Sherri Brooks Picks Up Her Shears Again For Dog Grooming Business

Sherri Brooks, rural Reddick, just can't stay away from one of her unparalleled loves — animals.

So after recovering from years of an illness, she is back in the animal game doing dog grooming and training.

She works out of her house, which is surrounded by corn and soybean fields, and has a wooden sign at her door that says “The Brooks’ Field Zoo.”

The sign couldn't be more descriptive with the cats and dogs she has in her home keeping her company.

Prior to her illness, for years she ran a kennel and dog grooming business located on the west side of Reddick in the country off Route 17.

She ran that business from 1982 to 1994 when her daughter took over due to Sherri's illness.

Her daughter, Julie Brooks, eventually attended veterinarian school. (Couldn't be from the influence of growing up around all those animals, could it?)

Meanwhile, due to her illness, Sherri sold the business and thought she would no longer be able to work with animals again.

But she is now on the mend, opening Shearjoy, working out of her home.

Besides dog grooming, she does training, with no punishments.

“We give rewards for good behavior,” Brooks explained. “We get fast results.”

The training includes basic obedience, but she does whatever the dog owners require.

“We work with behavior problems,” she said.

The business opened Sept. 29.

Dwight Fox Center Carpenter Known As ‘Dr. of Wheelchairology’

Vern Arnold's carpentry job has transformed over the years into basically a full-time position building and maintaining patient-specific wheelchairs at the Fox Developmental Center in Dwight.

Arnold, a Reddick native and graduate of Reddick High School, has been working at the Fox Center for 19 years, hired as a carpenter.

The center has 104 patients at present, almost all in wheelchairs. Since his career at the Fox Center began, he has made 140 custom-built wheelchairs, after spending three days in Michigan doing training.

With all those wheelchairs, “there's always something to do,” Arnold said. He said his job is now 100 percent wheelchair construction and maintenance.

Thus the moniker, “Dr. of Wheelchairology,” which hangs on his office door.

“It's a good feeling helping these guys out,” Arnold explained of his job satisfaction. “I'm here for these guys.”

Most of the patients at Fox cannot talk. They have intellectual disabilities such as cerebral palsy, or birth defects.

About 10 percent of the patients at Fox are verbal, according to Lana Waselewski, director of the center.

The process to design a custom-built wheelchair begins with consultation with Vivian Bumpass, physical therapist, who determines the specific physical needs and equipment requirements such as special padded arm-guards or head-rests.

“She and I work together and plot what we want to do,” Arnold explained.

Bumpass prepares physical therapy assessment done on the patient to assist in the

wheel-chair building process.

“We talk about the dimensions, sizes needed, seat depth,” Arnold said.

The next step is to start with cutting the seat base, which is made out of flotation foam plastic providing cushioning.

The foam is shaped using a grinder to fit the patient precisely, then a memory foam padding is placed on top for further comfort.

Some chairs require special additions to prevent the patient from sliding forward.

Others include head and neck braces depending on how the person sits.

After the seat form is completed, a special vacuum sealer allows Arnold to put on a vinyl covering with smooth, rounded edges.

Each chair requires about four to five days of labor.

If Fox Center secured such custom-built chairs from an outside contractor, the cost would be several thousand dollars and take longer.

Plus, as Arnold explained, if an outside company did the work, sometimes it must be redone more than once to fit the patient's needs and specifications with communication issues between the Fox Center and the contractor.

Having a carpenter in-house speeds up the process and eliminates the need to do work over.

Carol Shenk, mother of David, is a patient at Fox Center, agrees that this is best for the patient. Her son (continued on page 3)

“We are making the necessary steps to continue a great quality of life for you, the village of Dwight residents and visitors to our town,” he continued.

He listed the following projects and their progress:

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Investors Should Avoid “Great Expectations”

Apart from death and taxes, few events in our world are consistently predictable – and investment returns are definitely not one of them. What can you, as an individual investor, do to cope with the ups and downs of the financial markets and make progress toward your long-term goals?

To begin with, you should be aware that the financial markets have fluctuated greatly – daily, monthly and yearly – over the past three decades. depot as well as new windows and doors will be bid out soon to complete the project.

- Amtrak’s new depot is “pretty much completed” besides sod and punch list items. “We are anticipating IDOT and Amtrak will finalize the walk-through and approval for an early November opening.”
- D Construction was awarded our 1st phase of residential street improvement project and they will be starting

this week, with curb removals. They will work on this until the weather breaks, sometime in November.

- “We have awarded Conley Construction from Morris (the) new water main work,” he said. The streets will be Mazon Ave. from Route 66 to Superwash on Route 17, North Street from Chicago to Clinton street and Taylor Street.
- “We are meeting with water meter supply companies to replace all water meters in town,” he explained. These

will be tamper proof, and more accurate and be read through wireless technology. “By doing this, we will better utilize our employees from having to spend three days every two months reading meters.”

