Dwight's Rt. 66 Family Restaurant Notches 15th Year in Business

The Route 66 Family Restaurant in Dwight has been serving the community for 15 years, officially opening its doors under the current ownership Nov. 5, 2001.

Maria and Naser Ahmedi came to the Dwight area after running Wishing Well in Odell from 1993 until they sold it in 2003.

She purchased Dwight restaurant from Melvin Mack who had purchased Stark's Restaurant in

The business employs 30 full and part-time employ-

The restaurant business is nothing new to Maria.

She worked in her father's restaurant in Seneca from age five in 1977.

And at the current restaurant, it too is a family business with her children working in the business at a young age.

So what keeps the restaurant busy?

"It's a combination of tourism and locals," Maria said. She said it was her idea to change the name from Stark's and secure more traffic with Route 66 in the business name

"If it has 66 in the name, people will come," she reasoned.

The strategy worked.

Her busiest season is from April through the summer when Route 66 traffic climaxes each year.

But the tourism just brings the traffic to her door. It is her homemade specialty items that keep customers coming back for more, she

The restaurant specializes homemade soups, coleslaw, broasted chicken, and mashed potatoes and gravy, all made from scratch.

Other popular items are homemade lasagna and homemade potato salad.

"A lot of people meet here," in Dwight, she said. They come from all points in Illinois and converge on meets at the restaurant each Dwight.

"This is kind of the midpoint," she continued. "Those who find us, they love it, find it so homey with an old-fashioned look to it."

She said compared to Odell, Dwight is a "big" town with lots of traffic.

"The location was the main key for us, and Route 66 tourism exploded at the time."

Longevity of employees helps, too. Waitress Dianna Sullivan has been with the Ahmedi family since she was in Odell, and waitress Betty "Boop" Clover was working for Mack at Stark's before the Ahmedis took

The restaurant is now a lifetime member of the Route 66 Association, and is a member of the Dwight Economic Alliance, Heritage Corridor and the National Scenic Byway of Route 66.

It is also the quarterly meeting place for the Red Fez Shriners.

Dwight Police Department Adapts To New Challenges of 21st Century

Just like police crimefighting equipment has gone from a cop walking the beat to computers in squad cars and body cams, so have community policing techniques changed with the times battling new chal-

lenges such as mental health.

Community policing remains the number one priority of the Dwight Police Department, according to Police Chief Tim Henson, who attended a conference the International Association of Chiefs of Police Oct. 22 in San Diego, California.

But one unexpected chal-

lenge facing police departments today, including Dwight, is mental health.

Funding has dried up for mental health facilities, which closed doors and dropped the mental health problem onto the lap of law enforcement officers.

The Dwight Police arrested Christian Banks, 20, of rural Dwight, for residential burglary Nov. 1.

Banks was confronted by three witnesses and fled prior to police arrival.

"Banks was also in possession of a loaded handgun during the commission of the burglary," Police said.


Gas Prices Mixed

Watchdog Group: Nuclear Bailout Legislation **Imminent in Illinois**

Much of the media focus Flu and pneumonia vac- in Illinois has been on basein the state say residents could be back in front of lawmakers.

Last month, state Sen. Donne Trotter, D-Chicago, said he would introduce another version of Senate Bill 1585, the "2016 Exelon Nuclear Bailout legislation," as early as the fall veto session, which begins Nov. 15.

SB 1585 amends the Public Utilities Act, preventing premature closings of nuclear power plants. Trotter's office said there would be dire consequence

to the economy, jobs, and the environment if they were to shut down.

Dave Kraft, director of the watchdog group Nuclear Energy Information Service, says the legislation threatens community solar energy projects, which he said Exelon and its Midwest utility, ComEd, want to eliminate.

Illinois' utility companies have said the bailout only would raise ratepayers' bills by about 25 cents per month. while ensuring stability and improving Illinois' energy markets. Critics say ratepayers would be on the hook for an average of \$3 per month during the first ten years, and more after that.

2nd Quarter Sales Report **Good News for Dwight**

It took an unusually long time for the Department of Revenue to release its April, May, June 2016 sales tax report for Illinois municipalities, but the report was well received in Dwight as it showed a nice 11.5% increase in revenue for Dwight compared to the second quarter of 2015.

This year's 2nd quarter report totaled \$170,984 (\$125,213 from Livingston Co.; \$45,771, Grundy). Last year's 2nd quarter total was \$153,326 (\$109,889 Livingston, \$43,437 Grundy).

Grundy County furnished some 26.7% of Dwight's total sales tax revenue in the 2nd quarter of 2016, 28.3% in the 2nd quarter of 2015.

