# South Wilmington Immortalized for Posterity With New Museum

Jack Smolik no longer has to store historical treasures from South Wilmington in his basement.

Now there is a home for the artifacts — the South Wilmington Historical Museum, located in the former Patterson Funeral Home, two blocks east of the South Wilmington VFW Park on Lemmon Street.

The museum hours will be 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Tuesdays and Thursdays.

However, during South Wilmington's Party In The Park, the museum will be open Saturday and Sunday, July 29, 30, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. (For further details about the annual celebration, see page 6 in this paper).

The museum was made

possible through the donation of the funeral parlot building by Jim and Martha Patterson. It was donated to the village of South Wilmington, and the remodeling of the building was "just finished in time" for the official launch during South Wilmington's annual celebration.

"In June, we started moving in," Smolik explained.

Smolik said the dream of some sort of historical society in South Wilmington was slowly becoming a reality 12 years ago when people began bringing him historical memorabilia.

As part of his dream, he built a scale model replica of the entire town as it looked in 1910, complete with one coal mine in the village, plus homes, and businesses.

"It took me three years to

do that," he said.

The scale model map has been viewed by South Wilmington Grade School pupils in the past, but they had to travel to Smolik's basement to view it.

Now it will be available to the public.

The model includes his own home, which still stands to this day, plus at least 24 saloons, (there were six in East Brooklyn too), two ice houses, four blacksmith shops, a lumber company, a drug store, three churches, three schools, "and a lot of markets," Smolik meat added.

The funeral parlor was built in 1959. The building already has wheelchair access and air conditioning, plus special lighting that was used to showcase caskets.

The new year of 1905 brought with it much excitement for South Wilming-ton's Congregation.

Archbishop James Quigley of Chicago had just announced plans for a tour of the northern Illinois coal towns.

During this time he planned to visit the miners' homes and work places and

The local pastor, Father came to town to dedicate Lawrence Donna, and his flock anxiously made plans for the upcoming big day. Father Donna, an immigrant from Canischio, Catholic Turin, Italy, who was ordained in 1902 and was a former coal miner, was appointed pastor of the new parish in July of 1904.

But some other local inhabitants were allegedly planning a reception of a different sort. These men were anarchists, followers inquire not only into their of a political philosophy

brought from Europe which opposed governments, organized religion, authority, and heroarchy as restrictive of human freedom. Their hatred of government stemmed partly from the fact that governments in Europe ruthlessly crushed peasant revolts and workers' strikes and often required all young men to serve several years in military at very low pay.

By 1905, the anarchists had made quite an impact on the world and were a force to be reckoned with. Anarchists, for example, assassinated President Carnot of France in 1894, Empress Elizabeth of Austria in 1898, King Humbert I of Italy in 1900, and President William McKinley in 1901.

Anarchists living in the coal towns of northern Illinois engaged in a range of law-defying actions. For example, they were often accused of destroying property and encouraging riots during strikes.

Couples often lived in common-law fashion, denying the need for religious or governmental sanction of their marriages.

The offspring of such unions were named for the order of their birth — Prima or Primo (first), Secundo (second), etc. — rather than for saints or biblical figures.

Cigar-smoking women were known to "baptize" infants with beer in saloons on Sunday mornings, thus mocking religion, ignoring Sunday closing laws, and contemporary defying notions of proper female behavior.

Anarchists who were chosen as pallbearers for their friends who were taken to churches for burial would carry the casket to the door of the church, but (continued on page 4)

The United States average gallon of gasoline price increased 2.3 cents to \$2.288, July 24 compared to July 17.

The chain was started by John Kotara, who is currently president of the company, and another partner, whose last name started with the letters "Ber."

Thus the Berkot's name. Since then, Kotara became the sole owner of the chain about halfway through its 35-year history.

Kaminski has been with the chain since 2001, at the tender age of 19 when he worked as a stock clerk. He came to the Dwight store after managing Manhattan location.

"We're able to compete with national chains," Kaminski explained. He said with the buying power of 15 separate stores, the chain is able to bring prices down on large bulk product purchas-

Kaminski said the low prices reflect what Berkot's pays for the items, plus its profit markup.

"It's really about what we pay, and we try to be competitive," he added.

Meantime, the longevity of Berkot's employees reflects an atmosphere of working for a small-family business, Kaminski said.

"I've been around for 16 years," Kaminski said. "John is a family-friendly person. John and his son, Luke, always had that family-friendly mentality. We're big, but it's always been a family business."

The Dwight store maintains a staff of about 35 workers, both full- and parttime. Some have been at the store since before Berkot's took over ownership.

Kaminski believes the secret to Berkot's success is paying attention to what customers want and need.

"We have to make sure we fulfill their needs, specifically like with products we don't carry. We try to satisfy those needs."



# Gardner's Ida Schopp Pens Autobiography

At the tender age of 90, Ida Schopp, of Gardner, has written an autobiography of her life as a widow since her husband Gordon died in 2000.

And her theme is "It takes a village," exemplified by all the charity work she has done since her husband's passing.

"I've got so much in here," she said, pointing to her heart. "I just have to share it."

The 182-page book, "Lady B, Dreams and Experiences," is currently being printed and will be available for sale Aug. 9 at the open house for the Gardner Archives.

She said the book tells the story of a widow living in Gardner and how "it takes a village and choosing to be happy and not sad."

The book includes photographs and has on the cover the license plate of her vehicle, a gift to her from her late husband, with the license plate saying "Lady B."

Schopp is now known in town as "Lady B" and continues to drive the red Pontiac GrandAm in her favorite color.

She said she spent many nights laboring for hours to complete the publication.

Schopp does not type, so she wrote her book out in longhand.

