### Sandy Smith Hangs Up Her Mail Sack After 43 Years of Service

Sandy Smith, 69, has hung up her Herscher rural mail carrier sack for good after a 43-year career with the post office.

Or should we say, she is hanging up her rural mail truck license plate. She used a personalized Illinois license place that said "FEMAIL 3" and was widely recognized in the Herscher area for all the years she carried the mail to

So after driving a million miles, many in snow storms and whiteout conditions, after having her husband Monty change brakes endlessly, change oil endlessly and wear out a total of 15 different vehicles, she decided to call it auits.

accidents and just four flat tires.

In the days before cell phones (hard to imagine now), the farmers were sure to call husband Monty and give him an update on her progress. Sandy said she did not know about that until after she retired.

"I just learned Alex Denault and Dale Boness would call Monty and tell him what time I delivered their box during a blizzard," she said.

"You're never alone out there,"

Throughout her career, she trained many people as substitute carriers, including Mark Jensen, who was her first sub.

She also delivered many unusual things in her career.

"Things I delivered (included) a deceased person, bees, chicks, ducks, and insects for a horse farm to kill off the flies," she said.

Things a carrier may find in the mail boxes include hay in the fall, kittens, beer cans, lots of ants, spiders, earwigs and treats from her customers, she added.

The worst thing she ever found upon delivering mail was Dorothy Herscher, on Route 17, who had been dead for a few days. It was the summer of 2016. She knew something was wrong because Dorothy always brought out the mail box to the road for Sandy to deliver the mail. The box had been knocked off by passing cars on

family deemed it was just easier not to leave it out after the mail was delivered. Sandy called 911 upon finding the body, and was instructed on how to see if Dorothy was still breathing.

"She was cool," to the touch, Sandy explained.

Her career began at the urging of her mother, the late Bonnie Greene, who was clerk in the Herscher Post Office for 18 years.

Bonnie wanted Sandy to go with her to take the Civil Services test in 1973. Ollie Schlaich, Herscher's rural letter carrier, asked her to be his substitute. At least temporarily.

Sandy took the test and reluctantly agreed to "temporarily" be a sub for Schlaich.

"Ollie and Bonnie talked me into it," Sandy explained.

On July 8, 1974, she started subbing, and 10-and-a-half years later took over Schlaich's route.

She has no regrets.

"I have loved serving some of the most wonderful postal patrons ever, for a total of 43 years and six months," she said. "I will miss you all very much."

She said she has answered letters to Santa Claus for children for many years. But she told The Paper one story where the letters did not work. The family had eight children, and she stayed up late one night writing all eight children let-

In all that driving, she had zero Route 17 so many times that the ters from Santa. The next day, the mother told her she had just explained to her children that there was no Santa Claus, Sandy said. You could see the disappointment in Sandy's eyes as she recalled the story.

She said she and Don Devereux made a point of delivering Christmas presents on time.

They would travel to the Kankakee Post Office, often in bad weather, and pick up the parcels for delivery before Christmas.

On Christmas eve, she and Devereux would wear Christmas hats to spread the cheer. Spreading Cheer is something

she was famous for during her years as carrier. "I always smile at everyone,"

she said. "They might be having a bad day."

She was bitten by two dogs during her career

Her route included delivering to homes in the townships of Pilot, Norton, Otto, Salina, and Essex. She also delivered to portions of Ford and Iroquois counties along the edges.

The route was roughly 100 miles and took most of the day, or longer if the mail was heavy that

She officially retired August 1 of this year, but had taken off earlier (May 29) to help Monty at home when he was injured. Then (continued on page 3)

## Mazon Solar Farm Public Hearing Scheduled for Nov. 21

A public hearing for a proposed solar farm will be held at 7 p.m. before the Grundy County Zoning Board of Appeals on Tuesday, Nov. 21, in the Grundy County Board Chambers in Morris.

The proposed 234 acre project southwest of Mazon will cost roughly \$28.35 million to develop, and produce 27.3 kWh annually, enough to power 2,412 single-family dwellings.

Jim and Laurie Fleischman are owners of the land which is located south of the Grand Ridge road just west of Mazon at S. Hadden

According to Grundy County Land Use Director Heidi Miller, the public hearing will be utilized by the ZBA to make a final recommendation to the full County Board.

