## Gardner Archives Sign Delay Draws Ire From Archives Curator

The Gardner Archives Curator chastised the Gardner Village Board at its meeting, Sept. 12, asking why there has been a delay in placing the sign on Village Hall.

The Archives, which were established more than a decade ago in the Gardner Village Hall, contains fully packed cases with memorabilia and artifacts outlining the village's history.

Ida Schopp, curator for the museum, had funds donated to the village to purchase "letters" for a sign that would be placed on the Village Hall to show the Archives are inside.

She told the board she understood the letters arrived some time ago.

"I've asked several persons and they tell me 'ask the mayor,'" Schopp said. "Your honor, why have they

not been put on?"

She said the people volunteering for the archives spent "many hours putting this all together," and the volunteers are getting "impatient."

She also praised the village for allowing the seniors to meet in the Archives and enjoy their town's history.

Mayor Mike Serena responded that the letters had in fact arrived and were still in his office.

"Dan Alexander is to get some volunteers to put them up," Serena said.

To which, Schopp responded, "My license plate says 'get 'er done,'" adding she did not care who put up the letters, but to have it completed.

In other business, the board:

- heard a report from Councilman Dick Hileman that the well at the water plant has been down and that

it should be back in operation in two weeks. The cost for repair is \$70,000. Hileman also reported the well near Rub Ford is down but this will not be repaired until after the rainy season.

- learned that tax money will be received in October and at that point the village will pay the Fire Department \$10,000 that is owed.

- learned from Councilman James Riley that an issue with cleaning up cargo containers at O'Hare Trucking will be forwarded to the village attorney for further action.

- approved a special one-weekend extended hours for Class B liquor licenses during NASCAR weekend, Sept. 16 through 18. The hours were to be 6 a.m. to 1:30 a.m. for those three days. Hours are normally 8 a.m. to 1:30 a.m. Monday through Saturday, and 11 a.m. to 1:30 a.m. on Sunday.

## Dwight Grade School BOE Adopts Deficit Budget

*Board Votes Down Air Conditioning*

Following a public hearing on September 14, the Dwight Grade School Board of Education moved forward with adopting its Fiscal Year 2017 Budget.

Prior to the hearing, the Board took actions impacting the proposed budget. The Board approved the abatement of \$990,000 from Working Cash to the Education Fund. The Board also approved a \$14,000 Loan repayment from Working Cash to the Education Fund. In a third action, the Board approved the permanent transfer of \$35,000 from Health / Life / Safety to the Operations and Maintenance Fund.

With these actions in place, the Board approved the 2016-17 Budget. With the \$990,000 Working Cash Fund transfer to the Education Fund included in the budget, the projected FY17 Education Fund end balance is \$879,825. The O&M Fund is projected to have an end balance of \$412,138. Across all Funds, projected FY17 revenues are

\$6,757,645 while projected expenditures are \$6,858,385 for a total deficit of (\$100,740). The total projected FY17 balance is \$3,061,173.

There was no comment following the public hearing before the budget was adopted.

Caution prevailed when the Dwight Grade School Board of Education moved its discussion to the topic of whether air conditioning should be added to the over 50 year old building.

With a \$330,000 heating project underway, the BOE has been considering upping the ante and adding air conditioning to the school which would increase the total project cost to approximately \$1.875 million. Monies from Livingston County sales tax would be used to pay for the project. But, with sales tax revenues a fluctuating source of revenue, the uncertainty for board members already dealing with a struggling financial picture has left most unwilling to take the risk and questioning 'is the money there to support a 1.8 alternative revenue bond?'

"You have to be realistic

about what you have in front of you, look at the numbers, and look at the cash coming in. It's just not there," said board member Nick Stipanovich.

Sales tax revenues to Dwight Grade School from Livingston County are projected to be \$235,000 this year. The total sales tax in the county multiplied by student enrollment drives the portion of sales tax each school district receives. Loss of businesses that generate sales tax and/or a decline in student enrollment could negatively impact the sales tax revenue amount.

For some, air conditioning the school is a goal. But, without cash in hand, now is not the right time.

"Go ahead and spend the two million – go ahead and do it. Point of fact is you are going to have air conditioning with no school," cautioned BOE member Steve Tock.

"This is not a necessity – we can still operate and we can still educate students. Maybe in not the most desirable of environments, but in a couple of weeks it has cooled off quite nicely. I just

## Former Dwight Resident Earns Lead Female Role in 'The Last Descent'

A former Dwight Grade School and High School student stars as the lead female in "The Last Descent" which opens in theaters Sept. 16.

