CVS Acquires Doc's Drugs

Doc's Drugs, the chain of drugstores that began in Pontiac in 1978 by Dave Sartoris, will now be part of the national CVS Pharmacy chain.

But Dave's son, Anthony Sartoris, president, told *The Paper* last week it was a win-win.

"It's a good move for everyone," Sartoris said in a phone interview June 1. "The most important thing for us is CVS decided it wants to operate every one of the stores."

Stores in *The Paper* territory that will become CVS include Dwight and Herscher.

Other nearby stores include Braidwood, Coal City, Pontiac, and Fairbury.

CVS Pharmacy formally announced it has acquired the Doc's Drugs' 14 locations in Illinois and will operate them as CVS Pharmacy locations.

The acquisition is expected to be completed soon, the news release dated June 1 stated.

The 14 pharmacies will be converted and renamed by July, the news release said.

CVS Pharmacy and Doc's Drugs are working together to ensure that the transition will be seamless for customers and that their access to pharmacy care is not interrupted, the release said.

CVS also expects to retain as many of the Doc's employees working at these locations as possible.

"Together Doc's Drugs and CVS Pharmacy have created a win-win for our loyal associates, our valued customers, and our communities," Sartoris said in the news release.

"Our customers and patients can be assured of continuity of care in their hometowns where access to their local pharmacy will remain where it has been for more than 30 years," Sartoris continued.

"The depth of CVS' resources will provide a wider variety of products and services, as well as access to a larger number of prescription drug plans."

Sartoris also told *The Paper* last week that although he expects all his employees to remain, he will not continue with the company.

"I'm 58," he said. "I'm too young to drink beer all day," he joked. On a more serious tone, he said he planned to obtain a job within the industry.

He moved into the field, following his father's footsteps, whom Anthony said "is Doc's Drugs."

His father was a regional vice president with Walgreens before starting his own pharmacy chain.

Anthony said one of the reasons for the merger with CVS was how they treat employees. He said CVS was very sensitive to the needs of single-mother employees with flexible scheduling concerns.

"It's a good company," Sartoris said of CVS. "They are concerned about the well-

Lance Leeds Leaving; Dwight UMC Pastor Since 2011

The Rev. Lance Leeds, pastor at the Dwight United Methodist Church since July, 2011, will preach his last sermon in Dwight on Sunday (June 11).

He and his wife Judy will be moving to the Marion Aldersgate United Methodist Church in Marion.

"Marion is the first place we will move to that we have actually heard of before," Lance said, having served in many small towns throughout Illinois in his career.

Not only has Pastor Leeds and his family had to move 11 times during his career with the United Methodist Church, but the way he started his career was not your typical "call" to serve, he said.

At the tender age of 27, Leeds was general manager of an AM/FM station, one of the youngest in that position in Illinois. He was fired from his job. The first thing he did was turn to his pastor for guidance.

"I need you to pray for me," he told the Rev. Prosper Tournier of the First United Methodist Church of Pittsfield.

He explained to his pastor that he lost his job and began shooting out his resume to various radio stations to secure employment.

This went on for two weeks with no response, Leeds said.

At that point, the Rev. Tournier called Leeds back and asked him if he had ever considered going into the ministry.

This pulled the rug out

from under Leeds.

"You don't just go into the ministry because you need a job," he said.

So he prayed to God.

"I said, 'Here's the deal,

God. I don't want to do this just because I need a job.'"

When he first was dating Judy, who has been his wife for the past 31 years, she told him at that time that Leeds

could have a career in any field he chose except for being a politician or a pastor.

It just so happened that for a few months, Judy had

'Distinguished Simplicity': Wright's First National Bank Design To Be Honored June 8

The First National Bank of Dwight, designed in 1905 for the 1906 opening by world-renowned architect Frank Lloyd Wright, will be marking Wright's 150th birthday with cookies, punch and coffee June 8.

According to Eric Stewart, vice president and loan officer at the Dwight branch, the bank is a major tourist attraction for people looking for Frank Lloyd Wright architecture in Illinois.

"We regularly have tour buses and tourists come to see the bank," Stewart said.

"Wright designed this one-story commercial structure for Colonel Frank Smith of the (First National Bank of Dwight) with the aim of achieving an overall effect of distinguished simplicity,"

says an online description of Wright's design in Dwight.

According to Wikipedia, Wright's earliest designs for the building date to 1904, but it was constructed in 1905 and opened in 1906.

"The design of the building deliberately rejects the classical influences common at the time, and is meant to evoke an air of simple dignity," Wikipedia said.

The bank building was to house the real estate office and bank of Frank L. Smith, a prominent local citizen who would later be elected to Congress.

"Smith had decided that his real estate clients needed a simple and convenient way to obtain financing, so he founded the bank and hired Wright as the architect."

