WWII Vets Cochran, Flynn, Tobenski Named Herscher 2016 Labor Day Grand Marshals

The 2016 Herscher Chamber of Commerce Labor Day Grand Marshals will be World War II veterans Warren Cochran, Robert Flynn, and Harold Tobenski.

The following biographies of the veterans were sent to *The Paper* by the Herscher Chamber Labor Day Committee:

Warren Cochran

Cochran has been a resident of the Herscher area for more than 65 years. He and his late wife, Beulah, have three children: a son and daughter-in-law, Richard and Joyce Cochran; one daughter, Bonnie Knutson and her significant other Gary Eskridge; one son, Kevin Cochran and his friend Peggy Schott.

They have four granddaughters: Tricia (Troy) Coffman, Cheri (David) Dayton, Kimberly Knutson and fiance Britt Barnard, and Jennifer Cochran. There are three great-grandchildren: Ryan Coffman, Brianna Dayton, and Rebecca Coffman.

"Warren is 93 years old and his faith and family continue to be a joy in his life," the committee wrote.

He was a farmer for more than 20 years. He then worked for the Bin Division of Hendrix Town and Country for 24 years.

From November 1943 to June 1946 he served as a member of the Army Air Force during WWII, stationed in Italy for two of those years. In May of this year he travelled to Washington, D.C. on Honor Flight Chicago for a day of honor and recognition.

He is a former member of the Buckingham United Methodist church and currently is a member of the

Grand Prairie United Methodist Church.

Ever since moving to the Herscher area, Warren has attended the Labor Day parade, video taping it every year since 1952, only missing 1967 because he was driving his son to college.

Bob Flynn

Bob Flynn was born on a small farm in Whiteside County in Northern, Illinois. He walked to a one-room schoolhouse — Liberty School. He grew up and married Lillian Russell in 1945, now married 71 years.

In 1945, Flynn was drafted into the U.S. Army and served for 18 months. He began his military career at Ft. McClellan, Alabama for basic training as a combat engineer. Then onto a troop ship with 3,000 other men, crossing the Atlantic in 10 days with very rough seas at times, landing March 1 in Le Havre, France.

He arrived in Bremerhaven, Germany, guarding German prisoners and driving a truck. He went to a big engineering depot in Frankfurt, Germany, and from there returned to the United States on the USS George Washington.

Bob farmed for 21 years, growing corn and beans, and raised cattle, hogs and milked cows. He and Lillian raised eight children while on the farm. Bob said he "is proud of every one of them and what they have accomplished."

From the farm, they moved to Herscher on Labor Day 1974. He then worked for 25 years at Hendrix Town and Country as a foreman. While working for Hendrix, he mentioned taking some trips, including one to Acapulco where he

went parasailing.

Bob has a heart for missions and serving. He took his first mission trip to Jamaica after Hurricane Gilbert in 1988. Lillian and Bob went back to Jamaica for their 50th anniversary to get reacquainted with people he had met there.

His group worked on a church that had been abandoned for 12 years and refurbished so people were able to use it for worship.

He served on four mission trips to Red Bird Mission in Kentucky. Bob also made six trips to Monterey, Mexico, with other United Methodists where they built pews and other various building projects.

The crowning jewel was when Susan Fultz encouraged him to take the Honor Flight. Bob and 90 other WWII veterans made the trip to see the memorials in Washington, D.C. His son Doug went along with Bob. After the group's plane left D.C., they had mail call and Bob was amazed to receive 80 letters from Alaska, Washington, Florida, and many states in between. He also received a special package of 200 letters from the first through third grade at Herscher Grade School.

Bob became a Christian when he was 19 and became a member of Youth for Christ while in the military. He was a member of the Open Bible Center for many years. He and his wife Lillian have been members of the Herscher United Methodist Church since 2003. Bob has served on several committees over the years, and has chaired the United Methodist Men sev-

St. Joseph Cabery Parishioners to Pope: Give Us Back Our Sanctuary

The St. Joseph's Church of Cabery Preservation Society filed an appeal Aug. 3 with Pope Francis in Rome to keep their church open as a sanctuary.

A year ago, the preservation society filed an appeal with the Bishop of Joliet Diocese, the Most Reverend R. Daniel Conlon to prevent the church from being sold or torn down.

According to Brody Hale of Massachusetts, who helps preserve Catholic Churches all across the United States, the reasons cited for closing the church by the Bishop are against Canon Law.

In order to close a church, Canon Law says there have to be "grave" reasons, Hale explained, defined as:

1) The church is in such disrepair it cannot be fixed, as from the aftermath of a fire or some other disaster.

2) There are no funds from any sources, sacred or secular to be used to maintain it as a sanctuary.

Bishop Conlon cited dwindling church population as the reason for closing the church. In fact, there were roughly 20 families remaining in attendance when it was closed.

"You can't close the church because the Bishop feels like it," Hale told *The Paper*.

After working with the Bishop in Joliet to keep the church open as a sacred place, the parishioners have since been told the building will be sold.

A year ago, after appealing the decision to close the church, the parishioners were told if they could show they could maintain the building with their own funds, the Bishop would allow them to keep the parish building open.

