# Dwight Township Eyes New Offices, Undecided on Gothic Church

by Myke Feinman Managing Editor Dwight Township owns

and operates the Pioneer Gothic Church building on North Franklin Street, utilizing it as an "office."

The building, also known as the Town Hall, is on the historic registry as it was erected as a church in 1858. But the old girl is in need of repair.

Not only in need of repair, the building itself really is not suitable for township needs.

So the township board purchased property at 414 S. Washington Street, with a mobile home on the property in a state of disrepair. The plan is to demolish the building and rebuild new offices.

The land was purchased in August of 2016.

"The plan is to clear out explained. the old building and rebuild, but we are not in a hurry."

The next step will be to create a more functional township building.

"We feel like the church has limited space," she She said they own a

she said. "We all have to work out of our homes."

Plus, the church is in need of some costly upkeep. The steeple itself is leaning due rotting wood, she

"We have serious structure issues with the steeple," she said.

The board received one "We will be seeking bids bid to repair the steeple at a cost of \$125,000. And that is not the only part that is in need of repairs. The wood shingles must be replaced or repaired, and other issues need care that will cost money.

> "Everybody loves the church," she added. "We rent it out regularly.'

> People rent the church building for social functions at a low price.

"We want to keep it but the cost is something the township cannot afford.'

She said the township board has already been investing in some repairs.

"We did some caulking

and painting on the windows and siding," she said.

She explained that Rudy Piskule, township assessor, had done some legwork on trying to repair the steeple. He connected with a group working on a steeple in Gardner, who looked at the one in Dwight.

They suggested that the board contact a structural engineer.

The building is an example of a type of architecture known as Carpenter Gothic. The pointed arched windows and door, as well as its board and batten skin and frame construction are typical of Carpenter Gothic. The 62foot steeple arose over the Dwight area prairie and was a guide to early travßelers who passed

# Village of Dwight January Board Actions

Meeting schedules for the coming year were approved by the Dwight Village Board of Trustees when it met on January 9.

The 2017 Village Board meeting schedule is set as the second and fourth Monday of each month with the exception of October 10 (moved to Tuesday) and December 25 (cancelled). Village Board meetings are scheduled to begin at 6:30 p.m. and are held in the lower level of the Public Services Complex.

The 2017 Commission and Zoning Board of Appeals meetings will be held the third Tuesday of each month with the Plan Commission meetings beginning at 6 p.m. while Zoning Board of Appeals meetings are set for 6:30 p.m. Meetings are held in the lower level of the

Public Services Complex. Recommendations resulting from the Ordinance, Licensing Judicial & Committee meeting held on January 5 received board approval. Chapter 10 Article V of the Municipal Code will be changed making the North side of the 100 block of West James Street a no parking zone. Committee also recommended that Local Government Travel Expenses be changed to reflect that mileage reimbursement is set by the IRS with the current reimbursement rate effective January 1 2017 at 53.5 cents per mile; the maximum reimbursed will be the conference rate for any hotel room; and the maximum meal reimbursement will be \$45 per day south of I-80 and \$60 per day north of I-80. A final committee recommendation receiving board approval will see changes to the village employee sick leave policy.

In his report to the board, Chief of Police Tim Henson reported that an impounded vehicle has been sold back to the proper financial institution with \$6,250 paid to the Village for fees and storage. The money will be put into the Police Drug Fund account.

### **Online EMT Course Coming to OSF Soon**

Registration is open now, and the class can accommodate up to 40 students.

The online course is an opportunity for anyone interested in a career as an EMT, especially those who don't have schedules that support traditional classroom learn-

The course begins Monday, February 13, 2017 and runs through Saturday, July 8, 2017. The flexibility of an online course means lessons can be accessed anytime online, but participants must adhere to weekly

assignment deadlines. Throughout the 21 week course, there are eight live and final testing procedures. Those classes will be held at OSF Saint James in Pontiac.

After course completion P (and successful state board testing), students will hold an IL EMT-Basic License.

Course requirements: Students are required to have online access, hold a GED or high school diploma, and be at least 17 ½ years old by the end of the program. Students must also hold a current American Heart Association (AHA) CPR card throughout

the course. The cost for the course, including textbook and access codes, is \$1,100.00. Students are also responsible for purchasing an EMT Basic clinical shirt.

# **Dwight VGTs Top** \$7-Million for Year

During December, players gambled \$576,926 in Dwight's 55 video gaming terminals, bringing the total of funds invested in video gaming in Dwight during 2016 to \$7,180,566.

Funds paid out during December amounted to

\$422,322, leaving a net terminal income of \$154,603.

