Rev. Ognoskie Accepts Call To **Iowa Church After 18 Years**

After an 18-year stint, Rev. Daniel Ognoskie's last day serving the Dwight Emmanuel Lutheran Church will be Feb. 3.

He has taken a call to serve Zion Lutheran in Wilton, Iowa.

"I came here from Iowa," Ognoskie explained to *The* Paper.

He was in the same area in Iowa from 1975 to the end of 1998. He has been in Dwight ever since.

Wilton Church years ago when serving in Iowa. His old parish was 11 miles from the new one.


He also said the church needs him to "help make the congregation into a stable situation."

The man who wears the star is still serving "customers" at the Dwight Texaco Ambler gas station on the corner of Old Route 66 and Route 17 (Mazon Avenue) in Dwight.

And this is long after Texaco has since become Chevron. The station doesn't even pump gas any more, but lots of people still visit it from around the world and are greeted by the Texaco Man in uniform in the central Illinois town of Dwight.

The man who wears the star even has a patch that says "Trust your car to the man who wears the star" on his custom Texaco outfit.

He is Dwight area native and Gardner-South Wilmington High School graduate Paul Roeder, who has been the Texaco man since the station opened as a historic site in Dwight in May of 2007, making this May

Illinois State Police Warn of Phone Scams

The Illinois State Police (ISP) is warning the public of a phone scam that is currently circulating throughout the state. Several individuals have reported to the ISP that they have received automated messages advising them they are under criminal investigation and requesting they send \$600. The voice in the automated message appears to be a male with a foreign accent.

The phone number associated with the calls has been faked to appear as a legitimate ISP telephone number of (847) 608-3200, in a practice known as

"caller ID spoofing."

The ISP will never call to solicit money on behalf of the Department or ask you to send money for any reason. The ISP encourages those that believe they have been the victim of this phone scam to call the ISP at (847) 294-4400 to file a report.

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Try to Overcome "Roadblocks" to a Comfortable Retirement

His role as the Texaco Man at the tourist attraction on Route 66 came about because Roeder saw a sign with a photo of the "Texaco Man." He thought to himself "Why can't I try to dress up like a Texaco Man in uniform?"

He purchased the shirt and pants at Farm and Fleet. and went to Amazon for the patches and old-fashioned change machine.

The hat was a different matter. He contacted a man in Princeton to purchase a hat, but found they were sold out. So he ordered one, and bought three because they are so hard to find. This was all done at Roeder's own expense and he does not have a contract with the village of Dwight or any other officials in town. He does, however, work with the group that manages the volunteers.

"I'm just a plain Texaco Man as volunteer and no money is given," Roeder explained.

He greets tour buses and car clubs that stop at the Dwight station, but sometimes, the photo requests can get a little frightening.

"On one bus tour group, one woman asked if I was married and looked on my ring finger for a ring," Roeder explained. "I said 'no' and she said 'Will you propose to me at the Texaco Pumps?' I was a little terrified on what is happening now. Cameras were snap-

ping and people laughing.' Good thing it was all in jest, Roeder thought.

He said he spoke with the officials to make sure he would not interfere with the volunteers, and be an "extra" volunteer when the station is open to tourists.

"I did get a request from a visitor if I would sign her book as Texaco Man on a

page where the Dwight Texaco Station was," he said. "I did not hesitate. Glad to do it for her. When in uniform I get joy talking to people from the United States and other countries."

He lets people take his photo all the time.

One man raised the hood of his antique car and Roeder pretended he was checking the oil. Sometimes he washes the windows in the photographs.

Maybe I do more than they ask me," Roeder said.

'It's a joy to do so and so I will continue as long as I'm able."

He said when he retires as the Texaco Man, he will get a manikin and place the uniform on it for display.

Tourists roll along Old Route 66 to see the station and the Texaco Man from such far away places as France, Germany, Czechoslovakia, Brazil, China, Japan and other nations, he said. And of course, people from all over the United States stop by.

The Red Carpet Corridor Route 66 tour each spring brings Roeder in uniform to Dwight for two days.

Last year he was also in Dwight for the 90th birthday of the Mother Road, Route 66 which drew large crowds to Dwight, including international motorcycle riders.

Roeder served in the United Army States Reserves from 1964 to 1970 and later graduated from Joliet Junior College in 1973. He is retired from Argonne National Laboratory in the Lemont area since 2007, the same year he became Dwight's Texaco Man. He now resides in the Limestone area, western Kankakee County.

Throughout his life he has travelled to other nations, so when he meets a foreign visitor, he chats with them if he has been to their nation.

