Late Jerry Beier, Former Harvest Days Chairman, Honored With 2017 Button

Longtime volunteer, entertainer, and community leader, and most of all Chicago Cubs Fan, the late Jerry Beier, will be honored on this year's Dwight Harvest Days button.

Designed by Barbara DeWaard, the buttons are in red, blue and white and feature several symbolic messages to illustrate who Jerry was and what he meant to the community.

Surrounding the button on the outer edge is "What A Wonderful World," Jerry's trademark song, with the "B+" logo between the song title repeated in a circle.

B+ is Jerry's blood type, which was used to secure a match and acquire a kidney donation from his niece, Blakely Moulton, in 2012.

In the center is Jerry's Big Kahuna logo (for his D.J. business) overlayed on the Chicago Cubs red "C." the button also features the dates of this year's Harvest Days, Sept. 15-17.

Jerry died of health complications Dec. 2, 2016, after finishing his final year as Harvest Days Chairman, the year the event had to be moved to Renfrew Park due to construction downtown.

"This button is our way of honoring him," said Randy Irvin, chairman of Harvest Days.

Buttons will sell for \$2 and the profits from the sales will be split between Harvest Days and a charity to be named at a later date, according to Harvest Days Chairman Irvin.

Irvin took over this year after Jerry retired following a near-decade stint as Harvest Days Chairman.

"Jerry was good to work with," Irvin said. "He had interest in the community."

He described Jerry as "thoughtful" illustrating his forethought when last year's event would mean the parade was moved away from the residents at the Fox Developmental Center. Irvin said Jerry wanted to make sure the residents would be able to see the parade, and he made arrangements to do so

Irvin said Jerry was an inclusive person, but Irvin and others like his fraternal brother Gary, described him as a guy who had difficulty delegating responsibilities.

That got to be wearing on Jerry by his last years with Harvest Days when he was doing the event with less volunteers, commented both his brother and Irvin.

Irvin said he has a lot more volunteers for this year's event.

"As volunteers dropped off, Jerry ended up putting a lot on his shoulders," Irvin said.

Irvin as this year's chairman appreciates the work Jerry did all those years.

"It's a full-time job," Irvin said.

Gary agreed it was hard work for Jerry too.

"I knew Harvest Days was harder than it had been in past years," Gary said. "He's just one of those guys. He probably took on more than he should have. He took a lot of pride in that."

Many people said Jerry (continued on page 3)

Dwight Streets About Half Done; Some Unhappy With Landscaping

Twenty-three blocks of resurfacing work have been completed in Dwight so far, with about 30 more to be completed, according to Village Administrator Kevin McNamara.

The work not only includes resurfacing streets paid for from the increased 1¢ per \$1 sales tax, but also work to replace water and sewer lines.

"We're about 50% done," McNamara told *The Paper* last week.

But not all of the work will be done this summer.

Work remaining next year includes East Main Street in the downtown area.

Currently, work is being performed on South Chicago, East Chippewa, East Delaware, and East South.

The amount of money in contracted awards so far totals \$5 million, McNamara said. That work is being financed through the 1¢ sales tax increase passed last year by voters in Dwight.

The work on West Main Street is another \$500,000, paid for with Tax Increment Financing District funds.

While the work is progressing causing a temporary inconvenience where work is currently underway, some residents are complaining to the village that since the work was completed, re-seeded grass is coming up with weeds instead of grass.

McNamara explained that the contractors are just replacing soil that was on the yards previous to the work done.

"We are not planting weeds," McNamara said, emphatically.

However, one resident countered, "That is not factual at all."

The resident indicated that prior to the work being done, there were no weeds in the front yard. Now there are weeds coming up in the portion where the grass was re-seeded.

In addition, a biodegradable mesh was placed onto the lawns after the reseeded was done.

The mesh will disintegrate eventually, but it can be removed, if the residents wish to do so.

McNamara said it can be mowed over without issues. Metal pins should be removed first. And he said grass will push up the mesh.

All About You Co-Op Flea Mart was renting the pole barn at 104 N. Rt. 129 in Gardner. It has now been sold.

