Dwight Police Opening All Incident Reports To The Paper

Dwight The Police Department has agreed to allow The Paper to view all police incidents that are investigated each week, no matter how big or small.

Starting this week all incidents the police handle will be reported by this publication.

The decision was made Sept. 21, by Dwight Police Chief Tim Henson after a meeting with this reporter. That morning a discussion was sparked by a letter critical of the police for withholding information on incidents in Dwight. The letter appeared online at "Dwight IL Concerned Citizens" web

The anonymous letter stated that Police Chief Tim Henson "often does not report certain crimes to The *Paper* as he is trying to make the town appear to be safer

Paper."

The letter goes on to say that the writer does not agree with "his censorship of the criminal events that most other towns report to their local newspapers."

The letter added that if those criminal events "were being reported in The Paper as they should be, then perhaps those that are doing these criminal acts would be less inclined to do so, knowing that they may be seen or watched or caught."

In response, Henson told The Paper this week that in addition to the traditional ticket information, accident reports and major incidents, the incident "book" for that week will be open to The Paper to disseminate any and all reports done by the Dwight Police Department.

The Paper will ask for further details as warranted. In the discussion between

to those that would read The The Paper and the Dwight Police regarding the letter, going forward the police will report every incident, large or small.

"That way if you saw a theft of a lawn ornament and you wanted to do a story, you have 100% control of the news," Henson told this reporter.

The letter also said "censorship by any public official, no matter how small they think it is, is not their

Henson said he "felt that some of that (letter) was taken out of context. "

He added that he may not have been clear about what he was trying to say, and Henson's solution going forward is to open all incidents to the news media.

The Paper starting this week will put these incidents in the "For the Record" section under a "Police Blotter" subheading.

Mazon Home Powered By Sun, Demonstration Tour Set Oct. 7

An operator at the Exelon La Salle Nuclear Power Station in Brookfield Township is circumventing the traditional electrical grid to power his rural Mazon

But in a sense, you could say he is still using nuclear power — from the sun's rays, that is.

Unlike a nuclear power facility that heats water to steam which in turn generates electricity by powering turbines, the sun's pressure and heat in its core causes protons from hydrogen molecules to fuse and create helium. The helium produced contains less energy than the protons which were fused to make it. The excess energy is released in the form of heat. This happens millions of times a second generating massive heat

every one on our planet.

"It doesn't make sense not to do it (use solar energy)," said Earthling Jeffrey Hodgen, rural Mazon.

In the case of the Hodgen home, he is using cells on the roof of his outbuilding to convert the sun's nuclear fusion-generated heat into electricity to power a 3,100 square foot home for four Hodgen family residents (him, his wife and two children) and the unattached outbuilding housing lawn equipment and other tools, which is 240 additional square feet.

The Illinois Solar Energy Association is hosting its 11th annual free tour, and as a part of the 130-home event, Hodgen's house will be available to the public from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m., Saturday, Oct. 7.

In a news release issued

which warms everything and by the association Sept. 18, it said this tour has attracted more than 1,000 attendees across Illinois in recent vears.

> "The tour affords participants a direct perspective on the costs, processes, as well as the economic and environmental benefits of going solar," the news release explained. Hodgen's home is at 2775 South Gorman Road, rural Mazon.

> So why convert from securing your electricity from the utility to generating your own power?

Because the system pays for itself in five years and after that, the energy is free.

In the United States today, electricity is generated by nuclear power or burning limited fossil fuels like natural gas or coal.

"In 25 years, it is estimated I will pay \$75,000 in elec-(continued on page 3)

Tri-Point Deficit Spending Ends

Extra Money from Wind Farm, Transportation

The Tri-Point School District ended its trend for deficit spending with the 2017-18 school year budget approved Sept. 18, and that wasn't a lot of hot air.

But air and wind are in fact major contributing factors to the "windfall."

