Emmanuel Lutheran Marks Century And A Half of Service to Dwight July 9

The Emmanuel Lutheran Congregation of Dwight will celebrate 150 years in Dwight with a special serv-

ice Sunday, July 9. As part of the service, Dwight native son Peter Kirby will give the sermon.

"I never forget my roots," Kirby said in an email message to The Paper last week.

"The Lord has blessed me to be able to travel widely in his service, but this place will always be home for me as long as I live in this world."

The church, located at 325 East Mazon Avenue in Dwight, was originally organized in 1867, then being served by Rev. Franz Schmitt Trinity of Congregation of Goodfarm.

At that time, land sold for \$1 an acre, according to the church history.

'On March 19, 1893, during a voters meeting of Emmanuel, a call was extended to Rev. G. F. W. Westerkamp," the church history said. "He was installed as the first pastor of

Emmanuel on Sept. 3, 1893."

Prior to that, Emmanuel shared pastors with other area congregations.

The Rev. Paul Hartmann, grandfather of Peter Kirby, the scheduled speaker July 9, was installed Feb. 1, 1953 where he remained until 1977. Kirby followed in

grandfather's footsteps, now running the Lutheran Hour Ministries, travelled to Jamaica, Latvia, Russia, Kazakhstan, Mongolia and Turkey.

On July 9, coffee and fellowship, open to the public, begins at 8 a.m. at the church.

In the case of Dwight native Masha (Wilkinson) Ellis, the choice was to serve orphan children in India.

She and her husband Caleb were married in 2016 and currently work with an agency based in Gridley, Illinois called Lifesong for Orphans.

On the group's web site, it says that the group pledges:

"Our Children will: Not want for food, clothing, medical care, or shelter; be taught the Gospel and how to live as followers of Jesus Christ; receive a quality education to provide a foundation for their future; and experience continued love and support as they transi-

tion into adult living."

Masha has been doing Sometimes God chooses mission work in India since shortly after she graduated from Dwight Township High School in 2009.

> She is the daughter of Brad and Barbara Wilkinson of Dwight.

For a while she was working at a home for children who were formerly part of the illegal brothel system in Mumbai, India. She worked with 10 teenage girls who were at risk for being trafficked. "Some of the girls' parents were prostitutes themselves," Caleb explained.

Some of these children came from the "red light" district of Mumbai. The district is called Kamathipura. "It's about half the size of

Dwight," Masha said. "There are rows and rows

of brothels. Masha explained that the job ended up being more like one-on-one counseling with the girls.

"These girls have had a lot of emotional trauma," Masha said.

In 2014, she met her future husband Caleb. He had previously worked investigating the brothels for a law enforcement agency.

Recently the couple has transitioned to Lifesong, which is an advocate for orphans in 12 countries with 19 different projects. This allows them to work together on a mission as a couple.

"Lifesong helps people adopt, are advocates for adoption, provide orphan care around the world and promote community development projects," Caleb explained. The newlyweds find the work rewarding.

Dwight Village Street Work Progressing

June 26 Dwight Village Board Actions

The Dwight Village Board of Trustees met on June 26 where street work updates were reviewed following Properties a Committee meeting prior to the regular board session.

Plans are being finalized and several projects are getting ready to be put out for bid. Village Engineer Ryan Hansen of Chamlin and Associates was on hand to provide a status of the proj-

Chippewa Street from Route 47 to Chicago Street will be bid out for complete reconstruction. In addition, North Street from Morris

Road to Chicago will also be put out for bid for complete reconstruction. Bids were to open June 30 and will be discussed at the next village board meeting.

Bid plans for Wilmac Street, St. Louis Street and Clinton Street are being finalized with the intention of the board to put these plans out to bid in July. All streets are being bid for complete reconstruction. On all streets, the board will compare the complete rebuild bid with the cost to only resurface the street and add new storm sewers. The board will review and evaluate all plans, bids and costs before making any final

West Main Street construction is nearing completion with one more pour needed along with some sidewalk work at the historic depot, landscaping, grading, striping and final cleanup work remaining.

\$174,000 of the approximately \$250,000 project has been paid for by High Speed Rail monies with the Village of Dwight responsible for the balance. The board discussed adding Prairie Avenue in that area to the West Main Street contract.

Resurfacing projects currently underway are moving along and nearing comple-





She said she did not know how many people will stay as there is some duplication with the two dealerships.






• Patience – When you watch the best hitters – such as those appearing in the All-Star Game - you will notice that most of them are very patient, willing to wait for several pitches until they get the one they feel they can hit. But these events are actually pretty rare. The most successful investors are typically the ones who invest steadily, through good markets and bad ones, and who follow a long-term strategy appropriate for their needs, goals and risk tolerance.

• Preparation – During the All-Star Game – or, for that matter, during any game – the ballplayers will know exactly what to do in almost any given situation. To take one example, consider what happens when a runner is on first base and the batter hits a ground ball to the shortstop. Almost without thinking – because he's already prepared for this very scenario – the shortstop will flip the ball to the second baseman, who is already standing on the bag, because he too is ready for this play. The second basemen completes the double play by immediately throwing to the first baseman, who is also in the right place, standing on first

When your children head off to college, you should know if and how you'll help them pay for it, maybe because you've prepared by saving in a 529 plan or another college-savings vehicle. Livingston County Retired Teachers Association Met June 20

Fifty-eight members and guests of the Livingston County Retired Teachers met June 20 at the Country Mansion in Dwight. After member sign-in, a breakfast buffet was held.

Mary Flott introduced the speaker for the day, Lynn Neville, from the Dwight Historical Society. She gave a very informative slide presentation on the Keelev Institute. She brought out the significant role it played in the community of Dwight.