The County Board is scheduled to act on the recommendation at its Dec. 12 meeting. Miller believed the developer, Cypress

Creek Renewables, intends to start construc-

tion in late 2018. However, Scott Novack, a spokesman for Cypress Creek, explained to The Paper last week that the plan is to break ground in early 2019. Construction will take from five to six months.

Cypress Creek Renewables is an American company with U.S. ownership, leadership and operations.

"We have received funding through a mix of U.S. and international investors and banks," Novack said.

"Through a combination of organic growth and strategic development, Cypress Creek has grown into one of the country's leading solar companies," he added.

The company develops, builds and operates solar projects across the United States, including in Indiana, North Carolina, and Minnesota.

"As a developer and owner-operator, we take great pride in operating well-maintained solar farms," Novack added.



### Blue Cross/Blue Shield **Drops Double Whammy**

In September, Blue Cross MedicareRx (PDP) informed all members of its prescription drug customers in the Dwight area that CVS Pharmacies were not a preferred member of its network (effective Jan. 1, 2017) and therefore Blue Cross members' costs would be higher for any prescription drugs purchased at CVS.

CVS is the only pharmacy in Dwight.

CVS purchased a chain of 14 Doc's Drug Store locations in Illinois in June of this year, including Dwight. Doc's pharmacies had all been recognized by Blue Cross MedicareRx.

At the time of the CVS purchase in June, Doc's Drugs president Anthony Sartoris was quoted: "We have created a win-win for our loyal associates, our valued customers, and our communities. Our customers and patients can be assured of continuity of care in their hometowns."

That was then. This is now. If you belong to Blue Cross MedicareRx and want to have prescriptions filled at the same cost as before, you have to drive some 20 miles to another pharmacy recognized by Blue Cross MedicareRx.

Blue Cross responded to one complaint about their action by stating that "CVS had requested additional reimbursements for generic prescriptions compared to other pharmacies. To maintain affordable benefits for our members and customers. we need to obtain competi-

tive reimbursement rates from participating pharmacies.'

Blue Cross and Blue Shield dropped the second foot when it announced October 1 that it was removing three OSF hospitals from its PPO network. Those hospitals were in Peoria, Rockford and Galesburg. The termination of those hospitals from the Blue Cross/Blue shield network was to be effective the first of 2018. OSF responded to the Blue Cross action by terminating most of its remainhospital agreements with Blue Cross in Illinois, including St. James in Pontiac.

Karen Brodbeck, vicepresident of public relations for OSF HealthCare, St. Francis Medical Center, Peoria, responded to questions The Paper asked about why Blue Cross had begun this action: "Some people have wondered if it had something to do with contract exclusivity. The truth is BCBSIL has long been free to negotiate and enter into agreements with provider it chooses.

She continued: "Both OSF and BCBSIL are in active negotiations and are working toward a resolution. At this time, an agreement has not been reached. We hope BCBSIL will realize the value of having OSF hospitals in its network for its members."

permits, Cypress Creek places great value on being a good neighbor in the communities that we operate in across the country," he told The Paper last week.

"The zoning jurisdiction falls under Grundy County," he continued. "We have reached out to the Village of Mazon and will continue to be available as a resource should the Village have any questions or concerns."

Solar farms are virtually self-sufficient, Novack said.

"As such, there will be no permanent jobs located at the property; however, ongoing operational expenses are expected to contribute approximately \$190,000 to the local economy annually," Novack said. "This includes lawn and vegetative maintenance along with any needed system repairs."

taxing bodies in the area, including Mazon-Verona-Kinsman school, and area fire and rescue departments.

However, there are no assessments available at this early date to determine what it will mean in terms of increased revenue.

"At this point, we do not yet have an estimated tax figure to share." Novack said. "However, we do know the tax generated will be exponentially larger than the existing tax the agriculturally classified land is contributing. We are excited to be able to add additional revenue to county services such as schools."

The estimated life of the solar farm is 40 years.

When a smoker calls the Quitline, they are connected with a medical professional who will assist them in their quit attempt. The medical professional will assist the caller by designing a quit program that meets the caller's needs.