"If you've been over to their country, they talk more," he added, making a mimicking sign with his hand of a person talking as he smiled broadly.

Ambler Texaco/Becker **Marathon History**

As of 2001, the station has been registered on the U.S. National Register of Historic Places.

Ambler's Texaco Station was built in 1933 by Jack Schore on property originally owned by Otto Strufe. When the station closed, it held the record as the longest operating gas station along the historic Route 66.

The station last dispensed gasoline in 1999, under the ownership of Phil Becker as a Marathon station.

In 1936, the station was leased to Vernon Von Qualen and became known as Vernon's Texaco Station. Over the next two years, Von Qualen purchased the station from Schore, and sold it in 1938 to Basil "Tubby' Ambler. Ambler owned the station from 1938 to 1966.

Roeder said he often went to the station to hang out with Ambler, a story repeated by Phil Becker who became an employee and later owned the station.

Roeder said whenever Becker sees Roeder at the station as the Texaco man, he smiles broadly.

Other owners of the station included Ambler who sold the station to Earl Koehler. Koehler sold the station to Royce McBeath, who ran it between 1965 to 1970. The station changed hands once again when Becker bought the station from McBeath on March 4, 1970. Soon after Becker took over operation of the station, Texaco stopped supplying the location with gasoline so Becker contracted with Marathon Oil.

Gas Drops 3.8 Cents The U.S. national average gasoline price per gallon dropped 3.8 cents a

gallon to \$2.301 Monday. This is the second consecutive

week of price declines in gasoline across the United States.

In *The Paper's* circulation area, the largest decline was in Gardner with a 21 cents plunge to \$2.19. Mazon lost 14 cents to \$2.15. Braceville was down 12 cents to \$2.17 while Dwight fell 10.4 cent decline to \$2.154 and Herscher fell 10 cents to \$2.19.

Frauli is a 1993 graduate of Dwight Township High School, graduated from Joliet Junior College in 1995 and has a degree in journalism from Illinois State University, obtained in 1997.

She currently works as a clerk at the Prairie Creek Public Library and free lances, writing non-fiction news articles for Telling Ministries, a Christian non-

She has done several articles such as a story on the set of the movie Dolphin Tail 2" filmed in Florida.

She also writes stories based on phone interviews for the ministry. She recently did an interview with country singer Reba McIntyre.

She has been writing for the company for three years.

This is the first of three fiction books she is contracted to write for Telling Ministries, their first venture into fiction publishing.

The ministry asked Frauli to write a trilogy that would be "kid friendly" and still appeal to adults.

She said she was contacted in April for the book contract and wrote the story from April to October.

This was written while juggling duties at the library, and raising her three children with husband Chris. Her children are Jillian, 16; Daniela, 13; and Tyler, 12.

Since Dec. 1, about 300 blood drives across 27 states have been forced to cancel due to inclement winter weather, resulting in more than 10,500 blood and platelet donations going uncollected. Since the beginning of the year, snow and icy roads forced blood drives to cancel, causing donations to go uncollected. Despite the weather, hospital patients still rely on transfu-

Blood donor Jim Taylor knows how it feels to have a loved one waiting for a transfusion. His son Aaron was born with a rare liver condition. In the short two months of his life, he

received 115 blood products. Taylor said each transfusion gave his family more time with Aaron, so he encourages others to give.

"When the Red Cross says there is a shortage, they are not exaggerating," said Taylor. "I now know from experience that what they are saying is somewhere there is a father waiting on the donation that will save his son's life. When the Red Cross asks for help, what that means is a new dad is praying for a miracle."

when the public school added a preschool program to the curriculum.

Dwight's Emmanuel Lutheran Church will be celebrating its 150th anniversary this year, with a celebration July 9. He said he may be able to attend.

He said the rural area in Iowa is similar to Dwight, although Iowans are more connected to agriculture than in this area.

And the challenges are similar for all churches, he said.

"We're suffering the same as most all churches with attendance," he said.

Dwight's church has 249 Baptized members, 165 of whom are Communicants (age 14 or older). That is much lower than when he came nearly 20 years ago.

"There doesn't seem to

be as much of attendance as in previous generations," he continued. "In the past, you went to church on Sunday. Now you don't go every Sunday. Kids are more active and involved in sports.'

He said instead of going to religious classes, children attend sports practice or games.

"In the past, the community would set aside Wednesday night for church activities. That's no longer the case."

He said community sports activities are now offered to younger children, which also detracts from church attendance and church class attendance.

