Kinsman Mayor for Three Decades Honored by State

The Village of Kinsman lost a valuable commodity April 19: its late mayor of more than three decades, Mark Harlow.

The State Assembly honored his passing May 22 with a resolution read in his honor, attended by his wife, Doreen, son, Perry, and daughter, Kaitlyn.

The event was commemorated by State Senator Susan Rezin and State Rep. David Welter, both representing the Kinsman area.

"I used to brag to other kids I was the first son of Kinsman," Perry told The Paper last week. "But I never said it was a town of 99 people."

Mark did not meet his future wife Doreen until after he was already Mayor of Kinsman, according to his son Perry.

'My mom and dad met at E.J. Carz, on the Grand Ridge Road near Verona," Perry said. His mother was from Minooka and came down to help at the tavern, working with Perry's grand-

mother, Rita Mills. "Dad came in with a business card and gave it to her," Perry said. Mark's card had such jobs listed as Mayor of Kinsman, Highland Township Road Commissioner, among other

"She's like, 'He's got to be kidding," Perry said.

And many people explained to Doreen that in fact Mark was all those things and was a "good guy, so they pressured her into dating him."

The rest is the Harlow family history.

A Kinsman native, he graduated from Mazon High School, the son of Elmer and Edna "Ruth" Freese Harlow. Mark married Doreen Mills August 19, 1989 in Dwight.

Mark spent his life devoted to public service. He served as the Mayor of Kinsman over the past thirty years and served as the Highland Township Road Commissioner.

Perry said during his tenure as mayor, a new well was blended with the older well to improve water quality thanks to a grant from the Environmental Illinois Protection Agency, and he was planning to fix the pump house.

Kinsman has water service to homes, but each home

has its own septic tank. Perry explained that his father was always ready to help his neighbors, giving the example of a person whose sump pump failed during a rainstorm, and Mark took his pump from their own home to help his neighbor during the emer-

His obituary reflected similar actions on the late Mayor's part.

"He will be remembered as a friend by everyone, especially for answering his phone at any time at night to help post a flooded road or to plow out someone's driveway after a big snow," the obituary stated.

He was a member of the Grundy County Farm Bureau and was a volunteer with the Verona-Kinsman Fire Department.

Perry said the village has yet to replace Mark as both mayor and the township needs to replace him as road commissioner, a position he had held for 15 years.

The son of a farmer, Mark grew up on the family farm two miles south of Kinsman. He and his father grew corn and soybeans on the family farm. He raised sheep as part of his 4-H and FFA projects. After high school, he helped his father farm until Mark retired from

farming in 2017. He loved his International-Harvester tractors and the family will remember him for his passion for his Farmall H tractor and snowmobiling with his family and friends.

"At the visitation, not one negative thing was said about my father," Perry



Father Chris Haake is busy going through a transition involving three parishes in the northeastern corner of Livingston County.

The church members learned May 20 from Bishop Daniel R. Jenky, Peoria Diocese, that the parish of Sacred Heart Church in Campus would be merged into the parish of St. Patrick, Dwight.

'The church of Sacred Heart, Campus, shall be properly maintained and used for worship at the pastor's discretion," the decree states.

The changes go into effect June 13.

"First of all, I have great empathy and compassion for us at Sacred Heart," he said, emphasizing the word "us," "as it goes through the transition from a parish to a chapel," Father Chris Haake told The Paper last week.

"Being my second home here, it's like losing a loved one," he said. "But I also know God is with us and he always has a plan we don't necessarily see."

The main reason for the changes is a dwindling church population, according to a letter written as part of the announcement by Jenky.

"It is well known that populations have been

"There's just so much history," Walsh said.

He said it will now be considered a "chapel of ease" with worship services for major holidays like Christmas.

The Bishop defined the chapel of ease as an alternative worship site, which provides "occasional Masses or other liturgical activities. Masses at these churches will be reduced and will no longer have regularly scheduled Masses."

As part of the decree, Campus parishioners will remain in charge of raising funds to maintain the build-"We always give of our

time, treasure and talent," Walsh said, believing maintaining the building will be no trouble for Campus parishioners.

He said he is very proud of the building, describing the nave and sanctuary as "beautiful."

He is hopeful that Father Haake will come as often as possible.


"All we are asking is an hour a week," he said.

He said the Campus church serves between 50 and 60 families in the Campus area. The village itself has a population of roughly 200 people.

This transition also affects St. Paul Church in Odell, where there is also a K-8 Catholic School attended by students from Campus, Dwight and Odell.

Father Haake will now also be the pastor in Odell, replacing three priests from the Pontiac area.



A Streator woman was shot May 22 at 8:48 p.m., and later died of her wounds, with the suspects fleeing the scene and apprehended in Dwight later that night.

Maria M. Delatorre, of Streator, 33, was found dead at 213 W. Ninth Street in Streator, according to the La Salle County Coroner's Office in a news release dated May 23.

An autopsy was performed and the incident remains under investigation, the coroner's office said.

Streator police were dispatched to Delatorre's home in reference to shots fired.

"Upon arrival officers discovered a female victim had been shot," the Streator Police said in a news release May 23.

She was transported to the Streator OSF Center for Health Emergency Room where she was pronounced

dead. Suspect and vehicle information were obtained and broadcast to other law enforcement agencies.