Therefore, the business is relocating to two other places in Gardner, plus, some crafters are moving to a third location.

This September would have marked year-four completed at the location.

The flea market, which has been at the yellow pole barn building situated near where traffic enters or exits Interstate 55 at Gardner, has two other locations in town that will house vendors goods: 102 S. Route 53 (across the street from the pole barn) and 108 Depot Street in downtown Gardner.

Some crafters will be moving to a new location to be called Creative Gems Craft Boutique, which will open Sept. 1 on Liberty Street. The craft boutique will be run by Lois Young.

The pole barn building was to be vacated by the flea market business by the end of July while the renters take another week to take down overhead decorations and some personal equipment.

The business not only sells craft and flea market items, but also sells authentic Route 66 soda pop, and will continue to do so at the new locations.

Patty Parks, owner of the business with her husband Craig, told *The Paper* that the flea market is a big supporter of Route 66 tours, and has a guest book with visitors signing from 27 states and 22 countries.

The hours for the Flea Market are Thursday through Sunday, 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

A Dwight Police squad car utilized by the K-9 Unit was marred by graffiti while it was parked at a local business for maintenance work.

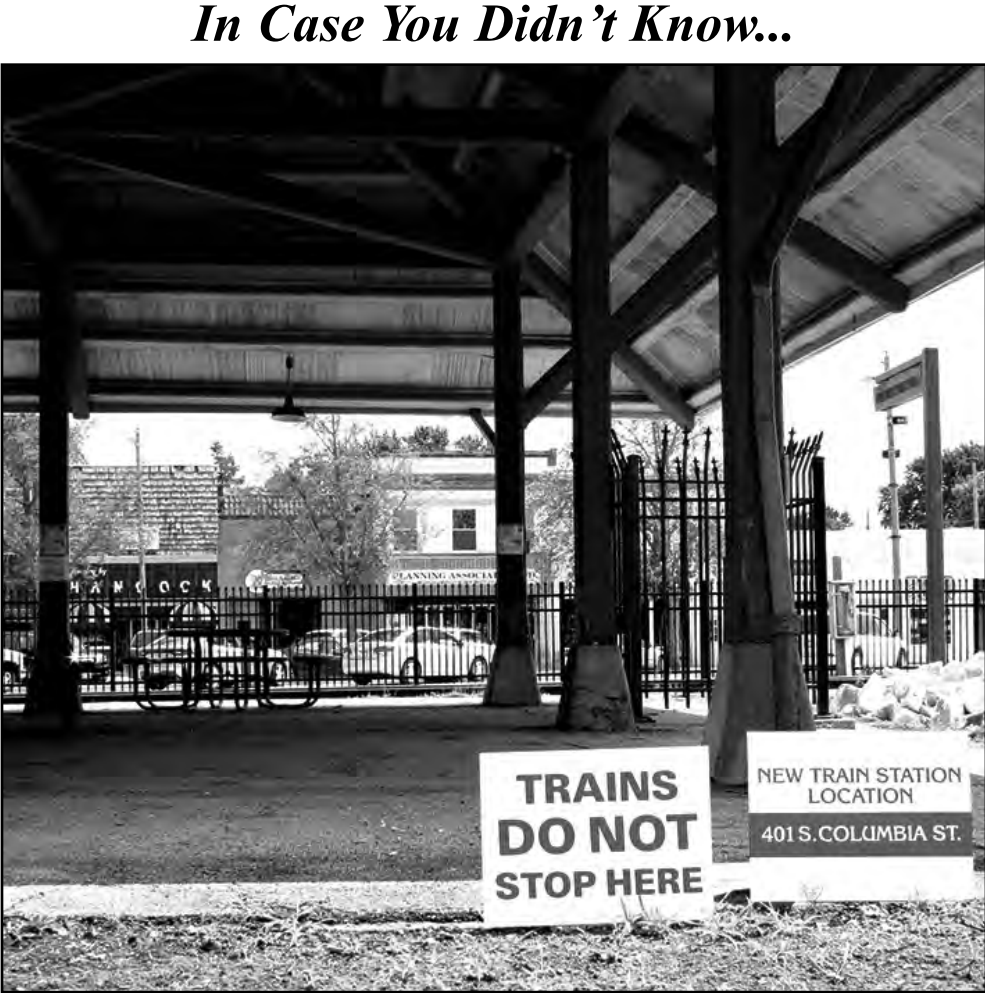
The graffiti was applied sometime overnight between July 25-26.