Drinking & Eating ingston and Grundy) accounted for \$22,277 in sales tax revenue, 2nd quarter 2016, compared to \$20,728 a year ago in the same time frame.

Automotive & Filling Stations in the Livingston Co. part of Dwight produced So. Wil. 25,485

tax revenue of \$49,929 in this year's 2nd quarter. It was \$47,259 a year ago. The state's report does not show figures for that category in the Grundy County part of Dwight.

The amount of revenue from the additional 1ct. sales tax for Dwight approved by voters in March of this year will not be reported until the 3rd quarter figures are released for July, August, September. The 1c increase is earmarked for infrastructure work in the village.

(continued from page 1) tion, 42 million mentally ill people are incarcerated in jails across the United States. The nation spends \$15 billion a year housing mentally ill people in jail, whom when released will re-violate the law within 30 days.

One third of homeless people have a form of mental illness.

Twenty-five percent of police who are killed, are killed at the hands of people with mental illness and one in 10 calls for police services are due to someone who has some form of mental ill-

"A lot of cops who get shot are by folks that have mental illnesses," Henson told *The Paper* last week.

"And a lot of people shot by cops have been diagnosed with mental illnesses," he continued. "So it's important to take steps to prevent this from happening in our community."

Henson is sending officers to Critical Incidents Training courses that help officers learn how to deal with situations so they can be resolved peacefully.

Henson said in Dwight, the police have been dealing with such incidents, but "fortunately it has not resulted in the use of our sidearms."

He said such incidents generally may escalate, however, to require police to use pepper spray, a taser, or some other physical force to make a suspect comply with officers' commands.

The training gives police tools and techniques to resolve the situations.

Fentanyl is absorbed through the skin, normally used as a potent painkiller.

But because it is absorbed through the skin, officers need to be wary of the dangers of being dosed when searching personal belongings or suspects, wearing puncture-proof gloves.

"Fentanyl is 10 times more potent than morphine," Henson said, "and is used in patches applied to the skin."

Meantime, heroin remains a major problem among young people in urban areas, and in small communities, and Dwight is no exception.

He said years ago, a minority of youth were involved with abusing drugs, whereas today the majority of young people, including children of prominent citizens or from good homes, are experimenting with deadly, highly addictive substances.

policing, Community especially with a small department like Dwight, remains a crucial part of patrolling the streets for crime and solving other safety concerns.

For example, Henson said when he spoke with Angie Turner of Studio 134, a hair salon on East Main Street, he learned of Turner's concern about more patrolling downtown late at night, and the lights going out in the alley walkway between her building and the Bank of Dwight building.

Henson said that obtaining feedback like that is paramount, and plans to conduct a community survey, with the village board's approval, to gauge the community's policing concerns.

He will also be conducting a Citizens Police Academy, to allow citizens to ride along with police officers.

"It's important for citizens to get an inside view of what we do on a daily basis," Henson said.



Veterans Day is a holiday that has come to mean more since September 11, 2001, and the U.S. military involvement in Iraq and Originally Afghanistan. started after World War I, the increasing number of veterans in recent years and the military commitments have made the holiday more important to contemporary society. More schools and businesses close, and celebrations have blossomed across the country. Despite those developments, there are still some questions about this national holiday.

There's even some question about the actual name of the day. Does the day belong to veterans? Should the name have an apostrophe? If so, does it belong to one vet-

eran or all veterans? There is no apostrophe in the name because it is a day to honor all veterans.

How is it different than Memorial Day? Memorial Day is meant to honor and remember veterans who have died in the service of their country or because of wounds from service. Veterans Day is meant to honor all veterans. It has taken on an increased awareness of living veterans, their service and the contributions they have made to national security in recent years.

Veterans Day is not only a national holiday in the United States. Dating back to World War I, Canada, Australia and Great Britain all observe Remembrance Day on November 11. The celebrations are a little different in each place, but the overall intent is the same: to honor those who have served to protect the country. Parades, wreath laying and ceremonies mark celebrations in all three coun-

While Veterans Day is a federal holiday, it is not universally observed. There is no requirement for businesses or state offices to close, although all federal services are suspended for the day. There is no federal law requiring all schools to close as there is for other federal holidays, so each school district decides whether to follow the observance. Unlike other national holidays that have been moved to Monday to create a long weekend, Veterans Day is observed always November 11 regardless of

the day on which it falls. Veterans groups have long lobbied for special recognition. Schools can and do choose to observe the holiday on different days of the week.

