graduate Kalee Dionne was co-host for the New Year's Eve party countdown on Chicago's NBC 5.

She is a Herscher native, the daughter of Rex and Connie Dionne, and is a 2003 HHS graduate.

The party was held at Navy Pier in Chicago, and included colleague Marley Kayden and radio personalities Christopher "Fred" Frederick of Kiss FM and Joe Soto of V103.

Dionne is a weather forecaster for NBC 5.

She is on air Wednesdays, Thursdays, and Fridays on the morning show, with Andy Avalos in the morning.

She has been busy covering the Chicago weather, especially the arctic blast and snow hitting the area last week.

She joined the NBC 5 Chicago weather team in October 2016. She returned to Illinois from Kansas City where she was the morning meteorologist at 41 Action News. In the fall of 2014, she was voted Kansas City's Best Meteorologist by KC Magazine.

She joined the 41 Action News team back in April 2013 after three years of giving the daily weather and traffic reports on Wake Up

She was excited to move back to the Midwest to be able to forecast all four seasons. Most importantly, she brings a lot of severe weather experience from her time covering Tornado Alley to keep the people of Kansas and Missouri safe.

In 2011, Kalee was brought to a new level of excellence in her weather broadcasting career.

On April 27, a strong line of tornadoes decimated the state of Alabama. It was a part of a super-tornado outbreak that was one of the largest in US history. The WIAT-TV weather team went wall-to-wall with their coverage. Kalee kicked off the coverage in the early morning and stayed on until late at night. The broadcast featured live images of tornadoes destroying parts of Alabama. In total 243 people were killed in the out-

It's a day that Kalee will never forget, but her professionalism and team approach to the coverage received recognition in competition.

WIAT won numerous broadcast honors, including the Edward R. Murrow, Associated Press and Broadcasters Alabama

including Station of the Year. It was in large part due to the efforts of the weather team during that terrible day.

Kalee began at Lincoln College in Lincoln, IL where she took on Musical Theater.

She performed at Disney World, Carnival Cruise Lines, Cedar Point and in the musical "Smile" in Cisco, TX before deciding to take her performance to the camera. She then transferred to Southern Illinois University Carbondale, where she received her bachelor's degree in Radio/Television Broadcasting.

Kalee worked as a Weather Anchor/Supervisor, Reporter, Anchor and Producer at the Southern Illinois University studentrun station, River Region Evening Edition. While she was there, the student program won state and national awards including, Best Student Run Newscast at NAB 2007.

Kalee also interned and worked as a Weathercaster at the ABC affiliate in Southern Illinois, WSIL-TV. In late Spring 2008, Kalee relocated to central Illinois where she worked at the CBS affiliate in WCIA-TV. There she was the Weekend Weather

January, 2017

2017's news cycle began with a story about how the Dwight 1 cent per \$1 sales tax hike would generate \$430,000 or more each year. The reality was close to the

The sales tax hike was okayed by voters to start July 1, 2016.

As of the end of 2017, the extra 1 cent for \$1 in sales taxes actually generated an additional \$544,915 in village coffers since it began (July 2016 to September 2017). That is close to \$435,000 for 12 months, so slightly better than the estimate of \$430,000 for 12

months. Sales taxes for Dwight are generated in both Livingston and Grundy County, with much of the gasoline revenue in Grundy

The sales tax hike is earmarked to pay for the road improvements, many of which were completed in 2017, and more are slated to be done in 2018.

The Dwight Township board is still unsure what to do about the Gothic Church building with its steeple in need of repair at a large cost. They had some initial discussions with the Village Board, but the village would not be interested in taking over the building until it was

fully repaired. In either case, the church cannot just be torn down as it is on the historic registry. The Dwight Historical Society is being kept abreast of the discussions regarding the Gothic Church. This year marks the 150th anniversary of the church on North Franklin Street.

The Gardner Area Band has reached the halfway point in its fundraiser to research on the town's Civil finance a trip for band members to march in the

Parade in Washington D.C. "The band has raised more than half of the \$22,480 needed to perform in the event," said band director Michael Leone.