Odell Awaits Continuation of State Reimbursement for Walk/Bike Path

The Odell walking/biking path project is coming back to life.

At the July 10 meeting of the Odell Village Board, Village Clerk Iris Thorne reported that 80% of the village reimbursement of Eppel’s first invoice on the Trails Grant is sitting in the Odell checking account.

It will go toward the walking/biking path as soon as the state resumes reimbursement payments.

In other business, the board:

- heard from Sgt. Bunting that there has been “quite a bit of activity” in Odell in June.
- heard that the collector’s position will be advertised in *The Paper*, the *Leader* and on the Odell website.
- was updated by Attorney Ed Legner that a complaint was filed against the owners of the buildings on Wauponsie Street and a hearing date had been set for July 28.
- approved the appropriation for the Fiscal Year 2018 based on the working budget as presented.
- adopted the prevailing wage ordinance for FY 2018.
- learned that on a request for a flea market in Odell, Legner reported that a flea market is not specifically listed as a permitted use in commercial 2 zoning. The item was tabled.
- was informed by Mayor Terry Joyner that the new street signs have all been placed in town. Trustee Lisa Lambert commented on how nice the signs look.
- learned that according to Treasurer Jim Rebholz’s report, the village of Odell currently has: In checking, \$65,592.74; General Fund Money Market, \$89,607.56; Motor Fuel Tax fund, \$84,468.09; Odell MFT checking, \$500.63; Odell Tourism checking, \$34,475.09; Odell Water Savings, \$99,887.09; and Odell general certificates of deposit, \$229,774.85.

Tri-Point to Upgrade Computer Network

The Tri-Point School Board accepted a proposal from Virtek of \$49,656.18 for computer network upgrades and repair.

The decision was made at a special meeting Tuesday, July 25.

Diversify Your Investments ... But Consolidate Your Providers

You have probably heard that diversification is a key to investment success. So, you might think that if diversifying your investments is a good idea, it might also be wise to diversify your investment providers – after all, aren’t two (or more) heads better than one?

Before we look at that issue, let’s consider the first half of the “diversification” question – namely, how does diversifying your investment portfolio help you?

To illustrate: If your existing bond pays 2 percent interest, and new bonds are being issued at 3 percent, the value of your bond will fall, because no one will pay you full price for it. (Of course, it may not matter to you anyway, especially if you planned to hold your bond until maturity, at which point you can expect to get your full investment back, providing the bond issuer doesn’t default.)

Here’s the key point: Stocks and bonds often move in different directions. If you only own U.S. stocks, you could take a big hit during a market downturn, but if you own domestic and international stocks, bonds, government securities, certificates of deposit and other types of investments, your portfolio may be better protected against market volatility, and you’ll have more opportunities for positive results. (Keep in mind, though, that even a diversified portfolio can’t prevent all losses or guarantee profits.)

So, it clearly is a good idea to diversify your investment portfolio. Now, let’s move on to diversifying financial service providers. Why shouldn’t you have one IRA here and another one there, or enlist one advisor to help you with some types of investments and a different advisor assisting you with others?

Actually, some good reasons exist to consider consolidating all your investment management with one provider. For one thing, you’ll keep better track of your assets. Many people do misplace or forget about some of their savings and investments, but this will be far less likely to happen to you if you hold all your accounts in one place.

Also, if you have accounts with several different financial service providers, you might be incurring a lot of paperwork – and many fees. You can cut down on clutter and expense by consolidating your accounts.