The practice of wearing poppies on Memorial Day is a tradition that has gone largely unobserved by many in recent years. Many wonder if it is appropriate for Veterans Day as well. Officially, the wearing of poppies to remember war dead is precisely that—a remembrance for those who have died-and, because Veterans Day honors all veterans, the wearing of remembrance flowers is not a common practice. Many communities, however, are developing rituals and ceremonies to mark the holiday honoring all veterans.

Dwight's Jeremy Riegel Retires From U.S. Army as Jumpmaster

There are those individuals who are not content to just fly in airplanes — some prefer to jump out of them.

Dwight's Major Jeremy Riegel, a 1995 graduate of Dwight Township High School and the son of Annette and Troy Riegel, is one of those who prefers to jump out of the airplanes.

Riegel retired from the U.S. Army on Oct. 31, after achieving the distinction of being a jumpmaster (making ceremonies. The event at least 65 jumps) as part of the Airborne Infantry.

He said the highlight of his career was jumping from

a plane over Normandy in France in 2009, the 65th anniversary of D-Day.

During World War II, paratroopers led the Allied Forces a day ahead of D-Day, jumping into Germanoccupied France during June, 1944, the start of the final operation against German forces that ended the war in Europe by the following spring.

Riegel was the lead planner for the event over France which included dozens of included service men and women from the U.S., Canada, the United Kingdom, France, and ... Germany. Germany is now our ally.

"The Germans and French are part of the European Union now," Riegel said. "France and Germany are very close."

He was also honored after his 67th career jump with the distinction of being named a jumpmaster at a ceremony in France.

Jumpmasters are the expert paratroopers in an airborne unit who train and teach the military techniques of jumping from airplanes.

They are responsible for training soldiers, who enter Army Airborne School, into paratroopers and managing airborne jump operations in airborne units across all branches of services.

When he jumped into France, he said there were 15,000 people lined up to watch the troops land.

"That was the best week in my military career," Riegel told The Paper.

His jumpmaster pin was put on by World War II veteran, Major Duke Boswell. He said he had a chance

to sit down and talk with World War II veterans. "It was an absolute

unique experience," he added. "It is the highlight of a paratrooper's career." At the time of the 65th D-

Day celebration, Riegel was Company Commander, Chief of Training, and Operations Officer at the 173rd Airborne Brigade, in

Germany. Yes, I said Vicenza, Italy and Bambert, Germany.

This deployment was from 2004 to 2009.

Prior to that, he was Leader Platoon Company executive officer in the 504th Parachute Infantry Regiment of the 92nd Airborne Division from 2000 to 2004 at Fort Bragg, North Carolina.

So his paratrooper career was not just re-enactments of war. He also fought alongside special forces in Afghanistan 24 months in four deployments, 2003 through 2012.

"All four deployments included combat patrolling as well as efforts to rebuild Afghanistan and train Afghan forces," he said.

"On my deployment as a company commander in 2007-2008, we trained Afghan National Police and Afghan Border Police," Riegel continued. "To do this effectively, we lived with them for 10 to 30 days at a time. It offered great insight into Afghan culture and how they live their daily lives."

In 2005, Vice President Dick Cheney came to Afghanistan for the seating of Afghanistan's first Parliament. "I worked closely with the Secret Services to plan his security and develop crisis action and emergency evacuation plans," Riegel explained.

When asked if he was ever in harm's way, he said, "Every deployment, and driving through Baltimore when living in Maryland," he joked.

"I'm proud about making a difference in so many lives of Afghans," he said. "When village elders would stand up to the Taliban and kick them out because the elders knew that educating their kids, especially their girls, was a priority, I knew we were making significant

progress." His final deployment, 2015 to 2016, was for 18 months Deputy as Operations Information Chief/Cyber Chief at the Asymmetric Warfare Group at Ford Meade, Maryland.

His career also took him to Fort Richardson, Alaska. He is a 1999 West Point

graduate. His mother, Annette

Riegel, told The Paper that he would never consider himself a "hero."

But she said all those who serve in the military are heroes.



Her son said he owes a lot of his military career success to the lessons and values he took with him from Dwight.

At West Point, he was concerned that his DTHS education would be inadequate, especially in the math and sciences. He found the opposite to be true.

"I'm very thankful for the quality of teachers I had," Riegel said.

He was also involved in lots of sports growing up in Dwight.

He praised the mentor-

ship and leadership he learned from such coaches as "Rub, Butterbrodt, Baum and Basile, to name a few."

He said they taught him "real men win, but not at all costs. They win the right way."

He said a lot of his friends were jealous of the support they saw coming from his hometown of Dwight with such things as Project SOS that sent regular care packages to the deployed troops.

"I'm very thankful I came from a small town," he added.


