Record Crowd Braves Chilly Winds To Honor Dwight Area Vets Friday

A standing room only audience gathered at the historic Dwight Depot at 11 a.m., Friday, Nov. 11, to honor all area veterans, braving chilly winds.

Dwight grade school children who attended were bundled up well, with covered heads and ears. Although some were covering their ears because of the noise during the traditional 21-gun salute at the close of the ceremony.

"This year we mark the eve of America's entrance into World War I, the Great War, the War to End All Wars, from which Veterans Day evolved," said Randall Farris, past commander of the Dwight VFW Post 2608.

He said Veterans Day salutes all who served, regardless of when or where.

"It is our day, which we equally share with our families who served and sacrificed alongside us," Farris said. "Today we honor the contributions and sacrifice es of nearly 22 million living veterans who have served our country in the name of liberty and justice."

He said people may be confronted with the question "What have veterans done exactly?"

"I encourage you to respond with a smile and simply state: Around the world, veterans have broken

the shackle of tyranny, behind a wife and sevenunleased the chains of bondage, and emancipated entire nations from oppression," Farris said.

"Veterans have lifted the cloak of darkness, oppression and desperation, and replaced it with an inextinguishable light that is the sprit of freedom and liberty," he continued.

Farris said in times of peace, it is the selfless dedication of America's veterans who continue to secure the freedoms on which our great country was founded.

But in times of war, veterans made sacrifices, sometimes the ultimate sacrifice, to secure our freedoms.

"From the jungles of Vietnam to the mountains of Afghanistan, from Bastogne to Baghdad, from Pork Chop Hill to the Persian Gulf, our veterans have borne the cost of America's wars — and continue to stand watch over America's peace," Farris

Farris closed his remarks to the crowd on a personal

"I would also ask that you keep in your thoughts and prayers the family of Chief Petty Officer Jason Finan who on Oct. 20, 2016, lost his life while assisting Iraqi forces to retake the city of Mosul," Farris said.

"He was a friend of my son's and was in his unit from San Diego. He left

year-old son. Another example that freedom comes at a price."

In addition to Farris, Carol Dippon of Dwight Area Operation S.O.S. told the audience about the program that sends gift boxes to soldiers deployed in the U.S. and abroad.

"We have just sent out our Veterans Day boxes," she said.

"We mailed out 29 boxes with 25 of them in the United States and four overseas," she added.

Dippon explained that the boxes contain the 2016 Hallmark Military Christmas ornament, a letter from Operation S.O.S. thanking them for their service and updating them on what is happening in Dwight.

The package included a copy of the Nov. 9 issue of The Paper and candy that was donated from the children from Dwight Grade School.



Dwight's Andrew Funk Wins National Championship for Dirt Track Racing

Dwight's Andrew Funk won the 2016 United Midwestern Promoters national racing championship for dirt track car racing.

The season which runs from March to October includes races on dirt tracks all over Illinois, plus Michigan and Indiana.

This season, Funk raced at area tracks including Kankakee, Fairbury and Peoria.

This year, he raced 46 nights, had 26 wins, 36 races in which he finished in the top three, 39 races in the top five, seven races he did not finish.

Special shows he won include the Raymond White Memorial in Charleston: the O'Toole's Auto Special in Fairbury; and the "What Up" Both won national champi-Dog 40 Memorial" in Farmer City.

His victories and top placing allowed him to accumulate enough points to defeat all other drivers this year.

Dwight Grade School Prepares 2016 Tax Levy -- November Board Actions --

The Dwight Grade School District #232 Board of Education met on November 9 where District Superintendent Dr. Richard Jancek gave the BOE a financial presentation which included the projected 2016 EAV, recommendations for the upcoming tax levy, and a three year projection of all school funds.

According Livingston and Grundy County Assessors, the Grade School's EAV is projected to increase from \$104,143,925 to \$105,047,174; an increase of \$903,249 (0.87%). Using the projected 2016 EAV, Dr.

Jancek presented his recommendations for the tax levy rate and extension. The 2015 levy rate was \$3.4398 with an extension of \$3,582,644. The recommended 2016 tax rate is \$3.3987 (a decrease of \$0.0411) and with an extension of \$3,592,451 (an increase of \$9,807 - 0.27%). Dr. Jancek explained while the tax rate will go down, the extension will increase due to the increase in the EAV.

