DTHS August Board Actions

With fall fast approaching and the 2016-17 school year getting underway, the Dwight Township High School Board of Education met on August 17 when it reviewed budgets, summer projects, and prepared for the new year.

The Fiscal Year 2016 proposed vs actual budget was presented by District Superintendent Dr. Richard Jancek. District #230 ended the 2015 - 16 year with an Education Fund balance of \$3,390,025 and a balance of \$5,409,414 across District 230 funds. Jancek also presented a first draft of the proposed FY 17 (2016-17) budget. However,

the addition of a special education aide, to the final proposed budget numbers are pending. Dr. Jancek will present the final FY 17 budget numbers to the BOE in September for approval.

As summer projects begin to wrap up at DTHS, a status update was presented the Board of Education. Summer 2016 saw many projects at DTHS including paving of the west parking lot, parking lot lighting, waterline relocation, new softball dugouts, backstop fencing and netting, tree removal, and the addition of a driveway to the school's greenhouse.

Francis (Frank) Zelek of Elk Grove Village was employed as the new Director of Technology for the district.

Mr. Zelek offers much experience and was most recently Directory of Technology of the Oregon Community Unit School District. Mr. Zelek will receive a twoyear contract and an annual base salary of \$70,000 which is shared with Dwight Elementary School and prorated for year one.

The DTHS Board of Education also:

· approved payment of June and July bills.

· affirmed transfer of \$2,000 from Working Cash to Bond & Interest.

• affirmed TJ Henson as Assistant Football Coach. approved TJ Henson as fall maintenance worker.

· approved an FMLA request for Justin Stevenson (ten days/September).

• accepted the resignation

of Linda Dawson, District Office Administrative Assistant.

 affirmed Christine Ruffatti as Volunteer Volleyball Coach.

• accepted the resignation of Joel Steichen as JV Scholastic Bowl Coach.

 reviewed IASB Board Policy recommended updates.

· learned that the State of Illinois owes DTHS District #230 \$45,222.23 for fiscal 2015/16 year \$24,428.10 to date for 2016/17.

The next meeting of the Dwight Township High School Board of Education will be 6 p.m., Wednesday, September 21, in the DTHS Board Room. Meetings are open to the public.

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

explained.

But while the television show lasts 39 days, the Durham challenge is just four days, and has 18, instead of 16 participants initially.

But the need for food, water and shelter is the same.

And the strategy used by the individuals in the contest is what makes or breaks the players in the game.

"The three major components are outwitting, outsmarting and outplaying people," Kaiser told The Paper.

He said one of the ways to survive initially is to form "tribes" of a few people who protect each other and vote others outside the group off.

"That way you'll be safe for a couple of rounds," Kaiser explained.

He said by "politicking, you put yourself on a higher totem pole," adding he "lies all the time," as part of the

"You really want everyone to think you are on their side," he said. "I was manipulative.'

He said the worst part was not sleeping, more than hunger.

"The hunger part wasn't too bad," Kaiser said. "After the first 24 hours without eating anything, you start to get hungry. But we won food for the second night."

But sleep-wise, he said he only slept one hour the first night, and two the second

Plus, with limited clothing, sleeping outdoors with temperatures down to 48 degrees was tough, making sleep difficult.

"By Sunday (final day) I was totally beat," Kaiser said. "My mind was zoning out. It was hard to stay

He said he learned his "survivor" skills by watching the television show for the past 16 years.

He said voted off the island can be done by different criteria, and being deceptive does not always work in your favor.

"Sometimes, people won because they were not as bad as the other person," Kaiser said. "Deception could work against you."

He added you have to be a charming liar to win.

One person who voted for him told him, "My God, you are such a schmoozer but you are really good at it."

He said doing the challenge was like fulfilling a lifelong dream, but he still wants to be on the actual Survivor show aired on CBS. He did not win any monetary reward for doing the challenge, but instead,

"I met tons of fans from all over the country as well as numerous others who have been on the show and just came out to be a part of the experience with the fans," he added.

"It was a super cool experience," he added.

Johnson, Brian Mills and Joan Bullard to be on an interview committee for the superintendent position.



