Lindsey Jensen – DTHS English Teacher

2018 ILLINOIS TEACHER OF THE YEAR

Lindsey Jensen, English teacher at Dwight Township High School, has single-handedly put Dwight on the map.

“It is my privilege to welcome all of you here today for a very special recognition honoring Mrs. Lindsey Jensen, DTHS English Teacher,” said DTHS Principal Dan Kaiser at an all-school assembly Monday afternoon.

“As most of you already know, Mrs. Jensen made headlines throughout this area and the entire state as she was selected as the Illinois Teacher of the Year this past Saturday evening.”

Jensen herself was almost at a loss for words — almost.

“I am elated, I am excited and a little bit terrified, but

ultimately I am proud that this brings attention to all of the positive things happening in education here in Dwight, Illinois,” she told *The Paper* on Monday.

She was selected as the top teacher among a field of 130,000 teachers across the state.

Superintendent Richard Jancek had only words of praise for Jensen.

“Mrs. Lindsey Jensen is an outstanding professional educator at DTHS who challenges her students every day, motivates them to push past their own limitations, makes content applicable to their lives, and all while building relationships,” Jancek said.

“On behalf of the Board of Education, administration, faculty and staff, we congratulate Lindsey on being named 2018 Illinois

Teacher Of The Year,” he added.

“I read in the Sunday *Pantagraph* that there has not been a Teacher of the Year selected from the Bloomington-Normal area for 18 years,” said Kaiser at the assembly.

“And for that person to come from Dwight Township High School is absolutely amazing,” Kaiser continued. “It may have just put our small town on the map for many people in this state. For that reason, and many more, we congratulate Lindsey Jensen today.”

Jensen was named the Illinois Teacher of the Year Saturday at an awards dinner in Bloomington.

“We are so proud of Lindsey and all she does for her students every day, going the extra mile on (continued on page 10)

LivCo Support Group Meets For Families of Drug Addicts

There are groups like Narcotics Anonymous for drug addicts, but what about the families and loved ones of those addicts?

A new such support group for Livingston County exists for families of people who died or who are struggling with opioid addiction. It is called Kyle360, named after the son and grandson of the organizers, and will meet Thursday, Nov. 2, 7 p.m., at the Grace Episcopal Church, 900 S. Manlove, Pontiac.

The group meets there twice a month on the first

and third Thursday of each month.

“I struggled with Kyle for 14 years,” said Pam Bach, of Pontiac, whose 33-year-old son died Nov. 5, 2016.

“Every place I went, they slammed the door in my face,” she continued. “You couldn't get any help. You had to have insurance. Had to drive 60 miles. And every-time you got there, no beds were available. When he passed, I just kept praying to the Lord, ‘What should I do?’ God just kind of put this in my path.”

Pam and her mother, Marie Pulliam, started the

group this year in Pontiac. The name has the number 360 to symbolize a circle, Bach said.

“360 is a circle and hopefully people can turn their lives around,” she said.

Since 1999, the number of American overdose deaths involving opioids has quadrupled and is considered by health experts to now be in epidemic proportions.

From 2000 to 2015, more than 500,000 people died of drug overdoses, with opioids accounting for the majority of the drug culprits.

The Centers for Disease

Control and Prevention found more than 64,000 people died last year from drug overdoses. That is the equivalent of 175 people dying each and every day in the United States of drug overdoses.

Locally, there were four overdose calls in Dwight last year, according to Al Metzke of the Dwight Emergency Medical Service. This year, there have also been four overdose calls, he reported, as of October.

President Trump took action Thursday, Oct. 26, to address the opioid epidemic a “public health emergency”

and said, “We can be the generation that ends the opioid epidemic.”

Locally, Dwight Police Chief Tim Henson said there are many programs in place to help addicts.

Unlike Pam Bach's situation, there is in place a new program called Safe Passage.

