Mazon FS Grain Hosts Open House To Showcase New Pit

Just in time for the 2017 corn and soybean harvest, FS Grain in Mazon held an open house Sept. 26 to showcase its new leg and pit to take in grain, the third pit at the site just west of Mazon on the Grand Ridge Road.

The event included a sponsored Compeer Financial, a farm service financial center, and served by Seneca High School FFA students.

Roughly 200 area farmers attended the event and tour throughout the day.

According to Dan Tarnowski, facilities manager at the elevator, the new leg is capable of taking in 20,000 bushels of grain per

hour.

At the site, Mazon's FS Grain can store up to 730,000 bushels of beans and 3.4 million bushels of corn, including an outside

The site became FS Grain Sept. 1, 2015, Tarnowski


It is capable of loading cargo containers driven over the road by semi-tractor

Agriculture experts are predicting lower yields this year compared to last year due to intermittent rains and sometimes heavy rains causing flooded spots that killed the crop in small areas.

Yields can be highly varied from farm to farm, and even on one farmer's field.

Dwight Police Chief Clarifies Policy Regarding Info Release

Editor's Note: In honor of both National Newspaper Week (Oct. 1 through 7) and because it is timely because of recent discussions regarding police news in Dwight, this article contains police and newspaper policies about printing crime news.

Police Chief Tim Henson clarified the position of the Dwight Police Department in the wake of the announcement Sept. 27 in the issue of The Paper that all reports are open to The Paper.

He said there are instances when some information is not allowed to be

released for various reasons. Here is the outline Henson submitted to The

Paper for publication:

1. The police will not release information if they are actively working an investigation and they believe by releasing the information, that it would adversely affect the outcome or taint the investigation.

2. The police will not release information of an arrest if that person is actively working as a confidential source with the

police. 3. There have been several high-profile cases in investigation. Dwight in which citizens have been upset because releasing the information in in traffic cases only. a timely manner. They even go on to believe the police are incompetent, because everyone knows what happened, but the police are not releasing the information. Please remember that a citizen can speculate. The police are only allowed to operate on facts. The citizen's information may end

however until the police get results back from the lab, they cannot release the information in an active

4. Juveniles. The police are not allowed to release they believe they know the most juvenile (under age 18) information and therefore cases to The Paper. They will blame the police for not release juvenile information

The newspaper is subject to some of the same laws that restrict the release of information, but it is allowed by law, for example, to print the names of juveniles in the case of crimes if the name of the perpetrator is known.

The Paper's policy is to not do so, however, to prevent the juvenile being stigup being true and correct, matized as a criminal.

The following are policies this publication uses in reports from the police:

1. This publication will not print the names of juveniles involved in crimes with the exception of moving traffic violations.

2. This publication does not print the names and address of victims of crimes. The Paper is not interested in victimizing the victims.

3. If the newspaper finds out about a crime, if the publication can corroborate the information with official agencies, it will be printed. But if The Paper has documentation or solid sources, it will print the facts without authorization from official organizations. That is true for crimes or any other news printed in these pages.

4. *The Paper* believes that the business of government is the public's business. Therefore, everything that is public record is subject to publication, as long as printing it serves a public interest, like information the public should have about a crime wave in town. Anything stated in a public forum is subject to being printed in this newspaper.

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Odell Village Accepts Bid For Replacing Clearwell Liner

The Village of Odell's leaking Clearwell will soon have a new liner that does not leak.

The liner had been replaced but was leaking forcing the village to go into litigation concerning fixing the issue. The village remains in litigation with the contractor, and cannot discuss the case.

Meantime, at its Sept. 11 meeting, the board accepted a bid of \$149,280 from DN Tanks, pending financing and pending bond.

Village Attorney Ed Legner advised the board to contact DN Tanks to notify the contractor their proposal was accepted, contingent upon approval of the terms of the contract.

The Clearwell is a storage tank to hold treated water before it goes into the water tower, according to Acting Mayor Brian Mills.

Mills took over as Acting Mayor to fill out a portion of the term when former Mayor Terry Joyner left the position due to family obligations and work pressure.

Mills will remain as acting mayor, with voting privileges, until a new Mayor is elected in April of 2019. Whoever runs for Mayor will fill out the remaining two years of Joyner's term.

Mills, who remains a voting trustee as well, said the Mayoral job is a lot more involved than he thought it would be.

"The Mayor is in charge of everything here in Odell," Mills explained. "It is a lot more work than I ever was Village Hall sidewalk until imagining."

