

Dwight Police Dog Succumbs to Incurable Illness, To Be Replaced

Dwight's Police Dog, Katscho, will soon be replaced. He is retiring due to an inoperable tumor, according to his trainer, Dwight K9 Police Officer Watson McKee.

Dwight Administrator Kevin McNamara told The Paper last week the dog will be replaced by a new dog and the K9 program will be continued for the village of Dwight.

The ongoing program costs \$11,000 and McNamara said there are no issues funding it.

However, the Dwight Economic Alliance has chosen the Dwight Police Department Canine Program as this year's recipient of its Fund-A-Need project with a goal of \$20,000.

"The funds include the immediate need of purchasing the Dwight Police Department's next K9 dog and the first-year costs projected for additional training, equipment, food and vetting as needed," said Police Chief Tim Henson.

'We are fortunate that two of our communities are currently in need of K9 dogs so we have the opportunity to cost-share and alleviate some of the regular travel costs normally associated with a community securing a new K9 dog," Henson added.

The fund-raiser will be part of the DEA Annual Auction, Feb. 24, at Station 343, Dwight.

Fund-raisers were held originally for the K9 program which helped pay for a special squad car and other equipment, ranging between \$70,000 and \$80,000, according to Police Chief Tim Henson.

Meantime, Katscho, a German Shepherd reed, has been a Dwight Police dog since December of 2010. After serving for all those years with honor and dedication according to members of the Dwight Police Department, he is now suffering from an inoperable carcinoma tumor in his sinus. "I ask him if he's OK," McKee told The Paper. "He just barks, grabs a toy and runs to the door. Best I can tell is that he still feels fine and is in good spirits. Since his diagnosis, he has been enjoying steak frequently, strawberry ice cream — his favorite — and other assorted foods."

times early on to become the handler, but I saw a necessity for a K9 team," McKee said.

Speaking of need, McKee told a story of an arrest involving Katscho when 34 grams of heroin were seized which was bound for Pontiac

"The heroin tested positive for fentanyl, a deadly narcotic added to heroin to make it more potent," McKee explained. "That's one instance where a drug seizure possibly saved one or several from an overdose death."

Katscho has been deployed for (locating and following) tracks on burglaries, robberies and for a victim involved in a car accident, according to McKee.

His most frequent function is for sniffing the air on traffic stops and narcotic detection at the public schools.

"He has been involved in numerous drug arrests every year," McKee said of Katscho.

"These arrests have reduced drug activity all throughout the county. Before an effective K9 team was on the force, needles were picked up regularly around the village. I am not aware of any needles being found out in public areas discovered by citizens since Katscho started working."

The police dog can be used for mutual aid to other departments, but there is no funding reimbursement, according to McNamara.

The county has a K9 unit as well.

Besides acting as a member of the Dwight Police force, Katscho's pack, Katscho also helped McKee become a better police officer.

"Katscho has gotten me knowledge, experience, training, into situations and exposed me to activity I may never have had in my career," McKee said. "One month with Katscho gave me more than (the) four years of military law enforcement did.



McKee did not originally want to be the K9 officer.

"I had turned down Chief Henson a few

As part of McKee's training, he spent six weeks initially with classroom based education, plus practical training and exercises.

After certification, "we performed daily training, formal monthly training and annual certification throughout his (Katscho's) career," McKee said.

McKee described Katscho as very "poised" and his personality changed to all business when it was time to work.

But sometimes the job involved some funny moments.

"Katscho enjoys waiting until people get right next to the squad (car) then barks at them, giving them a scare," McKee said.

KATSCHO, the Dwight Police K9, has been active with the village for seven years, starting in December of 2010. He is retiring due to an inoperable tumor and will be replaced. K9 Officer Watson McKee will be assigned a new K9 dog for his unit.

"People usually have a good sense of humor be his handler," McKee said. "Katscho has and laugh along with the other officers and me."

Officer McKee will miss Katscho deeply. "I'm proud to have had the opportunity to been treated with love, respect and cared for better than most pets because he means so much to me. He's not just a police dog. I will miss everything about Katscho."



Heroin Overdoses Down in 2017, **But Still Major Issue: Dwight EMS**

The Dwight EMS had significantly less calls in 2017 for heroin/opioid overdose calls, but it remains a major national and local social issue, according to Al Metzke, Dwight EMS director.

In 2017 there was a total of 1,100 EMS calls, which is 51 fewer than in 2016.

Of those calls, 686 involved transporting patients, generally to a hospital.

Other calls may have been assistance to the fire department, or refusals to be transported, Metzke said.

Metzke said in 2017 five people were administered the heroin overdose drug, Narcan, less than half of the Narcan doses in 2016.

But he said a lot of the people that were given Narcan in 2016 are no longer in Dwight, while several are new people.

He mentioned that the number of times Narcan is administered is not the same as the number of people whose lives were saved from a drug overdose death.