The idea of the Great American Smokeout began in 1971 when Arthur Mullaney, a Massachusetts resident, asked people to give up smoking for a day and to donate the money they would have spent on tobacco to a local high school. Others started promoting different variations of the ideas until The California chapter of the American Cancer Society encouraged nearly one million smokers to quit

### **Stampeding Bull Market May Slow** Down ... So Be Prepared

As you know, we've been enjoying a long period of steadily rising stock prices. Of course, this bull market won't last forever – and when it does start losing steam, you, as an investor, need to be prepared.

Before we look at how you can ready yourself for a new phase in the investment environment, let's consider some facts about the current situation:

• Length – This bull market, which began in 2009, is the second-oldest in the past 100 years – and it's about twice as long as the average bull market.

• Strength – Since the start of this long rally, the stock market has produced an average annualized gain of 15.5%

While these figures are impressive, they aren't necessarily predictive - so how much longer can this bull market continue to "stampede"? 



### Dwight's Brian Farris Disposed Of Explosive Ordnance For Navy

Brian Farris, a 1985 graduate of Dwight Township High School and Dwight native, unofficially retired from the United States Navy Aug. 25, after spending 25 years disposing and deactivating things that could blow up in his face — literally.

His Navy career officially ends in December, but he is on what he termed "terminal leave," which sounds more ominous that it is. It just means he is using up his leave until actual retirement.

He leaves the Navy as an E-9 Chief Petty Officer, working as part of the Ordnance Explosive Disposal unit, the military equivalent of a civilian police bomb squad, throughout his naval career.

"I was in Explosive Ordnance Disposal Command, part of the Naval Special Operations, but not Special Warfare," he pointed out. He wanted to be sure people reading the article did not confuse him with Navy Warfare Operations that includes Navy Seals.

"Our mission is mine counter measures," Farris

Since the U.S. terrorist attack on Sept. 11, 2001, he shifted to counter improvised explosive device oper-

He has been deployed in both Iraq and Afghanistan during the recent wars, including Operation Iraqi Freedom, Operation Enduring Freedom and the current war in Afghanistan.

"I took part in Iraq and Afghanistan under direct and indirect fighting," Farris explained.

He said I.E.D. are often booby traps invisible along a soldier's path or connected to a secondary I.E.D. after the initial explosive is discovered.

He talked about missions in Iraq clearing a palm field and "we found all sorts of booby traps," he said. They were installed by al-Queda soldiers who were "on the run" from U.S. forces at the

"I stepped over a palm frond, and in two steps, boom!" he said. "This thing went off."

He said the man behind him brushed up against the explosive device and set it

"Nobody got killed or hurt," he added. "It was a miracle, really."

But after that close call, the officials decided it would be better to just burn the whole palm field instead of trying to disarm the booby traps.

The fires set off the bombs, he explained.

He said his job entailed going through an exhaustive checklist, and was routine. 'You assess the risks, and

go through a checklist," he "To me, it was just a job,"

he added. The "job" is now over, and he can spend time with his wife, Rachel, and two

sons, Calvin, age 14, and Zak, age 16. The family resides in El Cajon, California. He was stationed in San Diego.

Farris enlisted in 1992, attending college at the

University of St. Francis in Joliet, and working for one year in the Morris area in the community recreation field before getting laid off after budget cuts.

He joined the Explosive Ordnance Disposal unit right after boot camp in the Navy.

By the end of his 25-year career, he was in charge of 158 people including support staff, and 102 E.O.D. technicians.

He said he wanted to give a special "Thank You" to Dwight's Operation S.O.S. for supporting him with care packages through the years.

"You can't imagine how important that is," he said. "That's one of the nicest things. It is the essence of small town U.S.A. It shows they support what's going on and are true Americans."

He comes by his enlistment honestly, with a long list of family members who have served in the U.S. Armed Forces, including his father, Randall of Dwight, who is a Vietnam Veteran of the Army.

His grandfather, Calvin Wiemken, was in the South Pacific during World War II and his great-grandfather, Richard Wiemken, fought in World War I. They were all from Dwight.

Each year a national ceremony takes place at the Cenotaph in Whitehall. London, a monument erected as a memorial to soldiers buried elsewhere. Queen will lay the first wreath at the Cenotaph, while others will leave wreaths and small wooden crosses
