LivCo Sheriff's Spot Contested In March 20 Republican Primary

Incumbent Livingston County Sheriff Tony Childress will have to do battle with challenger Jack Wisner to retain his job, as both men are seeking the Republican nomination for the position on the March 20 ballot.

The Livingston County Sheriff's race is the sole race as of press deadline for county officials in *The Paper's* readership area.

For Livingston County, the Republican Primary generally decides the winning candidate since the Democrats rarely put forth opposition, making the primary the real race for Sheriff.

The March 20 primary includes races for Sheriff, Clerk, and Treasurer.

Livingston County incumbent Clerk Kristy Masching has filed to retain her position.

For Treasurer, Barb Sear, will not seek re-election while Niki Meier is running for the position on the Republican ticket.

For Livingston County District 2 which represents the Livingston County vil-

lages served by *The Paper*, for towns of Dwight, Campus, Odell, Emington, Saunemin, and Cullom, Steve Lovell, who is finishing a two-year term, will run for a four-year term. Other members up for election include, in District 2, Bob Weller, Judy Campbell and Daryl Holt.

The primary will also include precinct committee positions.

Grundy County

In Grundy County, the following County Board members from District 3 which includes Mazon, Verona, Kinsman, Gardner, Braceville and South Wilmington, Doug Buresi (Republican), Mike Onorato (Democrat), Richard Joyce (Democrat), have expired terms. Jake Olson has filed for District 3 as a Democrat.

The County Clerk's office said Richard Joyce is not seeking re-election.

Kay Olson is running for County Clerk with no opposition as of press time.

For Sheriff, the incumbent is Kevin Callahan, a Democrat. The Republicans have two candidates running against each other for a

chance to run against Callahan. They include Jason Flanders and Kevin Briley.

County Treasurer Lori Werden has not yet filed for re-election. There is no opposition either.

Kankakee County

In Kankakee County, County Clerk Bruce Clark will not seek re-election. Don Hendrickson, a Republican, has filed for Clerk.

For Sheriff, Incumbent Mike Downey (Republican) has no opposition.

There have been no filings for Treasurer. The incumbent is Republican Nick Africano.

County Board District 12, which includes the areas of Essex, Reddick, Union Hill, Buckingham, Cabery and part of Herscher, is represented by Sally Evans, who said she will not run. So far Darrel Smith has filed with no opposition.

The deadline to file for the March 20 primary was the end of business, Monday, Dec. 4.

Any other races that develop will be reported in next week's issue.

Gardner's Rev. Christensen And The Fight Against Germany's A-Bomb

Editor's Note: On Dec. 7, 1941 (76 years ago Thursday), America was dragged into World War II when Japan attacked Hawaii, which resulted in America helping to defeat Germany in early 1945, then dropping two atomic weapons on Japan to finally force Japan's surrender in August of 1945. So we decided to revisit the role of Gardner's Rev. Christian Christensen, and see what massive impact the pastor from Gardner really had on World War II.

Would Hitler have really developed the atomic bomb if Gardner's retired Rev. Christian Christensen had not helped the allies destroy Germany's heavy water plant in Norway? The answer is a resounding "Yes." Historians say Christensen's help may have been *crucial* in stopping Germany's nuclear weapons program.

Today, there is a commemorative plaque near the historic two-cell jail in downtown Gardner in honor of the unsung hero. And there is nothing to diminish the Reverend's part in this secret project that resulted in

a commando raid on the Norwegian heavy water plant.

His great-granddaughter Barbara tells the story of her grandfather's secret involvement.

He was born in Norway and was a sailor, she wrote.

He knew the fjords well and later emigrated to America and was a Rev. in Gardner and Herscher.

"He secretly wrote (at the age of 83) to the U.S. government and told them exactly where to find this water plant, even his wife did not know what he was doing until after the war," Barbara wrote.

"We have the commendation that he received from the king of Norway for his part in WW II," she added.

"His daughter, my grandmother, Fern Ruth Christensen, told me stories of this.

"He read a newspaper story about Hitler trying to develop an atom bomb," she continued.

