# DTHS Teachers Create Love Of Reading And Want To Spread It

Erik Borne, second-year English teacher at Dwight Township High School, along with other English teachers and the school library, have created a culture among students that engenders a love of reading.

And now Borne wants to spread that love of reading to the community of Dwight.

He said he began carving out time for students to bring books of their choice to school, and giving them reading time in class.

"Last year, we had 300 books checked out at the school library," Borne said. "This year we had 2,670 books checked out."

He believes that this data speaks volumes, pun intend-

Now he sees students reading before school, in study hall, carrying books around with them to all classes.

Students are asking the library to order books.

culture "The changed," Borne said. "They are reading in study hall instead of looking up to the sky."

And now, Borne and his organization's web site. students, working with Shop Teacher Jeff Froelich have created a "Little Free Library," a tiny building to house books.

This is part of a national program which people may learn about by going online

The idea is that the "building" will be installed at the train station. People may take a book to read on the train, or they can leave

"Over the past couple of years, I have noticed what I call bookhouses popping up in communities," Borne explained.

"Local communities purchase or build these Little Free Libraries, they plant them in a convenient place for residents, and hopefully these initiate a natural sharing of great books.

"Little Free Library is a nonprofit organization that inspires a love of reading, builds community, and sparks creativity by fostering neighborhood book exchanges around the

world," according to the

"Through Little Free Principal Dan Kaiser and Libraries, millions of books are exchanged each year, profoundly increasing access to books for readers of all ages and backgrounds."

The houses are in front of schools, in church and restaurant parking lots, and along walking paths to encourage the concept of getting a book and giving a

"Because our high school students are reading more than ever in these past couple years as a result of some English department and library initiatives, I figured this would be a great way to help grow this excitement for reading outside the high school walls," Borne said.

Kaiser connected with the village to lock in a place for the Little Free Library build-

Froelich built the book house, and a couple of student artists painted it.

Borne is collecting book donations at the school to place in the "library."

The library should be in place at the train station in a few days, Borne anticipates.

### **New Administrative Team** at Dwight Grade School

School Safety Upgrades to include Classroom Phone System

Administration changes were approved by the Dwight Grade School Board of Education when it met in session on May 9.

In March, the BOE accepted the resignation of Pre-K – 8 Building Principal Ben Bailey. Mr. Bailey has accepted a middle school principal position Virginia.

Stepping into the role of Pre-K - 8 Building Principal will be current DGS Assistant Principal and Director Athletic Mr. Brandon Owens. Mr. Owens came to Dwight in 2016 with six years of teaching experience at the middle school level and three years of administrative experience in Kindergarten through 8th He earned his Bachelor Degree from Olivet Nazarene University

and his graduate level degrees in Administration and in Curriculum and Instruction through American College of Education. See related article, "Changing of the Guard", in this week's edition of The Paper.

Mr. Owens will receive a three-year contract with a starting salary of \$78,500. The twelve month contract includes 20 days of vacation. All other benefits are equal to what other faculty and staff receive.

Mrs. Julie Schultz, a Dwight native, will be the new Dwight Grade School Assistant Principal and Athletic Director. Mrs. Schultz comes to DGS with a bachelor's degree from ISU, master's in educational leadership from the University of St. Francis, and is currently teaching 7th grade English Language Arts, specifically 7th grade Reading, and holds the ath-



"There are a lot of similarities," he said between his hometown and Dwight. "Except now, I'm just older," he added, with a broad smile.


### **Water Testing for Nitrates**

The Livingston County Soil & Water Conservation District, along with the Illinois Corn Growers, is once again offering free water testing for nitrates from tile water, which will be done on the second and fourth Tuesdays of the month from 3:00-4:00 p.m.

Sample containers should be clean and free of any residual chemicals or detergents and need to be at least eight ounces. They should be taken as close to the testing time as possible, preferably within 48 hours, and be kept refrigerated if not being tested immediately. An estimate of flow will allow additional calculations.

Simply record how many seconds it takes to fill up a bucket of a known volume. They have two gallon buckets and sample collection bags at the SWCD office.

(continued from page 1) here. All three of our children, Cal, Jordan, and Jack will be students at Dwight Township High School next

"My vision as an educational leader is to continue to foster a love of learning for the students and faculty through a positive school culture," continued Mrs. Schultz. "In my 19 years of teaching experience, I have had the privilege to teach within the primary, intermediate, and middle school grades. I am fully invested in the Dwight community and look forward to dedicating myself to the children and teachers at DGS as assistant principal/athletic director."

Mrs. Schultz will receive a three year contract with a starting salary of \$67,500. The 220 day contract will include all other benefits equal to what other faculty and staff receive.

Superintendent Dr. Richard Jancek stated, "I am excited for Mr. Bailey and his family on his new leadership opportunity. I've worked with Mr. Bailey for the past eight years and want to publicly thank him for all of his leadership working with our students, parents and staff. I am equally excited about our new administrative team starting July 1st. They will bring a lot of energy, passion and new leadership style."

In unfinished business, the board approved support increases. salary Support Staff at Dwight Grade School will receive a three percent salary increase effective July 1. The three percent increase equates to \$15,192 annually across all support staff personnel. Support staff includes office personnel, aides, custodians, school nurse, and the board treasurer. Currently DGS employs 30 support staff.

In new business, the board approved a contract with Rival 5, Hosted Phone Solutions and Intercom Services, which will include the installation of a phone in every classroom. Currently, every classroom does not have a phone. Through the new system, classroom phones can also double as intercoms and local police can utilize these intercoms in an emergency. The system, which will be installed this summer, is considered a huge safety upgrade for the building.