The State of Illinois received 25% of the NTI, or \$38,651, while Dwight's 5% share of the NTI was \$7,730.

#### **Fort Lauderdale Shooting**

Hello. I ran this ad below a few weeks ago. I'm running the ad again as the content is topical to the Fort Lauderdale shooting. The ad was my effort to describe organized intimidation stalking and No-Touch Torture technology. In addition to the sources cited below, I recommend Leah Remini's show on the A&E channel. The program is titled Scientology & the Aftermath - which airs Tuesday nights at nine and is available On Demand. Also, the HBO documentary Going Clear: Scientology and the Prison of Belief details similar information. Both those sources are proof positive that organized intimidation stalking exists. Former perpetrators have come forward to detail how they harassed and stalked their critics. The programs use the term "Fair Game" to describe the discrediting techniques. However, I am trying to communicate that a military technology that is only authorized in wars abroad is being used in these private, for-hire harassment campaigns.

I'm Dave Voigts. I'm a Dwight native, former naval officer, and graduate of the United States Naval Academy. While in the service I discovered an ongoing non consensual human experiment testing a human-machine interface weapon. For information on the civilian applications of the technology I recommend the playlist "Tech that can hack your brain" at TED.com (http://www.ted.com/playlists/392/tech that can hack your brain). Also, I recommend the YouTube video "Discussion | Jack Gallant on fMRI-enabled mind-reading" (https://youtu.be/ZZSJqsMtk1k). The civilian tech is forty years or so behind the military systems.

Like any new innovation this technology will take some time to get used to. Similar to the change from rotary to touch-tone phones or the change from compact disc players to the iPod, there will be people who are innovators, bringing these human-machine interface products to market. Among the population there will be early adopters who will pay a premium to own the products first. Then the rest of the population will join either the early majority, late majority, or they will be stragglers - showing less interest in the benefits or dangers of the tech-

To reiterate, the victims' claims of torture are true. I have independently verified this information, and the most common questions about the program are answered in Dr. Robert Duncan's "How To Tame a Demon." I'm also a victim. I had the opportunity to enter the program and I took it so that I could learn more about the program and help shut it down. I have been tortured 24/7 since 2012. This past spring I sent out 12,000 letters describing the issue. I sent a letter to every Dwight address available through leadsplease.com -1800 total. The best time to start making your immunization plan is at least 6-8 weeks before you plan travel.

The CDC website www.cdc.gov provides genrecommendations. However, recommendations for vaccines and medicines depend on many factors that are specific to each person and each trip.

Information the health department travel immunization specialist will need to know includes: where you are traveling within a country; the length of your trip; what activities you might do; and other personal matters such as your age, medical and vaccine history, and current medical status.


#### **DTHS Scholastic Bowl** Takes 2nd at Morrison Tournament



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


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

#### **Phone Scammers Target Grandparents**

The Federal Trade Commission estimates that millions of dollars are lost by countless grandparents across the country due to the latest phone scams targeting older adults.

In 2015 alone, the FTC received 10,155 "family/friend imposter" fraud complaints and those are just the ones who were not too embarrassed to report the crime.

According to an article in this month's AARP Bulletin, the scam consists of a caller saying they are in jail and in need of bond to be released, sometimes involving an accomplice posing as the "grandchild's" attorney.

Sometimes the scammers don't know the names, and get the victim to reveal his or her grandchild's name.

And if the voice sounds

wrong, the caller will explain he or she has a cold or give some other plausible reason for the difference in the voice.

The AARP article suggests five steps to avoid these issues as follows:

1) Build a wall around your computer. "Use both antivirus and anti-spyware software to keep intruders from stealing personal information from your comput-

2) Don't open file attachments in emails from strangers. These can contain programs that enable the bad guys to invade your computer remotely. Also, be cautious on social media. Anything you post that is revealing about family travel or schedules can be seen by the crooks too.

3) Ask lots of questions. AARP advises people to take a deep breath when receiving such calls, and try not to get emotional. Ask questions that would be hard for an imposter to answer correctly like "the name of the person's pet, his mother's birth date or his boss's name."

4) Slow the process down. "Never say yes to money transfer based on a single call," AARP said.

Always hang up and do some research, such as trying to contact the person directly on a cell or work phone, or talking to someone the grandchild is close to so the situation can be verified.

5) Don't be embarrassed. "If you fear you have fallen prey to a scam, do not let pride get in the way of contacting authorities," AARP said. "And if you've wired money, immediately call the money transfer service to report the fraud. If the money hasn't been picked up yet, you can retrieve it."


