Paul Warner Appointed to DTHS BOE

> The estimated annual payment is \$314,000 on this ten year bond to be paid

from the Water Fund. Ordinance #1376 authorizes the issuance of General Obligation Bond Alternative Revenue Source Series

No significant findings were noted in the audit review.

In his report to the Board, Dwight Chief of Police Tim Henson outlined for the Board a new program rolling out on July 1 that will piggyback off of the heroin and prescription pill program presented earlier this year.

The Safe Passage Program focuses on trying to help those dealing with opioid addictions.

The program allows anyone to come in to the police station 24 hours a day, turn in contraband with no questions asked, and be placed in an opioid addiction recovery

center that same day. Chief Henson noted that while this is a different approach, police are not getting soft on crime by allowing a no questions asked program for drug users. Instead,


Henson indicated that taking actions to help individuals receive the help needed to recover from addictions is an important step in the long term battle against drugs.

"We can't arrest ourselves out of this situation," said Chief Henson.

The program requires the individual to voluntarily come in and seek help through the Safe Passage Program. The Safe Passage Program is open to anyone. regardless of local residency, needing help with an addic-



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The Keeley Treatment From 1950-1966

Note: The Paper continues its articles about the Keeley Institute culminating with the Dwight July 14-17 Alcohol and Drug History Society conference.

The basic cost of the four week stay in 1940 was \$225 that included room and board. When the Institute closed in 1966, the treatment had been reduced to three weeks and the basic cost was \$338. The following course of treatment remained basically the same after 1940, as set forth in various Keeley promotional pamphlets.

1) At admission, a complete medical history is taken from our patient, if sober, otherwise from family and/or referring physician. Also, all tobacco is confiscated and cash on the person is given to the office to purchase incidentals and daily dime bags of pipe tobacco.

2) The first of three complete physical exams is given including urinalysis, liver function, B.M.R. and blood tests for sugar and venereal disease. Medication is prescribed for any ailment masked by the alcoholic

3) Our patient is taken to his initial sleeping room by a friendly, trained attendant, who may stay two or three days. During this time, our patient must recognize the problem, and if refuses to cooperate with the physicians, treatment is discontin-

4) In selected cases, the withdrawal technique may be necessary being a gradual curtailment of alcohol intake using whiskey malted milk. Aversion methods are not employed, and restraints are used only when necessary.

5) The four daily injections of the cure are started together with tonics every two waking hours. The complete regimen for physical regeneration includes diet and vitamin therapy, medication for appetite stimulation and exercise.

6) The Institute takes pride in its excellent food and service. Special diets, when necessary, are carefully prepared. The food is plentiful and geared to combat the malnutrition of heavy

7) Our patient may be moved to another sleeping room in The Lodge or in a private home. All may walk throughout Dwight and use their free time as they wish.

8) Our patient is free to exercise individually or with a group. A well-equipped gymnasium is maintained under the supervision of a trained instructor. Outdoor facilities include tennis and golf. Among the many "little things" offered to speed recovery are: massages, ultra-violet and infra-red treatments.

9) Our patient's record is thoroughly examined and discussed at round table staff conferences including at least two physicians and one counselor. Psycho therapy is indispensable in leading our patient to the goal of total abstinence. Group therapy is accomplished by lectures held three times a week. An introduction is made to Alcoholics Anonymous but not required to attend meet-

10) After realizing the problem is out of control, he/she appeared for help. Thanks to medical knowledge the individual is now returned sober to society, a happy, healthy and useful citizen.



Livingston-McLean 4-H Livestock Judges Brave Heat to Exhibit Skills

did not stop nearly 400 4-H members from across the state from competing in the six hour Illinois 4-H State Livestock Judging Contest June 20 in Urbana.

Livestock judging is more than just selecting what animal looks best in the ring. In livestock judging, youth must rank four animals from best to worst based on their physical traits, such as bone structure and mobility; their performance data, such as growth rate or calving ease; and their potential profitability. Their ranking is compared to the official placing to determine part of their score.

In addition, youth must remember specific characteristics of each animal presented and respond to random questions about each animal, such as which was the bolder-ribbed, stoutermade heifer. 4-H members not only have to know the right answer; they have to remember it long after the class leaves the ring. Older members must then provide reasons for their selections orally to a panel of judges and defend their placings in

Fifteen local youth participated in the competition as part of the Livingston-McLean Livestock Judging Team, which is coached by Jesse Faber.

Leslie Walker placed third overall as an individual in the senior division. As a team, Caroline Landstrom, Leslie Walker, Ty Drach, and Bri Groth placed seventh overall in the senior divison.

In the junior division, there were several individual top ten finishers from Livingston and McLean Counties, including Ellie Drach, eighth; Preston Rhode; ninth; and Rodney Billerbeck; tenth. As a team, Emerson Tarr, Rodney Billerbeck, Brittney Billerbeck, and Preston Rhode placed second overall, and Maddie Kraft, Autumn Botkin, Ellie Drach and Klayton Botkin placed tenth in the junior division.

Dwight Rolls Out Drug Rehab Program: Safe Passage

Addicts struggling with addiction are no longer alone.