Superintendent Bryan told The Paper last week that two major factors contributed to the district climbing out of the debt

1) Early tax money from Ford County in June of 2018 for one-half of the revenue the district will be owed in 2018. There are 67 turbines in Ford County, with the rest (30) of the turbines in Kankakee County. The early

tax revenue is projected to total \$272,000 in the education fund, \$73,000 in the building fund and \$54,000 in the transportation fund.

2) The transportation fund will receive 84% of its claim from the state for the 2017-18 school year, an additional 13% compared to 2016-17, or \$36,000 in revenue.

Overall, the budget will include \$6.35 million in expenditures compared to revenue of \$6.4 million.

"I came here five years ago," Bryan explained. "At that time they were in deficit spending. The board and previous administration made cuts to staff just before I walked in the door."

He said at that point, the school board believed they

had cut all that could be cut without cutting services and educational programs to students.

But the wind farm revenue was coming, although it came about two years later than expected.

"We survived," Bryan said, utilizing borrowing to stem the tide of red ink.

"We felt there was light at the end of the tunnel," he added. This is the first budget of many that we will be able to put cash back into the bank.'

They are projecting putting aside up to \$500,000 per vear for a while starting in the 2018-19 school year.

He said that money may be earmarked for upgrading the building facilities in the

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Here's Your Retirement Countdown

• One to three years before retirement – To help increase your income stream during retirement, you may want to convert some – but likely not all – of your growth-oriented investments, such as stocks and stock-based vehicles, into income-producing ones, such as bonds. Keep in mind, though, that even during your retirement years, you'll still likely need your portfolio to provide you with some growth potential to help keep you ahead of infla-

• One year before retirement - Evaluate your retirement income and expenses. It's particularly important that you assess your health-care costs. Depending on your age at retirement, you may be eligible for Medicare, but you will likely need to pay for some supplemental coverage as well, so you will need to budg-

Also, as you get closer to your actual retirement date, you will need to determine an appropriate withdrawal rate for your investments. How much should you take each year from your IRA, 401(k) and other retirement accounts? The answer depends on many factors: the size of these accounts, your retirement lifestyle, your projected longevity, whether you've started taking Social Security, whether your spouse is still working, and so on. A financial professional can help you determine an appropriate withdrawal rate.

These aren't the only steps you need to take before retirement, nor do they need to be taken in the precise order described above. But they can be useful as guidelines for a retirement countdown that can help ease your transition to the next phase of your life.

In his particular case, his system produces so many kilowatts when the sun is shining unobscured. It will be less on overcast or cloudy

He just installed the system in July, and on his first two bills, he paid ComEd \$30 the first month to provide power to his home which has electric appliances like stove. In the second month, his bill was \$15, plus he had 320 kw hours "banked" for when the sun does not shine. His bills were as high as \$250 or more during peak summer months.

After a year, the "banked" power resets to

He can monitor his system on his phone, which gives him updates every two hours.

The power consumption, should it exceed his output, will be supplied by ComEd, first from his own "bank" of electricity, then from ComEd at the going electric

He said he is doing the open house on the Solar tour this year because a lot of people do not know how solar energy works and how they can use it in their own homes to their advantage.

This 12.22 kw solar system cost \$28,500. A third of that will come back in the form of tax credits on his

income tax (approximately \$9,500). Also, he earns \$150 per Megawatt produced (1,000 kilowatts). In five years, he estimates this will total roughly \$15,000 to \$20,000, thus the five yearpayback on his system.

He did not purchase a battery for the system, believing buying back power from the grid is more economical. After a year, he may look into a battery for his system to store electricity he produces.

He said on sunny days, his system produces 70 to 80 kws while it produces 30 kws on cloudy days. There is no production of electricity at night when the sun is down, of course.

Herscher Unit 2 Projected To Earn More Than It Spends

by Myke Feinman Managing Editor

The Herscher Unit 2 School District is projected to end the 2017-18 school year in the black, the first year to eliminate red ink in more than 10 years.

year includes \$25 million in expenditures and slightly more than \$25 million in income.