Cost of the new classroom phone system is \$15,665 for the initial installation with a monthly cost of \$1,269. These total costs are shared with the Dwight Township High School District and are pending DTHS BOE approval. Currently, \$1,092 per month is paid for the present phone

The BOE affirmed Pre-K Grant funding requests.

Receiving notice that additional 2017-18 Pre-K Grant funding monies from the State of Illinois are available, the District has submitted grant requests for additional playground equipment, a storage shed, classroom furniture and addition-

al curriculum. The Board approved expenditures for the Triple-I Conference attendees to include mileage and registration fees. The November conference is an opportunity for professional development for school board mem-

The Board approved 8th Grade promotions, as presented, pending successful completion of all require-Forty-four DGS Eighth Graders are expected to graduate. The DGS 8th Grade promotion ceremony date is set for 7 p.m., Thursday, May 24, in the DTHS gymnasium.

A Summer Reading program was approved with three, one-week sessions being offered. The program will run from July 23 -August 9. Each session will be from 8 a.m. - noon and for students K - 4.

As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally-occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances esulting from the presence of animals or from human

ontaminants that may be present in source water

Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations, and wildlife.

Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally-occurring or result from urban storm water runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farming.

Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban storm water runoff, and residential uses.

Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban storm water runoff, and septic systems.

Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally-occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations which limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. FDA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water which must provide the same protection for public health.

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population.

Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly and infants can be particularly at risk from infections These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. #### Source Water Assessment

The source water assessment for our supply has been completed by the Illinois EPA. If you would like a copy of this information, please stop by Village Hall or call our water operator at 815-584-1128. To view a summary version of the completed Source Water Assessments, including: Importance of Source Water; Susceptibility to Contamination Determination; and documentation/recommendation of Source Water Protection Efforts, you may access the Illinois EPA website at http://www.epa.state.il.us/cgi-bin/wp/swap-fact-sheets.pl.

Source of Water: DWIGHT To determine Dwight's susceptibility to groundwater contamination, a Well Site Survey, published in 1992 by the Illinois EPA, and a Source Water Assessment Program, were reviewed. Based on the information contained in these documents, six potential sources of groundwater contamination are present that could pose a hazard to groundwater pumped by the Dwight community water supply wells. These include a foundry/metal working, two vehicle sales, and three below ground fuel storages. Based on information obtained by Dwight water supply officials, the following facilities, also indicated as potential sources in the site data table, have had their tanks removed: Dempsey Dodge Chrysler Plymouth (now Public Service Complex), Tri Oil Station, TD Petroleum, Arthur Leach, and the Village of Dwight, Rub Buick Chevrolet Oldsmobile, Phillip Becker, and unknown underground fuel storage. Based upon this information, the Illinois EPA has determined that Dwight Wells #7, #8, and #9 are not susceptible to IOC, VOC, or SOC contamination. Based on their proposed construction and location, the Illinois EPA anticipates that proposed Well #101 will not be susceptible to IOC, VOC, or SOC contamination when it comes on line. This determination is based on a number of criteria including: monitoring conducted at the wells; monitoring conducted at the entry point to the distribution system; and the available hydrogeologic data for the wells. In anticipation of the U.S. EPA's proposed Ground Water Rule, the Illinois EPA has determined that Dwight's community water supply wells are not vulnerable to viral contamination. This determination is based upon the evaluation of the following criteria during the Vulnerability Waiver Process: the community's wells are properly constructed with sound integrity and proper site conditions; there is a hydrogeologic barrier that restricts pathogen movement; all potential routes and sanitary defects have been mitigated such that the source water is adequately protected; monitoring data did not indicate a history of disease outbreak; and the sanitary survey of the water supply did not indicate a viral contamination threat. However, having stated this, the U.S. EPA is proposing to require States to identify systems in karst, gravel and fractured rock aquifer systems as sensitive. Water systems utilizing these aquifer types would be required to perform routine source water monitoring. Because the community's wells are constructed in a confined aquifer, which should provide an adequate degree of protection to prevent the movement of pathogens into the wells, well hydraulics were not considered to be a significant factor in the vulnerability determination.

## **Squeaky Train Wheels Get Grease: Amtrak Refunds Rooks Creek School's Money**

Squeaky wheels on the Amtrak trains will soon receive the proverbial grease, or in this case, a refund.

After fighting with Amtrak for nearly three months to resolve an issue regarding a field trip, Dwight resident Todd Bean and Superintendent of Rooks Creek School District in Graymont, has some closure: Amtrak will refund the school's money.

"Amtrak has had a series of conversations with officials with Graymont School and we have been unable to find a mutually agreeable date and time for this year's school trip," wrote Marc Magliari, public relations manager, Amtrak government affairs and corporate communications in an email to The Paper last week on May 10.

"Therefore, we are refunding their payment with apologies for the time it has taken to resolve this issue."

Bean credits the efforts of Illinois State Senator Jason which includes Livingston County).





#### How Can You Meet Your Short-term Goals?

Why do you invest? If you're like most people, you'd probably say that, among other things, you want to retire comfortably. Obviously, that's a worthy long-term goal, requiring long-term investing. But as you journey through life, you'll also have short-term goals, such as buying a second home, remodeling your kitchen or taking a much-needed vacation. Will you need to invest differently for these goals than you would for the long-term ones?

To answer that question, let's first look at how you might invest to achieve your longer-term goals. Nonetheless, these types of investments are usually not difficult to sell, either before they mature or at maturity, and this liquidity will be helpful to you when you need the money to meet your short-term goal.

Stability of issuer – Although most investments suitable for short-term goals do provide a high degree of preservation of principal, some of the issuers of these investments are stronger and more stable than others – and these strong and stable issuers are the ones you should stick with.