"But the papers were never signed," Cheryl Weaver of the preservation group told *The Paper* last week. "Basically they strung us along for a year."

Since last fall, the organization has raised \$6,000 with four fundraisers. The purpose of the funds are to preserve and maintain the St. Joseph Catholic Church building in Cabery as a sacred space, available for the celebration of occasional masses, and other sacred activities, such as private prayer.

The fundraisers are to also avoid forcing the St. Margaret parish of Herscher and the Diocese of Joliet to expend funds for this purpose. St. Margaret Mary is now in charge of the building, per the Bishop's decree.

Now, if the building does not sell, it may be torn down at the expense of parishioners in Herscher.

But even if it is sold, all the sacred statues, stained glass windows and other valuables that could be used by other churches would be removed by the diocese and

made available to other churches.

"They strip off all the things I used to dust with my grandma," said Weaver, who worked with "Babe" Cassidy, her grandmother, to clean the church in her youth.

Tears welled up in her eyes as she grew silent thinking of the church being taken apart piece by piece, saying she was very "passionate" about it, as are others in Cabery.

St. Joseph's Catholic Church was established as a mission in Cabery in 1867 by the Diocese of Peoria and as a parish in 1892.

Hale said the Bishop's plan to sell the church and not allow it to stay open maintained by the Cabery preservation group "has no justification canonically."

"I don't understand why the church wants to shut it," Hale continued. "The Vatican started to crack down on church closings.

Since 2011 there have been 34 reversals of church closings. This is an open and





Eighth Annual Harvest Days Jr. Karaoke


Harvest Days Stage will be the spot for the eighth annual Junior Karaoke Championship.

ISP Statement on Decriminalization of Small Amounts of Cannabis

Governor Rauner recently signed Senate Bill 2228 into law, which amends the penalties for possession of smaller amounts of cannabis.

"The safety of Illinois citizens, and the motoring public, will always remain the utmost priority of the Illinois State Police (ISP)," said ISP Director Leo P. Schmitz. "ISP officers will continue to enforce the law, while being mindful of the penalty changes for smaller amounts of cannabis. The public is reminded that cannabis possession without a medical marijuana card is still illegal; the penalty and fines have changed. In addition,

drivers under the influence of cannabis will still be arrested and prosecuted."

The new law changes the penalty for the possession of ten grams or less of cannabis to a civil law violation, carrying a minimum fine of \$100, and a maximum fine of \$200. Persons found in possession of not more than ten grams of cannabis can be issued a citation and be required to appear in court for the violation. ISP officers will no longer be required to fingerprint, photograph, and either collect bond or transport defendants to jail. Confiscated cannabis and drug paraphernalia will be seized and placed into

evidence. Following the adjudication of the citation in court, seized cannabis and paraphernalia will be destroyed, and the charge against the defendant will be expunged on or before the following July 1 or January 1.

Local ordinances regarding fines for the possession of cannabis and related drug paraphernalia are not impacted.

Harold Tobenski

Harold was born Sept. 25, 1925, $\frac{1}{2}$ mile south of Irwin and $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles west.

"I have outlived the building site," Tobenski said.

His parents were Frank and Aldia (Burton-Kerouac) Tobenski. He had one broth-

er Floyd and two sisters Dorine Cowan and Donna Witheft.

After graduating from Irwin Parish school in 1939, he chose not to go to high school.

In the spring of 1942, he worked for Clarence Siedentop at the A.L. Siedentop I.H.C. dealership on the farm at Dickey Siding. He joined the U.S. Navy on Dec. 23, 1943. After training, he shipped out to the Landing Ship Troop carrier #851 built in Seneca, Illinois, down the Illinois

and Mississippi Rivers to New Orleans.

He left for overseas action Dec. 31, 1944. His overseas tour included Panama Canal crossing, Hawaii, Philippine Islands, Okinawa, Japan and back to Hawaii, then back to the U.S. mainland at Portland, Oregon.

He was eventually discharged May 6, 1946.

From 1946 to 1954, he returned to work for Siedentop and helped his parents on the farm while "sewing wild oats," he said.

He worked for Hendrix International for 20 years, 1965 to 1985 then worked for two years for Hunt's Super Service before retiring.

On Nov. 20, 1954, he married Helen Nicklas. They had one daughter, Becky, who is married to Ken Emling of Bonfield, and three grandsons, Klaton, Kyle and Kasey Emling.

"I am still working on I.H.C. tractors at 90 years old," he explained. "I guess I am a workaholic."

shut case."

Last month, the Bishop told the preservation society it was backing out of the deal to keep St. Joseph's building open if the community could maintain it financially. Weaver said they were told not to bother appealing it.

Hale told *The Paper* that Conlon's statement about

appeal may have been an "attempt to bully the parishioners."

He could not grasp the Bishop's reasoning for going back on the deal to keep the sanctuary open.

"It makes no sense," Hale said.

