Dwight Loses Dr. Louis Cronin, Animal Lover, Veterinarian

Dwight veterinarian who died Nov. 23, a family pet was not just an animal. It was a beloved member of the owner's family.

"He was passionate about everything," said his wife, Lynne.

"He was passionate about animals but just as passionate about the owners. I think he thought of animals as that allowed the society to things that people cherish and love."

She said his favorite movie was "It's A Wonderful Life."

When asked to be parade marshal for Dwight, he had a big banner made up that said "Dwight is a wonderful place to have a wonderful life," she explained.

Dr. Cronin had a pet too, a golden retriever named "Shadow." And like the name implies, Shadow would follow his master around wherever Dr. Cronin went.

Lynne Cronin said she believes her husband would want people to b filled with joy, not saddened by his passing.

"He would want people his 40 years in Dwight.

to keep supporting one another, loving one another and sharing joy," she added.

Dr. Cronin was involved in several community endeavors, most notably the Livingston County Humane Society and the Guardian Angel Basset Rescue project.

Dr. Cronin co-founded the humane society 18 years ago.

He signed a certificate investigations do into alleged animal abuse.

"It allowed to pull animals away," said Karen Gregory, co-founder of the Society and president of the board.

Since the year 2000, Dr. Cronin provided Humane Society shelter animals with free spaying and neutering.

For two years prior to the shelter opening, Dr. Cronin taught Karen and others who took in shelter pets to medicate them properly.

"He was a compassionate educator, and mentor," Gregory said. "He shared his knowledge with us freely to make us a success.'

But Lynne was behind the scene for Dr. Cronin during

She said Louis had great ideas but she was the practical partner.

"He planned it and I implemented it," she said. "We made a great team, he always said."

In the matter of the three children they raised, Lynne joked, "I raised the kids and he played with animals."

Managing Editor More than just coal came out of the mines in South Wilmington, Essex and other area towns. Well, perhaps the term is "inspired" by the coal mines.

The Christmas holidays in the Gardner area were not without their local treats, such as "G. Shaft" candy from the Harry Williamson Company Candy Minooka.

"How well we remember the hard candy at Christmas time called G. Shaft," said in Braidwood in 1872, and Ida Schopp, of the Gardner Archives.

She said she received a history for the Gardner Archives this week and wanted to share the history with those who recall the sweet candy and inform those too young to remem-

ber.

"We received this bit of information this week and knew Gardnerites would love to hear the story," Schopp said.

The story is that Harriet Williamson left England to join her husband in the United States, taking with her her father's recipe for a brown hard candy called "Bull's Eye."

He told young Harriet she might need the recipe some day to make a living.

The Williamsons settled on Sept. 8, 1881, William Williamson, a hoisting engineer at C. W. & V's "I" shaft, died from injuries sustained when the engine house roof collapsed.

Harriet, now a widow with no income and children to support, began to make

the Bull's Eye candy. With her children's help, she made the candy and distributed it to merchants in the Braidwood area.

She named it "G. Shaft" for the mine she could see from her kitchen window.

In 1893, it became a registered trademark.

"The hard candy with the distinctive taste and poignant background sold well and became a holiday tradition throughout" the area, including Gardner, said a history written about the candy and submitted to the Gardner Archives.

Harriet died in 1914, and her son Harry and Harry's sons Harry, Frank and Ralph continued the candy business.



The Livingston County Health Department is now taking appointments for the Wellness Clinic that will be conducted at the health department on Wednesdays, December 7 and 21. The Wellness Clinic is open to all adults in Livingston County.

Basic Wellness Clinic Services include: blood pressure screening and a blood chemistry profile. This profile includes testing for: all cholesterol levels; glucose level; blood count; and liver and kidnev function enzymes. The \$65 cost for a basic wellness clinic visit includes all lab fees. Lab results are sent to participants within one week. Additional services available through the wellness clinic at additional fees include: PSA (prostate specific antigen) prostate cancer testing for men - \$25; Thyroid (TSH) screening -\$25; A1C screening for clients with diabetes - \$30; and Osteoporosis screening for women \$20. Ralph Williamson in the Elwood Ordnance Plant explosion ended the family's G. Shaft candy business.

The history also says the lengend of the candy continued with a substitute.

"Every year, just before Christmas, bags and cartons of a similar hard candy, called by the same name. appear in local stores," the history said. "Old Timers know it's a substitute, but it's still good and they buy it for themselves and to send to friends and relatives who have moved away. Every year the story is retold and the legend lives on."