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




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HHS Grads, Brothers, To Be Sworn In as Judges Sept. 19 in Central Illinois

Managing Editor Two Webber boys have been benched — on judges benches, that is.

Gary Webber, 51, of Monticello, and formerly of Herscher, will be sworn in as a 6th Circuit judge in Moultrie County on Sept. 19. This is his first judgeship. He is replacing his older brother, Roger, 58, of Savoy, who was named a circuit judge in Champaign County. Roger will also be sworn in that same day, in Champaign County.

The Webbers are the sons of Bob and Thelma of Herscher.

graduated from Roger Herscher High School in 1976 while Gary is a 1982 HHS grad.

Gary was most recently State's Attorney for Moultrie County.

Roger was in private law practice in Champaign before becoming a judge two years ago.

The good news for mom and dad is they should be able to see both their sons being sworn in as Gary's is scheduled for 9 a.m. in Monticello while Roger will be sworn in at 11 a.m. in Champaign.

Bob explained that as children, there was some arguing, but no signs the two would be lawyers, although Thelma said Roger always wanted to be a lawyer.

She explained that of her four boys, Roger and Gary were the most studious.

Roger played baseball for the Herscher Tigers, but Gary was unable to play because he was too short, Bob said.

"Now Gary is the tallest, and Roger is the shortest," Bob joked.

The two other Webber boys are Gary's twin, Jerry, a plant manager in Wisconsin, and Bob, a school administrator in Colorado.

Both parents are very proud of their sons, and said that the two being sworn in on the same day is "special." Bob described it as "unbelievable."

After hearing the two brothers will be judges, a friend, who shall remain anonymous, stopped Thelma at the Herscher Post Office and asked where the brothers would be posted as judges.

After telling where they will serve on the bench, the man said "Thank God," relieved because he said they know him, joking he had a past which could "prejudice" the judges.

Gary told The Paper that the last month that before he becomes a judge may be the longest month of his life, having a little trepidation but also excited about the new

He said the circuit judge has to travel to four different counties.

"I haven't really sat down with him (brother Roger) to talk about the ins and outs of the position," Gary said.

But he plans to go to meet Roger at work a few times before he is sworn in.

"It will be almost like a job-shadowing," Gary said.

Roger agreed that this could be useful for his younger brother.

"I wish I had an older brother to show me the Roger told The ropes," Paper.

Roger said Gary told him he will have "a few questions over the next few weeks," to which Roger replied Gary should shadow Roger to get a feel for the different venues under the Circuit.

Roger agreed that his siblings had arguments and sometimes fought like "cats and dogs," but also "stood up for each other."

That team spirit was tested when Gary came to work as an attorney for Roger's law firm in Champaign. Even though Roger was technically Gary's supervisor, it was very "informal," Roger explained.

"In some respects I was his boss, and his supervisor, and in other respects we all worked independently."

And now each will be sworn in independently on the same day in two different circuit judge positions.

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Consider All Aspects of College Savings Options

It's almost back-to-school time. If you have young children going to public schools, your biggest expenditures may be on pens, pencils and notebooks. But if you want those same kids to go to college someday, you'll eventually face considerably larger costs – so you may want to start preparing soon.

College is costly. For the 2015-16 school year, the average expense (including tuition, fees room and board) was nearly \$20,000 at a public, four-year school, and more than twice that amount at a four-year private school, according to the College Board. Of course, cheaper alternatives are available - your children could go to a local community college for two years at a very reasonable cost, and then transfer to a four-year school.