Just before her final year at Dwight Township High School, Alexis Johnson, now 28, graduated from high school and attended college on the East Coast.

The Illinois native attended Dwight schools under her family surname, raised by her grandparents in Dwight.

She told *The Paper* the movie shows, "There's hope even in tragedy, light even in darkness."

The film, a true story, depicts the life of John Jones, married to Emily, who currently resides in Peoria, Johnson noted.

According to the plot summary found online, the movie is about Jones who in 2009 explored an un-mapped section of the famous Nutty Putty Cave in Utah. While spelunking,

Jones became stuck in a hole 18 inches wide and 150 feet under ground. Rescue crews worked frantically to free him.

"The story is about his life and with flashbacks of Emily and John, with their relationship," Johnson explained.

"She was pregnant with their second child. John was in medical school in Virginia. Emily was a housewife. The hardest part was the fact that this was a true story."

Johnson said she contacted the real Emily prior to doing the film, started emailing back and forth and eventually began speaking on the phone with her.

"It was a very emotional process throughout," Johnson said of the film experience.

"She's not your typical L.A. actress and I believe a lot of that comes from the way she grew up," said Michelle Moore, her movie publicist.



# Disposition of Three Drug Convictions Released

### Vote for Smart Investment Moves

The presidential election is little more than a month away. Like all elections, this one has generated considerable interest, and, as a citizen, you may well be following it closely. But as an investor, how much should you be concerned about the outcome?

Probably not as much as you might think. Historically, the financial markets have done well – and done poorly – under both Democratic and Republican administrations. Also, many factors affecting investment performance have little or nothing to do with the occupant of the White House. Consequently, no one can claim, with any certainty, that one candidate is going to be “better for the markets” than another one.

Still, this isn't to say that any given presidential administration will have no effect at all on investors. For example, a president could propose changes to the laws governing investments, and if Congress passes those laws, investors could be affected.

But in looking at the broader picture, there's not much evidence that a particular president is going to affect the overall return of your investment portfolio. As mentioned above, many factors – corporate earnings, interest rates, foreign affairs, even natural disasters – can and will influence the financial markets. But in evaluating a president's potential effect on your investments, you also need to consider something else: Our political system does not readily accommodate radical restructuring of any kind. So it's difficult for any president to implement huge policy shifts – and that's actually good for the financial markets, which, by their nature, dislike uncertainty, chaos and big changes.

The bottom line? From your viewpoint as an investor, don't worry too much about what happens in November. Instead, follow these investment strategies:

- Stay invested. If you stop investing when the market is down in an effort to cut your losses, you may miss the opportunity to participate in the next rally – and the early stages of a rally are typically when the biggest gains occur.
- Diversify. By spreading your dollars among an array of investments, such as stocks, bonds and other investments, you can help reduce the possibility of your portfolio taking a big hit if a market downturn primarily affected just one type of financial asset. Keep in mind though, that diversification can't guarantee profits or protect against all losses.
- Stay within your risk tolerance. Investing always involves risk, but you'll probably be more successful (and less stressed out) if you don't stray beyond your individual risk tolerance. At the same time, if you invest too conservatively, you might not achieve the growth potential you need to reach your goals. So you will need to strike an appropriate balance.

Elections – and even presidents – come and go. But when you “vote” for solid investment moves, you can help yourself make progress toward your financial goals.

cannot fathom financing our foreseeable future to the gills... to finance air conditioning,” said Stipanovich. “I am all about it, and I think we should go for it - it is definitely a goal that I want high on the list. But, I can’t see paying interest even if the cost of materials and the cost of labor and whatever else goes up. I don’t want to be stuck with that payment. Who knows what is around the corner...taxpayers repealing the one percent sales tax increase...Walmart closing...or just flat out being short on one side of the budget but having air conditioning on the other side of the budget? I just cannot see it. I cannot be in favor of something like that; it does not sit well with me. My answer is no.”

That answer was the same for the majority of board members when a motion to accept the \$1.875 million A&R Mechanical bid for a heating and cooling solution failed with Marc Ellis, Bo Partney, Nick Stipanovich, Steve Tock, and Kim Frauli opposing. Voting in favor were Joel Funk and Cathy Ferguson.

Board members did agree to look at alternate options to providing a more favorable climate for students and staff.

The Board did approve a bid of \$64,600 from Siemens Controls for controllers needed for the heating project.