Wright was involved in the design and construction down to the smallest details

including interior furnishings. One of the tables he designed can be seen in the

main lobby of the bank.

During the 1950s, the

The phone number most often associated with the call is 312-789-5176; however, phone scammers have the ability to quickly change the phone number that is displayed on caller ID. Citizens should be wary of calls soliciting money regardless of what number is displayed, particularly if threats are made by the caller or they become pushy.
The ISP will never call to solicit money on behalf of the Department or ask you to send money to them for any reason. The ISP encourages those who believe they have been the victim of a phone scam to call 800-243-0618 and report it to the Office of the Illinois Attorney General.

Odell Standard Station History

In 1932, a contractor, Patrick O'Donnell, purchased a small parcel of land along Route 66 in Odell, Illinois. There he built a gas station based on a 1916 Standard Oil of Ohio design, commonly known as a domestic style gas station. This "house with canopy" style of gas station gave customers a comfortable feeling they could associate with home. This association created an atmosphere of trust for commercial and recreational travelers of the day.

been working with a pastor's wife, and was asking her questions about what being a pastor's wife was like.

"It was unbeknownst to me," Leeds added about his wife's discussions about leading the life of a pastor's wife.

Instead of saying "no," Judy obviously responded "yes," which gave Lance confirmation it was what God wanted.

Judy agreed.

"In my head, I get goosebumps thinking about it," Judy told *The Paper* last week.

"I saw my life as a jigsaw puzzle. At that moment ..." she made a motion and sound like the puzzle pieces all magically and suddenly

fit together as one piece.

"Of course that's what we should do," she thought.

And since that moment, she knows it was the right decision, meeting all sorts of people that she has grown close to in all the towns they served, including Dwight.

Lance attended Garrett Evangelical Seminary in Evanston, and graduated in 1994, although he was a student pastor since 1990.

Some of the places he has been pastor includes Smithfield, Astoria, Geneseo, Waterloo, Rantoul, and Vienna, all in Illinois.

The couple has two sons: Tyler and wife Maria who reside in Metropolis, and Braydon who works at the ALDI warehouse in Dwight.

During his six years in Dwight, he officiated at 79

funerals and 18 weddings.

The Dwight UMC was built in 1975, and is a merger of Zion, First Methodist Church, and Salem EUB Church in Dwight.

As a resident of Southern Illinois for many years, Leeds is a St. Louis Cardinal Fan. This, of course, was in conflict with many Cub fans in Dwight. Last year, during the World Series, he promised to wear a Cub hat and sing "Go, Cubs, Go" for his congregation. He did it, as much as he did not want to.

"I had NEVER worn a Cubs hat," he explained.

The new pastor will not have those issues.

Pastor Leeds will be replaced by Mike Ebersohl from Salem, who is a Cubs fan.

Tri-Point NHS Announces State Decrees May 4 As 'Bluebird Day'

When Cullom Mayor Barb Hahn sees potential for some positive benefit for her community, she takes action.

She was impressed with the Chatsworth project to put up bluebird houses to attract the birds to that area.

She was "intrigued by the bluebird Project and wanted to expand it," said Tara Hummel, a National Honor Student at Tri-Point High School. Hummel and fellow NHS student Abby Kerrins spoke to a group of Connecting Communities of greater Livingston County about the project June 1 at a meeting in Fairbury.

"She contacted Tri-Point's National Honor Society and presented the idea to us," Hummel continued.

"We realized how much this could impact our community and decided to take it on as our service project."

Tri-Point's NHS, under the direction of Tri-Point ag teacher Allison Buckley, set out to sell 50 bluebird houses in the area. They sold 133, and in a second round, with a goal to sell 20 more, they sold 26, bringing the total to 159 bluebird houses.

They met with Senator Barickman and Governor Bruce Rauner.

"Senator Barickman made a motion for May 4 to be recognized as Bluebird Project Day in the state of Illinois."

The proclamation mentions the town of Chatsworth where the project began, the Tri-Point, Pontiac and Prairie Central high schools.

The purpose of the project is to cultivate a habitat for the bluebird, and those "activities can have a significant environmental and economic impact on the town of Chatsworth and the State of Illinois," the proclamation said.

A copy of that proclamation was presented to Mayor Hahn at the June 1 meeting.

Also honored at the same meeting was Joe Forneris, Dwight, who acts as a consultant for the Bluebird Project. He was presented the award by Chatsworth Mayor Richard Runyon.

The meeting dealt with volunteerism, how to attract volunteers and how to help get community projects off

the ground.

As part of the program, Sandy Gunther of the Cullom Historical Society spoke about the historical project having no funds and is now renting a main street building to house a museum. They also started the "Gaudy Geese" project, with the concrete geese being manufactured at Hahn Industries in Cullom.