“Anybody can come in to the police department, no questions asked, and get into a treatment facility,” Henson explained. This program began in the summer of 2016 in Livingston County and has served four people in the Dwight area so far.

The program has connections to drug rehabilitation facilities to get the addict into a program within 24 hours, Henson said, hopefully avoiding the situation that took place for Kyle Bach.

Two programs for Livingston County residents are Chestnut in Bloomington and Gateway in Springfield.

“Friends and loved ones who know a person has a problem, I encourage them to seek help,” Henson said.

“People need to understand it is an addiction,” Henson continued. “Love and support go a long way to (continued on page 4)

Cullom Artist Donates Etchings To Be Made From Student Art

In a combined project developed by Nancy Sovinski, librarian at the Cullom Beckman Memorial Library, and Cullom artist Corey Marek, a contest starts today at Tri-Point schools.

Students will be asked to create art which will be turned into an etched sketch on a mirror by Marek.

The contest will be held from today (Nov. 1) through Dec. 1, and features three grade categories, grades sixth, seventh and eighth; grades nine and 10; and grades 11 and 12.

Tri-Point High School art teacher Charlene Bokesch-Parsons has been working with her digital art students to create posters advertising the event at schools in Cullom and Piper City.

Bokesch-Parsons will be working with junior high art

teacher Akiko Thorson-Saffer to introduce the program to the junior high students.

Marek spoke to art classes at Tri-Point High School on Oct. 27 to explain the program.

Bokesch-Parsons said students are already enthusiastic about the project.

She said at the high school, it will be an assignment, and it will be up to the student if they wish to submit it for the contest.

Marek does the glass etching as a hobby.

He has been a prison guard for the Illinois Department of Corrections for 19 years, currently working at the prison in Pontiac.

Previously, he was a guard at the women's prison in Dwight, where he watched fellow Dwight guard Jason “the Sandman” Shelton, who showed Marek the etching process.

It was only recently, however, that Marek has been doing the etchings for friends at work and relatives. It started to “snowball” he said when he did some glass etchings for his children and posted them on his Facebook Page, “Maverick Glass.”

The glass etching process takes about two hours, Marek explained.

He takes a glass plate or mirror, cleans it and attaches contact paper, being sure to eliminate any air bubbles.

The image is transferred onto the glass and cut out by hand.

The spaces where paper is no longer present is blasted with a sand blaster to create the image.

The paper is removed to reveal smooth glass where there has been no sand blasting (negative space in the artwork).

He has been experimenting with creating etchings on

plexiglass and trying to etch both sides of the glass as well.

He said he hopes this will encourage students to learn about and create art in their lives.

“I wanted to do something that puts myself out there and create a response,” Marek explained for the motivation for the project at Tri-Point schools.

He already has a connection to public education as his wife, Carey, is a teacher at schools in Clifton. The couple is a blended family with six children and two dogs.

He said this is just a hobby and he began doing it “just to see if I could do it.”

Gas Edges Up 0.7 Cents

Gasoline prices across the nation inched up 0.7 cents from the prior week, averaging \$2.471 as of Monday, Oct. 30.

"The overall robust demand picture for gasoline which, as we saw in Wednesday's weekly status report by the EIA, contributed to a 4.4 million barrel draw in stockpiles," said Dan McTeague, petroleum analyst for GasBuddy. "A rise in the price of oil is almost inevitable."

Cypress Creek Seeks Use Permit For Rural Mazon Solar Farm

A company is considering siting a solar farm on 234 acres of farmland southwest of Mazon.

A hearing was held Oct. 24 by petitioner Cypress Creek Renewables and owners James and Laurie Fleishman regarding the proposed project before the Grundy County Planning Commission.

According to the petition, the solar farm seeks land zoned for agricultural use to be issued a special use permit for the development.

The property is located along the south side of Grand Ridge Road and is within one mile of the village of Mazon.