Traffic flow patterns, congestion, and the safety of students during a.m. drop-offs and p.m. pickups were, once again, topics of discussion as board members and administration tossed around ideas for a solution to the ever present concern. No recommendation was made as the Board continues to look at the situation.

Following a closed session discussion, the Board approved a revised salary agreement for Tony Noonan, Building and Grounds Supervisor, and Deb Conroy, District Secretary.

The BOE also:

- recognized 7th and 8th Grade Board Scholars.
- affirmed employment of Alexandria Severson as First Grade Teacher.
- affirmed employment of Lynette Kruck, Classroom Aide.
- approved the employment of Ryan King, Wrestling Coach.
- approved IESA Wrestling Co-op with Gardner & Odell (DGS Hosting)
- approved Board Policy updates (second reading).
- approved a revised Risk Management Plan.
- set a Board Retreat date of January 21 from 8 a.m. – Noon.
- approved an ISBE application for the Recognition of Public Schools 2016-17.
- approved EIS Administrator and Teacher salary and benefits report.

The next meeting of the Dwight Grade School Board of Education will be 6 p.m. on Wednesday, October 12, in the DGS Library. Meetings are open to the public.

Even though this is Johnson’s first starring role in a major motion picture, she has been training for many years under a teacher named Marta DuBois.

“I trained with (Marta) intensely for the past five years,” Johnson said.

“Brick on brick I’ve been building every week, sometimes until two or three in the morning.”

Although she now considers herself an actress full time, she worked as a waitress previously to make ends meet.

“My first job was on Rodeo Drive as a window girl in Beverly Hills,” she said.

Previous to this lead role, she acted in short films and has done “tons of commercials and bit parts,” she said.

“It doesn’t happen overnight,” she continued.

She said for anything worth doing a person has to be persistent.

“Not giving up is part of that,” she said. “I have clarity about how to go about going after something.”

She said she has a strong foundation in religion, growing up Catholic and attending St. Patrick’s Church in Dwight as a young girl.

“The most important thing is to pay it forward,” she said. “I have been given a gift. I want to pay it forward with that gift. Inspire other people.”

## Tri-Point’s 2016-17 \$90,000 Deficit Due to State Financing: Bryan

The Tri-Point School District expects to end the 2016-17 school year roughly \$90,000 in the red. And the state is to blame.

The Tri-Point tentative budget was approved by the school board at its meeting, Monday, Sept. 12.

“Overall we are in the red,” said Superintendent Jeff Bryan in an interview with *The Paper* last week.

Combining the education fund, building fund, transportation fund and working cash fund, the district will end with a deficit of roughly \$90,000 by the close of the 2016-17 school year.

Bryan said the state notified schools it would fully fund education general state aid, but said nothing about categoricals like transportation funding.

The Illinois State Board of Education, however, said that categorical payments like transportation and special education transportation will likely be funded at half of the total quarterly payments due to districts.

In the case of Tri-Point, that is a “loss” of roughly \$100,000 for this school year, resulting in the \$90,000 deficit, Bryan said.

“Now I understand how the state is fully-funding general state aid while not putting funding into categoricals,” Bryan said, half-joking.

Bryan expects the 2016-17 school year to be the last one closing with a deficit because of property tax income from the wind turbines being constructed in the district.

However, there is a late property tax payment coming from the one county creating a situation with more bills than funds at the end of the school year. So Bryan anticipates having to use tax anticipation warrants again next spring.

“We have \$1 million coming from Ford County but we get it just before the end of the fiscal year,” he said.

He said the district borrowed \$500,000 at the close of the 2015-16 school year and used just \$300,000 of it.

The district has been able to streamline its operations with less funding for education due to attrition.

“We’ve had retirements and in a lot of cases replaced them with people not as experienced,” Bryan said indicating the district has been trying to whittle down costs. Less experienced teachers are paid lower on the scale. “One person was at the top of the pay scale,” he added.

The tentative budget will be on display until Oct. 17 when the school board is expected to adopt it.

In other action, the board:

- approved Matt Mogged as a volunteer coach for the district.

# Herscher Unit 2 Projects \$800,000 Deficit By Close of FY 2016-17

Herscher Unit 2 expects to end the 2016-17 school year \$800,000 in the red, out of a \$23 million budget. “That is with \$9.9 million in reserves,” Superintendent Rich Decman told *The Paper* last week.

He presented the tentative budget to the board for approval at its Sept. 12 meeting.

He noted that the deficit at the end of the 2015-16 school year was higher at \$1.3 million.