"The plant was under a mountain shelf in Norway which was out of reach of allied bombers and battle-ships that couldn't navigate the narrow fjords. He had sailed the fjords and climbed the mountains — he knew how to get at it. He contacted the U.S. Navy and officials came to his home and laid war maps on the floor. With the info, the British organized the raid Feb. 1943."

The raid was dangerous and required brave commandoes to risk everything to climb the mountains, and plant charges at the plant, which was a success (See the 1965 movie starring Kirk Douglas called "The Heroes of Telemark.")

"Christian's wife was named Lena and they had ten children, the youngest being my grandmother," Barbara said. "She (Barbara's grandmother) would often tell stories about being the Lutheran pastor's daughter and how he started

every day saying 'this is the day that the Lord has made, we will rejoice and be glad in it!' After retiring from the church in Washburn, Wisconsin, he retired in

Gardner and is buried there."

Lois Vigna of Gardner was a child in WW II, and is the great-niece of Christensen.

Dwight Woman Sentenced To Seven Years on Drug Charges

Rebecca M. Cortez, 29, of Dwight, was sentenced Nov. 22 to seven years in the Illinois Department of Corrections on six counts of unlawful delivery of a controlled substance (heroin), after Cortez pled guilty.

Cortez was arrested in May in Pontiac after a narcotics investigation that started in March.

The investigation was led by the Dwight Narcotics Unit and resulted in a search warrant for her residence.

During the execution of the warrant, police seized hypodermic syringes, multiple baggies with heroin residue, and other drug paraphernalia.

She was charged with six counts of unlawful delivery

of a controlled substance on the day the search warrant was executed.

Also arrested in March at the residence was Tyler Herndon, 30, of Pontiac, for unlawful delivery of a controlled substance (class 1 felony) and unlawful possession of a hypodermic syringe.

Agencies assisting the Dwight Narcotics Unit in the investigation were the Livingston County Pro-Active Unit, Livingston County Sheriff’s Police, Livingston County K-9 Unit, Livingston County Detective Section, Livingston County State’s Attorney’s Office, Pontiac Police Department, and the Dwight Police Department.

Gas Prices Ease 3.2 Cents

Gasoline prices across the nation fell another 3.2 cents after dropping 7.7 cents the previous two weeks, averaging \$2.466 as of Monday, Dec. 4.

Gasoline Inventories increased in the last month, and demand decreased, forcing the price of crude to drop and gasoline prices to continue to fall. Shortly before the Energy Information released monthly petroleum data, oil per barrel was \$57.73, and was down another 28 cents after the report.

Average U.S. gallon regular price is made up of 18% state & local taxes; 16% distribution and marketing; 21% refining and 44% crude as of September 2017.

Retired Fairbury Police Chief Jack Wiser Challenges Sheriff

Retired Fairbury Police Chief Jack Wiser will be challenging incumbent Livingston County Sheriff Tony Childress in the Republican Primary, March 20, 2018.

Wiser told *The Paper* Dec. 1 he plans a formal announcement in the next few days.

At that time, he will outline details for an improved administration of the department.

"I intend to be a full-time Sheriff," Wiser said.

"The taxpayers deserve better than a Sheriff that works additional jobs in the private sector," he continued.

"Our current Sheriff cannot find the time to attend Sheriff, Jail, and License Committee or County Board meetings that meet monthly. I will not only attend these, I will be available to the Sheriff's Department, other elected officials, the press, and members of the public to answer their questions and listen to concerns."

Wiser began his career as a Livingston County deputy in 1988.

He then served first as a Fairbury patrol officer, and was later promoted to Fairbury's first full-time detective.

He was appointed Chief

of Police in 1999, a position he held for over 13 years.

From Wiser's beginnings in 1988 as a Sheriff Deputy, his 13 years as Fairbury Police Chief and 9-1-1 Board member, to his help in establishing the Livingston County Proactive Unit, Wiser has a 30-year track record of working closely with the North-Eastern Livingston County area and the Dwight Police Department.

When the Dwight Police Department was launching their first K-9 Unit, Wiser was there to assist with experience and guidance.