"If you don't have any money, well, you just ask for it," Gunther said, explaining how the museum became funded and is going into its second year.

The Village of Dwight Trustees should do research on the effects of burning yard waste.

A fact sheet from the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency states:

"The open burning of leaves and grasses can be of particular concern because

of its impact on the public's health. Smoke from burning leaves, grass, brush and most plants contain high concentrations of such pollutants as carbon monoxide, particulates and photochemically reactive chemicals.

"The photo chemically reactive chemical benzo (a) pyrene, released from leaf burning is a known carcinogen. Repeated exposures over a lifetime may increase the risk of developing cancer. Carbon monoxide reduces the supply of oxygen to the body."

Please consider alternatives to burning such as composting.

The past two Sundays I've attended both of Chicago's baseball stadiums, and it got me thinking on how the two of them compare.

It's a unique feature that Chicago possesses, in having two professional baseball teams – it's something that only New York City and Los Angeles can claim, with the Mets and Yankees, and the Angels and the Dodgers. There are others that could maybe fall into this, if you counted the Athletics and Giants, as their cities are very close.

The biggest difference, right off the bat (baseball pun, have to love it) is the location. Wrigley Field is located in the middle of a neighborhood – there are houses steps from the outfield walls; you can watch the game from the rooftops of apartments. It gives an atmosphere unlike almost any other ballpark because of its location.

The White Sox is much more standard of a current day ballpark. There's actually space for the park; there's parking, it looks like it was made for the area in which it stands, whereas Wrigley was there and then built around.

I'm a Cubs fan, so I obviously lean toward Wrigley in the comparison, but I really enjoyed going to the White Sox game – for the price, it was a very fun experience. It doesn't compare to the Ivy at Wrigley, but was really good nonetheless.

AARP- Protect Medicaid: Vulnerable Seniors & Children with Disabilities

Editor’s Note: The following is an opinion piece and political stand by the American Association of Retired Persons on current plans in Congress to slash Medicaid and repealing the Affordable Health Care Act.

For nearly 60 years, AARP has been fighting to ensure older Americans have affordable health care and access to the services they need to stay at home as they age.

Right now, there is legislation in the House of Representatives that would cut Medicaid by \$880 billion, jeopardizing essential care to millions of Americans, including seniors, children, and adults with disabilities.

The bill would shift hundreds of billions of dollars in costs to states and taxpayers, take health care away from millions of families, and cut services that help seniors and people with disabilities live independently in their homes and communities for as long as possible.

For more than 50 years, Medicaid has provided essential care to millions of Americans, including 17.4 million children and adults with disabilities, and low-income seniors. During times of economic downturn, hardworking Americans who’ve lost jobs turn to Medicaid for their care.

Medicaid is jointly financed by states and the federal government. Under this financing arrangement, the federal government guarantees that it will share, with states, the costs of all medically necessary health care and needed long-term care (such as assistance with bathing, dressing, toileting) for eligible individuals.

Under the current system, federal funding increases in response to increases in enrollment due to unemployment, outbreaks of epidemics, natural disasters, the cost of care, and the services people use.

Health Care Reform Debate

The proposed American Health Care Act includes per capita caps — a fixed amount of funding for each Medicaid enrollee.

Once the per capita amount is set by the federal government, it would not change, even if a state’s actual program costs were greater than the allotted amount.

If a state’s costs exceeded the cap, it would have to use its own funds to make up the difference or, more likely, cut services for low-income residents, including children and adults with disabilities and seniors.

These caps would put an enormous financial burden on states and state taxpayers, take health care away from millions of families, and cut services that help seniors and people with disabilities live independently in their homes and communities.

Our Medicaid Values

Ensure adequacy and affordability. Medicaid should remain a vital safety net that guarantees adequate and affordable health care and long-term services and supports that meet the needs and preferences of beneficiaries and recognize and assist their family caregivers.

Medicaid should also cover a range of home- and community-based services to allow individuals to live as independently as possible.

Ensure quality, efficiency and program integrity.

Medicaid should improve the quality and efficiency of care for beneficiaries and maximize value for the program. Program waste, fraud and abuse should be identified and eliminated, and the process should not unduly burden beneficiaries.

Provide sufficient and responsive federal funding. Federal funding should be sufficient to account for the complex needs of beneficiaries and changes in state circumstances that affect program enrollment and costs.

Provide state flexibility and accountability. States, with federal guidance and oversight, should have flexibility to innovate and strengthen their programs in ways that do not cause harm to beneficiaries.

Tell Congress to vote NO on the American Health Care Act!

WOMEN WITH higher BMI scores reported worse hot flash symptoms in new study.