“The board is going to have to discuss some types of cuts to services or see if we can get any more revenue from taxpayers,” Decman said, adding, “unless the state provides more funding.”

Decman said he had not heard that state education sources are saying categoricals like transportation and transportation for special education will not be fully funded. The state has already said that general state aid would be fully funded.

But in a school district like Herscher Unit 2, at 260 square miles and one of the largest districts in Illinois, transportation is a big chunk of the district’s budget at \$2 million.

If the state does renig on half of its four quarterly pay-

ments, Unit 2 would be another \$750,000 in the red at the end of this school year. “We are the third or fourth largest district (in terms of square miles) in the state,” Decman said. “We are one of the top five.”

The tentative budget will remain on display for 30 days for adoption action at the October board meeting.

The board also approved moving \$325,000 from the working cash fund to the operations and maintenance fund to offset the fourth year in a five-year lease agreement plan for more than 1,000 technology devices used by students and teachers

In grades 5-12, students use Chrome books. In high school, they utilize laptops.

“Our rationale is our kids have got to be prepared,” Decman said of the technology devices used at Herscher district schools.

The district set graduation for 2 p.m., May 21, the weekend ahead of Memorial Day due to scheduling that will allow seniors to be out of school earlier.

On the subject of graduation, the district is going to add more weighted classes to try and narrow down the number of students who achieve valedictorian or salutatorian status.

English, statistics, and

U.S. history classes are currently weighted. The additional weighted classes may include science and math with physics, calculus, biology, and chemistry.

In a weighted system, a student in a weighted class receives 5.0 for an A grade, instead of 4.0 on a 4.0 system. That means some students end their high school careers with more than a 4.0 average.

One parent protested the change, saying if a student is not strong in science and math, he or she would be penalized.

In other action, the board:

- accepted the resignation of Megan Coy as high school ag teacher effective Dec. 22.

- learned of the pending retirement of Transportation Director Beth Wilcox.

- hired Joel Huizenga as high school varsity volleyball coach.

- hired Greg Walter as high school assistant girls soccer coach.

- heard a complaint by FFA alumni about the delays in the new Herscher High School greenhouse. The construction of the new greenhouse has been delayed by red tape such as architect’s approval and other paperwork beyond the control of Unit 2, Decman said.

Since its last assessment in 2013, OSF HealthCare has seen system-wide improvement in three key areas: access to medical care, ability to gain needed prescription medications, and access to dental care.

# Compensation Increase for New Village of Dwight Trustees

## Public Works Building Addition Moves Forward

The Dwight Village Board of Trustees met on September 12 when recommendations by the Village Administration Committee received board approval.

In the first action, Village Trustees will receive a compensation increase. Village trustees will receive \$50 per month; \$55 per regular or special board meeting; and \$40 per committee meeting.

The raise will go into effect once the new officials are sworn in after the April 2017 Consolidated Election. Trustees who were seated in 2015 are not entitled to the new rate until after their terms expire in 2019. The last increase for Trustees was in 2009.

In a second action, the board approved an Administration Committee recommendation to move forward with the Public Works building addition project in its entirety including the structure, concrete floor, plumbing, electrical and a new roof for the existing building. A total low bid of \$101,068.00 from Morton Buildings, Inc., was approved by the board. The addition will be paid for using General Fund monies.

In other business, the board authorized the Village President to sign three Bond purchase agreements as follows:

- General Obligation Bond 2016 A, Water Bond for up to \$2.5 million, to be used for new water mains on Mazon Avenue, North Street and Taylor Street.
- General Obligation Bond 2016 B, TIF Bond for up to \$2.4 million, to be used for the East Main and West Main Street improvement project.
- General Obligation Bond 2016 C, Street Project Bond for \$4.8 million used for infrastructure/street repairs.

In his report to the board, Dwight Chief of Police told the board that the investigation of an incident in August where a truck ran into a residential home on Union Street has been completed. According to Henson, the completed investigation has been forwarded to the State's Attorney's Office for review and for determination of charges.

A DTHS Homecoming parade request for Friday, September 23, starting at 2:30 p.m. was approved by the board. Due to downtown construction, the parade route will be different this year. The parade will begin at DTHS proceeding north on Columbia Street; east on South Street; south on S. Chicago Street; then west on Philmar Street returning to the high school.

