Emington's Bob Young Takes Helm As Livingston County Board Chair

Emington. For years Young was superintendent of schools in Saunemin.

The Livingston County Board elected him Board Chairman in a narrow victory Monday, Dec. 5, winning the position by a 13 to 11 majority.

In addition, traditionally the vice-chair of the board is an individual nominated by the newly-elected chair. Young's nominee lost, however, and elected was his chairmanship opponent, Tim Shafer of the Fairbury area.

When asked if he believed going forward this could cause conflicts in the leadership of the board, Young told The Paper, "Hopefully, the conflicts are

behind us.

The Fairbury choice for County Board may have stemmed from the upcoming controversial Zoning Board of Appeals decision regarding siting commercial wind farm developments in Livingston County.

During the Nov. 8 election, Livingston County had a non-binding ballot question that sought to gauge each township's desires regarding wind farm developments.

Most of the voters in Young's district, District 2, which includes Dwight, Odell, Campus, Emington and Saunemin, all contiguous, said they had no problem with the suggestion to raise the current setback for wind turbine towers from 1,200 feet to 1,600. A "no" vote meant that this increase to 1,600 feet was not enough. The Fairbury area

1,600 setback. There is a vocal group from Indian Grove Township, where Fairbury is situated, that is fighting against development of wind turbines.

Currently, a wind farm is in the Odell area, and one is being completed in the Tri-Point School District area (Kempton and Cullom in Livingston County).

Indian Grove was strongly against it, voting 1,353 against, compared to 518 in favor of the 1,600-foot setback.

Young, on the other hand, who lives nearby the Odell area wind farm and can see a wind turbine from his farmland, has been vocally in favor of new wind farm development.

"Wind turbines are still

As military people finish their enlistments, new ones come in to replace them.

For the last three years, the numbers began to slide from the 65 average.

At one point, in 2007, when one Dwight soldier died, Raymond Holzhauer, Dippon told *The Paper* that a

Riegel, Dippon and Drach all agreed that the community needed to come together to grieve and heal after the loss of Holzhauer. "We would meet up

above J.T.'s Saloon," said Drach. "We brought in sewing machines. We had a lot of volunteers.'

One year, the operation made fleece tied quilts. They have made bags and stockings, as well.

Currently, there are 30 Dwight area soldiers on the mailing list, and each received a Christmas package mailed out Dec. 3.

So why do these gals continue their work, long after their sons have returned home?

"We get paid in hugs," said Dippon.

"We get to see each soldier when they return,"

Here's Your Retirement "To Do" List

Emington's Bob Young Takes Helm As Livingston County Board Chair

(continued on page 1) an issue," Young said. "The Zoning Board of Appeals has it in their hands.'

His short-term goals include resolving a final setback ordinance for wind farm development and "maintaining a healthy financial picture for the county."

He estimates no action will be taken on the matter before January of next year.

He added that whatever the ZBA recommends, it will go to the Ag committee, and then be changed, dropped, or sent intact to the full County Board for debate and a vote.

A large chunk of change is being secured for county coffers through tipping fees charged to people dumping refuse in the Pontiac landfill. The fees generate roughly \$3 million net income per year, compared to a total budget of \$31 million, a major source of income and a means to keep property tax rates low. If one looks just at the operating budget of \$11 million, \$3 million is nearly a third of the total operating budget, according to John Clemmer, financial director for the county.

Young said the landfill has a life expectancy of 20 more years.

"The landfill is still going well," Young reported. "They just opened up a new cell. Without it, the county {finances} would be in a world of hurt."

He said over the years the financial committee has done a "tremendous job trying to keep costs down. We would be in the red without the landfill."

He said as a rural resident in the county, he would like to be a voice on the board number of county board for rural issues.

The county, with a population of roughly 38,000 people, includes most people living in the larger towns of Pontiac, Dwight, and Fairbury, with smaller towns such as Odell and Forrest also acting as population centers.

Surrounding counties such as La Salle, Kankakee and Grundy have a much larger population base by comparison.

Currently there are 24 Livingston County Board members, equally representing constituents by populamembers, which will be studied by the ad hoc com-


So why did Young decide to make a run for County Board Chair?

'People are still enlisting," Dippon said. "We just need names."

They had no idea this would last as long as it has.

Dippon added that each time the Operation S.O.S. banner appears in The Paper, they receive donations.





Dwight defeated the Herscher Tigers 50-32 in the JV match-up, improving to 6-2 overall.





The other instructors at his studio include Sherri and his Rathje, Patricia.

Rathje is a Hall of Fame Senior Instructor. River Valley Defensive Arts is a charter school of the Taekwondo Independent Association and the Internation Combat Hapkido Federation.

Classes are held in Dwight on Mondays and Wednesdays at 4 p.m.

Being a charter school allows students, if they leave Dwight, to go to another school at another location and continue their training.

"The federation has certificates, ranks, and the curriculum is accredited," Brain explained.

"If they leave Dwight, and say go to New York, they can flash their certificate and start right where they left off."

Martial arts is also an olympic sports, and people may train at the studio for tournaments and competi-

Classes can have up to 20 students, and will require additional classes if there is more interest. Students can be beginners though black belts, male or female, children ages four through adult.

children, the Taekwondo teaches discipline and self-esteem as well as self-defense.

The younger students gain far more than selfdefense skills, and parents start to see improvement in their school work, attitudes, and work ethic at home and school.

"It helps kids focus in school," Brain said. "They are more respectful, concentrate better and their grades go up."

He said most kids are there because they want to be, and therefore are motivated to learn and follow the class rules.

Rathje is the chairman of the testing, which is checking not only for self-defense skills, but uses a survey filled out by the student's parents and teachers to make sure they are doing their chores, homework, have good attitudes, are respect-

Brain said the testing is before all of the other students, and could be before 200 others. If the student is not behaving respectfully and properly outside of class, Rathje will ask why during the test.

So the student learns, through peer pressure, to follow the rules and instill discipline at an early age.

Brain stressed that the classes are in a secure environment, and students are always supervised and not

allowed to roam unattended.

Also, if a student has to wait for a ride, instructors stay inside with the student until the ride arrives, he added.

Some issues the selfdefense studio deals with is bullying, not only students who are bullied, but avoid teaching potential bullies the arts.

"We want to make sure we communicate with parents," Brain said. "We want to teach students how to react in the real world. They are learning to defend themselves. We don't want to

teach a bully." The physical training involved is basic, without the use of weights or machines, doing simple exercises like jumping jacks or push-ups.

He said they encourage parents to come and watch if they wish.

Adults largely take classes for self-defense, and study Hapkido.

"Adults see some Steven Segal movie and they say, 'I want to be able to do that," Brain joked.

"We are very excited about bringing an internationally chartered martial arts program to the Dwight area," said Rathje in a news release issued by the studio.

"Witnessing the development of an awkward beginner into a skilled martial artist is an instructor's greatest reward, and we're looking forward to making a positive impact on our students and the Dwight community."