As Livingston County Sheriff, Wiser said he will be committed to full-time service of the entire county - including the North-East corner.

LivCo Sheriff Tony Childress Seeking Re-election In Primary

Livingston County Sheriff Tony O. Childress, has announced his intention to seek a second term, and will be facing Jack Wiser of Fairbury in the March 20, 2018 Republican Primary.

Speaking at rallies in Pontiac, Dwight, Fairbury and South Streator, Childress highlighted his accomplishments in office and his plans for future enhancements to safety and law enforcement in the county.

In his comments, Childress highlighted successful activities combating crime in the county, especially drug offenses, and noted increased drug-related arrests and convictions.

"It's the most successful criminal control operation in this county, ever," he said.

The increased effort includes a combined drug task force agreement with LaSalle, Bureau and Putnam counties. Officers also have been assigned to the Federal Homeland Security Task Force to further enhance drug-fighting efforts.

In the past three years, the Sheriff's Department has received more than \$100,000 in grants, a portion of which was used for the acquisition of the county's first complete K-9 Unit, including the purchase of the dog and

complete training for officer and dog, a special K-9 vehicle and other accessories.

The Sheriff's Office was also the recipient of a \$10,000 Safe Community grant from Enbridge Corp., allowing the department to purchase several mobile data terminals for use in and out of squad cars.

This equipment facilitates "a safer and smoother transmission of data," Childress said.

"I've begun the first Safer Schools Initiative, which uses enhanced technology to make our schools safer for both our children and their teachers. It is with confidence and a large dose of humility that I seek re-election."

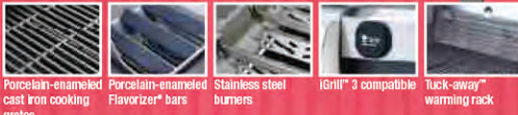

The Village of Gardner's tax levy request will remain unchanged at \$73,200, the amount of the tax extension for 2016.

The Gardner Village Board met in regular session Nov. 27, discussing the tax levy with commissioner Dick Hileman. The board approved an ordinance for the Levy and Assessment of taxes for fiscal year beginning May 1 and ending April 30, 2018.

In other business, the board:

- heard from resident Tom Perkins who thanked the Village for use of the chambers and archives on Saturday after dedication of the Riviera Restaurant sign on Rt. 66 on Saturday, Nov. 25.
- approved funds for village holiday lighting contest. Prizes are first place \$100, second place \$75, and third place \$50. Judging for the contest will be on Dec 22.
- discussed and approved the 2018 meeting dates for the Village Board and the Planning/Zoning committee, the ordinance regarding utility construction in village right-of-ways and a loan from the Community Development Assistance Program revolving loan fund to Every Buddies Pub and Grub, Inc. for \$70,000 at 3.25% interest. The loan is for a 15-year period.

- heard from Village Engineer Casey McCollom of Chamlin and Associates who advised the board D Construction of Coal City plans to begin the demolition of the grain elevator after Jan. 1, after all permits are in place.
- heard from Mayor Mike Serena who noted the 2017 Village Christmas tree lighting ceremony was a great success with the large crowd and warm weather and thanked everyone involved.
- Serena offered special thanks to the Gardner Lions Club for the hot chocolate, hot cider and treats, Don and Melissa Phillips for providing sound and emceeing of the event, and Reverend Greg Olson from United Lutheran Church and Reverend Jan Chandler from the Church of Hope for speaking. Serena and the board also thanked Jackie Marks for donating the hand-crocheted scarves, Terry and Barb Baker for the donation of lights and the decorating crew of Paul and Regina Chase, and Steve Price, and the Halterman family for the use of their man-lift to decorate the tree.
- Serena also said Curly's Tap provided their banquet room free of charge for children to visit with Santa and Mrs. Claus and thanked Mr. and Mrs. Claus for taking the time out of their busy schedule to come visit with the

children of Gardner.

The 2018 Dwight Village Board meeting schedule was approved when the Dwight Village Board of Trustees met on Monday, November 27.