Time is a Key Factor in Investing

With the arrival of the New Year, many of us will pause and ponder the age-old question: "Who knows where the time goes?" And, as is always the case, none of us really do know. However, wherever the time goes, it will usually be a key factor in your success as an investor.

Time can affect how you invest, and the results of your investing, in different ways:

• *Growth potential* – Contrary to myth, there's no real way to "get rich quick" when investing. To build wealth, you need patience - and time. If you own quality investments with growth potential, and you give them years – in fact, decades – to increase in value, your perseverance may be rewarded. Of course, there are no guarantees, and you'll need the discipline to withstand the inevitable downturns along the way. But in describing how long he likes to keep his investments, renowned investor Warren Buffet says his favorite holding period is "forever."

• Targeted goals - To accumulate resources for retirement, you need to save and invest throughout your working life. But along the way, you'll probably also have some shorterterm goals - making a down payment on a home, sending your children to college, taking a round-the-world trip, and so on. Each of these goals has a specific time limit and usually requires a specific amount of money, so you will need to choose the appropriate investments.

• *Risk tolerance* – The element of time also will affect your tolerance for risk. When you have many decades to go until you retire, you can afford to take more risk with your investments because you have time to overcome periods of market volatility. But when you're on the verge of retirement, you may want to lower the risk level in your portfolio. For example, you may want to begin moving away from some of your more aggressive, growth-oriented investments and move toward more income-producing vehicles that offer greater stability of principal. Keep in mind, though, that even during retirement, you'll need your portfolio to provide enough growth opportunity at least to help keep you ahead of inflation.

Thus far, we have looked at ways in which time plays a role in how you invest. But there's also an aspect of time that you may want to keep out of your investment strategies. Specifically, you might not want to try to "time" the market. The biggest problem with market timing is it's just too hard. You essentially have to be right twice, selling at a market top and buying at the bottom. Also, as humans, we appear to be somewhat wired to think that an activity – especially a long-running activity - will simply continue. So, when the market goes up, we seem to expect it to keep rising, and when the market drops, we think it will continue doropping. This can lead to big mistakes, such as selling after a major market drop even though that can be the time when it may be much smarter to buy because prices are low.

As we've seen, the way you interact with time can affect your investment efforts. So, think carefully about how you can put all the days, months and years on your side. Time is the one asset you can't replenish – so use it wisely.

Coroner Identifies Fairbury Man in Fatal Crash

Livingston County Coroner Danny Watson released the name of a Fairbury man who died in a vehicle accident near Dwight, Thursday, Dec. 21.

Douglas L. Benge, 58, of Fairbury, was the driver of a 2002 Mercury Sable involved in an accident at 2550 North and Route 47 south of Dwight at 6 p.m.

The accident occurred in Union Township when Benge's vehicle crossed the center line and made contact with a northbound semi tractor trailer.

The driver of the semi was not injured.

Benge was pronounced dead at the scene. His name was withheld pending notification of next of kin.

According to a release issued Dec. 23 by the Coroner's office, the accident is still under investigation by the Illinois State Police, the Illinois State Police Crash Reconstruction Team, and the Livingston County Coroner's Office.

An autopsy has been ordered for the deceased.

Snyder said most funeral homes are converted houses, but because of the fire, Hager was purposely built as a funeral home, which means he is "fortunate to have lots of space."


Snyder, who has been director at Hager since 2015, said he hopes in 2018 to have all the lights inside replaced with LED light bulbs, for energy efficiency.

White Expands Organ/Tissue Donor Registry; 16- and 17-Year-Olds Can Become Donors

White's legislation allowing 16- and 17-year-olds to register for the state's First Person Consent Organ/-Tissue Donor Registry when they receive their driver's license or identification card took effect on Jan. 1, 2018.

"Our main priority is to save lives," said White. "Thousands of Illinoisans are waiting for an organ. Those who are waiting are someone's mother, father, daughter or son. This new law is an important step in reducing the number of individuals on the waiting list."

