## Dwight Community Chest Continues Decades of Service to Area Since 1950s

The Dwight Community Chest, which is basically the United Way for Dwight, has been serving the community for more than 60 years and continues to do so.

The Community Chest board and the agencies it serves believe it provides essential funds to the needy and emergency funding that is not available from any other agencies in the Dwight

One of the 15 agencies served by the Community Chest, Futures Unlimited in Dwight, utilizes funds donated to offset transportation costs, said Executive Director Karen Donovan.

"The state does not pay the true cost of transportation," Donovan said. "The Dwight Community Chest allows our clients to go into the community, get into society, get services they need and get to their jobs," she

Futures Unlimited services people with disabilities and functional limitations in Dwight.

"As a Board Member of the Livingston Family Care Center, I fully recognize the need and commend the Dwight Community Chest for its continued fund-raising effort," said Chris Myers, Dwight, executive director of Livingston County Commission on Children & Youth & Livingston County Mental Health Board.

"It is agencies and services like the LFCC that subsist on grants and donations that so appreciate this wonderful and generous community assistance," Myers added.

Myers said the LFCC provides health services to all uninsured Livingston County residents and has provided services to at least 35 people (9.11% of LFCC patients) from the Dwight area in the last year.

Other Dwight Community Chest funds go to the Dwight Ministerial Association, where the money is used to help people in emergency need to purchase food, gasoline, pay a portion of a utility bill, or for people traveling through town, obtain a hotel room, if need-

The rest of the list of recipients includes Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault Service, American Red Cross, Caring Pregnancy Center, Christmas for Kids, Peace Meals

## Wet and Dry Coal Mining Towns Waged Political Battles: Richard Joyce

While researching the lems and crime, and noted prevalence of saloons in the old area coal mining towns, local historian Richard Joyce of Coal City found some interesting statistics from a century ago.

In those days, political battles raged in many villages between "wets" who favored allowing saloons to operate and "drys" who opposed saloons.

In the mining towns, saloonkeepers often also owned other businesses such as grocery stores, halls, and boarding houses.

They offered patrons free lunches, credit during strikes or slack times at the mine, and space for meetings.

Fraternal organizations and labor groups often met in halls above or adjoining saloons, and dances, theatrical productions, school events and even religious gatherings were held there.

Saloonkeepers were popular with many citizens and were often elected to local

Joyce's great-grandfather, Peter Menozzi, was an immigrant miner turned saloonkeeper who served as village trustee in Clarke City and later as village treasurer in Cardiff.

The Anti-Saloon League and other reformers, however, saw saloons as dens of

They claimed saloons caused poverty, family probthat gambling, prostitution, and physical violence were associated with

They were especially upset that saloonkeepers often violated state law and the Sabbath by being open on Sunday.

Saloonkeepers were usually quite willing to pay their fines for this offense since Sunday was the only day off for miners when the mines were in full operation.

in many communities. This allowed citizens to vote on whether their community should be wet or dry.

In 1907, Illinois had 23,000 saloons and only 14 dry counties.

By 1917, 54 of the state's 102 counties were dry, including Ford, Livingston, Kendall, and DeKalb. Monroe was the only completely wet county in the state.

In 1917, 199 townships in the state were wet and 1,416 were dry, and 87% of

"local option" on the ballot Illinois' land area was dry as 59 in Streator, Will County was 75% of the population outside of Chicago.

But victory for those opposed to saloons was far from complete. Illinois had 9,893 saloons in December of 1917, with 6,605 in Cook County.

Other counties had plenty of spots for those wanting to wet their whistles with liquor.

St. Clair County, for example, had 516 saloons, Madison County had 386, Peoria County had 318, La Salle County had 252 with had 171, Bureau County had 113 with 43 in Spring Valley, Kankakee County had 74, Vermillion County had 48, Marshall County had 24, all in Toluca, but Iroquois County had only two saloons.

Grundy County had 38 saloons with 18 in South Wilmington and 11 in Coal

In 1919, Prohibition became the law of the land, but the enforcement of that controversial enactment is another story.