- An addition will be built on the public works building, located at 710 S. Old Route 66.

“I need to apologize for the inconvenience, but with patience great results are coming,” Anderson said.

has been at the Fox Center since he was nine years old. David is now 53.

She said his wheelchair has to fit David’s body position.

“He doesn’t sit like an average person,” Carol explained. “He needs support for his head.”

In addition to the head support, the chair also provides special padded guards for his arms to prevent them from hitting something as he is pushed in the wheelchair.

All the chairs at Fox are push chairs. None are motorized.

Each chair has several bearings that can wear out, Arnold said. Part of his job is checking and replacing worn parts.

The chairs are unique for each patient’s needs, and it is up to Vern to figure out how to create the chair that works.

“A few give me fits,” Arnold said. “But by the end of the day, I have figured it out.”

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To the Electors of the State of Illinois:

The Illinois Constitution establishes a structure for government and laws. There are three ways to initiate change to the Illinois Constitution: (1) a constitutional convention may propose changes to any part; (2) the General Assembly may propose changes to any part; or (3) a petition initiative may propose amendments limited to structural and procedural subjects contained in the Legislative Article. The people of Illinois must approve any changes to the Constitution before they become effective. The purpose of this document is to inform you of proposed changes to the Illinois Constitution and provide you with a brief explanation and a summary of the arguments in favor of and in opposition to the proposed amendment.

Proposed changes in the existing constitutional amendment are indicated by underscoring all new matter and by crossing with a line all matter which is to be deleted.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO ADD SECTION 11 TO ARTICLE IX OF THE ILLINOIS CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE IX – REVENUE

SECTION 11. TRANSPORTATION FUNDS

(a) No moneys, including bond proceeds, derived from taxes, fees, excises, or license taxes relating to registration, title, or operation or use of vehicles, or related to the use of highways, roads, streets, bridges, mass transit, intercity passenger rail, ports, airports, or to fuels used for propelling vehicles, or derived from taxes, fees, excises, or license taxes relating to any other transportation infrastructure or transportation operation, shall be expended for purposes other than as provided in subsections (b) and (c).

(b) Transportation funds may be expended for the following: the costs of administering laws related to vehicles and transportation, including statutory refunds and adjustments provided in those laws; payment of highway obligations; costs for construction, reconstruction, maintenance, repair, and betterment of highways, roads, streets, bridges, mass transit, intercity passenger rail, ports, airports, or other forms of transportation; and other statutory highway purposes. Transportation funds may also be expended for the State or local share of highway funds to match federal aid highway funds, and expenses of grade separation of highways and railroad crossings, including protection of at-grade highways and railroad crossings, and, with respect to local governments, other transportation purposes as authorized by law.

(c) The costs of administering laws related to vehicles and transportation shall be limited to direct program expenses related to the following: the enforcement of traffic, railroad, and motor carrier laws; the safety of highways, roads, streets, bridges, mass transit, intercity passenger rail, ports, or airports; and the construction, reconstruction, improvement, repair, maintenance, operation, and administration of highways, under any related provisions of law or any purpose related or incident to, including grade separation of highways and railroad crossings. The limitations to the costs of administering laws related to vehicles and transportation under this subsection (c) shall also include direct program expenses related to workers' compensation claims for death or injury of employees of the State's transportation agency; the acquisition of land and the erection of buildings for highway purposes, including the acquisition of highway rights-of-way or for investigations to determine the reasonable anticipated future highway needs; and the making of surveys, plans, specifications, and estimates for the construction and maintenance of flight strips and highways. The expenses related to the construction and maintenance of flight strips and highways under this subsection (c) are for the purpose of providing access to military and naval reservations, defense-industries, defense-industry sites, and sources of raw materials, including the replacement of existing highways and highway connections shut off from general use at military and naval reservations, defense-industries, and defense-industry sites, or the purchase of rights-of-way.

(d) None of the revenues described in subsection (a) of this Section shall, by transfer, offset, or otherwise, be diverted to any purpose other than those described in subsections (b) and (c) of this Section.

(e) If the General Assembly appropriates funds for a mode of transportation not described in this Section, the General Assembly must provide for a dedicated source of funding.

(f) Federal funds may be spent for any purposes authorized by federal law.

EXPLANATION

The proposed amendment adds a new Section to the Revenue Article of the Illinois Constitution that provides revenue generated from transportation related taxes and fees (referred to as “transportation funds”) shall be used exclusively for transportation related purposes. Transportation related taxes and fees include motor fuel taxes, vehicle registration fees, and other taxes and user fees dedicated to public highways, roads, streets, bridges, mass transit (buses and rail), ports, or airports.