But most important, by placing all your accounts with a single provider, possibly under the supervision of a single financial advisor, you will find it much easier to follow a single, unified investment strategy, based on your goals, risk tolerance and time horizon. You won’t get conflicting advice and you’ll receive clear guidance on important issues, such as the amounts you can afford to withdraw each year from your retirement accounts once you do retire.

Diversification and consolidation – one is good for building an investment portfolio, while the other can help you invest more efficiently and effectively. Put the two concepts together, and make them work for you.

“He imitated Caray’s voice and everything,” Gary said. “He always loved base-

Dwight Police Chief Tim Henson first met Jerry as a student at Dwight Schools when Henson was the town’s “Officer Friendly.”

“Even back then he was an entertainer, always trying to get a smile or laugh out of his classmates.”

Later, as Harvest Days Chairman when Henson became police chief, Henson said “Jerry was the face of Harvest Days.”

Henson’s description of Jerry also included a permanent positive attitude Jerry brought to his fellow human beings.

Tracy Anderson, a co-worker for more than two decades with Jerry when Beier was manager of the former Turtle’s Tap in down-

town Dwight, agreed with Henson’s assessment of Jerry as a positive person.

In his honor, the “B+” organization in Dwight, both a reference to his blood type and his positive attitude, will be generating funds for a scholarship at Dwight High School.

B+ workers will man the Harvest Days booth on Thursday, Sept. 14, the opening night of events. All proceeds from the booth will be used for the Dwight Township High School scholarship. The hope is to continue the scholarship for years, with the first award to be given at the close of the 2017-18 school year.

She said the scholarship in Jerry’s memory will be awarded to a student who has a major interest in music, plus the volunteer skills that Jerry possessed.

“Jerry and I grew up together since I was three years old,” Anderson recalls.

Gary, Jerry and Tracy were the three musketeers, always hanging out together for many years.

“We were all good friends in school,” she said, adding that she worked with Jerry for 23 years at Turtle’s Tap.

“He was outgoing, very caring and a good friend. He’s missed every day.”

Marcie Todd, another friend and Turtle’s co-worker, said Jerry “always had a smile on his face. I miss him dearly.”

Jerry also worked at *The Paper* for many years.

“He was a team player,” said Mary Boma, publisher and former neighbor of Jerry when they were growing up. “We enjoyed his quick wit and his cologne. And we miss him.”

Jerry leaves behind his wife, Catherine, of rural Blackstone, and their three children: Eden, 14; Iris, 13; and Oren, seven.

More Dwight Streets Get Green Light for Upgrades Harvest Days Plans Approved, July 24 Dwight Village Board Actions

Three more streets were approved for upgrades when the Dwight Village Board of Trustees met on July 24.

Bid packages were reviewed for street projects that include Clinton Street from Chippewa Street to Odell Road, Wilmac Street and St. Louis Street. The base bid included reconstructing the three streets with seven inches of concrete along with new curb, gutter and storm sewers. Alternate 2 bids were also received which included 4.5 inches of asphalt along with new curb, gutter and storm sewers. While the concrete streets will cost the village approximately \$165,000 more than the asphalt option, the longevity and reduced maintenance costs associated with concrete over asphalt swayed the board. The board approved a Properties Committee recommendation to accept the low bid of \$1,885,761.30 received from D Construction of Coal City for the base bid package. While work on these streets is expected to begin this year, it is not expected that all three streets will be completed leaving work to carry over into 2018.

In other business, fall is just around the corner and committees planning for the 2017 Dwight Harvest Days celebration took various requests to the village board for approval. Randy Irvin stepped out of his role as village trustee, to bring the requests before the board as this year’s Dwight Harvest Days President. Trustee Irvin abstained from all votes associated with the Harvest Days requests.

This year’s Harvest Days event will return to Dwight’s downtown area for the main festivities. Family entertainment including a carnival, flea market, craft vendors, food vendors and stage entertainment will all take place downtown. Renfrew Park will be home to Sunday’s car and tractor shows. The Harvest Days main stage location will change this year and will be set up at the north end of East Main Street.