Still, if your child does go on to get a bachelor's degree, those big bills will eventually arrive. As you consider how you can best deal with these costs, ask yourself these questions:

- · How much can I afford to contribute? As much as you'd like to help your children pay for college, you also have to think about your own needs - specifically your retirement. Think very carefully before reducing contributions to your retirement plans, such as your IRA and 401(k), to help fund a college savings plan. After all, your children may be able to get scholarships and grants, and even if they have to take out loans, they'll have many years in which to repay them - but you can't postpone saving for retirement without jeopardizing your ability to enjoy a comfortable lifestyle. When it comes to prioritizing your financial goals, putting yourself first is not necessarily a selfish act.
- What college savings plan should you consider? A number of college savings options are available. For example, you could contribute to a 529 plan which offers potential tax advantages and high contribution limits. You might also consider a custodial account, such as an UGMA or UTMA, although when your children reach the age of majority, they are free to do whatever they want with the money – and their plans may not include college.
- What will be the effect of a college savings plan on financial aid? When colleges determine financial aid packages, they will evaluate your child's assets differently than your assets. Your child typically would be expected to contribute 20 percent of his or her assets, while you are only expected to contribute up to 5.6 percent of your assets. Consequently, you may be better off saving for college in your name, rather than your children's. Under the federal financial aid guidelines, an UTMA/UGMA account is classified as a student asset, while 529 plans are counted as parental assets if parents are the account owners. (The rules on financial aid are not always so clear-cut, however, so it might be worth your while to contact a financial aid officer at a local college or university to ensure that your chosen method of saving will still allow for the greatest possible assistance.)

As you can see, you've got several factors to think about when it comes to helping your kids meet their higher education goals. Study up on these options, so you can find the right answers for your family's needs.

David Davison, IRTA State President, was guest speaker. On the state level, he has served on the State Legislative Committee as Regional Director, Area

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Rep., V. Pres., and is in his first year of a two-year term as President.

He gave the members an IRTA update and thanked members and leaders for attending local meetings and

supporting IRTA. Mainly he talked about current threats to pensions, including taxing pension benefits, lack of funding from the state for pensions, state's funding of insurance program, Chicago's public retirement system to go in with theirs, needed legislation to go in and out of TRIP and TRAIL, and the federal social security penalties for teachers.

Davison stressed important it was that in 2015 the Illinois Supreme Court declared SB1 unconstitutional and their Tier 1 rights were protected.

The business meeting was then called to order. Secretary Dee Dee Raube's and Treasurer Sue Schnell's reports were accepted as read. Bill Flott made the motion to accept both

reports and Karen Kehoe seconded it. The motion car-

Loryann Eis, Area I Rep. for IRTA, informed the group abour IRTA grants available to any public school educator (pre-K through 12) in Areas 1 and 2. Livingston County is one of 26 eligible counties to receive \$15,000 in grant money. The deadline is Sept. 2 for educators to apply online so that their students will have the means to participate in special projects.

Committee Reports: • Don Gibb, legislative

chairman, reported the legislature has not been in session since the last meeting so there was nothing to report about legislative action.

• He emphasized that the first line of defense against any attack is the IRTA Political Action Committee (IRTAPAC). These funds are used to help elect legislators who will oppose budget bailouts that affect benefits and support other retiree issues. IRTAPAC relies on donations from IRTA members to achieve this and he encouraged all to donate \$1.00 a month (pension deduct) or send a check for \$12.00 to IRTAPAC.

• The IRTAPAC met August 4 to review questionnaires submitted by incumbent legislators for consideration of endorsement. (220 questionnaires were sent and about 30% returned. Most of those not returned were from incumbents who have no challengers).

• The only contests in Livingston County are in the two precincts in the

Woodland area. PAC voted to endorse Christine Benson and Rep. Andrew Skoog.

• As of August 1, there was about \$125,000 in the PAC accounts and most of that has been allocated for the 2016 election races.

 Alberta Kinate, membership chair, reported they haven't gained any new members since the June meeting.

 There are approximately 100 people on the nonmember list that must be contacted. LCRT has a membership list of approximately 300 retired teachers.

· Sheets of nonmembers were distributed and Bert asked for help contacting the ones they knew.

 Cathy Montgomery, scholarship co-chair, reported all schools in Livingston County have been notified via the administrators with a request to pass along the information to their teachers. The deadline is Sept. 30 for active teachers to apply. Winners will be announced

at the October meeting. Vice President Ehrhardt announced \$112.00 was taken in for the 50/50 drawing. The winner was Marlene Landstrom, who donated \$56 back to the scholarship fund.