Dr, Leslie Keeley (1832-1901), a self-proclaimed Civil War Surgeon, came to Dwight after the war to continue his study of alcoholism that began among the Union soldiers.

In 1879, a small wooden frame building, the Keeley Institute was founded with the proclamation from Keeley, "Drunkenness is a disease and I can cure it." His treatment centered on a secret preparation of bichloride of gold.

He claimed a 95% cure rate. Whatever the success rate, he had a lasting and profound impact on the treatment of alcohol and drug abuse including narcotic additions, the tobacco habit and neurasthenia.

By 1893, there were 92 Keeley Institutes in the US, Canada and Mexico and that number grew to over 200 and expanded to Europe.

In 1990, Keeley suffered a heart attack in Los Angeles, California and died at age 63.

Dee Dee Raube then read a card from Laura Bruer thanking the group for remembering her 100th birthday in May.

Video Gaming Owes **Communities More**

It was enlightening to read the Pantagraph's two front page stories Sunday, June 25, concerning the proliferation of video gambling in Illinois communities.

Bloomington, for the second year in a row, has the dubious distinction of being on the Illinois Gaming Board's list of Top 10 Video Gaming cities.

Some of Bloomington's leaders are concerned that they may have too many video gaming/liquor-serving establishments in their town, one for every 329 residents.

Dwight has one video gaming terminal for every 83 of its residents. It may have reached the saturation point. Or not. The Illinois Gaming Board doesn't have

a Top Ten list for vgt-saturated villages.

The bottom line is: do the video gaming terminals provide more prosperity or more poverty?

In any event, several months ago I suggested to our State Representative, Tom Bennett, that the state should raise the local take on the operation of video gaming to 10%, rather than 5%.

That would seem a reasonable thing for the Illinois Gaming Board to do in view of the problems, visible and invisible, that are created by gambling addictions.

If communities must bear the brunt of the addiction problems, they should at least be compensated.




Gas up 1.1 cents

2017 was a great year for GSW baseball, as Chris Halpin's Bronco level team finished 10-4 on the regular season - good enough for second place.



ORDINANCE

APPROPRIATION ANNUAL BUDGET AND **ORDINANCE** APPROPRIATING CERTAIN SUMS OF MONEY NEEDED TO DEFRAY THE NECESSARY EXPENSES AND LIABILITIES OF THE DWIGHT FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT OF LIVINGSTON COUNTY AND GRUNDY COUNTY, ILLINOIS FOR THE FISCAL YEAR BEGINNING MAY 1, 2017 AND ENDING APRIL 30, 2018.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Trustees of the Dwight Fire Protection District as follows:

SECTION I: The fiscal year of the Dwight Fire Protection District is hereby fixed and declared to be from May 1, 2017 through April 30, 2018.

SECTION II: The following budget containing an estimate of receipts and expenditures of the Dwight Fire Protection District is hereby adopted as the budget of the Dwight Fire Protection District for the above fiscal year.

SECTION III:

- (a) The cash on hand at the beginning of the fiscal year, May 1, 2017, was \$236,865.18.
- The estimate of cash expected to be received during the aforementioned fiscal year from all sources, including loan and tentative grant proceeds, is \$1,242,098.20.
- Attached hereto as Exhibit A and made part hereof is an estimate of the expenditures contemplated for the aforementioned fiscal year and the sums hereinafter appearing in this Section are hereby appropriated for the purpose of defraying the necessary corporate expenses and liabilities of the Dwight Fire Protection District for the fiscal year beginning May 1, 2017 and ending April 30, 2018, the sums of money to be used for the following specified objects and purposes, as such objects and purposes are set forth on the attached Exhibit A.
- The estimate of the cash expected to be on hand at the end of the fiscal year is \$224,694,65 after current year expenditures, with the cash on hand at the end of the year as a reserve for estimated future purchases of new equipment and building acquisition and improvements. A part of the estimated cash on hand at the end of the fiscal year may be expended for new equipment purchases, building maintenance and improvement and building acquisition if the need arises.

Tdap Vaccines Available at Grundy County Health Dept.

The Grundy County Health Department is offer-Tdap discounted (Tetanus, Diptheria, and Pertussis) vaccines to adults age 19 years and older who do not have insurance that covers the vaccine, are residents of Grundy County, and who've not had the vaccine before.

The Tdap vaccine will be offered to those who meet these qualifications for a reduced fee. The price reduced vaccines will only be discounted for a short time and will not be restocked once they've run

What are Tetanus, Diptheria, and Pertussis?

Tetanus (Lockjaw) is rare in the United States today. It caused painful muscle tightening and stiffness, usually all over the body. It kills about one out of ten people who are infected, even after receiving the best medical

Diptheria is also rare in the U.S. today. It can cause a thick coating to form in the back of the throat and can lead to breathing problems, heart failure, paralysis, and

Pertussis (Whooping Cough) causes severe coughing spells, which can cause difficulty breathing, vomiting, and disturbed sleep. It can also lead to weight loss, incontinence, and rib fractures. Up to two in 100 adolescents and five in 100 adults with pertussis are hospitalized or have complications, which could include pneumonia or death.

Who should get the immunization?

One dose of the Tdap vaccine is routinely given at age 11 or 12. People who did not get Tdap at that age should get it as soon as possible. Only one dose of Tdap is routinely recommended. After the first dose, an adolescent or adult can get the Td (tetanus and diptheria)) vaccine once every ten

Tdap is especially important for health care professionals and anyone having close contact with a baby younger than 12 months.

Pregnant women should get a dose of Tdap during every pregnancy to protect the newborn from pertussis. Infants are most at risk for severe, life-threatening complications from pertussis and do not receive a vaccination containing pertussis until they're two months of age or older.


