# Gardner's Dibble Ent., Trucking **Grow Into Major Competitor**

People in Gardner may have noticed four new 90,000 gallon propane storage tanks being installed at Dibble Enterprises, just south of Gardner's Subway restaurant.

The site also includes a new scale for semi trucks to be weighed before heading out on the road to many different states.

This storage will be in addition to the current 150,000 gallons of storage for liquefied petroleum gas, (commonly known as propane) at the Dibble Trucking site, just down the road on Old Route 66.

Back in 1989, when Ron Dibble Jr. bought out the ailing Chance Freight Lines of

customers. Today, Dibble serves more than 3,000 propane customers.

But the business is more than just a propane delivery company for rural residents and grain elevators who need the fuel for space heating or drying grain.

There are actually two companies now: Dibble Trucking and Dibble Enterprises, each housed on 10 acres off Old Route 66 in Gardner, including more than one acre for a truck wash facility.

Dibble Trucking brags 41 semi-tractors, 104 liquefied petroleum trailers, 120 flatbeds, step decks, containers, and other specialty trailers. Dibble Enterprises has four Bobtail Truck tankers to

Gardner, he had 15 propane deliver residential heating propane. In 1991, his company boasted a total of two office women and five drivers including Ron.

The combined companies employ 65 people including some who have been with Ron from the start: Lisa Hillman, office worker since September of 1990; Scott Douglas, driver since 1986 before Chance Freight Lines was purchased; and Mike Calhoun, with the company since March 1991.

He now also employs his daughter, Allie, who does marketing for the company. Ron, himself, still drives a truck like he did at the start in 1981.

Another family member, Allie's uncle, Kyle Sulz-(continued on page 3)

# Ransom Blue Jay Tests Positive For West Nile Virus Oct. 5

The La Salle County Health Department announced in a news release Oct. 10 that a blue jay from Ransom tested positive for West Nile virus.

The bird was originally collected and tested by the county health department Sept. 25, but testing was "inconclusive," the news release said.

The blue jay was forwarded to the Veterinary Diagnostic Laboratory at the University of Illinois which confirmed the positive result.

The bird was "shipped out to the lab on Sept. 25," Jenny said Barrie, spokesperson for the health department.

"Based on the lab report we received, the bird was tested on Oct. 5," she said. "Per lab protocol, they forward the results to the Illinois Department of Public Health. We received notification from the Illinois Department of Public Health on Oct. 6."

The IDPH web site shows that as of Oct. 12, there have been 62 deaths in Illinois so far this year, two in Kankakee County, one in Will county, and a major portion (32) in Cook County.

There are no reported deaths associated with West Nile virus in Grundy, Livingston, nor La Salle counties to date.

Barrie told *The Paper* last week that until there is a frost, the mosquitoes that carry the virus are still active in Illinois.

Additional activity includes mosquitoes which

tested positive in July, and a crow which tested positive in August. West Nile virus is transmitted through the bite of a Culex pipiens mosquito, commonly called a house mosquito, which has picked up the virus by feeding on an infected bird.

Common West Nile virus symptoms include fever, nausea, headache and muscle aches.

Symptoms may last from a few days to a few weeks.

Four out of five people infected with West Nile virus will not show any symp-

However, in rare cases, severe illness including meningitis or encephalitis, or even death, can occur.

People older than 50 and immunocompromised individuals are at higher risk for severe illness from West Nile virus.

Precautions include practicing the three "R's" reduce, repel and report.

**REDUCE** - Make sure doors and windows have tight-fitting screens. Repair or replace screens that have tears or other openings.Try to keep doors and windows shut. Eliminate, or refresh

each week, all sources of standing water where mosquitoes can breed, including water in bird baths, ponds, flowerpots, pet bowls, clogged rain gutters, wading pools, old tires, and any other containers.

REPEL - When outdoors, wear shoes and socks, long pants and a long-sleeved shirt, and apply insect repellent that contains DEET, picaridin, oil of lemon eucalyptus, or IR 3535 according to label instructions. Consult a physician before using repellents on infants.

REPORT - Report locations where you see water sitting stagnant for more than a week such as roadside ditches, flooded yards, and similar locations that may produce mosquitoes.

The local health department or city government may be able to add larvicide to the water, which will kill any mosquito eggs.

### **Put Lessons From** "Retirement Week" to Work

(continued from page 1) berger, is manager of the Enterprises' business.

"When I bought Chance Freight Lines, I had gone to work for them and knew their customers better than they did," Ron explained.