A request for a downtown beer garden from 3 p.m. to 11 p.m. on Saturday, September 16 was approved with Trustee Jim Mixen opposing. Harvest Days is partnering with Willy’s Pub for the operation of this year’s beer garden which will be set up from just south of the corner of South Franklin Street and East Main Street heading south on East Main Street. The area will be fenced off and monitored by staff to ensure alcoholic beverages purchased from inside the beer garden are not removed

from the area. Dwight Harvest Days is not requesting the open alcohol wristband usage this year, so open alcohol in streets outside of the beer garden will be prohibited.

Sound Amplification Permits were approved for Dwight’s downtown area during the celebration. A sound permit from 12 p.m. to 11 p.m. on September 14 – 17 in the downtown carnival area was approved. A second downtown area sound amplification permit for 9 a.m. to 11 p.m. on September 15, 9 a.m. to 11 p.m. on September 16, and 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. on September 17 was approved. Also approved was a third sound permit for Renfrew Park from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Sunday, September 17.

A new parade route is planned for this year. The 2017 HD parade will step off in the Clinton Street area heading east on Mazon Avenue. The parade will proceed to Franklin Street where it will turn going north to Waupansie Street. The parade will head west on Waupansie back to

Clinton Street. The judging stand will be set up on the corner of Washington Street and Mazon Avenue. Street closures needed for the parade and parade setup areas were approved for Sunday, September 17 along with various other street closures during the four day event necessary to accommodate the carnival, downtown activities, and car and tractor shows.

2017 Dwight Harvest Days is slated to run from September 14 through September 17.

In his report to the board, Mayor Jared Anderson advised residents to be aware that ComEd will be in town trimming and clearing trees over the next several weeks. Also, beginning September 1, Dwight will participate in “Turn the Towns Teal”, a national campaign to create awareness of ovarian cancer, its subtle symptoms and risk factors. Teal ribbons will be placed around the town and remain up for the month of September.

Debra Karch provided a report to the board recapping

activities that have taken place, and strategies being developed, during her first weeks on the job. Mrs. Karch was recently hired to serve as the full time Dwight Economic Development Director and Jane Anderson was hired to serve part time as the Dwight Economic Alliance Coordinator. The DEA office is located in the old historic depot building. While Karch and Anderson are busy much of the time out in the community, there are set office hours of 9 am – 1 pm, Monday – Thursday. To reach the DEA office, phone 815.584.1830.

- the extension of a \$750,000 First National Bank of Dwight CD for 90 days.

Commissioner Dick Hileman commented the sign is not on village property.

Mayor Mike Serena commented the sign is on private property and he will contact the owners to determine the status and their interest in the sign.

Resident Dean Rankovic commented he became the owner of the sign upon his purchase of The Gardner Haus Restaurant but was unable to maintain the sign due to it being on private property. He stated that if Serena is able to arrange access to the property, he is willing to allow the Church of Hope to maintain the sign, or move it if necessary.

Danny Bell addressed the

board regarding water concerns around his property on Odell street.

Bell commented he believes the storm sewer tile may be blocked or partially blocked based on the property failing to drain following rain events. The board responded they will review the issue and seek a solution.

The board discussed and accepted the annual audit, presented by Trevor Debelak of Mack & Associates.

Debelak briefly reviewed the report, commenting the issues discovered were addressed and satisfied. Attention was called to the section comparing budget to actual, noting everything appeared normal.

La Salle County Sheriff's Police responded to a two-vehicle accident on Route 170 between N. 12th and N. 13th road near Ransom.

The accident, which was reported to have resulted in injuries, was called in at 10:34 p.m., July 30, but not all motorists were at the scene when the police arrived.

"Upon arrival the deputies located the two vehicles and only one driver," police said.

The driver, Austin Timmons of rural Ottawa, said a southbound car had crossed the center line and struck his vehicle.

Deputies and other emergency personnel from fire and EMS units searched the wreckage of the other vehicle and could not find the driver.

Life Flight, Illinois State Police and sheriff's deputies along with other rescue personnel searched the area for several hours with no results.

The Illinois State Police aircraft was requested and responded to the scene to aid in the search.

A Streator K-9 also participated in the search effort.

