be construed to apply said general prevailing rate of wages as herein ascertained to any work or employment except public works construction of this Odell Public Library District to the extent required by the aforesaid Act.

Section 3. The Secretary of the Odell Public Library District Board of Trustees shall publicly post or keep available for inspection by any interested party in the main office of this Library District this determination or any revisions of such prevailing rate of wage. A copy of this determination or of the current revised determination of prevailing rate of wages then in effect shall be attached to all contract specifications.

Section 4. The Secretary of the Odell Public Library District Board of Trustees shall mail a copy of this determination to any employer, and to any association of employers and to any person or association of employees who have filed their names and addresses requesting copies of any determination stating the particular rates and the particular class of workmen whose wages will be affected by such rates.

Section 5. The Secretary of the Odell Public Library District Board of Trustees shall promptly file a certified copy of this Ordinance with both the Secretary of State Index Division and the Department of Labor of the State of Illinois.

Section 6. The Secretary of the Odell Public Library District Board of Trustees shall cause to be published in a newspaper of general circulation within the area a notice of this Ordinance and such publication shall constitute notice that the determination is effective and that this is the determination of this public body.

Section 7. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage.