Under current law, an individual must be at least 18 years old to join the First

Secretary of State Jesse Person Consent Organ/-Tissue Donor Registry.

> The legislation amends the Illinois Anatomical Gift Act allowing 16- and 17year-olds to join the registry. Those who join the registry will receive a letter of thanks from the Secretary of State's office, and Secretary White encourages 16- and 17-yearolds to use this letter as a basis for discussing their choice with their parents.

> By joining the First Person Consent Organ/-Tissue Donor Registry, 16and 17-year-olds will be giving consent to donate their organs and tissue at the time of their death with only the single limitation that the pro

curement organizations (Gift of Hope Organ & Tissue Network and Mid-America Transplant) must make a reasonable effort to contact a parent or guardian to ensure they approve of the dona-

The parent or guardian will then have the opportunity to overturn the child's decision. Once the 16- or 17year-old turns 18, that decision would be considered legally binding without limi-

There are 47 states that have enacted this legislation. In 2016, more than 350,000 16- and 17-year-olds in Illinois were issued driver's licenses and identification

"Approximately 4,700 people are on the waiting list in Illinois and about 300 hundred people die each year waiting for an organ transplant," said White. "One person can improve the quality of life for up to 25 people. Currently, 6.3 million Illinoisans are registered with the state's registry.'

GSW Board Adopts Six Percent Decline in Property Tax Levy

by Myke Feinman Managing Editor

Gardner-South Wilmington taxpayers will be getting a tax break next year, thanks to action taken Dec. 20.

Superintendent Michael Perrott presented the final levy request, adopted by the school board after a public hearing at which there were no comments.

The estimated total property taxes to be levied are \$1.421 million, compared to the extension of property taxes of \$1.512 million for

Taxing bodies typically adopt a levy request in December then send them to the county assessor, ahead of the assessments performed in the spring.

The levy is the taxing body's best guess as to what actual equalized assessed valuation (one-third market value) will be for taxes payable in 2018.

One of the main reasons for the decrease in the levy request is less debt service.

The estimated property taxes to be levied for debt service and public building commission leases for 2017 are \$174,462.50, a 45 percent decrease over the previous year. The previous year's extension was \$321,935.72.

At the meeting, Perrott presented the working cash bond sale for \$590,000. The board passed the bond measure with no comment.

Principal John Engelman presented the SAT test score report from the spring. GSW had 37 juniors take the SAT for the month of December.

These students are now

seniors, and there were no students who exceeded state expectations.

Engleman said a good percentage met expectations but a low number did not meet the state expectations.

"We are not leaving the lower performing students behind," he told the board.

The board discussed what the high school is doing to enable the students to meet or exceed state expectations on the test.



New Illinois Bicycle Traffic Laws Went Into Effect Monday, January 1 However, some drivers

Three new Illinois bicycle traffic laws went into effect Jan. 1.

The most notable change in traffic law will allow drivers to pass bicycles in a nopassing zone in order to improve cyclist safety and traffic flow on the road. Under certain conditions when it's safe to do so, it will be legal for drivers to cross the solid no-passing centerline into the oncoming lane in order to pass a cyclist by at least three feet, the minimum legal clearance.

The new legislation also officially legalizes bicycling on road shoulders, a common safety practice of cyclists, and allows cyclists to use a rear tail light instead of the legally required rear reflector when bicycling at

The traffic bill, House Bill 1784, was proposed by Ride Illinois, a nonprofit bicycle advocacy organization dedicated to improving bicycling conditions and safety throughout the state. Filed back in January, HB1784 was sponsored and led through the General

Assembly by State Rep. Tim Butler of Springfield and State Sen. Heather Steans of Chicago.

The legislation unanimously passed both chambers in May, and was signed into law by the governor in September. The new legislation went into effect on Jan.

"This new legislation legalizes some common motorist and bicyclist traffic practices," said Ed Barsotti, Illinois' Ride Programs Officer. "The intent is to make the roads safer while improving carbicycle interactions."