Route 170 was closed by State Highway crews while the search went on.

An accident reconstruction team was also dispatched.

"As the search continued, sheriff's investigators interviewed family and friends of the missing motorist," Police said.

All area hospitals were contacted and no one had been admitted to them.

La Salle EMA was called to the scene to conduct another ground search for the missing driver.

At 7:37 a.m., July 31, the La Salle County Sheriff's office received a call from the Grundy County Sheriff that they had the driver involved in the accident at a location on the Gardner Road.

Sheriff's investigators were sent to the scene to meet with Grundy County deputies. The second driver, identified as William H. Hardee of Naplate, was being transported to Morris Hospital to be treated.

The accident remains under investigation.

Students may also be required to pay other fees for consumable workbooks or project fees for supplies and materials depending upon courses for which they are enrolled.

Students will be required to supply the following information on registration day: Name of Health Insurance; Parent's place of employment and phone numbers; Family Physician and phone number; Adult to contact in case of emergency (it parent cannot be

reached); E-mail.

State law requires students entering ninth grade and students new to the district (at any grade) to present evidence of a physical examination and immunization records. Students entering ninth grade will be required to show proof of current immunizations including Tdap, MMR, polio, hepatitis B, and two doses of Varicella vaccine or a health care provider's indication of a past case of chicken pox. A new law states that all students with a diagnosis of Asthma have their doctor provide an asthma action plan at the school. Students failing to present evidence of physical examinations and immunizations will not be allowed to enter school until these requirements have been met. Physical exam forms are available in the high school office.

Incoming seniors: All students entering 12th grade (seniors) will be required to show proof of meningococcal conjugate vaccine (MCV) upon school entry. This law is to prevent a severe form of bacterial meningitis. Some students have already received a meningitis vaccine. If the vaccine was received after age 16, only one vaccine is required. If the vaccine was received prior to age 16, two vaccines are required.

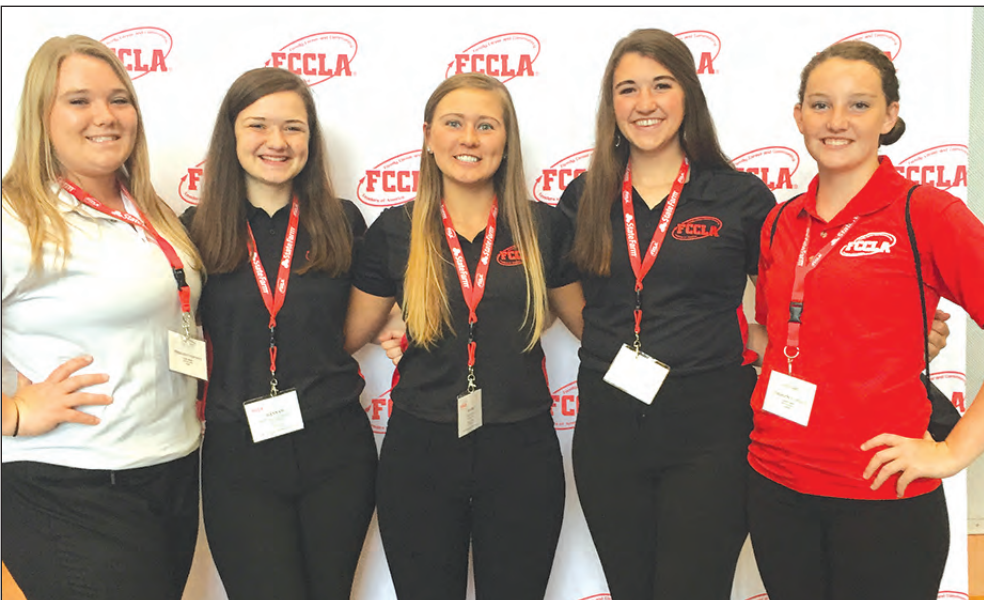
Hannah Van Der Karr was awarded the 2017

Chipotle Mexican Grill scholarship. The \$1,000 scholarship was presented at the closing of the general session.