He said he is not sure if he will run for Mayor in April of 2019.

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Consider Multiple Factors When Creating Retirement Plans

If you think you'd like to have a "second act" in your working life, you might need some additional training, or you might just put your existing expertise to work as a consultant. If you do launch a new career, it could clearly affect your financial picture. For one thing, if you add a new source of earned income, you might be able to withdraw less from your retirement accounts each year. (Keep in mind, though, that once you reach 70 ½, you will have to take at least some withdrawals from your traditional IRA and your 401(k) or other employer-sponsored retirement plan.) On the other hand, if you keep earning income, you can continue putting money into a traditional IRA (until you're

70 ½) or a Roth IRA (indefinitely) and possibly contribute to a retirement plan for the self-employed, such as a SEP-IRA or an "owner-only" 401(k).

• Philanthropy - During your working years, you may have consistently donated money to charitable organizations. And once you retire, you may want to do even more. For one thing, of course, you can volunteer more of your time. But you also might want to set up some more permanent method of financial support. Consequently, you might want to work with your legal advisor and financial professional to incorporate elements of your investment portfolio into your estate plans to provide more support for charitable groups.

As you can see, your retirement goals can affect your investment strategy - and vice versa. So, think carefully about what you want to accomplish, plan ahead and get the help you need. It takes time and effort to achieve a successful retirement, but it's worth it.



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
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Team Loyalty All Year

Dwight Village Board Actions for September 25

The Dwight Village Board of Trustees met in regular session on Monday, September 25. Mayor Jared Anderson and Trustee Jim Mixen were absent. Justin Eggenberger served as President Pro Tem.

Several positive comments were given with regard to this year's successful Harvest Days celebration. Chief of Police Tim Henson said it was the quietest Harvest Days he could recall, with regard to any problems, during his 30 years with the Dwight Police.

Village Trustee and Harvest Days President Randy Irvin thanked all of the various Village departments for their help during the event and thanked everyone for their support.

Karch, Dwight Economic Development Director, presented a Labor Market Analysis Study result from the Work Force Board of Grundy, Livingston and Kankakee Counties. An existing conditions overview shows Grundy and Kankakee counties are considered labor surplus areas for FY 2017 according to the Illinois Department of Employment Security.

Labor surplus areas have an average unemployment rate at least 20 percent above the average rate for all states plus the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico during the previous two calendar years. The purpose of the labor surplus area is to direct Federal Procurement contract money to these areas where people are in the most

severe economic needs. Contracts are awarded to employers who agree to carry out at least over 50 percent of the value of the contract in the labor surplus area so a certain percentage of their employees have to come from that area.

The study results indicate a potential economic development opportunity for the impacted counties, but an opportunity not without challenges, according to Karch. A large construction trade's population which draws unemployment 3 - 4 months out of the year contributes to the results. Karch along with the Work Force Board will continue to review the study and dig deeper into its potential impact on the area.

Governor Bruce Rauner was in Dwight on his annual motorcycle ride through central Illinois to Springfield on Saturday,

September 23. Rauner along with his motorcade stopped at Dwight's historic Ambler-Texaco Station and visited with locals. The Governor's ride promoted tourism and travel on Rt 66.

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

Learn to Recognize Fall Allergies

Sneezing, runny nose, trigger." itchy, watery eyes, scratchy throat and cough can be eral lesser-known causes of symptoms of fall allergies. Related sinus and nasal inflammation can lead to congestion and headaches, causing an overall feeling of miserableness.

"Weed pollen, predominantly ragweed, is the most common trigger for allergic symptoms in the fall," says Hetal Amin, M.D., Allergist-Immunologist with Morris Hospital & Healthcare Centers. "Various molds, such as those found in wet mown grass and damp leaves, are another common when used correctly, many

Dr. Amin also notes sevallergy symptoms. "Dust mites can contribute to indoor allergies in the fall, since they get stirred into the air when the furnace is first turned on," she adds. "Also, foods such as melons, bananas, and zucchini can trigger symptoms due to the similarity of their food proteins to ragweed pollen."

Allergy sufferers typically resort to over-the-counter medications such as antihistimines, nasal sprays, and eye drops. While effective

people mistake allergies for cold symptoms and may use the wrong medications.

Dr. Amin offers many strategies for individuals who suffer from fall allergies, including keeping windows shut, running the airconditioner to re-circulate indoor air, and using HEPA filters to trap pollen, dust mites, and mold. She also recommends limiting decongestant nasal sprays to five days, as they can cause "rebound congestion" and make symptoms worse.