The solar farm is expected to produce 27.3 kWh annually which is enough to power 2,412 single-family homes.

This development is in part due to the state law that requires electric utilities to produce at least 25 percent of its electricity utilizing renewable resources, such as wind or solar.

According to the packet handed out to planning commission members, Cypress Creek Renewables intends on investing \$28.35 million on the project and will be providing temporary construction jobs during the 20-week construction project.

The company currently has 5,773 MW of electricity being produced by 250 solar power farms throughout the United States.

A 400-foot landscaping buffer will be placed between the solar farm facility fencing and the residential use to the west.

"Electrical power is generated from sunlight striking the photovoltaic panel cells, which in turn converts the photons of light into electrons which produces low-voltage direct current electricity," the packet explained.

This is converted to alternating current and added to the electrical grid to power homes and businesses by the electric utility.

"The intention of the developer is to place an eight-foot chain link fence around the perimeter of the site and add slats for privacy," the packet stated.

The engineering is being done by Baxter and Woodman.

There is no flood plain where the farm is to be located and the property to be considered is prime farm ground, the packet said.

Several conditions may be included by the planning commission in their recommendation to the County Board should the zoning permit be issued including:

- storm water engineering for the site must be reviewed by Grundy County prior to excavation for the project.
- The landscape buffer and approved fencing shall be in place prior to final building permit approval and operation of the Cypress Creek solar farm, and must be maintained by the company. Fencing shall also be maintained by the company.

- All construction must be done between the hours of 6 a.m. and 9 p.m.
- An annual report must be submitted to the Grundy County Land Use Department which exhibits that the solar farm is working properly and has been maintained following the issuance of this special use permit.

Cypress Creek Renewables is one of the largest solar developers in the United States. Its integrated business platform includes developing, building, financing and operating local solar farms.

"To do this we work in close partnership with landowners, local communities, regulators, lenders, and consumers to bring the highest-quality solar assets online," the company said in a document submitted to the County.

The PV solar panel cells are constructed of Silicon or a thin film, and do not erode and do not produce any emissions.

There are no chemicals, fluids, or materials that are capable of entering the environment from the PV panels.

Construction on the project may start as early as 2018 if they secure the proper permits.

GSW H.S. To Issue \$590,000 W.C. Bonds To Shore Up Red Ink

Due to uncertain financial issues regarding state payments to schools, school districts are having to take extra measures to ensure they do not wind up with negative balances in their funds.

Gardner-South Wilmington High School is no exception.

At its board meeting Wednesday, Oct. 18, Superintendent Michael Perrott explained that the district needs a working cash bond to the tune of \$590,000 this year.

Perrott pointed out that, as an example, the district is still owed \$83,151 from last fiscal year and “the outlook for receiving those funds from the state does not look very good,” he told the board.

Funds from the working cash bonds can help make up funding deficits when the state or local sources of revenue do not come in when needed.

The district has used working cash bonds for a number of years. A current bond will be paid off next month.

The board approved issuing the new \$590,000 in bonds.

In other business, the board:

- discussed an alumni recognition honor program such as the one instituted by Dwight Township High School. The board will research what other districts are doing, to create such a program at GSW. It will be brought up again in November for further discussion.
- renewed a contract with Fatlan’s Trucking to do snow removal for the district.

Safety measures for winter drivers

Winter weather causes many people to retreat indoors until the spring thaw. However, for those who embrace the cooler temperatures or find that life must go on despite snow and ice, taking inventory of their vehicles is a must before the first snowflakes start to fall.

Dwight Sets Standards for Curb Cuts on New Streets

The Dwight Village Council met in regular session Monday, October 23 with Mayor Jared Anderson, trustees Randy Irvin, Jerry Curtis, Marla Kinkade, Jenny Johnson and Justin Eggenberger in attendance. Jim Mixen was absent.

In public forum, Ian Cox of East North Street told the council that a former parking spot at his house had been eliminated during repaving of North Street and he would like it back. Mayor Anderson assured him that the parking spot would be restored.