"People focus on something else [other than church]," he said. "The parents kind of set the tone. I can remember missing [athletic] practice on Saturday if

parents would say 'go to church,' not this."

I had church activities. My

So, why did Ognoskie decide to enter the ministry?

"I wanted to be a pastor all my life," he said. "My parents told me I was two or three years old, standing at the dinner table and preach-

He even "played" church with his younger sister, she would play the piano and they would sing hymns.

He was married in 1973 and graduated from seminary in 1975. He and his wife Judith have two grown daughters, Michelle and Katie.

While Emmanuel Lutheran begins its search for a replacement pastor, the Rev. Harvey Nicholson of St. Anne, will fill in for Ognoskie.

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Play To Be Written About Saunemin's Albert Cashier

Managing Editor A second-year theater student at Emporia State University, Kansas, was in Saunemin Jan. 13 doing research on the town's Civil War hero Albert J.

What makes Albert different, and attracted the theater student to his story, is Albert's living as a man all "his" life despite being assigned female gender at birth.

Isabella Tate, 20, said she had already written the play, but will now be changing it with all the new research she has been

Tate came to Saunemin to see first-hand his home, which has been restored in Saunemin, where Cashier resided after his Civil War years.

own eyes," she said, enthusiastically, adding she had just come to the home after visiting Cashier's grave in Saunemin.

"The play's going to change a lot now that I've been here," she added. "It feels kind of like a pilgrimage."

What attracted Tate to the story was that woman Jennie Irene Hodgers, an Irish-born immigrant who served in the Union Army during the Civil

"It is because he was assigned female identity at birth and had the strength to live as himself after the war," Tate

According to Wikipedia, "Cashier adopted the identity of a man before enlisting, and maintained it for most of the remainder of her life. This consistent and long-term commitment to the male identity has prompted some scholars to suggest that Cashier was a trans man."

She was born a woman in 1843 and died a man in 1915 after living several years in Saunemin.

"What was going through his mind," Tate mused as she took in his historic home sur-

This is not the first time Albert Cashier has been the subject of a written story.

"The Jennie Hodgers Story"

"I wanted to see it with my is a biography written by veteran Lon P. Dawson, who lived at the Illinois Veterans Home where Cashier once lived.

The novel "My Last Skirt," by Lynda Durrant, is also based on her life.

Tate promised that when the play is finished, she will come to Saunemin to do a live reading for area residents.

The play is in three acts, with the second act the most lacking in historical facts, she

The first part is her life in Ireland, the second the Civil War, and third act is her life in Saunemin.

'Typically, she was said to have been dressed in boy's clothing by her stepfather in order to find work," according to Wikipedia. "Her mother died sometime in her youth, and by 1862, Hodgers had traveled as a stowaway to Illinois and was living in Belvidere."

Albert Cashier enlisted in the 95th Illinois Infantry, Sept. 4, 1862, part of the Army of the Tennessee under Ulysses S. Grant and fought in approximately 40 battles, including the siege at Vicksburg, the Red River Campaign and the combat at Guntown, Mississippi, where they suffered heavy casualties.

"Other soldiers thought that Cashier was small and preferred to be alone, which was not uncommon," Wikipedia said.

"She was once captured in battle, but escaped back to Union lines after overpowering a prison guard.'

Cashier settled in Saunemin, Illinois, in 1869, where he worked as a farmhand. Her employer there, Joshua Chesebro, built a one-room house for her, which is the home Tate visited Jan. 13.

"Because she lived as a man, she was able to vote in elections

and later claimed a veteran's pension under the name Albert Cashier," Wikipedia said.

In November 1910, Cashier was hit by a car that broke her "A physician discovered her

secret in the hospital, but did not disclose the information," Wikipedia stated

"Attendants at the Watertown State Hospital discovered that she was female when giving her a bath, at which point she was made to wear a dress,' Wikipedia said.

Dr. Jancek also told the BOE that there is one open board seat with no identified candidate on the ballot for the upcoming April 4 Consolidated Election. December 19 was the last date to file to be included on the ballot. However, anyone interested in running as a write-in candidate can do so by filing a petition by February 3. The seat will be for a two-year

the Principal's In report, it was noted that fourteen 2017-18 DTHS seniors have been recognized as Illinois State Scholars. Principal Dan Kaiser called the honor "incredible" for a school the size of Dwight High School. With a DTHS Senior Class of just 56 students, fourteen students represent 25 percent of the senior class receiving the recognition.

"To have fourteen students recognized from our school is a phenomenal

The board approved moving forward with the project at an estimated total cost of \$30,000 -\$35,000.