Dwight's Village Board of Trustees will meet on second and fourth Mondays of each month in 2018. Due to holidays, the months of May, November and December in 2018 will have only one meeting scheduled as May 14, November 26, and December 10. Also, due to the second Monday in October 2018 being Columbus Day, that meeting will be moved to Tuesday, October 9, 2018.

The 2018 Plan Commission and Zoning Board of Appeals meeting schedule was also approved as the third Tuesday of each month. Plan Commission meetings begin at 6 p.m. while Zoning Board of Appeals meetings are set for 6:30 p.m.

Deb Karch, Dwight

Economic Development Director, provided an update of recent efforts by the DEA which align with economic development strategies.

Mrs. Karch also shared a new portfolio that has been developed showcasing Dwight. Also, because questions had been raised regarding its status, Village Administrator Kevin McNamara pointed out that the Dwight airport is still open and operational. Tom Tock, who has recently visited the airport, noted that the facility is in "excellent shape".

In his report, EMS Director Al Metzke recognized the "valor" of the people, including medics and neighbors, who assisted and tried to rescue an individual during a recent garage fire that took the life of an area resident.

"You hear every night on the news of all the bad stuff that happens," said Metzke. "But here we have, in little old Dwight, people on the street that are willing to risk their life for somebody else. That's pretty great."

The Board also approved:

- Christmas gifts of \$50 DEA gift certificates for village employees and various committee members.
- the 2018 Illinois

Municipal Insurance Cooperative Renewal for \$117,212.00 which is reduced from last year's cost.

- a fund transfer of \$402,832.50 from the Referendum Fund to the Referendum Bond Fund for paying interest on a bond.
- a fund transfer of \$85,250.00 from the Water Fund to the Water Bond Fund for the purpose of paying interest and principal on a bond.
- a fund transfer of \$200,000.00 from the Water Capital Fund to the Water Bond Fund for the purpose of paying interest and principal on a bond.
- a fund transfer of \$51,714.93 from the Sewer Fund to the Sewer Replacement Reserve Fund for the purpose of paying interest and principal on a bond.

Mayor Pro-Tem Justin Eggenberger presided over the meeting, filling in for Village President Jared Anderson. Also absent were Trustees Jerry Curtis and Randy Irvin.

The next meeting of the Dwight Village Board of Trustees will be at 6:30 p.m. on Monday, December 11, in the Public Services Complex.

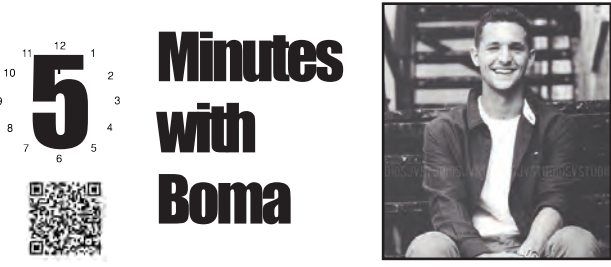

Gardner’s Rev. Christensen And The

THIS 1935 PHOTO shows the Vermork Hydroelectric plant, nestled in the hills of Norway and inaccessible to bombers or being attacked by sea. The plant produced heavy water which was instrumental in Germany’s nuclear weapons program in World War II. A heavy water nuclear reactor could be used for nuclear fission research and ultimately, to breed plutonium from which a bomb could be constructed. The plant produced 12 tons of heavy water per year.

She said Christensen “was a very well-liked guy,” and that he married many area people, regardless of their religion.

“They were very close as a family,” Vigna added.

Could Germany have really developed an atomic weapon during World War II had the Heroes of Telemark not destroyed its heavy water manufacturing plant in World War II? Maybe. But the destruction of the heavy water plant certainly stopped Hitler’s research.

With the benefit of hindsight, historians tell detailed stories, with Germany struggling against Russia and England by the time the U.S. entered the war.

1) **Germany was already struggling in 1941.** “For Germany to seriously consider taking the atomic plunge, it needed favorable war conditions that would allow the development of long-term research projects. In any event, jets, submarines, and rockets took up a greater portion of the Reich’s scarce engineering resources,” according to a historical website called “The National Interest.”