Under the proposed amendment, transportation funds may be used by the State or local governments only for the following purposes: (1) costs related to administering transportation and vehicle laws, including public safety purposes and the payment of obligations such as bonds; (2) the State or local share necessary to secure federal funds or for local government transportation purposes as authorized by law; (3) the construction, reconstruction, improvement, repair, maintenance, and operation of highways, mass transit, and railroad crossings; (4) expenses related to workers’ compensation claims for death or injury of transportation agency employees; and (5) to purchase land for building highways or buildings for to be used for highway purposes.

This new Section is a limitation on the power of the General Assembly or a unit of local government to use, divert, or transfer transportation funds for a purpose other than transportation. It does not, and is not intended to, impact or change the way in which the State and local governments use sales taxes, including the sales and excise tax on motor fuel, or alter home rule powers granted under this Constitution. It does not seek to change the way in which the State funds programs administered by the Illinois Secretary of State, Illinois Department of Transportation, and operations by the Illinois State Police directly dedicated to the safety of roads, or entities or programs funded by units of local government. Further, the Section does not impact the expenditure of federal funds, which may be spent for any purpose authorized by federal law.

Proposed Amendment to the 1970 Illinois Constitution

Explanation of Amendment

The proposed amendment adds a new section to the Revenue Article of the Illinois Constitution. The proposed amendment provides that no moneys derived from taxes, fees, excises, or license taxes, relating to registration, titles, operation, or use of vehicles or public highways, roads, streets, bridges, mass transit, intercity passenger rail, ports, or airports, or motor fuels, including bond proceeds, shall be expended for other than costs of administering laws related to vehicles and transportation, costs for construction, reconstruction, maintenance, repair, and betterment of public highways, roads, streets, bridges, mass transit, intercity passenger rail, ports, airports, or other forms of transportation, and other statutory highway purposes, including the State or local share to match federal aid highway funds. You are asked to decide whether the proposed amendment should become part of the Illinois Constitution.

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
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

USDA: Despite Heavy Rains in July, August - Corn, Soy Yields To Be High

The story of the 2016 harvest is lots of moisture but there will still be record yields.

Mother Nature threw a lot of moisture at area farms this summer, sometimes a little too much.

As area farmers continue to harvest their corn and soy-

beans, the United States Department of Agriculture predicted in its September report that Illinois soybean yields will break records and corn will be higher than 2015.

USDA estimates the average soybean yield this year in Illinois to be 61 bushels per acre, which is four bushels above the 2014 record yield.

For corn, USDA projects an average yield of 200 bushels per acre, 25 bushels more than 2015.

But those are averages, and yields are even higher in *The Paper's* circulation area.

For example, Warren Sancken, who farms in the Emington area, told *The Paper* last week he is seeing corn yields of 260 bushels.

Soybeans are ranging from 55 to 65 bushels, and that is with some soybeans suffering from sudden death disease, Sancken said.

"There's been quite a bit of sudden death from excess moisture," Sancken said. "You don't see it until mid-

August."

So just how much rainfall did the area see this summer?

In July and August this

water stood, those crops were damaged.

Similar reports are coming in from western

"We're seeing some damage from the moisture, three to 10 percent of the crop," Cotter said.

Most of the area corn and soybean farms have yet to be harvested this year, late due to the high amount of rainfall this past summer. Moisture has caused some damage but yields throughout *The Paper* readership area are expected to be high.

year, Livingston County saw 6.82 inches of rain in July and 6.83 in August. That is about three inches more than normal, according to Emerson Nafziger, University of Illinois extension agronomist.

"In that area, there were isolated cases where there has been sudden death," Nafziger said. "But Saunemin missed the big rains."

He added with July and August at such high rates of rainfall the area did have "some effect in some fields."

He added that where the

Andy Cotter, manager of Herscher Grain's elevator, said he is seeing soy with yields between 50 and in the mid-60s bushels per acre with roughly 25 percent of the crop harvested.

He said there is some sudden death in the soybean crop he has seen so far.

Corn, which Cotter estimates is about 10 to 15 percent harvested, has "stupendous" yields so far, anywhere from 175 bushels per acre to 240 bushels per acre

But the moisture is affecting the corn as well.

Conditions are similar in Grundy County, according to Gardner area farmer Frank Halpin.

"I think a lot of guys are looking at record yields," Halpin said. "Right now, harvest is a concern."

He was speaking of the rainfall this month, which is slowing the harvest.

He said corn yields are above 200 bushels per acre on his farmland, which is higher than the state average.

"We're just getting started ourselves," Halpin added.

Want to Expand Your Growing Season?

Does having a juicy tomato a month before the Farmers Market starts sound appealing?

Then try a hoophouse – small or large. It will allow you to extend the growing season into early or late winter.

The local food movement, the emergence of Farmers

Markets (which many consumers would like to have year round) and the availability of cost-share support for a hoophouse setup from NRCS have allowed extra food to be locally-produced more than ever before.