Having no old or new business, Don GIbb made the motion to adjourn and Sue Schnell seconded it. Adjournment was at 11:00



Tri-Point Changes Rules to Encourage Concession **Stand Volunteers**

Like many school districts, Tri-Point High School has experienced difficulty staffing concession stands at athletic events with parents, busy schedules, single-parent families, and other distractions.

So at the school board's Aug. 15 meeting, the school district approved a recommendation by the Athletic Committee to change concession work assignments.

From now on, if parents have a child in the athletic program, they will be required to attend one or two games and work the concession stand. As long as they attend their work assignments, they will be given back a \$50 fee paid.

"It is a \$50 deposit," explained Superintendent Jeff Bryan. "The check is returned without it even being deposited. It is to guarantee we have the concession stands staffed."


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

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

Rupp Wins Bronze in Rio

Galen Rupp, nephew of Mary and Mike Carpenter of Dwight, took home the bronze in Sunday's Olympic marathon at Rio de Janeiro, Brazil.

Rupp had high hopes of winning a medal in the 10,000 at the 2016 Olympic Games in Rio these past few weeks. It was his showing in the marathon eight days later, however, that proved to be his ticket to being an Olympic medalist.

Rupp, 30, of Portland, Oregon, saw the 10,000 as his best event. But after a disappointing showing Aug. 13, placing fifth, his chances of winning a medal relied on his performance in the marathon event - just the second marathon he's ever



rain and humidity-ridden race, Rupp stuck with eventual-silver medalist Fevisa Lilesa and favorite, Eliud Taking a shot at gold in a Kipchoge, until around the

21-mile mark, but would end up finishing a minute and 21 seconds behind Kipchoge and 11 seconds behind

Rupp's bronze was the first Marathon medal for the U.S. since the 2004 Games.

His time was about a minute less than in the Olympic tryouts, so he "ran a personal best," according to his Aunt Mary of Dwight.

After the race, Kipchoge, the best in the world at 26.2 miles, said he felt Rupp may soon break his record, high praise coming from the Gold Medalist.

Rupp himself said he should stick to marathons from now on.

Job Dunlavey, Kempton, Takes 11th in Nation for Bareback Riding at Rodeo

Job Dunlavey, of rural Kempton, grew up on his parents' livestock farm, but his passion for rodeo is from his uncle.

Dunlavey turned his passion for riding bucking broncos into hardware at this year's Illinois High School State Final Rodeo in June, taking first in bareback rid-

The next month, he came home with an 11th place in the nation at the national rodeo competition held in Gillette, Wyoming in late

Breaking a bucking bronco dates back to before the American West developed, born from the skills required to manage cattle and horses by Spanish Vaqueros.

Today, "cowboys" compete in rodeo competitions.

But the competitions are just as dangerous as they were when cowboys worked the ranches for a living.

The horses Job rides in rodeos are never broken.

unbroken," Dunlavey explained.

This year, Dunlavey, a 2016 Tri-Point High School graduate, said he was "bucked off" a horse four times, sustaining two injuries, once damaging his left shoulder.

He said while riding the bucking horse bareback, the rider's glove must fit into a rig on the horse, that barely allows space for the glove, similar to a suitcase handle, Job told The Paper last week.

"So you wedge your glove inside," he said, then hang on for dear life while the horse is inspired to buck harder by placing a spur at the horse's neck, he said.

"When you spur them, it helps them buck, makes jump higher," them Dunlavey explained.

In the national competition, he took second in performance and 15th in the

round. In the second round, he won performance and They are "bred to be placed 15th in the round.

> The top 20 in each event are allowed to compete in the national finals, where Dunlavey placed 11th in the nation.

> He earned a scholarship to a college in Fort Scott, Kansas.

> Dunlavey plans to attend college and take up welding as a career. But that will be his day job.

> He intends to continue his rodeo competitions, inspired by his uncle, Joe Courville, of Bourbonnais. Dunlavey began riding in competitions in 2015.

> Job is the son of Doug and Michelle Dunlavey, and has a younger sister, Kayla.

The farm raises hogs and

"I'm usually trained by Uncle Joe," Dunlavey said. "He makes it into the finals in the rodeos every year."

That is Job's goal, too, from here on out.