As of July 1, the village of Dwight has rolled out "Safe Passage," a program where those addicted to opiates can voluntarily walk into the police department and be enrolled in a drug rehabilitation program that same day.

"We've tried for years to arrest ourselves out of it," Dwight Police Chief Tim Henson told The Paper last

"We just feel that if we can save people's lives -- if we can turn around just one addict, it will be one less person out on the street doing things to support his habit.'

Often addicts turn to home burglaries to support their drug addiction and this past winter/spring, there was a rash of burglaries in Dwight and rural Dwight.

"This is a win-win for the addict, for his (or her) family and for law enforcement," Henson added.

Safe Passage is a program which began in the state of Massachusetts and was

begun in Illinois at Dixon. Since the spring, there have been 60 people admitted to the program at Dixon with 38 100 days sober, Henson said.

The program involves a dozen drug rehabilitation agencies throughout the state including Gateway in Springfield, Chestnut in Bloomington, and Proctor in Peoria. For people that need outpatient services, they will go through the Institute for Resources Human

This program rolled out in both the city of Pontiac and village of Dwight on July 1 with plans for the Livingston County Sheriff's Police to institute a similar program in the near future, Henson said.

The way the program works is the addict may walk into the police department after hours by calling on the red phone, and admit they have a problem. They just turn in any contraband they have including illegal drugs or needles and other paraphernalia with no questions asked and no drug charges will be brought against the

Persons under 18 can be admitted to the program, but their parents must be notified, Henson said.

Individuals 18 and over can designate individuals such as a spouse they wish to notify before being admitted to a rehab facility.

The cost of the program would be paid for by individual health insurance first, or funded with federal funding, Henson said, so it will still be paid for if the individual does not have insur-

Henson said heroin, which was a common drug of choice years ago, has once again become popular because of the low cost.

"If you want a jab of heroin, it can cost as low as \$10," Henson explained. "But eventually a person needs two or three jabs to get the same high. Then it may be five, six, seven or eight iabs.'

But heroin isn't the only drug people are getting hooked on, with such prescription drugs as painkillers which an individual steals from a patient at home or from friends.

Henson indicated this is not for a person caught on the street with drugs. It is a voluntary program for individuals who come on their own volition to the police department.

Henson said it would likely involve a minimum of a 30-day program or longer depending on the individual's addiction and needs.

Herscher Unit 2 to Add More **Weighted Classes** to Discourage Multiple Valedictorians

The Herscher Unit 2 school board wants to avoid multiple valedictorians at the end of the school year.

For the past two years, there have been five individuals who qualified as valedictorians at Herscher High School.

For the 2016-17 school year, there are currently nine candidates for valedictorian, all with the same academic record.

"At this point the board said that's enough," said Superintendent Rich Decman. At its June 20 meeting after a lengthy discussion, the board decided to add some "rigor" to the curriculum to "reduce the chances for multiple valedictorians,' Decman explained.

ORDINANCE

ANNUAL BUDGET AND APPROPRIATION ORDINANCE APPROPRIATING CERTAIN SUMS OF MONEY NEEDED TO DEFRAY THE NECESSARY EXPENSES AND LIABILITIES OF THE DWIGHT FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT OF LIV-INGSTON COUNTY AND GRUNDY COUNTY, ILLINOIS FOR THE FISCAL YEAR BEGINNING MAY 1, 2016 AND ENDING APRIL 30, 2017.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Trustees of the Dwight Fire Protection District as follows:

SECTION I: The fiscal year of the Dwight Fire Protection District is hereby fixed and declared to be from May 1, 2016 through April 30, 2017.

SECTION II: The following budget containing an estimate of receipts and expenditures of the Dwight Fire Protection District is hereby adopted as the budget of the Dwight Fire Protection District for the above fiscal year.

SECTION III:

- (a) The cash on hand at the beginning of the fiscal year, May 1, 2016, was \$216,697.49.
- The estimate of cash expected to be received during the aforementioned fiscal year from all sources, including loan and tentative grant proceeds, is \$1,659,971.16

Propane Grills

Check the gas tank hose for leaks before using it for the first time each year. Apply a light soap and water solution to the hose. A propane leak will release bubbles. If your grill has a gas leak, by smell or the soapy bubble test, and there is no flame, turn off the gas tank and grill. If the leak stops, get the grill serviced by a professional before using it again. If the leak does not stop, call the fire department. If you smell gas while cooking, immediately get away from the grill and call the fire department. Do not move the grill.

If your flame goes out, turn the grill and gas off and wait at least 15 minutes before re-lighting it.

Charcoal Grills

- Always make sure your gas There are several ways to get the charcoal ready to use. Charcoal Chimney starters allow you to start the charcoal using newspaper as
 - fuel. • If you use a starter fluid, use only charcoal starter fluid. Never add charcoal fluid or any other flammable
 - liquids to the fire. · Keep charcoal fluid out of reach of children and away from heat sources.
 - There are also electric charcoal starters, which do not use fire. Be sure to use an extension cord for outdoor use.
 - · When you are finished grilling, let the coals completely cool before disposing in a metal container.

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