He said he started hauling aerosol, which required special permitting and equipment. So he reasoned it may be a good idea to haul propane as well. Both products are now a major part of what Dibble hauls.

When there was an extremely cold winter after a lot of propane was needed to dry grain that fall, the price of propane began soaring (winter of 2012-13). Other factors like the repurposing of a midwest propane pipeline resulted not so much in a shortage, but in a situation where people could not get needed propane to proper locations.

Dibble was the only supplier of propane in the area that had adequate supply for both his own customers and for competitors, who reluctantly purchased propane from Dibble when they had no choice, Dibble explained. Dibble enjoyed a great deal of success that winter.

The Enterprise business also installs tanks for farms and larger tanks for commercial and industrial use.

His combined operations include a truck maintenance shop, and a fabrication shop that can refurbish used tankers for semis to haul. Some old tankers were built in the 1960s, and are essentially new except for the round steel body which uses hardened steel that is fourtenths of an inch thick.

Each tank is hydrotested every five years, checking for leaks under pressure greater than normal. LP gas,

or propane, is normally at 150 pounds of pressure per square inch within the large tanks hauled by semis.

Part of his business is hauling for area nuclear power plants, taking a truckload of contaminated laundry each day, for example, when the plants have scheduled outages for refueling twice a year.

His business has been hauling for area nuclear plants for years, not just laundry, but specialized equipment.

Hauling hazardous materials, including flammable liquefied petroleum gas (propane), requires a "ton of paperwork and is highly regulated," Ron explained.

Not only has the business been growing steadily over the years, but Dibble expects continued growth going for-

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

and types of vegetables and fruits. Phytochemicals are substances that occur naturally in plants, and there are thousands of these substances offering various benefits.

The Produce for Better Health Foundation notes that a varied, colorful diet incorporates lots of different types of phytochemicals, which the PBH says have disease-preventing proper-

The NIA also advises that men and women over 50 make sure at least half the grains in their diets are whole grains.

Numerous studies have discovered the various bene-

fits of whole grains, which are loaded with protein, fiber, antioxidants and other nutrients. Whole grains have been shown to reduce the risk for diseases such as type 2 diabetes, heart disease and some types of cancer.

Another potential hurdle men and women over 50 may encounter is a change in their sense of smell and taste. A person's sense of smell may fade with age, and because smell and taste are so closely related, foods enjoyed for years may no longer tantalize the taste buds.

That can be problematic, as many people instinctually add more salt to foods they

find bland.

According to the U.S. Office of Disease Prevention and Health Promotion, older adults should consume no more than 1,500 milligrams of sodium per day.

That equates to roughly 3/4 teaspoon of salt. Older men and women should resist the temptation to use salt to add flavor to foods, instead opting for healthy foods that they can still smell and taste.

In addition, men and women should mention any loss of their sense of smell to their physicians, as such a loss may indicate the presence of Parkinson's disease or Alzheimer's disease.

Maintaining a healthy diet after 50 may require some hard work and discipline. But the long-term benefits of a healthy diet make the extra effort well worth it.





Like a steady drumbeat, the human heart sets its own rhythm. Under normal conditions, the heart adjusts the beat to the demand of our body through its own natural pacemaker and electrical conduction system.

But on occasion, certain abnormalities can cause a person's heart rhythm to veer off its native beat.

If the beat is too fast, the heart may lose control. If the beat is too slow, the heart may fail to keep up. Once the heart is out of tempo, the body is no longer in harmo-

As Dr. Muhammad Marwali has seen, people of all ages can experience a variety of heart-rhythm conditions that can cause their heart to fall out of sync. In those instances, patients abnormal heart rhythms can benefit from pacemakers and defibrillators, which can add years, energy and hope to a person's life.

"They're lifesaving and life-changing," says Dr. Marwali, a board-certified electrophysiologist with Morris Hospital Cardiovascular Specialists who specializes in the diagnosis and management of heart-

# What is a silent stroke?

The brain is a complex organ responsible for controlling many different bodily functions. When working at optimal capacity, the brain is a wonder to behold. When illness or trauma affects the brain, various parts of the body may not work as they should.

One of the more devastating things that can affect the brain is stroke. Stroke describes a sudden stoppage of blood from reaching the brain.

Harvard Medical School states that if a large number of brain cells are starved of blood supply, they can die. With their demise, a person's memory and ability to speak and move can be compromised.