Finally, Dr. Jancek presented a three-year projection of all nine school funds. All funds are projected to have a positive fund balance through the 2018-2019 school year.

No action was taken. Board action with regard to the Tax Levy will take place at the December meeting.

In another matter, the Board approved a Resolution abating the taxes levied for the year 2106 to pay debt service on the General Obligation School Bonds (Alternate Revenue Source) Series 2016, of the District.

In other financial news, Dr. Jancek presented the Financial Reimbursement Information System report. The FRIS report shows that the State of Illinois still owes mandated payments to the Dwight Grade School District totaling \$67,613.23

from Fiscal Year 2015-16 and currently owes the DGS District \$53,631.29 for FY 2016-17.



During your working years, you are (hopefully) putting money into your IRA and your 401(k) or similar employer-sponsored retirement plan. But once you've retired, how can you maximize the benefits you get from these plans?

First of all, you need to be aware of the rules governing withdrawals from your retirement plans. If you are older than 59½, you can withdraw money from your traditional IRA without paying penalties, though the withdrawals will typically be taxable. But once you reach 701/2, you generally must start taking "required minimum distributions" (RMDs) from these accounts, with the annual amount determined by your age, the account balance and other factors. (The situation is different with a Roth IRA. If you are the original account holder, you are not required to withdraw funds from your Roth IRA at any age. You can choose to withdraw your contributions at any time, tax and penalty free. To withdraw your earnings tax and penalty free, you generally must have owned the account for at least five years and have reached age

So, assuming you do have a traditional IRA and a 401(k) or similar plan, what should you do with the RMDs? You'll probably require at least some of these distributions for your living expenses, but if you don't need it all, what should you do with the "excess"?

Here's one suggestion: As part of your overall retirement investment portfolio strategy, you can reinvest the money into these three "buck-

• Near-term income bucket – For this bucket, you're not concerned with high returns – you just want the money to be there when you need it for expenses, such as a major car repair, a new furnace, and so on. It's always a good idea to have an emergency fund containing three to six months' worth of living expenses – and your short-term income bucket could be an ideal source to help build such a fund.

- Medium-term income bucket During retirement, you can probably never have too many sources of income, so you may want to fill a bucket with intermediate- and long-term bonds, which make regular interest
- Long-term income bucket Even when you're retired, you will need some growth potential in your portfolio to help keep you ahead of inflation. So this bucket should be filled, not surprisingly, with growth-oriented investments. These investments can fluctuate in value, but as long as you don't need to tap into them in a hurry, you may be able to avoid taking withdrawals when the price is down.

In addition to this "bucket" approach, you do have other options for your RMDs. For example, you could give your grown children some financial assistance, possibly for help in funding their IRAs. And you can always make charitable contributions, which allow you to support worthwhile organizations and, by doing so, earn some potential tax

Clearly, you can do a lot with your RMDs. And you worked hard for them - so make sure they work just as hard for you.



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The dangers of smoking cannot be overstated. A recent study from the ACS found that smoking cigarettes contributed to more than one in four cancer deaths in the United States.

While cigarette smoking rates in the U.S. have dropped from 42% in 1965 to 15.1% in 2015, cigar, pipe, and hookah use are very much on the rise.

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

High Voter Turnout Provides Few Surprises in Local Elections

While Donald Trump defeated Hillary Clinton in the national presidential race, 279 electoral votes to 228, for local races in The Paper, there were few upsets or surprises in the Nov. 8

But the turnout in *The* Paper readership counties averaged between 65 and 75 percent, one of the highest since previous presidential races.

example, For Livingston County, the voter turnout was 68.88 percent.

That is higher than the 2008 presidential race when 66 percent of the people voted.

However, the 2012 race for president generated a record 70 percent turnout, according to Livingston County Clerk Kristy Masching.

"The reason [this year] was all the controversy in the presidential race and the local wind farm issue,"

Masching said.

The wind farm question asking voters for a 1,600 feet setback for new commercial developments lost overall in the county, but won in seven northeastern county townships (see separate story on the wind referendum, adjoining column)

In Illinois overall, Trump was defeated, giving Clinton 20 electoral votes, where she won 55.4 percent of the popular vote, compared to 39.4 percent for Trump.

