ORDINANCE NO. 01-2017

WHEREAS, the State of Illinois has enacted "An Act regulating wages of laborers, mechanics and other workmen employed in any public works by the state, county, city or any public body or any political subdivision or by anyone under contract for public works", approved June 26, 1941, as amended, being 820 ILCS 130/0.01 et seq. (formerly known as SS39s-1 through 39s-12, ch. 48, Illinois Revised Statutes, 1973); and

WHEREAS, the aforesaid Act requires that the Odell Public Library District of the County of Livingston, State of Illinois, investigate and ascertain the prevailing rate of wages as defined in said Act for laborers, mechanics and other workmen in the locality of said Odell Public Library District employed in performing construction of public works, for said Odell Public

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE PRESIDENT AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE ODELL PUBLIC LIBRARY DISTRICT:

Section 1. To the extent and as required by "An Act regulating wages of laborers, mechanics and other workmen employed in any public works by the state, county, city or any public body or any political subdivision or by anyone under contract for public work", approved June 26, 1941, as amended, the general prevailing rate of wages in this locality for laborers, mechanics and other workmen engaged in the construction of public works coming under the jurisdiction of the Odell Public Library District is hereby ascertained to be the same as the prevailing rate of wages for construction work in Livingston County as determined by the Department of Labor of the State of Illinois as of June 2017, a copy of that determination being attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference. As required by said Act, any and all revisions of the prevailing rate of wages by the Department of Labor and of the State of Illinois shall supersede the Department's June determination and apply to any and all public works construction undertaken by the Odell Public Library District. The definition of any terms appearing in this Ordinance which are also used in the aforesaid Act shall be the same as in

Section 2. Nothing herein contained shall be construed to apply said general prevailing rate of wages as herein ascertained to any work or employment except public works construction of this Odell Public Library District to the extent required by the aforesaid Act.

Section 3. The Secretary of the Odell Public Library District Board of Trustees shall publicly post or keep available for inspection by any interested party in the main office of this Library District this determination or any revisions of such prevailing rate of wage. A copy of this determination or of the current revised determination of prevailing rate of wages then in effect shall be attached to all contract specifications.

Section 4. The Secretary of the Odell Public Library District Board of Trustees shall mail a copy of this determination to any employer, and to any association of employers and to any person or association of employees who have filed their names and addresses requesting copies of any determination stating the particular rates and the particular class of workmen whose wages will be affected by such rates.


Section 5. The Secretary of the Odell Public Library District Board of Trustees shall promptly file a certified copy of this Ordinance with both the Secretary of State Index Division and the Department of Labor of the State

Section 6. The Secretary of the Odell Public Library District Board of Trustees shall cause to be published in a newspaper of general circulation within the area a notice of this Ordinance and such publication shall constitute notice that the determination is effective and that this is the determina-Section 7. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after

its passage.

Tie Vote Says Mautino Committee Did No Wrong

The Illinois State Board of Elections declined to rule June 20 that Illinois Auditor General Frank Mautino's former campaign committee made illegal campaign contributions.

The board vote was a split along party lines, 4-4, with the four Democrats on the board voting to absolve Mautino's committee from making any wrongful campaign contributions, and the four Republicans on the board finding his committee guilty of making wrongful expenditures.

The split vote means there is no finding that would require any further hearings.

The Liberty Justice Center, Chicago, and its client, David Cooke, will appeal the result to the Illinois Appellate Court.

In May of this year, the

State Board of Elections ruled that the former campaign committee of now Illinois Auditor General Frank Mautino willfully violated the board's May 2016 order requiring his committee to amend its spending reports. Information was sought about expenditures Mautino's committee had made at two Spring Valley, Illinois, businesses while Mautino was a State Representative. The board assessed a \$5,000 fine.

But the board declined in May to rule on the underlying claims that initiated the case in February of 2016 -that Mautino's committee had made illegal expenditures involving Happy's Super Service Station and Spring Valley City Bank.

The Liberty Justice Center and Cooke, who is formerly of Dwight, then filed a Motion to Reconsider

-- that the Election Board should still rule on the merits of Cooke's original charges against Commitee for Frank Mautino.

The 4-4 ruling by the Board on June 20, 2017, has, for the moment at least, stymied any further investigation of Cooke's charges.

Cooke remarked: "I am happy that half the board was willing to find, consistent with the evidence, that the Mautino committee made improper expendi-

"Unfortunately, there is no majority on the board willing to address the substance of my complaint. If the State Board of Elections is unwilling to rule on claims brought to it by citizens, then I doubt that citizens will exert the time and effort to bring such claims to the board in the future.'

Pittenger is married to Laura, and the couple has three children: Kaleb, 13; Addyson, 6; and Isabella, 4.







New Voter Registration Cards Being Mailed

Registered Livingston County will be receiving new Voter Registration Cards the first week of July. As required by law, the county clerk's office is in the process of completing purge of County Voters. Livingston County Clerk Kristy Masching explained that a purge is done to help maintain voter registration by keeping them current and up to date, to eliminate voters that are deceased, or have moved from Livingston County.

Masching urges voters to check their voter cards and familiarize themselves with their districts and polling location. Voters should sign their new card and destroy their old card.

Masching is asking for voter's assistance in returning Voter Registration cards that were delivered to individuals who no longer live at the address where the card was delivered. Should a household receive a Voter ID card for a member of their family or an individual that once resided at that address, but no longer does, please mark on the Voter ID card "NOT AT THIS ADDRESS". If you know the address where the individual has moved to, please place that on the card also. Place the card in the mail to be returned to the Clerk's office. They are not be destroyed nor should they be given to the person listed on the card if they are no longer living in that household. If the addressee on the card is deceased, please notify the county clerk's office in writing. The sole purpose of the purge is to have correct voter data for the election process.

Also, if an individual's address has been changed by municipality or post office action, please inform the County Clerk's office of said changes. Masching says if a person has a rural route box number that was changed by 9-1-1 addressing but their new voter card reflects an incorrect address her office needs to be informed.

Registered voters who do not receive a voter's card by July 21 should notify the County Clerk's office at 815-844-2006.

Masching would like to reiterate the importance to change voter registration information whenever a person changes their name or moves, even if they move across the street. If the address or name change is not made in a timely fashion before the election is held, the voter may be prohibited from voting a full ballot within their home

The next election will be the general primary, March 20, 2018. If an individual is not registered to vote, now is the time to do so. Registration may be done in the County Clerk's office Monday -Friday 8 a.m. - 4:30 p.m. Individuals may also register online by following these steps: 1.Access the official website