Long no-passing zones on two-lane roads commonly present a problem for drivers trying to legally pass a bicyclist with at least three feet of clearance. The travel lanes of most roads lack the width needed for drivers to safely and legally pass a cyclist with at least three feet of clearance while staying within the lane.

In this common situation, most motorists do cross solid centerlines to pass cyclists

choose to pass the cyclist too closely to obey the no-passing zone, and in doing so, illegally squeeze by within the same, too-narrow lane - a scary maneuver sometimes leading to sideswipe crashes.

For long no-passing zones, those drivers obeying both the no-passing zone and the three-feet passing law may not be able to pass a bicycle for a long time. Under the new law, a

motorist may overtake and pass to the left of a bicycle in a no-passing zone when: (1) the bicycle is traveling at a speed of less than half of the posted speed limit; (2) the driver is able to overtake and pass the bicycle without exceeding the posted speed limit; and (3) there is sufficient distance to the left of the centerline.

The driver must also pass with at least three feet clearance of the bicycle - a distance mandated by state law.

The new legislation also legalizes bicycling on shoulders, a common safety practice of biking. Illinois law largely restricts vehicles

driving on a shoulder, with some specified exceptions (e.g. farm tractors and equipment), and the new law adds bicycles to the list of excep-

Having this legal clarity will benefit cyclists as well as road agencies desiring to sign or otherwise designate bicycle routes having paved shoulders. Bicycling on shoulders is not required, however, as there are situations for which cyclists should not ride on a shoul-

The last provision of the new legislation will allow cyclists to use a rear, red tail light instead of (or in addition to) the currently required rear, red reflector when bicycling at night.

Today's improved bicycle light technology has much greater visibility than reflectors, and many bicyclists solely use rear lights already.

Eight states and the City of Chicago already allow either a light or reflector in their vehicle code, and Illinois joined the group beginning Jan. 1.

Last year's crop was a record-breaker at nearly 593 billion bushels, compared to 544 million in 2015.

Kiedra Cuddy Meece, who has been a police officer in Minooka for 17 years and formerly resided in rural Campus, has been named Minooka's Police Officer of the Year for 2016.

Meece, a 1993 graduate of Herscher High School, worked as a police officer in Dwight from June 1997 to December 1999.

After her stint on the Dwight Police force, she secured employment as a patrol officer for the Village of Minooka, where she has held a position as police officer for 17 years.

Eventually, the plan is to move the dealership to the Route 17 location, according to manager Kerry Patchett.

May, 2017

Peritus Plastics, which occupies the space formerly utilized by ITW, opened its doors for business April 3 in Mazon.

The factory, located in the Mazon Industrial Park, northeast of the residential area, at 804 Commercial Drive, produces roughly 50 different automotive parts for various clients, who own the molds and the injectionmolded plastic presses.

The plant is open 24-

hours-a-day, five days a week, using three shifts.

There are 23 employees, most of whom are full-time with some temp workers

with some temp workers.

Many employees are from the "greater" Mazon area including Dwight, Ottawa, Morris and Mazon.

The State of Illinois is allowing the former Dwight Correctional Center to go to seed, so the Department of Human Services pulled its paper records that were warehoused there.

Meanwhile, the state is

paying \$2.4 million to warehouse those records over five years in Springfield at a former furniture store building.

The reason: the Correctional Center building is falling apart.

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

Gasoline prices across the nation surged another 4.4 cents after the Christmas holiday after increasing 2.2 cents the prior week. Gas prices averaged \$2.487 as of Friday, Dec. 29.

"Building on the economic momentum of 2017, drivers appear ready to continue their ever-increasing appetite for gasoline, extending a series of month-to-month increases in consumption compared to the previous year, which was itself a record," said Dan McTeague, analyst for GasBuddy.com. "Combined with increasing oil and fuel exports from the U.S. to global destinations, unforeseen refinery disruptions or weather-related events like hurricanes or the cold snap now hitting the Great Lakes and Northeast, a more expensive year ahead is a given."