Unlike the state, in area counties serving The Paper readers, Trump was the overwinner. whelming Livingston County, Trump won with 10,197 votes compared to 4,005 for Clinton. In Grundy County, Trump secured 13,417 votes to 8,021 for Clinton. In Kankakee County, Trump defeated Clinton 25,081 to 18,908 and in La Salle County, he won 26,269 to

In the U.S. Senate race, Republican incumbent Mark

Kirk was unseated by Democrat Tammy Duckworth, 2,908,363 votes to 2,150,099.

In state and local elections, the transportation statewide amendment aimed at making sure transportation funds are not used for purposes, passed the measure easily with 78.9 percent of the vote, 3,690,927 yes, compared to 985,245 no votes.

In the race for State District Incumbent Republican Sue Rezin defeated Democratic challenger Christine Benson, 55,264 to 40,171 votes.

In the Illinois House District 79, Republican Lindsay Parkhurst unseated incumbent Democrat Kate Cloonen, 23,649 to 20,366.

In County races, for Livingston County Board District 2, the four winners for four-year terms were Jason Bunting, 3,594 votes; Joseph Steichen, 2,974 votes; Bob Young, 2,860 votes; and Ronald Kestner, 2,714 votes. Democrat M. Bennett-Tjes lost with 1,504 votes. The two-year term was won by Steven Lovell who was running unopposed

with 4,390 votes. The Grundy County hotly contested State's Attorney race went to incumbent Jason Helland with 12,883 votes compared to 9,753 votes secured by challenger Brooke Shupe.

In Grundy County, the race for County Board District 3 saw three winners: Harold Vota, 3,859 votes; Ann Gill, 3,678 votes; and Jim Ryan, 3,307 votes. Losing were Brian Severson, 3,304 votes; Frank Halpin, 2,936 votes; and Mashale Castelli, 2,372 votes.

County officials have said that larger setbacks would not be economically feasible, according to developers.

The advisory ballot question was designed to allow each township to give its wishes to the County Board regarding wind farm developments.

If a group of contiguous townships voted yes, that means the county board is being instructed by the voters that those townships wish to have such developments with a 1,600-foot set-

If they vote no, or if there are no contiguous townships that desire the development, then the people are telling the county board they maybe want the setback larger or no developments at all in their township.

Townships in Northeastern Livingston County, each had more yes than no votes according to unofficial tallies from Nov. 8:

Nevada, 60-yes, 52-no; Dwight, 965-yes, 860-no; Round Grove, 94-yes, 84no; Odell, 309-yes, 224-no; Union, 72-yes, Broughton, 96-yes, 63-no; Sullivan, 229-yes, 129-no.

The following townships in Livingston County and part of The Paper's readership area voted against the measure: Saunemin, 119yes, 166-no; Sunbury, 47yes, and 67-no.

interesting Another development in the election was how Indian Grove Township voted. There was a clear 3 to 1 majority against the 1,600 setback in that township with 518 in favor and 1,353 against.

There is a faction in Indian Grove, which includes Fairbury, that is against the wind farms, as exemplified by the group, United Citizens Livingston County.

Rebekah Fehr, Fairbury, a spokesperson for the group, said she was not surprised by the vote and sees that people in the Northeast corner of the county already have the Wind Farm development in their area.

"I do think this sent the Flott said.

following right message to the County Board," Fehr explained.

"The Zoning Board of Appeals is still deliberating on the wind turbine ordinance," she added, saying the moratorium on wind developments is scheduled to be lifted early next year.

She said her group will retain its zoning attorney to help the county figure out how to legally allow those townships that wish to see these developments be allowed to do so. This could be done by zoning only those townships to allow such a wind farm use, based on legal criteria.

"We plan to hold their feet to the fire," she said of the County Board.

Bill Flott, who is retiring from the County Board for District 2, which represents the Northeastern end of the county, said in those seven townships, which are contiguous, they can have new developments at 1,600 feet away from buildings, if the ZBA zones it thusly.

"I hope the County Board looks at each township,' Flott said. "Hopefully companies will be interested in developments in those areas.'

Gas Prices Slip 5 cents


The U.S. national gas price per gallon average slid lower this week, down 6.0 cents to \$2.15 Monday.