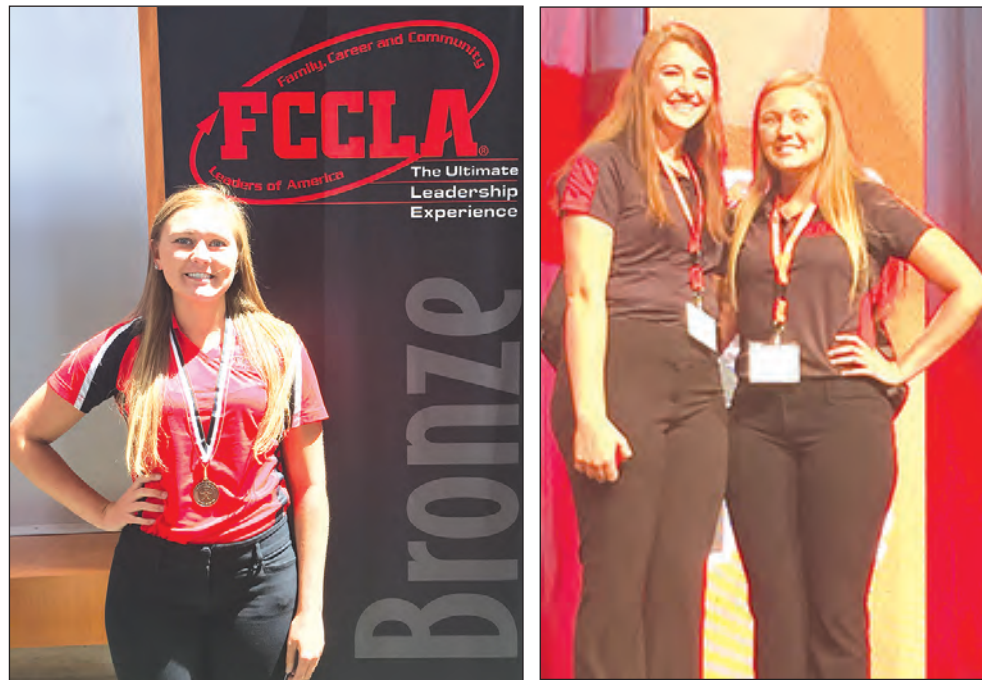

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ORDINANCE 2017-O-1

AN ORDINANCE ADOPTING THE BUDGET AND APPROPRIATIONS OF THE MAZON/VERONA/KINSMAN RESCUE SQUAD DISTRICT GRUNDY COUNTY, ILLINOIS FOR THE FISCAL YEAR BEGINNING MAY 1, 2017 AND ENDING APRIL 30, 2018

WHEREAS, the Mazon/Verona/Kinsman Rescue Squad District (the "District") is a unit of local government duly organized and operating according to the Constitution and laws of the State of Illinois, including but not limited to the Illinois Rescue Squad District Act (the "Act," 70 ILCS 2005/1 *et seq.*); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 7 of the Act [70 ILCS 2005/7], the Board of Trustees (the "Board") is the corporate authority of the District and exercises all of the powers and controls all of the affairs and property of the District; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 8 of the Act [70 ILCS 2005/8], the Board has power to take all necessary or proper steps to provide rescue services within the District and generally to do any and all things necessary or incident to the powers granted by the Act and to carry out the objects of the Act; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 4 of the Act [70 ILCS 2005/4], on April 19, 2016 the Circuit Court of Grundy County in Case 2015 MC 1 certified voter approval of the ballot question to establish the District; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 6 of the Act [70 ILCS 2005/6], on June 14, 2016 the Grundy County Chair, with the advice and consent of the County Board by resolution appointed the inaugural five (5) trustees of the District; and

WHEREAS, the District is subject to provisions of the Illinois Municipal Budget Law [the "Law," 50 ILCS 330/1 *et seq.*]; and

WHEREAS, Section 3 of the Law [50 ILCS 330/3] requires the District adopt a combined annual budget and appropriation ordinance, by which ordinance the Board may appropriate such sum or sums of money as may be deemed necessary to defray all necessary expenses and liabilities of the District, and in such annual budget and appropriation ordinance shall specify the objects and purposes for which such appropriations are made, and the amount appropriated for each object or purpose; and