Study Finds Heavier Women Have More Severe Menopausal Symptoms

Hot flashes are the bane existence for women going through menopause, and are more frequent and more severe in those with a high body mass index (BMI), according to new research — which seems like a cruel trick of nature, since menopause itself is associated with weight gain.

The new study, published in Menopause, the journal of the North American Menopause Society, looked at the records of 749 Brazilian women between the ages of 45 and 60 and found that those with higher BMI scores reported worse hot flash symptoms than those with lower ones.

The women with higher BMIs also reported more joint and muscle pain and more urinary tract problems. While the exact reasons for weight gain during menopause are still being

Older Americans Sell Prescription Opioids to Raise Needed Cash

We are in the midst of our nation’s deadliest drug epidemic ever and it is hitting older Americans particularly hard, reports AARP.

In the report released June 1, titled “The Opioid Menace,” AARP reveals that almost one-third of all

Medicare patients — nearly 12 million people — were prescribed opioid painkillers in 2015, drugs that can become addictive in as few as five days.

That same year, 2.7 million Americans over age 50 abused painkillers and nearly 14,000 people age 45-plus died from an overdose.

The report explores how older generations have become the new dealers, selling their prescriptions to raise needed cash. And it

details the extraordinary increase in grandparents having to raise their grandchildren due to the opioid addictions of their children.

The report also includes profiles of older opioid addicts; explores the U.S. regions that are most affected by the opioid epidemic; ranks the 18 approved prescription opioids based on their potency; and gives clear advice on helping bring an end to the nation’s deadly epidemic.

Social Security Change June 10

Last summer, the Social Security Administration announced it would start requiring two-factor authentication via cellphone for its 30 million online account users.

The news created an uproar among older recipients who said they didn’t own cellphones. After two weeks the agency said, in effect, never mind.

This week, the agency announced that it is making a second stab at improving online security.

Starting June 10, people logging into their online Social Security accounts will need to verify their identity by one of two methods: a code sent to their cellphone or a code sent to their email accounts.


The move is part of a broader government push to ramp up online security amid a number of hacks of government and commercial websites that have compromised the personal information of millions of Americans.

The new system is not expected to be as secure as cellphone-only two-step authentication since many people use the same password for email and other online accounts. If one of those accounts gets hacked, cyber intruders would then be able to access their Social Security account via the victim’s email.

It is, however, one more layer of security. And it can be made even more secure if users use a unique password reserved for email accounts alone, said Stephanie Lucas, a digital media specialist with the Los Angeles office of the law firm Baker & Hostetler.

Your personal account at ssa.gov can be used to check benefits and manage direct deposits to bank accounts, among other things.

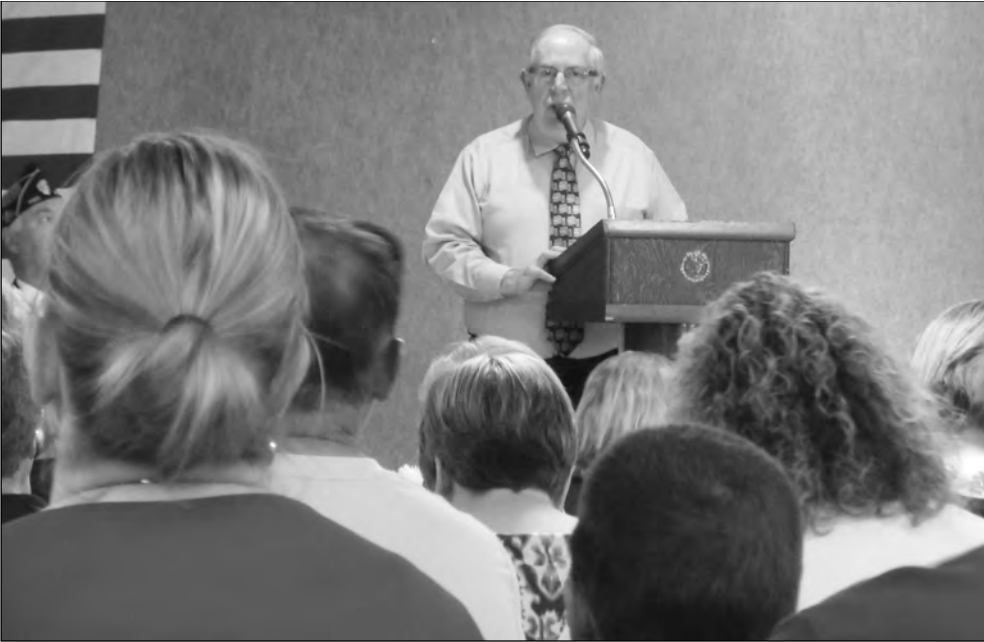
