## LivCo Wind Turbine Setback Amendment Hearing Has False

A hearing to go with a lesser setback for wind turbines for seven northeastern Livingston County Town-

ships got off to a false start June 8, ending almost immediately after it started.

In a meeting that was purported to be a hearing on an amendment to change the

setback requirement from 3,250 feet to 1,600 feet for the townships of Nevada, Dwight, Odell, Sullivan, Union, Broughton, and Round Grove, it turned out to be at the start a standard Zoning Board of Appeals meeting with the board taking care of routine business.

When Livingston County Agriculture Committee Chairman Daryl Holt (R-Dwight) was asked to present his "case" for the amendment, he was sworn in and the ZBA began peppering him with specific questions regarding the proposed amendment.

Since Holt was not prepared, the ZBA instead opted to recess the meeting to July 6, 7 p.m. in the historic County Courthouse in downtown Pontiac.

"It was supposed to be a slam dunk," said former Agriculture Committee Chairman and County Board Member Bill Flott, of Dwight, who was newly appointed to the ZBA. He told *The Paper* June 9 after the meeting that he was expecting the amendment to fly through the ZBA quickly.

Holt told *The Paper* the next day that he was blindsided by the ZBA chairman's questions and procedures, thinking it was his job to present the proposed amendment and that then there would be public comment taken.

Chuck Schopp, Regional Planning Commission Administrator for the county, was equally puzzled by what happened at the hearing.

"I didn't know what the depth of the zoning board's questions would be," Schopp told *The Paper* the next day. "I guess I'm at the point when I'm not surprised at anything anymore."

County Board Chairman Bob Young (R-Emington), publicly apologized for the agricultural committee not being prepared to answer detailed questions at the hearing.

He said the major factor driving this amendment was the referendum last fall (see related story on amendment language on this page).

He added that this subject has always been controversial in Livingston County.

A controversy began at the start of last week's hearing when Holt mentioned the ag committee's suggestion that the ZBA conduct hearings with a facilitator such as a judge to allow the ZBA to

be freed up during hearings to listen to testimony and ask questions.

But Holt mentioned it taking more than 30 hearings before action was taken on some issues and he believed the facilitator would speed up the process.

To which ZBA chairman Joan Huisman asked Holt why the agricultural committee did not ask any questions at the previous zoning hearings.

"Why are we just hearing about this now?" she asked.

Holt explained that the county lawyers advised the ag committee *not* to speak at the hearings.

When Schopp passed out information regarding the amendment, he gave the ZBA members data such as wind speeds in the area, elevations showing the Cayuga Ridge is the highest point in (continued on page 3)

## Gardner Area Band Performs in National Memorial Day Parade

The small but mighty Gardner Area (Marching Panthers) Band marched in the national Memorial Day Parade, May 29, in Washington D.C.

The trip, culminating a year of planning and fund-raising, included the 40 band members taking in the educational and historical sights at the nation's capital.

"It was hot, in the 90s," said band director Michael Leone. "The kids were extremely well-behaved, very respectful."

When the audience and parade had to stop to bow heads in silence, every member of the band bowed their heads and stayed quiet, Leone added.

"We did not have one kid drop out," due to heat

exhaustion, he said.

Leone reported most of the bands from other parts of the country had members succumb to the heat.

Plus the 10-block parade in the capital was a longer parade than he had anticipated.

"Blocks in D.C. are a lot longer than in Gardner," Leone said.

The parade was televised, and Leone, marching along the route with the band, had left his cell phone on at first.

He said his cell phone "exploded" with phone texts, saying "I see ya, I see ya" and texts of a similar nature. He had to shut the cell phone off so it would not interfere with his duties during the parade. Obviously folks at home were excited to see the band live on television, he (continued on page 3)

Reading Township, the only other part of the county that voted for 1,600-foot setbacks, is not contiguous to other townships that approved the lesser setback which precludes a commercial wind farm development. “This is a high wind area,” Schopp said. But more details will be

sent to the ZBA before the July 6 hearing.

Unfortunately, all those who showed up to speak for or against the amendment for the lesser setback were not heard because they wished the ag committee to provide more details, and answer questions at the next session “on the hot seat,” as Huisman termed it.

Back stage after the parade, many visitors who had no idea who the children were, asked to have their picture taken with band members.

“They felt like celebrities,” Leone said.

He said the route took the band right past the White House, and when the kids knew they were on camera, they “were really pumped up about it, and played hard.”