When it became apparent to Hitler that the Soviet Union would not collapse in 1941, Germany faced other obstacles in developing an atomic bomb.

2) **The heavy water plant destruction helped**

stop the research. “Western Allied attacks on the German industrial economy took their toll, even if they could not push Germany out of the war. Sabotage, like the attacks on heavy water processing plants in Norway, also curtailed German progress.”

Historians also note the Germans could not draw on Europe’s scientific expertise to the same extent as the Americans.

“Nevertheless, the Nazi regime did make substantial progress on a number of engineering frontiers, and could have developed a weapon in time.”

3) **Delivery.** “Even if the Germans had managed to develop an atomic weapon, delivery would have been a problem. For tactical use against ground targets, the Wehrmacht could have engineered a way to deliver the devices, but anything at longer range would have been a struggle. The Luftwaffe lacked an advanced heavy bomber capable of hitting targets in England or Russia, much less the United States.”

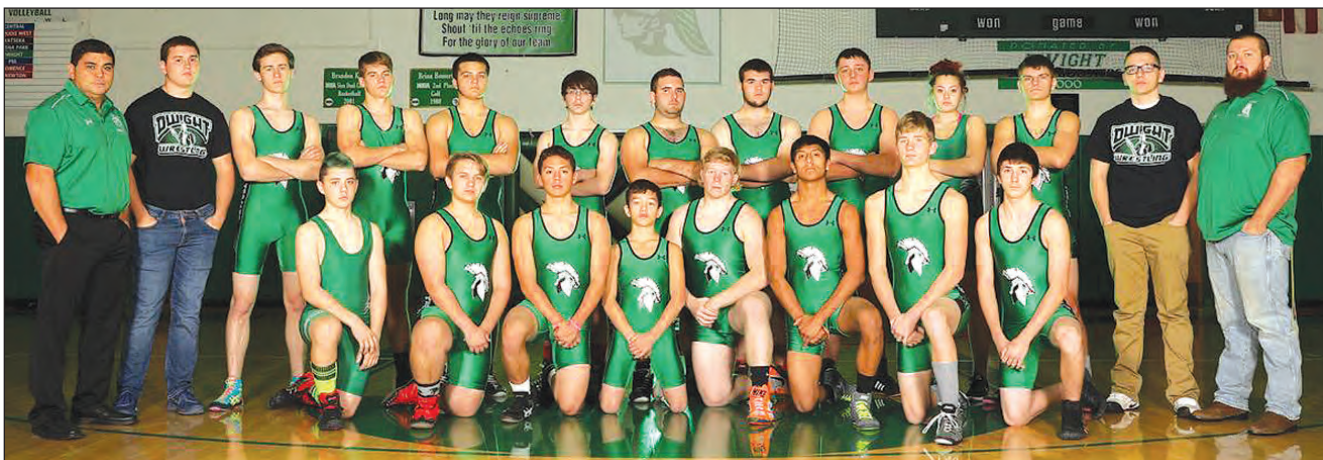

Curt Perschnick Named to Global Football All-Tazon Team

Former DTHS football standout and Augustana College graduate, Curt Perschnick, was one of 25 players to be selected to the Global Football All-Tazon Team.

The team consists of past players of the Tazon De Estrellas or Bowl of the Stars – hosted by Global Football between 1997 and 2016 – which gives NCAA Division III football standouts a chance to take on all-star caliber players from private universities in Mexico.

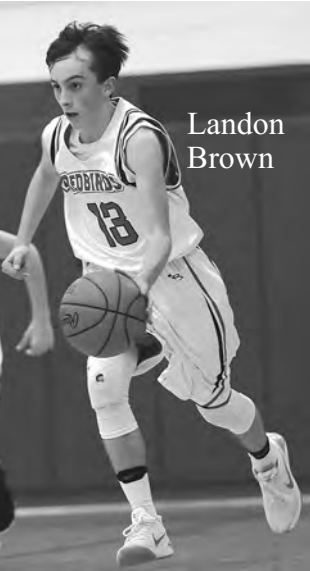