In the three largest funds, the education fund is \$100,000 in the black; operations and maintenance is \$3,000 in the black; and transportation is in the red by \$50,000.

The budget was approved by the Unit 2 school board Monday, Sept. 18.

"This is the first year in over a decade the budget is projected to be balanced," Superintendent Rich Decman told The Paper last week.

Decman discussed the new state education funding formula, saying that the bill will allow Unit 2 to receive the same funding as the pre-

"We have adequate funds compared to many districts around us," Decman said according to the new formu-

Unit 2 is considered 74% adequately funded under the new formula.

He added Reed-Custer, with its nuclear plant revenue, is considered 102% adequately funded.

In short, the new formula will have "little or no impact" on Unit 2 funding going forward, Decman explained.

The district will also use its financial powers to purchase \$900,000 in working cash bonds, which will be paid back in the same year, as a cash-flow maneuver to make sure it can meet expenses during lean times.

"The working cash is always one-year bonds," he

Enrollment is down for the 2017-18 school year, so in the future, without new housing starts, it may start to eat away at Unit 2 revenue.

More home building means additional property tax revenue and possibly more students.

In other action, the board hired three paraprofessionals (two teacher's aides at Bonfield): Kelly Kelley, and Sabrina Smith; and Elaine Noffke, Herscher Intermediate transportation

The school board also set the Herscher High School graduation date for 2018 as June 3, 2 p.m.

Although natural gas pipeline incidents are uncommon, these tips will help you identify a possible leak and know what to do.

LOOK for blowing dirt, discolored vegetation or continued bubbling of standing water.

LISTEN near a natural gas appliance or line; there may be a hissing or roaring sound when natural gas is leaking.

SMELL the distinctive, rotten egg odor associated with natural gas. Natural gas is colorless and odorless so we add an odorant with this scent for easy detection. You should take action any time you detect even a small amount of this odor in the air.

AVOID touching anything that may cause a spark. This includes starting a car engine or using cell phones, lighters, matches, cigarettes, light switches or landlines. Natural gas is non-toxic, lighter than air and displaces oxygen. Keep away from ignition sources because natural gas can burn near a spark, possibly causing a fire or explosion. In severe cases, if not used properly, it can also lead to asphyxiation.

LEAVE the area **IMMEDIATELY** if you detect a natural gas leak. Don't try to identify the source or stop the leak.

CALL Nicor Gas at 888.Nicor4U(642.6748) or 911 once you are safely away from the possible leak site. Stay away from the area until an Nicor Gas representative or emergency personnel indicate it is safe to return.

Note: Always leave if you suspect a leak. Do not solely rely on sense of smell. Be aware that some persons may not be able to detect the odorant because they have a diminished sense of smell, olfactory fatigue, or because the odor is being masked by other odors in the area. Certain conditions may cause the odorant to diminish so that it is not detectable.

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Dwight High School District Approves Healthy Budget September BOE Actions

Following a public hearing on September 20, the Dwight Township High School Board of Education approved its Fiscal Year 2017 – 18 Budget.

The financially sound District #230 opens FY18 with a beginning Education Fund balance of \$3,617,360 with \$3,777,849 of anticipated revenues and \$3,606,806 in budgeted expenditures for an end balance of \$3,783,403 or a difference of \$166,043. The Education Fund pays for the bulk of the school's annual expenditures covering areas such as salaries and benefits. Over all funds, the Dwight High School District has a beginning balance of \$5,564,172 with proposed revenues of \$5,701,278 and anticipated expenditures of \$5,377,498 for proposed end balance of \$5,887,952 or a difference of \$323,780.

The State of Illinois currently owes the DTHS District \$93,607.33 for the 2016-17 school year and \$56,675.38 for 2017-18.