ODELL PARK DISTRICT

AN ORDINANCE ADOPTING PREVAILING WAGE RATES TO BE PAID TO LABORERS, MECHANICS AND OTHER WORKERS PERFORMING CONSTRUCTION OF PUBLIC WORKS FOR THE ODELL PARK DISTRICT.

Ordinance No 01-2016

WHEREAS, the State of Illinois has enacted the Prevailing Wage Act, approved June 25, 1941, as amended, being 80 ILCS 130/0.01 through 130/12 (the "act"); and

WHEREAS, the Act requires that during the month of June of each calendar year the Board of Park Commissioners of the Odell Park District (the "District") investigate and ascertain the prevailing rate of wages, as defined in said Act, in the "locality" of the Park District for laborers, mechanics and other workers performing construction of public works for the Park District;


NOW, THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Park Commissioners of the Odell Park District, as follows:

Section 1: To the extent and as required by the Act, the general prevailing rate of wages in this locality for laborers, mechanics and other workers engaged in the construction of public works coming under the jurisdiction of the Park District is hereby ascertained to be the same as the Labor of the State of Illinois (the "Department") as of June, 2016, a copy of those determinations being attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference. As required by said Act, and all revisions of the prevailing rate of wages by the Department shall supersede the Departments June determination and apply to any and all public works construction undertaken by the Park District. The definition of any terms appearing in the Ordinance which are also used in the Act shall be the same as in the Act.

Section 2: Nothing herein contained is intended to apply nor shall be construed to apply said prevailing rate of wages as herein ascertained to any work or employment performed on behalf of the Park District except public works construction or demolition to the extent required by the Act.

Section 3: The Park District Secretary shall publicly post or keep available for inspection by any interested party in the main office of this Park District this determination of prevailing rates of wages. A copy of this determination or of the current revised determination of prevailing rate of wages then in effect shall be attached to all contract specifications, and for works awarded to a contractor without a public bid, contract or project specification, shall be attached to the purchase order related to the work to be done or in a separate document.

Section 4: The Park District Secretary shall promptly file a certified copy of this Ordinance with the Illinois Department of Labor in Springfield, Illinois.



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Six Dwight New Life Church Members Journey to Czech Republic

Sometimes Americans traveling abroad become ambassadors of U.S. culture without even trying.

Six people from the Dwight New Life Assembly of God Church travelled June 16 to July 2 to the Czech Republic, most for the first time, except Pastor Victor "Randy" Randle.

Others traveling included Cheryl and Keith Zacek with their sons, Brandon and Noah, and Melissa Black. The people paid their own expenses to travel.

But the trip was not just to help strengthen the churches in the area — they were also acting as ambassadors in a sense of American culture to the Eastern European nation.

Czechoslovakia split into two nations in 1993, shortly after the "iron curtain" had fallen in 1989. In 1989, Czechoslovakia was freed from the yoke of the Soviet

Union. Since then, the Czech Republic has become acclimated to Western Culture.

The group travelled to the Moravian region to a town called Hlucin (pronounced Lucheen), with a population of roughly 17,000 people.

"People from that region came to America in the 1700s," Randle said. "They were on a mission to Native Americans in the colonial states."

He said the city of Bethlehem, Pennsylvania has Moravian churches.

But after the Soviet Union released its hold on the area, religion is no longer considered "the opiate" of the masses, and churches are starting to make a comeback.

But it is slow going.

"They say the Czech Republic is 70% atheist," Randle said. "But they are just primarily unchurched."

So he has been going to the nation for 10 years

"planting churches."

"People ask, 'Why are you here?'" Randle said. "I would respond 'to establish a church.' And then they would ask 'What's a church?' But now after 10 years, we are going into public schools, meeting with city officials."

So other than being unfamiliar with churches, what else is different about the region?

"People bring their dogs everywhere," said Cheryl. "I started to pet a dog under a table (at a guest house), and they began to talk to me."

Cheryl, who speaks a smattering of Czech, explained she does not speak the language, which made the people laugh. Then they told her in Czech that she was speaking the language.

Cars are smaller there, as are the roads.

Melissa is studying special education in college and

she visited a school in the region similar to U.S. special education schools. The difference is special education children are not integrated into the general student population there, Melissa explained.

In school, children have to learn English and at least one other foreign language, Melissa said.

Another difference is there is no air conditioning out there, and — just their luck — the visiting Americans experienced some of the hottest weather in the Czech Republic.

On the radios, music was a mix of Czech and American tunes, Cheryl said, saying she recognized rock and roll "oldies."

Cheryl's son Brandon told of how he enjoyed electronic video gaming. Brandon was very popular and since has made some gaming friends from the Czech Republic.

Noah plans to return to the nation to help churches and work with youth, Cheryl said.

But besides speaking to groups, they also brought gifts from America including letters from Dwight village

officials for Hlucin officials. They had patches from Dwight Fire, EMS and Police.

"It's not just about us going there," Randle said. "We are connecting Dwight with Hlucin, and Hlucin with Dwight."

Randle said the small gifts, while they seem ordinary to those here, are treasured by the people there, and the gifts "opened a lot of doors for us."

Paster Randle plans to return for an 11th trip next year, and may take others with him.


