Father Show Reddy Allam officially moved into the Herscher rectory July 31.

He will be the parish priest for St. Margaret Mary Catholic Church in Herscher, Sacred Heart in Goodrich, and St. James the Apostle in Irwin.

there by Donovan.

She came to Futures as the staff nurse, after spending five years as a nurse at the Fairbury Hospital.

She said the executive director at the time called her up, offering her the job.

"It sounded intriguing," she explained. She said at first she felt out of place at

Futures, but then "it grew on me." She said what held her interest these past three decades were the people Futures

Unlimited serves. Futures owns the Dwight Learning Center and two sites in Pontiac, the Mary Beth Taylor Learning Center and home office. Futures also oversees six residential houses

There are a total of 300 people served, including 126 in developmental training.

Clients are people with developmental disabilities, in various degrees. Services include residential, job placement employment services, and developmental training.

Sometimes, Futures may assist people, for example, in obtaining their GED high school equivalent certificate, or help them learn skills to be interviewed for jobs, or train people in specific job skills.

Futures Unlimited is a private, non-profit organization, but receives roughly 60 percent of its funding from the State of Illinois, according to the Fiscal 2016 budget.

Further, the rates charged by Futures to the state have not been increased by the state legislature since 2006, 11 years ago.

With the current budget crisis, even though a budget has been passed, uncertainty remains regarding funding for such institutions, causing the agency to struggle finan-

'The state has a budget, but we don't know how we will be affected," Haberkorn

Meantime, Futures presses on.

She remained at first for her medical training, and stayed because she grew to be a part of the Futures Family.

"Both the clients and staff have medical issues," she said. "It is a very family-friendly place to work."

By that she means she and her husband were able to both work full-time and raise three children grown to adulthood: Keeley, 21; Kaleigh, 30; and Chris, 32.

They also have three grandkids.

Being able to juggle a job and work is only part of the reason she has been at the job for nearly 30 years.

"Patty has a heart and commitment to public service," said Shannon Dohleman, assistant director of developmental training.







Another Chicago festival, this time in the form of music and Lollapalooza. I have attended in the past, but I did not end up attending this year and enjoying the festivities. It's always interesting in Chicago when there's a big festival going on because it stretches through the entire city, some of it a fair distance away from the roots of the festival. There were people dressed as if they had just attended the festival throughout the weekend. With over 400,000 attendees it makes sense that they would be trickled throughout the rest of the city.

This year, as with many of the past years, a local artist stole the show with the headlining performance: this time it was Chance The Rapper. I saw there were estimates in the range of 80,000-100,000 people at his set, which is banana land.

The thing that you often run into with festivals, of which I'm not the biggest fan, as opposed to just a concert for a specific artist, is that of the accessibility to everything. Often times at bigger festivals it becomes very hard to navigate from stage to stage, whereas with just a single artist/stage, everything is right there in front of you, and there isn't much moving around involved.

Also, this might just be me being a little bit of a music snob, but the crowd just isn't the same when there is a bunch of people mixed in who are just general, or passive fans of an artist, as opposed to a room full of people who only came to see that artist. It just can't be compared, when there are songs you can sing along with, or what have you. The room full of fans just to see the specific artist usually carries a different aura.

I decided to attend a Lollapalooza after-show for that specific reason. It featured two artists who had previously performed at the festival that day, but for the reasons previously mentioned, it created a great atmosphere for a show. It was 1,000 people in a small venue, who all came to see the same artist(s) as opposed to 100K of whom maybe 20% of them really want to see the current artist.







Gov. Rauner issues amendatory veto to ensure school funding bill is fair, equitable for all students

On Tuesday, Gov. Bruce Rauner issued an amendatory veto to Senate Bill 1, the school funding bill. The matter now heads to the Illinois General Assembly, where the governor has respectfully requested that lawmakers uphold his changes. If these changes are upheld, Illinois will achieve historic education funding

More than a year ago, Gov. Rauner established the Illinois School Funding Reform Commission. This group came together on a bipartisan basis to study the way Illinois funds its public schools, and to chart a path to a fairer and more equitable system.

The governor's amendatory veto makes the following changes to ensure an adequate and equitable school funding formula:

- · Maintains a per-district hold harmless until the 2020-2021 school year, and then moves to a per-pupil hold harmless based on a three-year rolling average of enrollment.
- · Removes the requirement of \$350M in spending
- Removes the Chicago block grant from the funding formula.
- · Removes both Chicago Public Schools pension considerations from the formula: the normal cost pick-up and the unfunded liability deduction.
- Reintegrates the normal cost pick-up for Chicago Public Schools into the Pension Code where it belongs, and finally begins to treat Chicago like all other districts with regards to the State's relationship with its teachers' pensions.
- Eliminates the PTELL and TIF equalized assessed value subsidies that allow districts to continue underreporting property wealth.
- Removes the escalators throughout the bill that automatically increase costs.

Governor signs bill to prohibit pay raises for General Assembly mem-

Co-sponsored by 20 House Republican members, 643 amends the Compensation Review Act to prohibit what would otherwise have been automatic pay hikes for State government legislative and executive elected officers and appointees, including memof the General bers Assembly. The new law also freezes the reimbursements that lawmakers can ask to cover the costs of their lodging, meals, and mileage

while on State business. The freeze on taxpayerfunded pay and benefits covers all of Fiscal Year 2018, and will be effective through June 30, 2018. The pay/benefits freeze bill was signed by Governor Rauner on July

Illinois-based firms post second-quarter gains


Illinois' economic recovery from the 2008-09 "Great Recession" has been held back for almost a decade by slow demand for revenuegenerating goods and services from the private sector. In a roundup of second-quarter financial reports, however, Crain's Chicago Business reports many of these firms are now reporting healthy sales gains that outstrip inflation. Examples of second-quarter revenue hikes at Illinois' publicly-traded firms include Caterpillar (+10%), McDonald's (+7%), Deere (+5%), and Illinois Tool Works (+5%).

Revenue hikes are used by many firms to finance expansion opportunities and capital investment. Not all Illinois firms are showing increases in revenues, with makers of consumer-oriented packaged goods (such as shelf-stable groceries) continuing to be challenged in the current economic environment. For firms following a standard calendar reporting year, the second quarter ended on June 30,

Farmers Markets Increase Access to Fresh Food

There is nothing better than slicing up a ripe garden tomato fresh off the vine. However, some may not have the means to grow fresh vegetables in their backyards.

At the Center for Rural Affairs, we work with rural communities to build healthy, sustainable, local food systems. That includes supporting farmers markets.

Farmers markets expand access to fresh, healthy food in communities that need it most. They provide affordable, competitive prices for low-income families, and many accept food vouchers.

According to the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA), more than 5,000 farmers markets across the country accept Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits, with the number of new locations increasing at an average 40 percent per year.

Vendors are reaping the

benefits. In 2014, 362,477 SNAP households made at least one purchase at a farmers market, according to the National Farmers Market Coalition. That means more families are eating healthy and fresh local fruits and vegetables.

Farmers markets also provide beginning farmers a low-cost way to enter the marketplace and grow their businesses. Small and medium existing farms can supplement their revenue by selling at markets, supporting the sustainability of family farms.

The USDA reported 8,675 markets in the country in 2016, up from 2,863 in 2000. Many consumers now have the opportunity to eat food grown within a few miles of their homes. And, that money stays in their small towns, helping local economies.