The board also approved:

- payment of bills totaling \$152,395.22.
- a Fund transfer of \$100,000 from Sewer Fund (52) to the Sewer Replacement Reserve Fund (33) for the purpose of paying principal and interest on IEPA Loan L17-2627.
- a Dwight Baptist Academy request for a candy sale fund-raiser with dates of sale from September 22 through November 1 including door-to-door sales along with selling outside of local stores.
- a Lions Club candy sale request for October 7 from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m. and October 8 from 7 a.m. to Noon at the corners of Rt. 17 & Rt. 47 with a backup rain date of October 14 & October 15.
- a Harvest Days 5K Run request for Saturday, September 17.

The next meeting of the Dwight Village Board will be 6:30 p.m. on Monday, September 26, in the Public Services Complex.

ORDINANCE NO. 2016-06

An Ordinance To Levy and Assess A Tax for the Prairie Creek Public Library District of the Counties of Livingston, LaSalle and Grundy, State of Illinois, for the Fiscal Year Beginning July 1, 2016 and Ending June 30, 2017

BE IT ORDAINED, that the Prairie Creek Public Library District of the Counties of Livingston, LaSalle and Grundy, and State of Illinois, shall levy a tax of .02% of the value of all taxable property within said District, for building and maintenance purposes, subject to the right of the electors in said District to petition and require an election concerning the imposition of such tax, pursuant to 75 ILCS 16/35-5 (formerly Chapter 81, Illinois Revised Statutes, ¶1003-1).

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that within fifteen (15) days from the date of adoption of the ordinance, it shall be published in The Paper, a newspaper of general circulation in the Prairie Creek Public Library District and it is effective immediately upon adoption.