Later in the meeting the council revisited a suggestion made at an Administrative Committee meeting Oct. 16 in regard to how they would hereafter do curb cuts for streets that are being repaved. Curbs will be cut for anyone who has a garage or driveway. If a home has no garage or driveway, but has alley access, no curb will be cut. If there is no alley access, a curb cut will be provided if the parking will not be on village right-of-way but on the homeowners property.

A motion was made and passed unanimously to accept the above standards.

Village Engineer Ryan Hansen told the board that completion of work on Chippewa, Wilmac, and North Streets is all that is scheduled for this year.

Street and utility replacement work will renew in the spring.

The Utilities Committee discussed the vacant water operator position during an October 16 meeting. Jim Reed has been serving as interim Water Operator since March. It was the recommendation of the committee to remove the interim label and appoint Reed as Water Operator.

The recommendation was put in the form of a motion and unanimously approved at the October 23 meeting.

The village had been planning to install smart water meters throughout the village, but the funding (meters will cost \$350-\$400 each) is not available due to emergency expenditures for replacing water lines on Taylor, Jennings, Judd, Morris Road and Gooseberry Lane.

Motorola is seeking permission to install two antennas and a dish on the Dwight north water tower on behalf of the local public safety agencies in the surrounding area. Police Chief Tim Henson explained to the Administrative Committee October 16 that the system would help the police, fire, and EMS departments in the village use their portable radios without interruption.

The committee recommended moving forward with the equipment installa-

tion pending attorney review and resolution of a lease agreement with Motorola. The only cost to the village will be for electricity.

Commonwealth Edison will be cutting trees along Route 47 and along the alley from Rt. 47 west leading to their substation on South St. at Columbia.

The Administrative Committee also discussed overdue payments owed the village's Revolving Loan Fund. Attorney Irv Masching was instructed to send a letter reaching out to the loan recipient.

Deb Karch, Dwight Economic Alliance Director of Economic Development, addressed the council October 23 about her recent five days spent at an economic development training program in Naperville.

Karch attended sessions on workforce development, business incubators, business retention, met with a panel of developers, and studied the use of location mapping software. "It seems we are doing some things correctly," she happily concluded.

The village approved checks for \$99,019.11 to Opperman Construction for the Prairie Avenue reconstruction, and \$235,292.40 to D Construction, Inc. for work on Clinton, Wilmac and St. Louis streets.

behalf of them to make sure they not only learn all they can but to live up to their potential in every way," said Al Llorens, Illinois Education Association vice president.

"We are proud of all of our members who were nominated and acknowledged. IEA was well-represented at the Those Who Excel event and it speaks

volumes about the work our members are doing day in and day out to ensure a bright future for kids in this state."

Eight of the 10 finalists for the Illinois State Board of Education's teacher of the year were IEA members.

The "Those Who Excel" banquet and program in Normal acknowledged the work of more than 230 teachers and school personnel from throughout the state.

A selection committee comprised of administrators, teachers, educational service personnel, student support personnel and past Illinois teacher of the year winners reviewed 234 nominations this year. Jensen will represent Illinois at the National Aeronautics and Space Administration Space Camp in Huntsville, Ala., and in the Council of Chief State School Officers' National Teacher of the Year Program, among other responsibilities.

Kaiser explained what this awards means.

"It means that you are knowledgeable of the content you teach," he said.

"It means that you are well-prepared and know how to present material in a multitude of ways so that every student truly understands the concepts that are being taught.

"It means you are a master of organization and can manage a classroom so that everyone has respect and rapport for one another.

"It means that you are a great communicator and can

link what is being taught to student interests and cultures.

"It means you can develop questions that make students think deeply and challenges them to develop their own questions and dig deeper for the answers. It means that you are a life-long learner and are constantly working to better yourself and never come to the conclusion that you are the best that you can possibly be."