He explained that some are people who have had the drug administered two or more times.

He said all the Narcan

calls were in Dwight. Generally, a significantother calls the Dwight EMS for help.

When his department has to go to the same person a second time, it is frustrating for the EMS, but their job is not to judge. It is to save lives.

He said when they have to administer Narcan for the second time, a stronger dose is needed for the person to be saved.

"These people are addicted to it," Metzke said of the OD patients.

"Their bodies are addicted. Their bodies are screaming at them all the time for this drug. Anyone who is able to overcome a drug abuse addiction has made (quite an accomplishment).

"Every person has the ability to be productive for themselves, their family and their community," Metzke said. "You see this (addiction) and you know they are not (productive)."

He said addicts will do anything for the next fix, including illegal activities.

He said a lot of times it started with prescription pain killers in the home. Someone abused their own prescriptions or stole a loved one's pain killers and the addiction began.

Sometimes, if an individ-

ual overdoses, there may not be a loved one around to call for help.

In addition to last year's Narcan calls, this year's EMS calls include 10 ambulance calls in the first three weeks of 2018 due to the nation's flu epidemic.

He said his personnel has been affected by the flu, causing him to be forced to use part-time staff to fill in for full-timers, or call in mutual aid.

"I've had four people out with the flu," he said.

He said anyone who calls with "flu like symptoms" are being transported to the hospital.

"It's worth it to be cautious."

Herscher Hums Along As Town **Climbs Out of Recent Recession**

A sure sign that Herscher was suffering from the economic recession that gripped the nation was a total of 28 homes in town that had either loans foreclosed, or had other issues.

All 28 of those homes are now back "on the tax rolls," according to Herscher Mayor Ray Schneider.

"We are a bedroom community," Schneider said, with most people commuting to work elsewhere.

"In the morning, we have a lot of people heading out of town, plus a lot heading into town."

There are 55 registered businesses in town, too, which employ people, including one of the largest employers, the Herscher Unit 2 school district.

There are 550 homes, with two homes built in town in 2017, Schneider said.

In addition to Herscher itself, there is the natural gas pipeline storage located just south of Herscher and the natural gas pumping station recently opened just north of Herscher to send natural gas to the Chicago suburbs.

poles to Commonwealth Edison last year.

Other reasons for people to live and work in Herscher are the wind turbine farm recently in operation.

He believes the economic doldrums are behind for Herscher.

In Kankakee County, he learned there are 3,000 positions open.

"These are good paying jobs," Schneider said. "They're trying to fill them. I'm amazed at how much business there is around."

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Kankakee County Sheriff **Investigating Shooting**

On 1/17/2018 at approximately 1:45 a.m. Bradley Police and emergency personnel responded to Route 50 and Armour Road in reference to a shooting that had occurred. After further investigation it was determined that the shooting had occurred in Oak Creek Estates Mobile Home Park, which is located in the jurisdiction of the Kankakee County Sheriff's department.

Bradley Police detectives and the Kankakee County Sheriff's Police detectives are working together to determine the facts of this case. At this point in the investigation there is one subject who received a seri-

ous gunshot wound and is still hospitalized.

There are four subjects in custody, 22 year-old Dylan Arbuthnot, 20 year-old Thomas Lafond, 19 year-old Brice Mixon and 23 year-old Michael Whitehead who all have been arrested for Aggravated Battery and Mob Action.

The investigation continues and police encourage anyone with information on the shooting to call the Kankakee County Sheriff's Office at 815-802-7150. You can also remain anonymous by calling CrimeStoppers (815) 93-CRIME. Information may lead to a monetary reward!

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The town itself now has a Dollar General, which Schneider said would not have located in Herscher if the national chain store did not think Herscher would provide enough of a volume to make the store profitable.

But not all businesses make it. Sammy's Pizza, located downtown in Herscher, opened for business but shortly closed.

That store is now being re-opened by a Kankakee based company named 'Papi's.'

Schneider said he heard it was to open in February.

Last year the town also had an expansion of the historical society when the Schreffler Funeral Home donated its funeral home building to the museum, complementing the museum location on Main Street.

Also, a business that distributes electric poles for ComEd is busy, located near Hendrix Town and Country. Schneider said it distributed in excess of 20,000 electric

As for future growth, Schneider said Herscher is not a first choice for everyone, being "off the beaten path" with interstates miles away.

But the town offers a lowcrime, peaceful atmosphere with award-winning schools, and four active churches and four parks.

In the village's future, the board is looking to do some maintenance on the water treatment plant, but has no idea of the cost, or how to finance it.

Street work continues, but motor fuel tax funds don't go too far in today's high cost of road maintenance.

The police department generally runs with three full-time positions, and several part-time positions.

Police Chief Chad Scanlon remains in charge, but one of his officers is leaving so there is a vacancy.