## **Voter Registration Deadline Information**

Livingston County Clerk Kristy Masching will have her office open on Saturday, March 4, from 9:00 a.m. until noon for in-person voter registration. The inperson and mail-in registration deadline for the April 4, 2017 General Election is Tuesday, March 7, 2017 which includes new registrations as well as changes of address or name.

In order to register to vote: You must be a U.S. citizen; must have been a resident of the precinct at least 30 days prior to Election Day and at least 18 by Election Day.

Know the facts about voter registration:

 All voters must be registered to the correct physical address before casting a ballot (this includes changing apartments in the same building).

 If a voter has not cast a ballot at the last two Federal Elections, his/her registration could be inactivated.

• If you have changed



your name and moved, your voter registration will need to be transferred.

• Livingston County voters needing to register to vote or change registration on Election Day, can only do so at the Livingston County Clerk's office. Voter registration is not available at any Livingston County polling sites.

The Livingston County Health Department is now taking appointments for the Wellness Clinics that will be conducted at the health department on Wednesdays, March 1 and 15.

The Wellness Clinic is open to all adults in Livingston County.

Basic Wellness Clinic services include: blood pressure screening and a blood chemistry profile.

This profile includes testing for: all cholesterol levels; glucose level; blood count; and liver and kidney function enzymes.

The cost for a basic wellness clinic visit includes all lab fees. Most health insurance plans can be billed for wellness clinic fees. Lab results are sent to participants within one week.

Additional services available through the wellness clinic at additional fees include: PSA (prostate specific antigen) prostate cancer testing for men; Thyroid (TSH) screening; A1C screening for clients with diabetes, and osteoporosis screening for women.

## **Dwight Fire, EMS Called** to Diesel Fuel Spill Feb. 23

Dwight Fire and Dwight EMS were dispatched around 10:00 a.m. on February 23 for a report of an accident involving an active diesel fuel spill on Interstate 55 southbound near the 217 mile marker.

First arriving emergency responders confirmed that there was an accident involving two semis with a large active diesel spill. The first semi was hauling a load of steel bars that had become loose and then lost some of the load off the rear of the trailer. The second semi was struck by the lost load which caused a large gash in a saddle fuel tank. There was an estimated 150 to 200 gallons of diesel fuel spilled onto the

## REAL ID Act Illinois Secretary of State

Ill. House Passes DHS

Jesse White said in a news release Feb. 23 that REAL ID Act legislation, which authorizes the Secretary of State's office to offer customers the option to obtain either a REAL ID-compliant driver's license/identification card (DL/ID) or a noncompliant DL/ID, passed the Illinois House of Representatives today.

Illinois is currently REAL ID compliant through an extension granted by the U.S. Department Homeland Security in recognition of the state's recent improvements to the issuance process and security upgrades to the DL/ID design.

"This legislation gives customers the right to choose between applying for a REAL ID-compliant DL/ ID and a noncompliant DL/ID," said White.

"If you are someone who doesn't use air travel or have a reason to visit a federal facility or military base, or prefer to use a U.S. passport which itself is considered REAL ID compliant, the noncompliant card may be a viable option."

House Bill 395, which now goes to the Senate for consideration, is sponsored by House Transportation Chairman John D'Amico (D-Chicago) and is designed to give the public the right to choose between a REAL IDcompliant card and a noncompliant card, similar to other states that have been declared REAL ID compliant by DHS.

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## 2017 Foundation Scholarship Applications Available; Expansion of Financial Support

The Kankakee County Farm Bureau Foundation is proud to be able to offer financial support to those furthering their education in an agriculturally related field. In order to complement the scholarships being available to graduating high school seniors, the program has expanded to include support for those other than school seniors. Through generous contributions from Farm Bureau members, businesses, and other organizations this financial support is made possible.

To date, \$67,500 in scholarships has been awarded to Kankakee County students who are furthering their agricultural education. Last year, seven \$1,000 scholarships were awarded to Kankakee County students with four being high school graduates. The other three recipients included two who were students in their second year of post-secondary education receiving the Kevin Yohnka Memorial Renewable Scholarship and one student receiving the Foundation's first Continuing Education scholarship.