He added many teachers at Dwight and across the state match those characteristics. But what sets her apart?

"If you have had Mrs. Jensen in the classroom you know some of those extraordinary characteristics," Kaiser continued. "They are the characteristics that made others take notice as she went through that grueling selection process. She is energetic, she is theatrical, she is musical, and she is a performer. She is perhaps the most positive person you may ever meet in your lifetime (am I right?)."

"She is the one person that you can go to and will be guaranteed a smile and a positive statement as you walk in her door. It boils down to this — Lindsey Jensen is not just a teacher, she is a humanitarian.

"She is concerned with human welfare and the happiness of others. She does whatever she can possibly do to assist her school and community and those who are a part of it.

"As Mr. Borne stated, 'She is more than a teacher of English — she is a teacher of people. She inspires her students to want to be their best and they respond favorably.'"

Kaiser went on to quote Jensen herself:

"Teachers are in the business of human beings, and teaching requires becoming part of students' lives and making connections that no other professional experiences."

Dear EarthTalk: What - ever became of the rediscovered Ivory-Billed Woodpecker that we thought we had lost to extinction? What other animals that we thought went extinct have "come back" from the dead?

Whether or not the Ivory-Billed Woodpecker is extinct in the Southeastern U.S. is still a matter of debate. The last conclusive evidence of the bird's existence in the U.S. dates back to 1944; most biologists presume the species didn't hang on around here much longer than that. And the last confirmed sighting of the species anywhere was in Cuba in 1986.

But then in April 2004, amateur birder David Luneau captured video of what he claimed



to be an Ivory-Billed Woodpecker making its rounds in the Arkansas' Cache River National Wildlife Refuge, soon thereafter sparking international interest in the story of the bird that came back from the dead.

But doubters point out that the bird Luneau saw may have been a common Pileated Woodpecker, giving the similar

size and coloring of the two different birds. Luneau's shaky, distant video is far from conclusive proof, and since then no one else has managed a confirmed sighting of the bird at Cache River or anywhere else in the woodpecker's traditional range. A 2016 trip to Cuba by researchers from Cornell's Lab of Ornithology looking for evidence of living Ivory-Billed

Woodpeckers there likewise turned up nothing. While birders continue to hope the majestic woodpecker turns up again, no one is holding their breath.

But one source of optimism for the Ivory-Billed's return continues to be other examples of wildlife coming back from the dead. Some of the most famous "lazarus taxa" species—the name refers to the biblical Gospel of John, in which Jesus raises his follower Lazarus from the dead—include the Coelacanth, a prehistoric fish thought to have gone extinct with the dinosaurs 65 million years ago but started showing up in fishermen's hauls in the late 1930s; the Lord Howe Island Stick Insect, thought to be driven to extinction on the remote Australian island by invasive rats in the

1930s only to reappear in the 1960s; and the Terror Skink of New Caledonia, presumed extinct by the 1990s but then rediscovered in 2003.

Likewise, New Zealand's Takahē, a large flightless bird, was thought to be driven to extinction as a result of predation by introduced rats, cats and pigs at the end of the 20th century. But in 1948 a small population of living Takahē was discovered near an isolated lake in a remote mountainous region. These days a population of more than 200 of the birds is holding steady in New Zealand's Fiordland National Park.

Other Lazarus taxa examples include Cuba's Solenodon, the Bermuda Petrel, Laos' Rock Rat, the Canary Islands' La Palma Giant Lizard, Japan's

Black Kokonee, Columbia's Painted Frog, the Bavarian Pine Vole of Europe's Alps and Indonesia's Banggai Crow. Of course, the term Lazarus taxa isn't reserved just for fauna: The Mt. Diablo Buckwheat, an inconspicuous little pink flower last seen in the 1930s on the slopes of the San Francisco Bay Area's highest peak, reappeared in 2005 much to the delight of botanists.