Schneider said there may also be another full-time police vacancy soon.

The downtown lights have been upgraded in 2017, and the village parks continue to be full during youth baseball and football seasons

He said the types of businesses that may choose to locate in Herscher are generally service or retail types. He doesn't see any large manufacturers locating in Herscher.

"We're always going to be a bedroom community, small town America,' Schneider said.

"Her family came from a long line of superheroes," Lilly explained of her creation.

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Member SIPC Questions to Ask Before Taking Social Security

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DTHS BOE Discusses Snow Day Policies

Bryson Connor Recognized at Jan. 17 DTHS BOE Session

The Dwight Grade School Board of Education met on January 17 when a discussion took place around activity participation on days when school is cancelled due to inclement weather.

Board Vice President Jenn Myzia expressed concerns that were raised and questioned, if conditions are bad enough that school is cancelled, whether students should still be traveling in potentially dangerous conditions in order to participate in a practice or activity.

Superintendent Dr. Richard Jancek explained that, when bad weather is forecast to be moving in, a lot goes into the decision to cancel school. And, in order for parents to make accommodations, the earlier the decision is made, the better. Wind chill temperatures and road conditions are just a couple of the things looked at when making a school closure decision. Several other factors in extreme cold can also lead to closure decisions such as heating issues and buses not starting.

"There is no hard and fast rule," explained Dr. Jancek. "And, we don't take these things lightly. We always err on the side of safety. Always."

However, when a decision to cancel school is made, many times by midday roads have cleared and temperatures have risen. In these circumstances, Jancek explained that practices might be allowed and moved to the warmer and safer daylight hours – an option that is gauged and directed by school administration, not individual coaches. Dr. Jancek also noted that the possibility of initiating a late start time policy typically creates a "chaotic" situation with more scheduling problems for parents and busing issues as students may be with sitters and not at their normal pickup locations.

According to Dr. Jancek, there have been no negative consequences to current procedures nor complaints received. The board's direction was that current practices with regard to school closures remain unchanged.

In another matter, the board had the opportunity to share in the recognition of a DTHS student. DTHS and Varsity Basketball player, Bryson Connor, were recognized by the Illinois High School Association for "Sporting A Winning Attitude" following an exemplary show of good sportsmanship. According to the report filed with the IHSA by an official, during the Turkey Tournament, a So. Newton player lost control of a dribble and his balance, falling to the floor.

"Bryson Connor, #24 of Dwight, leaped over the player," stated the report. "With his team gaining possession with the opportunity for a fast transition, he stopped his advancement to help the player to his feet, plus asking him 'Are you OK?? Nice hustle!!!'." The report concluded with "It's great to see an athlete show this kind of concern for the opposition."

Principal Dan Kaiser presented a certificate from the IHSA to Bryson, noting that this was only the second time an SAWA recognition has been given during his time as a principal at DTHS.

"As a former official it takes something that is eye popping or eye catching for an official to write a report like this and send it to the IHSA and in turn get the certificate," stated Mr. Kaiser.

Also in his report to the board, Mr. Kaiser noted that SAT Prep will again be offered for interested junior students this year. The prep will be conducted on three Sundays leading up to the nation test date of April 10th. A fee of \$30 per student will be charged to cover the cost of instruction and snacks/drinks over the three different Sundays. However, a full refund of the \$30 will be offered to those students that participate and attend all three sessions in good standing.

The 2017-18 teacher seniority list was approved as presented. Dwight Township High School currently has 25 full time teachers with two teachers having served DTHS for 20 years or more. Tenure status (five or more years in the district) is held by 14 teachers.

In financials, it was reported that the State of Illinois has submitted all mandated categorical payments for the 2016-17 year. For 2017-18, the State currently owes the Dwight Township High School District \$94,368.25.

The board also:

• approved Luke Standiford, Varsity Football Head Coach (Tim Henson abstained).

• approved Mitch Thompson and Stephanie Simms, Volunteer Assistant Track Coaches.

• accepted the resignation of Carly Winkler, Special Education Aide.

• reviewed the IASB Press Plus Board Policy Updates (First Reading)

• reviewed board policy changes for travel expenses with mileage rates increasing to 54.5 cents per mile and lodging increasing from \$250 to \$300 per night to cover city taxes imposed on accommodations.

Following the regular DTHS board session, a joint session with the DGS BOE was held. The boards learned that Prairie State Insurance Cooperative Property and Casualty Equity Funds were returned to members with the DTHS receiving \$4,568 and DGS receiving \$1,142. Also, the board discussed a new bus lease agreement as the current three-year lease agreement with Midwest Transit of Kankakee expires June 30th. Quotes and a plan will be put together with a decision made in April / May. The joint boards entered executive session with no action following.

The next meeting of the Dwight Township High School Board of Education will be 6 p.m. on Wednesday, February 21, in the District Board Room at DTHS. Meetings are open to the public.