#### Scholarships for High **School Seniors**

Scholarships of \$1,000 each will be made available this year to the 2017 graduating class. Applications are available from high school guidance counselors, agriculture advisors, and at the Kankakee County Farm Bureau office. Electronic copies of the application may also be requested by contacting the Farm Bureau office. Completed applications will be due at the Farm Bureau office (or postmarked) by March 31, 2017. The scholarships are offered to high school seniors whose primary residence is in Kankakee County or are a Kankakee County Farm Bureau member family. Applicants must be accepted to an accredited post-secondary educational institution with an agriculturerelated field of study. Accredited post-secondary schools include colleges, universities, junior and community colleges, and technical and vocational schools. The applications will be assessed on four categories: demonstrated interest in agriculture, character and personality, academic performance and honors, and financial need.

The scholarship recipients will be notified in May but the funds will not be disbursed until the student has completed his or her first grading period at the postsecondary school with a "C" grade point average or bet-

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ter. During that grading period, the recipient also must be a full time student at his or her educational institution. The scholarship funds will then be disbursed to the scholarship recipient to be applied to post-secondary education expenses. Recipients are to submit official grade transcripts proving a "C" grade point average or better by March 1, 2018 or the scholarship will be for-

#### Renewable Scholarships

The Foundation is again making available a one-time renewable scholarship for last year's 2016 scholarship recipients. This renewable scholarship is known as the Kevin Yohnka Memorial scholarship and will be in the same denomination matching the recipient's first year scholarship amount. To be considered for this renewable scholarship, the recipient must submit an essay no longer than one page to the Foundation when they submit their first grading period grade transcript which is due by March 1, 2017. The essay should detail experiences of their first semester. Based on the essays, the Foundation may choose recipients for this Kevin Yohnka Memorial renewable scholarship.

#### **Expansion of Financial** Support

The Foundation is now making scholarships available to those other than high school seniors. These scholarships are in the amount of \$1,000 each. To be eligible for consideration, the applicant must be accepted or enrolled as a full time student at an accredited postsecondary school to study an agriculturally related field. These applicants could include transfer students, students who have changed their field of study to an agriculturally related field, those who wish to return to school to further their agricultural education, and others. Applicants with ties to Kankakee County, Illinois or a Kankakee County Farm Bureau member family will given preference. be Applications for this scholarship are available at the Farm Bureau office. As with other scholarships and financial assistance, final judgement of applications and qualifications will be at discretion of the Foundation board.

The Foundation would also like to remind those who are participating in agriculturally related workshops, conferences, classes, study sessions, and other programs that financial assistance for those programs is available as well. To be eligible for considera-

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tion, the applicant must be accepted or applying to an agriculturally related program and the application must be submitted at least one month in advance of the program for which the applicant is seeking financial assistance. The program syllabus, contact information for the sponsoring agency or instructor, and costs associated with participation must be included with the application. Applicants with ties to Kankakee County, Illinois or a Kankakee County Farm Bureau member family will be given preference. Criteria for awarding financial assistance include program relevance to agriculture, program quality, and the applicant's demonstrated interest in agriculture. Final judgement of applications and qualifications will be at the discretion of the Foundation board.

The Kankakee County Farm Bureau Foundation was established in 2003 with the purpose of promoting agriculture education. At the November, 2004 Kankakee County Farm Bureau® Foundation annual meeting, it was decided to create a scholarship program to promote and support the further study of agriculture.

Members of the Foundation board include: Karlock, President; Kelly Knobloch, Vice President; Katelynn Ohrt, Secretary; Patrick Koerner, Treasurer; directors Duane Oosterhoff, Matt McAllister, and Dr. Joseph Meisenbach. Although a separate entity, the Kankakee County Farm Bureau provides staff and resources for the promotion and operation of the Foundation.

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
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
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

## **Groundwater Awareness Week: March 5-11**

Just as you check your furnace or smoke detector batteries seasonally, spring is a good reason to have an annual water well checkup before the peak water use season begins, according to Terry Eimen, Iroquois County Public Health Department Director Environmental Health.