Lisa Klass typed the manuscript for Schopp.

And as is fitting for a woman who has won numerous awards for her charity work for various civic and social organizations in the Gardner area, \$1 from each book sale will be donated to the Gardner Church of Hope Food Pantry.

Klass wrote in her introduction to Schopp's book:

"Ida had a dream...to

write her story about life after she was widowed. She wanted to leave her mark; and tell folks about choosing to live after your husband of 50-some years is gone."

But the book, although historically documented, is not just about her life.

"For people who don't want to just read about me, they'll enjoy the root series."

In the back of her autobiography is a reprinting of a series of history articles she did for The Gardner Chronicle.

Schopp is the curator for the Gardner Archives, housed in the Gardner Village Hall, and said at the last meeting July 12, the archives met a goal of 500 artifacts collected.

The August 9 open house will feature many of the new items collected, such as a box of utensils that was found in the Nielsen Grain

"They (the utensils) were dusted and placed on display on the scale from the same place," Schopp explained.

There was also a donation of a Sheaffer pen display cabinet from Walter Peck's jewelry store.

During the open house for her book signing, she said she plans to sign each book with the words "It takes a village."

not accompany it inside.

I have been told that posters with skull and cross bones smeared with red material (to signify blood) were placed on the front doors of businesses owned by Catholics in South Wilmington the night prior to the archbishop's visit.

The exact nature of the threats made by South

Wilmington's anarchists against the archbishop were considered serious enough to require a contingent of male parishioners to meet him at the train in Gardner and escort him on his way to the church.

Here the stories vary.

One version I have heard claims that shots were fired in the dust in front of the cleric's horse as approached the church.

Another version says the anarchists met the contingent outside of town and presented Quigley with a bouquet of flowers.

Regardless, the church was dedicated on January 8, 1905, and served its congregation well until the early 1970s, when, due to structural problems, it was knocked down and replaced by a new brick structure constructed on the east side of the same block.

And what became of the anarchists? Sources have told me that as these gentlemen grew older, they gradually lost their hatred of the state and the church.

America was different that one could hold and express unorthodox political views without being jailed, harassed, or deported.

Perhaps they felt out of place as they saw their neighbors play active roles in church affairs and local government.

Some probably returned to the countries of their birth. Surprisingly, several of them were buried by the very churches they had once threatened and denounced.



dents entering ninth grade and students new to the district (at any grade) to present evidence of a physical examination and immunization records. Students entering ninth grade will be required to show proof of immunizations polio, hepatits B, and two November 14 doses of Varicella vaccine or a health care provider's indication of a past case of chicken pox. A new law states that all students with a diagnosis of Asthma have their doctor provide an asthma action plan at the school. Students failing to present evidence of physical examinations and immunizations will not be allowed to enter school until these require-<u>ments have been met.</u> Physical exam forms are available in the high school office.

Incoming seniors: All students entering 12th grade (seniors) will be required to show proof of meningococconjugate vaccine (MCV) upon school entry. This law is to prevent a severe form of bacterial meningitis. Some students have already received a meningitis vaccine. If the vaccine was received after age 16, only one vaccine is required. If the vaccine was received prior to age 16, two vaccines are required.

#### **Morris Hospital** Seeking **Volunteers for Youth Cardiac** Screening

Morris Hospital is seeking volunteers to assist at the Rhythm of Our Youth cardiac screening programs that will be held at six area high schools this fall. The purpose of the screening program is to prevent sudden cardiac death in area high school students by identifying those who may have existing cardiac abnormali-

On the screening days, a team from Morris Hospital provides electrocardiogram (ECG) screenings free of charge to students who have received parental permission to participate. An electrocardiogram is a non-invasive test that measures the electrical activity of the heart and detects certain heart abnormalities that can lead to sudden cardiac death.

Rhythm of Our Youth volunteers assist with checkin, escorting participants to the screening stations, or performing ECGs under the guidance of hospital staff. Volunteers may work full day shifts, 7 a.m.-3 p.m., or half day shifts, 7 a.m.-11:30 a.m. or 11 a.m.-3:30 p.m, and must be 18 years of age or older and pass a background check. Clinical skills aren't required.

In addition to working the screening days, volunteers are required to attend a mandatory training session from 6-7:30 p.m. at the high school the night before the screening. Volunteers can work a single screening date or multiple screening dates.



# **Study: Your Credit Affects Your Insurance Rate**

by Veronica Carter

If you have a good driving record but think your car insurance premium is too high, a new survey says your credit score could be the problem.

A report by the online marketing firm WalletHub found five of the largest insurance companies that write auto policies use credit ratings as a factor in determining insurance premiums.

WalletHub's Jill Gonzalez explains low credit doesn't mean companies

think a person is more likely to be in an accident.

"It has to do with, "Do you have a history of paying your bills, and do you think that history will carry on when paying your insurance premiums?" she says. "I think that's really where the mindset is here. I would say it's more of a cost risk than an actual driving risk."

The report shows the effect a credit score can have on the cost of an auto policy varies widely.

companies Farmers and Allstate weigh credit scores heavily in calculating premiums, while for GEICO and Progressive, low credit is much less of a factor.

She says costs also vary between states. The survey found bad credit in New Jersey can raise rates as much as 100% – while in California, poor credit adds very little to the cost of a policy.

Some critics say using credit scores to rate poli-Gonzalez says they found cies can unfairly raise

insurance rates for lowerincome families and communities of color.

Gonzalez says avoiding accidents and tickets will do the most to keep insurance rates down. But paying bills on time can help,

She says some companies are more transparent than others about how they use credit scores. Check the fine print on an insurer's website or call the company and ask them