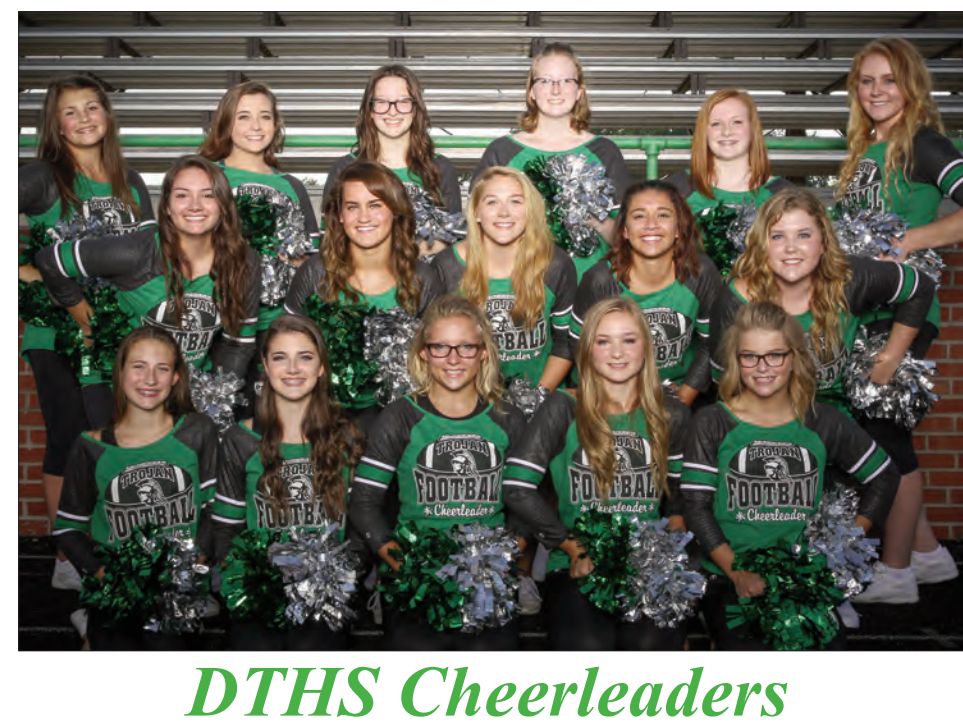

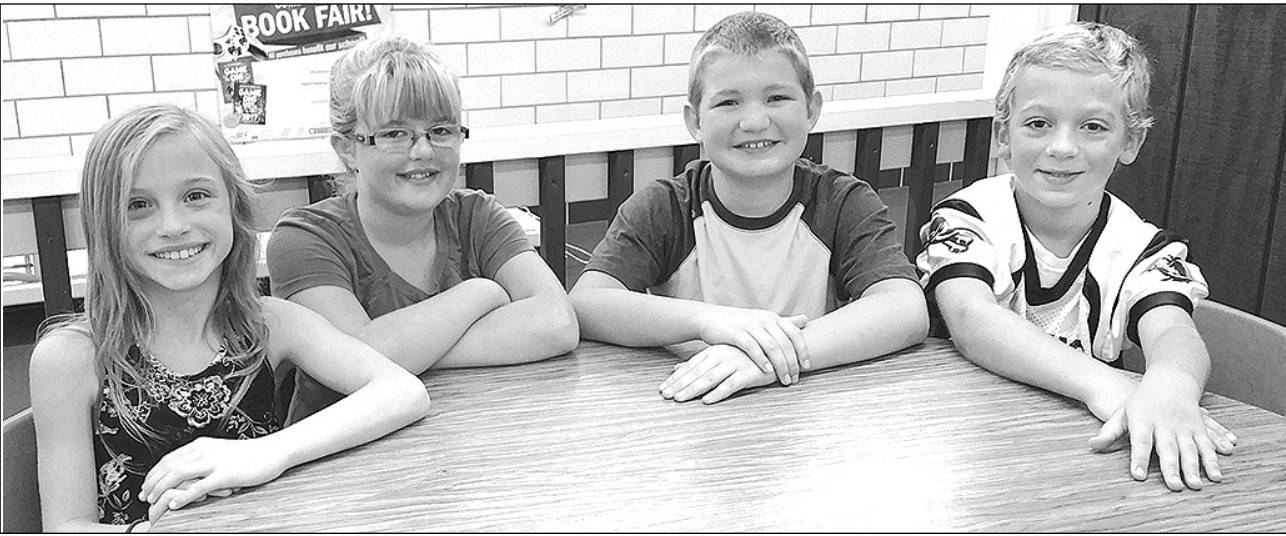

## Reduce, Repel, and Report Mosquitoes

With the heavy rains from several weeks ago, large “broods” of non-vector floodwater mosquitoes [Aedes vexans, etc.] in many areas of Livingston County have appeared. Adults are vicious biters and are particularly annoying at dusk and after dark. Consequently, the appearance of swarms of aggressively biting nuisance mosquito species may cause public concern in humans but these mosquitoes do not transmit West Nile Virus or Zika virus. These mosquitoes can be a vector of heartworms in dogs so pet owners should take appropriate precautions to protect their pets.

They are called floodwater mosquitos, because the eggs are laid in dry areas and when a heavy rain comes the water rises, floods the eggs and the egg hatches. Virtually any transient water can support the mosquito larvae, but rain pools in unshaded areas produce the largest broods. The species is most common in

grassy pools that border wooded areas but specimens can be encountered in partially shaded woodland pools, roadside ditches, and vernal pools in open fields.

West Nile virus is transmitted through the bite of a Culex pipiens mosquito, commonly called a house mosquito that has picked up the virus by feeding on an infected bird. Common symptoms include fever, nausea, headache and muscle aches. Symptoms may last from a few days to a few weeks. However, four out of five people infected with West Nile virus will not show any symptoms. In rare cases, severe illness including meningitis or encephalitis, or even death, can occur. People older than 50 and immunocompromised individuals are at higher risk for severe illness from West Nile virus.

For summer 2016, environmental surveillance indicates that WNV activity in Culex mosquitoes overall is above that as of this date in 2015 with

18% of mosquito pools in Illinois have tested positive for WNV virus compared to 11% in 2015. There have been 33 human cases of WNV in Illinois to date compared to 77 at this time in 2015. There have been no positive mosquitoes, birds or human cases to date this year with WNV in Livingston County.

While Zika virus is also primarily transmitted through the bite of a mosquito, the primary type of mosquito that carries Zika virus, Aedes aegypti, is different and is rarely found in Illinois.

Take some simple precautions include practicing the three “R’s” – reduce, repel, and report.

- **REDUCE** - make sure doors and windows have tight-fitting screens. Repair or replace screens that have tears or other openings. Try to keep doors and windows shut. Eliminate, or refresh each week, all sources of standing water where mosquitoes can breed, including water in bird

baths, ponds, flowerpots, watering pools, old tires, and any other containers.

- **REPEL** - when outdoors, wear shoes and socks, long pants and a long-sleeved shirt, and apply insect repellent that contains DEET, picaridin, oil of lemon eucalyptus, or IR 3535 according to label instructions. Consult a physician before using repellents on infants.
- **REPORT** – report locations where you see water sitting stagnant for more than a week such as roadside ditches, flooded yards, and similar locations that may produce mosquitoes. The local health department or city government may be able to add larvicide to the water, which will kill any mosquito eggs.