Why is it a good idea to have my water well checked annually?

Ninety-nine percent of available freshwater on Earth comes from ground water. Groundwater is water that fills cracks, voids, and other openings in soil, sand, and bedrock. Iroquois Co. residents use groundwater for drinking and

culinary purposes.

Eimen recommends you test your private water well annually, or if there is a change in taste, odor, or appearance, or when the system is serviced. The Iroquois Co. Public Health Dept. will be offering free water sample test kits during the month of March at their office, located at 1001 E. Grant St. in Watseka, any time between 8:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday.

Mr. Eimen also recommends that well owners:

· Keep hazardous chemicals, such as paint, fertilizer, pesticides, and motor oil far away from your well, and maintain a "clean" zone of at least 50 feet

between your well and any kennels and livestock operations. · Maintain proper separation

between your well and buildings, waste systems, and chemical storage areas.

· Periodically check the well cover or well cap on taps of the casing (well) to ensure it is in good repair and securely attached. Its seal should keep out insects and rodents.

· Keep your well records in a safe place. These include the construction report, and annual water well system maintenance and water testing results.

## January Brings Uptick in Home Sales

The start of a new year brought renewed interest from homebuyers who drove home sales and the statewide median price higher in January, according to Illinois REALTORS.

Statewide home sales (including single-family homes and condominiums) in January 2017 totaled 8,502 homes sold, up 1.2 percent from 8,404 in January 2016.

The statewide median price in January was \$172,000, up 5.5 percent from January 2016 when the median price was \$163,000.

The median is a typical market price where half the homes sold for more and half sold for less.

"The bitter winter weather everyone anticipates in January never really materialized, and as a result it looks as if plenty of buyers were out looking for homes," said Illinois REAL-TORS President Doug Carpenter, ABR, AHWD, GRI, SFR of Mokena, managing broker of Coldwell Banker Honig-Bell Orland Hills.

'Because inventories are still so tight, January was seen by many as a good opportunity to get out in advance of the busier spring selling season."

The time it took to sell a home in January averaged 69 days, down from 79 days a year ago. Available housing inventory totaled 49,724 homes for sale, a 15.5 percent decline from January 2016 when there were 58,830 homes on the market.

The monthly average commitment rate for a 30vear, fixed-rate mortgage was 4.15 percent in January 2017, a decrease from 4.20 percent the previous month, according to the Federal Home Loan Mortgage Corp. In January 2016 it averaged 3.87 percent.

"Illinois median prices have already recovered to the pre-bubble levels while those in the Chicago Primary Metropolitan Staistical Area are very close," said Geoffrey J.D. Hewings, director of the Regional Economics Applications Laboratory at the University of Illinois.

The Chicago PMSA, as defined by the U.S. Census Bureau, includes the counties of Cook, DeKalb, DuPage, Grundy, Kane, Kendall, Lake, McHenry

"Forecasts for median prices and the REAL Housing Price Indices also indicate moderate annual growth for both Illinois and the Chicago PMSA with a slightly stronger growth forecast by the REAL HPI for the next three months."

According to the data, forty-three (43) Illinois counties reported sales gains for January 2017 over previous-year numbers, including Winnebago County, up 16.6 percent with 218 units sold; St. Clair County, up 15.4 percent with 165 units sold; and Cook County, up 4.1 percent with 3,493 units sold. Forty-nine (49) counties showed year-over-year median price increases

including Lake County, up 15.4 percent to \$225,000; Peoria County, up 14.0 percent to \$112,900; and DuPage County, up 8.2 percent to \$250,000.

"We came out of the gates blazing, with greater activity this January than in years past, as consumers emerged from the holidays educated, prepared and ready to make decisions," said Matt Silver, president of the Chicago Association of REALTORS and partner at Urban Real Estate. "Our year-over-year numbers continue to demonstrate the strength of the Chicago market, as properties are being snatched up at a pace rarely seen, with higher prices across the board and rising interest rates - trends that will continue (barring ongoing inventory concerns) into the active spring season."



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