So, what is a hoophouse, and what styles are available, whether fixed or mov-

able? What can be grown in them? When and how? Can I erect a hoophouse in my backyard?

What resources are available? Zachary Grant, University of Illinois Extension Local Food Systems/Small Farms educator, will discuss hoop-houses, and answer questions.

2016 Harvest Season Opportunity to Help Vulnerable Farmers A World Away

Lee Bunting and Warren Sancken, co-leaders of the Dwight-Emington Growing Project, invite all area farmers to be part of the solution to world hunger.

The project raises funds for the overseas food security programs of a non-profit called Foods Resource Bank.

When farmers haul their grain to their local elevator, Bunting and Sancken ask them to consider designating proceeds from a portion of their harvest to FRB so that smallholder farmers in some of the world's most challenging places can grow their own food.

"FRB gives those farmers the opportunity to provide for their families and other members of their communities," said Bunting, a farmer from Dwight.

"With the right tools, seeds and training, they can lift themselves out of hunger and poverty," Bunting continued. "A few bushels of grain donated from us can end up making a huge difference to farmers in many places around the globe."

Sancken, who farms in Emington, agrees.

"The money we raise goes directly to helping vulnerable farmers," said Sancken.

"FRB is truly making a difference in reducing the number of hungry people in the world – and it is so easy to jump in and help out. Anyone can get involved."

Rather than shipping grain, FRB uses grain checks to fund a variety of agriculture development programs such as hands-on Farmer Field Schools, which train farmers in sustainable and conservation farming techniques that improve soil fertility, maximize available water, and improve yields. FRB's programs are led by 16 implementing organizations and their in-country partners.

These organizations work at the village level to support farmers, co-ops and self-help groups in finding lasting solutions to hunger.

No two food security programs are alike. Each one

invites the local community to determine its own goals and path to achieve that goal. And all are invited to participate, regardless of race, gender, belief, nationality, ethnic origin or political persuasion.

The Dwight-Emington Growing Project's farmers and supporters have raised over \$67,000 for FRB since the project began in 2006.

They've helped people they may never meet to grow enough food to eat, with enough extra to sell for income to purchase needed medicines and household staples, pay for modest farm and home improvements, and send their children to school.

"Like people everywhere, these vulnerable farmers want to stay in their own homes and communities," said FRB's president and CEO, Marv Baldwin.

"When families can make ends meet, they do not need to risk their lives in search of work in cities or other countries," Baldwin added.

Since its founding in 1999, FRB's volunteers, community growing projects, member organizations, individual donors, corporations and foundations have made it possible for over a million people around the world to achieve food security.

Pursuant to 35 ILCS 200/10-115, the farmland assessment for the 2016 assessment year will increase by 10% of the preceding year's median cropped soil productivity index as certified by the Farmland Assessment Technical Advisory Board resulting in a \$21.86 per acre increase for each soil productivity index.

As required by 35 ILCS 200/9-210 and 35 ILCS 200/10-115, the following equalization factors have been applied to bring the assessments to the statutorily required three-year median level of 33.33%.

Property in each Township, other than farmland, is to be assessed at a 33.33% median level of assessment, based on the fair cash value of the property. You may check the accuracy of your assessment by dividing your assessment by 33.33%. The resulting value should equal the estimated fair cash value of your property. If the resulting value is greater than the estimated fair cash value of your property, you may be over-assessed. If the resulting value is less than the fair cash value of your property, you may be under-assessed.

Assessment records of all parcels within your jurisdiction are available in the office of Supervisor of Assessments during regular business hours (8:00 AM – 4:30 PM). Information is also available on the Internet at livingston.illinoisassessors.com. Before filing an appeal, an attempt should be made to review the details of your property record card. If you are not satisfied with that informal review, you may appeal your assessment to the Livingston County Board of Review. Appeals must be filed in writing by the deadline of November 14, 2016 (30 days after publication date). If you file late, your appeal will not be heard. Contact the Livingston County Supervisor of Assessments for Rules and Procedures of the Board of Review and complaint forms. Complaint forms are also available on the internet at the address listed above or in the office of the Supervisor of Assessments.

Once a complaint is filed, the Board of Review will notify you of a preliminary decision. If you are not satisfied, a hearing may be requested. Attend the hearing to present evidence to support a change in assessed value. You may represent yourself or have an attorney represent you.

The Board of Review will send you a Notice of its final decision on the assessed value and certify those values to the County Clerk to extend taxes for the collection of property taxes. If the property owner does not agree with the decision of the Board of Review, an appeal can be filed with the Property Tax Appeal Board.

Your property tax bill will be calculated as follows:
Final Equalized Assessed Value – Exemptions = Taxable Value
Taxable Value x Current Tax Rate = Total Tax Bill