WHEREAS, the District's Board caused to be prepared in tentative form a Budget, and the Secretary of this Board has made the same conveniently available for public inspection for at least thirty (30) days prior to final action thereon; and

WHEREAS, a public hearing was held as to such Budget on the 12th day of July, 2017 and Notice of said hearing was given at least thirty (30) days prior thereto as required by law, and the Board having met all other applicable legal requirements.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Trustees of the Mazon/Verona/Kinsman Rescue Squad District, Grundy County, Illinois, as follows:

Section 1: The Board finds and determines the above recitals to be true and correct and incorporates them as if written here in full.

Section 2: That the fiscal year of this Rescue Squad District is hereby fixed to begin on May 1, 2017, and to end on April 30, 2018.

Section 3: That the following Budget containing an estimate of the revenues available and expenditures and the appropriations contained therein be and the same is hereby adopted as the budget and appropriations for this Rescue Squad District for said fiscal year; and the following sums of money:

House Vote on Nuclear Storage Bill Has Illinois Implications

Environmental groups have a warning for the nation’s leaders: Haste will make more waste.

A House vote could come as soon as this week on legislation known as the “Nuclear Waste Policy Amendments Act of 2017.” The bill would mean building more temporary storage facilities around the nation to hold high-level radioactive waste from nuclear reactor sites, both current and closed. It calls for reopening the Yucca Mountain disposal site in Nevada.

David Kraft, director of the Nuclear Energy Information Service, said it also would double the amount of this waste coming through Illinois and other states by road, rail and barge.

“In addition, it’s calling for the construction of new waste sites around the country, which are both expensive and unnecessary,” he said. “And the bottom line to all this is Illinois is going to become the crossroads for high-level radioactive waste for the next couple of decades.”

House Resolution 3053 is

sponsored by Rep. John Shimkus, R-Ill., who said it would modernize the energy infrastructure and environmental laws and enhance the nation’s energy security.

Kraft countered that the Shimkus bill serves the interests of a nuclear power industry that is in decline. Instead, he said, he thinks the nation needs an environmentally responsible plan for a permanent disposal facility.

“Illinois is probably the worst offender, because we make more high-level radioactive waste than any other state because we have 11 operating reactors,” he said. “But wishing for a facility that’s flawed, like Yucca Mountain is, to work is a lot like wishing for a pony for Christmas.”

The legislation is being opposed by dozens of environmental groups that have dubbed the plan “mobile Chernobyl.” They have warned it would send spent fuel rods from nuclear reactors through 100 major cities in 44 states and 370 congressional districts.

Ethanol Exports a Bright Spot For Corn Demand

As corn prices remain low, new markets are vital. As far as corn goes, your corn-based ethanol is finding a home in export markets around the world. One of them may be unexpected: Brazil. Brazil has long been a user of high-inclusion-rates of ethanol blends in their nation’s fuel supply.

But that ethanol has historically been derived from their own domestic sugar cane crop. As the world sugar price has risen, much of that sugar has gone to the world market for sweetener purposes, rather than fuel. This market

shift opens up the Brazilian ethanol market for corn-based ethanol to head south. This report provides more information. It comes from the Renewable Fuels Association blog.

U.S. ethanol exports surged to 119.2 million gallons (mg) in May, up 37% from April shipments, according to government data released this morning and analyzed by the Renewable Fuels Association (RFA). The total represented a new record for the month of May and was 75% higher than year-ago shipments. Brazil and Canada were

again the top destinations for U.S. exports, combining to receive 80% of total exports in May.

Brazil imported 64.3 mg in May, while Canada took in 31.3 mg of U.S. ethanol. Year-to-date U.S. ethanol exports stood at 594 mg through May, indicating an annualized export total of 1.43 billion gallons.

Through May, Brazil has imported 255.1 mg of U.S. ethanol, compared to 279.1 mg for the entire 2016 calendar year.