The band, made up of music students from South Wilmington Grade School, Braceville Elementary, Gardner Grade School and Gardner-South Wilmington High School, has students in grades five through 12.

To make the trip to Washington D.C., the community raised \$25,000 to send the students via charter bus. Parents and teachers paid their own way, with a total group from the GSW area of 111 people.

In addition to marching in the televised parade, students saw such sights as the Smithsonian Institute, the tomb of the Unknown Soldier, and Arlington National Cemetery.

He believes the experience was a once-in-a-lifetime trip for many of the band members.

He said he heard com-

ments from parents about how well organized the trip was, and said he has been “for the past year, you’re living this” trip as far as fundraising, organizing, logistics, and practicing.

The round trip lasted from Friday, May 26 to Tuesday, May 30.

Leone is thinking the band may take a trip like this every two years. But the band is growing. The enrollment for the band for the 2017-18 school year is 60, he said.

He believes this trip may have inspired new music students to join.





### Community Care Systems Offer Assistance with Applying for Programs

Last month, the Social Security Administration began mailing letters to 2.2 million people with Medicare who may be eligible for health care (Medicare Savings Program) and prescription savings (Low Income Subsidy/Extra Help).

Social Security sent this letter to people who are enrolled in Medicare, and based on their monthly Social Security benefit, appear to qualify for these programs. Getting the letter does not mean someone automatically qualifies, they need to fill out an application. Everyone who gets the letter will not qualify. Both programs have income and asset guidelines and Social Security bases the letters on Social Security benefits only.

The income and asset guidelines for Medicare Savings Programs are:

- 1 person household – income: under \$1,381 per month; assets: under \$8,780.
- 2 person household – income: under \$1,851 per month; assets: under \$12,430.

The income and asset guidelines for Low Income Subsidy/Extra Help are:

- 1 person household – income: under \$1,508 per month; assets: under \$15,320.
- 2 person household – income: under \$2,030 per month; assets: under \$29,100.

All income amounts are for gross monthly income. Assets do not count primary residence and vehicles.

### Gas Below 2016 Level

United States average gallon of gasoline prices dropped 3.9 cents to \$2.352, June 12 compared to the previous Monday.

The national average has dropped under its year-ago level at \$2.35 per gallon, according to GasBuddy. It’s the first time in more than 200 days that the current gas price is lower than a year ago, the lowest June 9 price since 2005, when the average was \$2.11.

Average U.S. gallon regular price is made up of 19% state & local taxes; 13% distribution and marketing; 19% refining and 49% crude as of April 2017.

Financial Gifts Can Help Dad for Years to Come

Father's Day is almost here. Dad will probably like any gift you give him, of course, but this year, why not go beyond the ordinary? By presenting your father with an appropriate financial gift, you can bring him some benefits that can keep on giving.

For starters, how about a back-to-school gift for Dad? If you have children, you may already be familiar with 529 plans, which many parents use to help their children pay for college. But 529 plans have no age limits, so there's nothing stopping you from reversing the usual formula and opening an account for your father. While 529 plans are commonly used to pay for four-year colleges, the money can also go toward most two-year community colleges and trade schools, so if Dad has a future interest in learning about anything from anthropology to auto repair, the 529 plan you've established can give him the gift of knowledge and enjoyment.

As the owner of a 529 plan, your earnings can accumulate tax free, provided they are used for qualified higher education expenses. (529 plan distributions not used for qualified expenses may be subject to federal and state income tax, and a 10% IRS penalty on the earnings.) Furthermore, if you invest in your own state's 529 plan, you might be able to deduct the contributions from your taxes.

Here's another suggestion: Help Dad reach a distant goal. For example, if you know your father will be retiring in, say, 10 years, you could give him some type of bond that matures just when he retires. During those 10 years, he will receive regular semiannual interest payments, and when the bond matures, he'll get the original principal back. He can then use this money to help fulfill a long-held dream — perhaps one of traveling the world or even opening a small business. Whatever he decides to do with the money, it will make a nice retirement gift.

If you're giving Dad a corporate bond, make sure it's "investment grade," which means it has received one of the highest ratings for safety from one of the major bond-rating agencies. Investment-grade bonds are generally the least likely to default. If your father is in one of the upper tax brackets, he might benefit from a municipal bond, whose interest payments are exempt from federal income taxes and possibly state and local taxes, too. (Some municipal bonds, however, are subject to the alternative minimum tax.)