The Archives also has the original recipe for the candy. The recipe is as follows:

Ingredients: 2 cups light brown sugar, one cup white sugar, 1 cup white Karo syrup, two cups water and eight drops of oil pepper-

Boil the first four ingredients to 280 degrees. Take out four tablespoons. These four tablespoons are to be pulled until "white." Put in on a buttered pie tin. Keep covered so it remains soft. Boil remainder to 300 degrees. Add oil peppermint. Put candy on buttered board. Shape into roll. Lay two strips of the white on it. Turn it over and lay two strips of the white on the other side. Cut into pieces.

As of Jan. 1, 2017, people who wish to call the Reddick Fire Department non-emergency number will no longer be able to use the old number.



Cullom Adopts New Ordinance For Driveway, Culverts in Town

If you are a resident of Cullom and want to build a new driveway or culvert, it's going to cost you \$10, plus an inspection by the Building Inspector or Public Works Supervisor.

According to a news release issued Nov. 23 by the Village, the ordinance is for "the replacement or construction of any new driveway or culvert in the village."

The inspection must be completed before work may commence, according to the new ordinance.

The minimum diameter for a driveway culvert shall

be 12 inches. In an area where significant drainage is needed, it may be necessary to install larger culverts.

The minimum length is 20 feet and no more than 40 feet.

"A driveway culvert must be placed deep enough to allow slope to continue from the center of the road to the center of the driveway culvert," the news release said.

A minimum of 12 inches of cover when possible must be provided over the top of the culvert, and will be determined on a case-bycase basis.

The U.S. national gas price per gallon remained flat at \$2.11 Monday.

"Prices at the pump generally fall in December, said GasBuddy analyst Gregg Laskoski on Monday. "In the last four years, we've seen the U.S. average price of gas increase just once in December-that was in 2013, when the national average ended the month 5 cents higher than when it started. Over the past four years, the average decline from Dec. 1 to Dec. 31 has been 15 cents per gallon, and I'd have to think most of us would be pretty happy with that."

Gasoline prices in The Paper's circulation area were mixed but remain under \$2.00 a gallon with the exception of Odell. The Paper publishes last week's and this week's lowest averages each week for the towns listed below.

Everyone Benefits When You Make Charitable Gifts

Now that we are in the heart of the holiday season, you may be thinking about ways you can put your money where your heart is. Specifically, you might be pondering which groups you should support with charitable gifts. And as long as you choose groups that meet the right criteria, your generosity can also be rewarding to you, in the form of tax benefits.

To begin with, you'll want to make sure you are giving to a reputable charity. That means you'll need to as questions. How does a group measure its effectiveness? Is it devoting as much of its contributions as possible to the actual work of the organization, or is it spending too much on administrative costs? Generally, a worthwhile charity should spend at least 75% of its income on programs. You may be able to find this type of information on a charitable group's annual report and its website. You can also go to the website of one of the agencies that evaluates charitable groups. On these sites, you can get a lot of information dealing with a charity's effectiveness, income, spending and other top-

After you've identified a charity, or charities, you can decide how much you want to give and how you want to give it. If the charity has 501(c)(3) status (named after the section of the Internal Revenue Code that governs such groups), your gift can offer you a tax deduction. So, for example, if you are in the 25% tax bracket, and you give \$1,000 to a qualified charity, you can subtract the \$1,000 from your adjusted gross income, which will result in tax savings of \$250. Upon making your gift, make sure you get a receipt that lists the name of the organization and the date and amount of your contribution. (Your maximum deduction will be limited to a percentage of your adjusted gross income.)

You can do more than simply write a check, however. If you have stocks that have grown significantly in value, you may want to donate them to a charitable group. You will be allowed a charitable deduction for the full fair market value of the gift on the date of the transfer, even if your original cost was only a fraction of today's value. Furthermore, you will avoid the capital gains taxes you'd have to pay if you sold the stock, provided you've held the stock for at least a year.

If you do contribute appreciated stocks, you will want to be cognizant of the effect of your donation on your portfolio. If you were to give a sizable amount of growth-oriented stocks, would it affect your overall growth potential? Conversely, if you are primarily giving away relatively conservative, income-producing stocks, would it end up moving your portfolio in a riskier direction? When donating stocks, if at all possible try to do so in a way that does not harm your portfolio's balance.

In any case, whether you give cash or appreciated assets, you'll need to make your gift by Dec. 31 if you're going to deduct it on your 2016 taxes. So be as generous as you can afford, think about the effect of your gift on your own financial situation - and be prepared to act soon.

The November 24 Arts & Entertainment section of the Chicago Tribune featured a front page article on "The beauty of bricks."



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

Herscher Unit 2 Levy Spikes 10.7%; **Rate Estimated To Go Up Two Cents**



As a Jewish lad (yes, I said "lad." Stop laughing) living in a predominantly Christian society, I have a different perspective on the Christmas holidays.







The Dwight Trojans were able to fend off a pesky Flanagan team Saturday night, taking the game 69-62 and earning a third place finish in the Route 17 Classic.