While many strokes come on suddenly, certain factors may indicate a person is at risk. Such factors may include prior heart attacks, genetics, high blood pressure, smoking, or a prior stroke. However, in a particular type of stroke — a "silent stroke" — symptoms are far more subtle and difficult to spot.

Silent cerebral infarction, often referred to as "SCI" or "silent stroke," is a brain injury likely caused by a blood clot interrupting blood flow to the brain, offers the American Stroke Associa-

Silent strokes largely go unrecognized but can lead to significant brain injury.

observation.

"From what I've seen, most patients who've received a pacemaker can feel the difference," Dr. Marwali says. "It can fix the problem and make them feel better."

### **Pacemakers**

Pacemakers, in particular, are small devices that send low, electrical pulses to pace the heart when it beats too slowly - a condition called bradycardia. People with a slow heartbeat can experience symptoms such as passing out, dizziness, shortness of breath and chest pain.

According to Marwali, a slow heartbeat can be the result of simply getting older as "wear and tear" in the heart's electrical conduction system begins taking its toll. While most pacemaker recipients are seniors, people of any age can have an inherent electrical conduction system problem that can be remedied with a pacemaker.

"Many conditions can manifest themselves as bradycardia," Dr. Marwali says. "In seniors, a slow heartbeat may indicate an arrhythmia or it may indicate heart blocks. Even in some younger patients, a slow heart beat may indicate an electrical conduction disease that causes symptoms."

**Defibrillators** 

Defibrillators, on the other hand, are typically used to treat the heart when it is beating too fast. Like pacemakers, a defibrillator is implanted in the chest with the lead - or wire - threaded to the patient's heart.

The lead senses the heartbeat and sends an electrical impulse when it detects a heart-rhythm abnormality. If it detects cardiac arrest, it delivers a shock.

Dr. Marwali says ideal candidates for defibrillators are patients with severe congestive heart failure, cardiomyopathy, congenital heart disease or an inherited disease of the heart that increases the risk for cardiac

Symptoms of these conditions can include feeling dizzy or lightheaded, palpitations, feeling the heart racing or shortness of breath.

"Both pacemakers and defibrillators are truly lifesavers," Dr. Marwali said.



# **Dwight Grade School Redbird Logo to Change**

### October Board Actions

Dwight Redbird fans may soon see a change to their familiar mascot logo. At the October 11 meeting of the Dwight Grade School Board of Education, Superintendent Dr. Richard Jancek informed the group that, due to trademark infringements with the Illinois State University Redbird logo, the Dwight Grade School is being forced to take some sort of action to address the

A logo change is a cumbersome issue and DGS has seven Redbird logos in the gymnasium alone. There are different options such as altering the current cardinal logo so that it is 80 percent or more different than the ISU Redbird or abandoning the ISU looking Redbird completely and changing to a completely different looking cardinal. There is an option to enter into a ten year contract with ISU at the cost of \$250 the first year with a nominal fee each year after to use the exact ISU Redbird but incorporated inside of the Dwight "D". Another option discussed was "painting the town green" and going Trojan across the board. However, after discussion, keeping the Districts' identities separate seemed to be the choice of most board members. Seeking community input was also discussed.

ISU is requiring an action plan from the district, but will allow DGS to sell down their inventory of Redbird items and also allow things such as the gym floor and players uniforms to be used for a normal life span before requiring the incorporated logos to be changed.

In November, more discussion will take place pending a final decision. But, regardless of the decision. the current and familiar Dwight Redbird logo will have to change.

In another matter, the board discussed possible 8th grade graduation changes. A previous board had discussed the possibility of eliminating the traditional 8th grade graduation ceremony. Earlier 8th grade graduation ceremony as it has been in the "community tradition" and not wanting to see the privilege of this recognition taken away from the students. After discussion, the board agreed to keeping status quo with its traditional graduation ceremony tentatively scheduled for Thursday, May 24, 2018.

In other business, voluntary water testing at the school last year proved nondetectable for lead contamination. However, testing this year did show detectable traces of lead levels exceeding five parts per billion. Mitigation is in process and the district is working to resolve the issues which seem to be resulting from, in part, water flow issues. In addition, construction issues could also be adding to the

elevated results. The board discussed an out of district tuition waiver option for teachers or support staff that reside outside of the district but would like their children to attend DGS. Current tuition cost for out of district students is \$7,500. Dr. Jancek was looking for a guided policy from the board on waiving tuition in this circumstance should the matter ever become a request. The board will come back for further discussion on the topic








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