Finally, you may want to help Dad plan his legacy. Although your father may be interested in what sort of legacy he will leave, he may not yet have taken any steps in this area — in particular, he might not have created a comprehensive estate plan.

You might consider giving your father some resources on estate planning, such as books or online articles. Better yet, though, consider setting him up with a consultation with a legal professional. It will take considerable time and effort to create the necessary documents, such as a will, a living trust, a durable power of attorney, and so on — and since the future is not ours to see, it's best to take care of these tasks sooner, rather than later. Father's Day is just a blip on the calendar. But by giving Dad some valuable financial gifts, you can help brighten all his days.







- Check the gas lines – the leading cause of gas grill fires is a fuel line leak or break
  - Inspect the line for cracking, sharp bends or brittleness
  - Rub soapy water on the line and look for bubbling to test for leaks
- Grill in well-ventilated areas - Never grill inside a home, tent, vehicle or camper where carbon monoxide can't escape and make you sick or worse kill you.
- Use combustibles cautiously – 18% of grill fires result from a grill being too close to combustibles
  - Keep lighter fluids CAPPED and a safe DISTANCE away from the grill
  - Never add lighter fluid to hot coals
  - Never use gasoline or kerosene as a starter fluid

  - Clean grates and grease pans to prevent flare-ups
  - Wait 48 hours before disposing of charcoal ashes
- Create a safe zone
  - Children under 5 accounted for 37% of emergency room visits for contact burns caused by grills

Surviving are her son, Harvey (Ritva) Musselman of Seattle, Washington; her daughter, Carol (Bob) Rodgers of Sequim; sister, Mary (Jim) Lydigsen of Yakima, Washington; brother, “Gus” (Sally) Michaels of Aurora, Colorado; and sister-in-law, Louise Michaels of Dothan, Alabama.

She is also survived by three granddaughters; seven great-grandchildren; and numerous nieces and nephews.

She was preceded in death by her parents; brothers: Raymond, John, Harold, Donald, Floyd, Marvin and Glen; and sisters: Shirley, Helen, Nancy and Barbara.

## WOMEN FARMLAND OWNERS AND OPERATORS IN AND AROUND LIVINGSTON COUNTY INVITED TO FREE CONSERVATION DISCUSSION AND FIELD TOUR JUNE 27 AT SAUNEMIN VILLAGE COMMUNITY BUILDING

More than one million women now operate American farms, as a growing number of women inherit, start or take charge of working farms every day. In the Midwest, women now own or co-own an estimated one-fourth to one-half of all the farmland.

To reach the growing number of women landowners interested in farming practices that benefit the health of their land, American Farmland Trust and Livingston County Soil & Water Conservation District are hosting a free conservation discussion and

field tour for women farmland owners on June 27 at the Saunemin Village Community Building (70 North Street, Saunemin, IL 61769).

The Vermilion River basin is one of the five highest nitrate-yielding watersheds in Illinois, yet no one purposely wants to fertilize the river! The primary topic of discussion on June 27 will be on how nutrients move through our crops and soil, and how we can keep them where we want them. This workshop brings together landowners in an informal setting for a

women-only morning discussion followed by lunch and a bus tour to view on-farm practices. Female conservation professionals will be on hand to answer questions and share resources. The key topic of discussion will be watersheds and water quality, government cost-share programs and talking with farm tenants about management practices.

"Women farmland owners and operators may not be aware of all the programs and resources available to them," says Jennifer Filipiak, associate Midwest

director of American Farmland Trust. "Our goal is to connect the growing number of women landowners with each other and with the resource professionals who can help them with their stewardship goals."

The meeting is presented in partnership with the Vermilion Headwaters Watershed Partnership led by Livingston and Ford Counties Soil & Water Conservation Districts, American Farmland Trust and the Natural Resources Conservation Service.

"According to the USDA Agricultural Census (2012)

70% of the farmland in our area is rented," notes Becky Taylor, Resource Conservationist for Livingston County Soil & Water Conservation District. "One of our goals with the watershed project is to engage non-operating farmland owners in addition to farm operators in discussions about conservation practices that help with water quality but don't impact farm profitability."

On June 27, coffee and registration will begin at 8:30 a.m. and the meeting will begin at 9. Lunch is provided at no cost to partici-

pants, and the program will end at 3 p.m.