A Livingston County Sheriff's Patrol Deputy the vehicle description driving at a "high rate of speed" on Route 17. A vehicle pursuit ensued.

The suspect vehicle was driven to Dwight and crashed in the area of Route 17 and Route 66, with the suspects fleeing on foot.

Dwight Police assisted Livingston County.

"One suspect was apprehended and was transported to the Streator Police Department," the news release stated.

"The two remaining suspects were taken into custody, thanks to a Dwight citizen calling in with a tip," said Dwight Police Chief Tim Henson.

The Dwight Police were assisted by the Livingston County Sheriff's Police, Illinois State Police, Illinois State Police Special Ops, Air Patrol, Pontiac, Fairbury Police, Livingston County Pro-Active Unit and many others.

"As your Chief of Police, I want to assure all the citizens of Dwight that your safety was our number one priority," Chief Henson wrote. "With the help of

an extremely dangerous situation and resolve it with no one getting hurt."

During the search for the two remaining suspects, Dwight Police conducted an article search. Dwight Police were assisted by 11 canine teams, 17 law enforcement agencies, approximately 40 **ILEAS** officers and Command Vehicle and ITECH trailer providing 50 portable radios for communication purposes.

Several hours later, two other suspects were apprehended in the Dwight area and transported to the Streator Police Department.

The investigation continues involving the Streator Police Department, La Salle County State's Attorney's office, Illinois State Police Crime Scene Services, Livingston County Sheriff's Office and the Dwight Police Department.

Court Orders New Hearing for Mautino

A state Appellate Court ruled May 22 that the Illinois Board of Elections must revisit allegations that Illinois Auditor General Frank Mautino's campaign committee made hundreds of thousands of dollars in questionable payments while he was a state representative.

The 4th District Board of Appeals in Springfield sent the matter back to the Illinois Board of Elections, ordering the Board to rule on whether some \$225,000 in payments made Mautino's campaign committee to Happy's Super Service Station in Spring Valley, IL, were legitimate payments for fuel and vehicle repairs, and whether nearly \$200,000 in expenditures that Mautino's campaign committee reported making to Spring Valley City Bank were legal.

Following the ruling, the Liberty Justice Center, Chicago, representing former Dwight resident David Cooke of Streator, issued the following statement from senior attorney Jeffrey Schwab:

"Our client (Cooke) alleges that Mautino's campaign committee spent campaign money illegally over a period of 16 years while he was a state representative, and it's crucial that we reach a resolution on this matter. The job of the Illinois auditor general is to ensure the state spends taxpayer money

properly, and taxpayers need to know whether Auditor General Mautino broke the law before taking statewide office . . . no elected official is above the law - and if there was wrongdoing, Auditor General Mautino

must be held accountable." The case of David Cooke vs. the Illinois Board of Elections began in February of 2016 after Cooke filed a complaint with the Illinois State Board of Elections alleging the Committee for Frank Mautino violated the Illinois Election Code in two

ways: Mautino's campaign committee made more than \$225,000 in payments to Happy's Super Service Station in Spring Valley between 1999 and 2015. These payments were for gas and repairs of vehicles privately owned by Mautino's family and friends.

Direct payments for gas and repairs of privately owned vehicles by campaign committees are illegal under Illinois law. Individuals who use privately owned vehicles for campaign purposes may only be reimbursed based on actual mileage, according to the Liberty Justice Center.

Mautino's campaign committee reported that it made nearly \$200,000 in expenditures to Spring Valley City Bank, but the committee's former treasurer admitted these actually were cash withdrawals from the committee's checking account that were spent elsewhere. Justice Center lawyers stated that the campaign committee never reported which vendors or individuals actually received the money.

Mautino was appointed Auditor General of Illinois by the Illinois legislature in January of 2016. He previously served as a state representative from Spring Valley for 24 years.



"Did YOU Hear the Frog?"

Asked Veronica Matuszewski - a sixth grader at Tri-Point Schools, remarking about the loud sound coming from her backvard pool in Kempton. It was a loud gray tree frog - the first one recorded in Ford County. These frogs may be found near wet, wooded areas throughout the county, but haven't been reported before this. Veronica's neighbors, Akiko Thorson-Saffer - art teacher at Tri-Point Schools, and Scott Saffer - science teacher at Prairie Central, helped Veronica catch and identify the frog. They also recorded the frog's loud call. Mr. Saffer had done field research with the Illinois Natural History Survey, and contacted Andy Kuhns and

Chris Phillips there – who confirmed the find. They will determine the exact species (gray tree frog -Hyla versacolor or Cope's tree frog -Hyla crysocelis) based on the call or DNA analysis - the two species are otherwise difficult to distinguish. Veronica will be credited for her scientific discovery in the record for that frog species at the Natural History Survey, and will be a co-author on a research paper that Mr. Saffer hopes to publish. He and his students from Tri-Point and Prairie Central have found six previous records of amphibians and rep-





tiles in Ford and Livingston Counties. As a result of their records, the previous discoveries have been published in Herpetological Review, a scientific research journal. Veronica was excited about her find, and was surprised at its importance. She'll definitely be keeping her eyes (and ears) open for more discoveries.

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'What She Saw' Gallery at **Pontiac Art Center in June**


In extras, both teams would go scoreless in the eighth – followed by a goose egg from Dwight in the top half of the ninth inning.

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

According to a professional clown, you still have to go to college if you want to "clown around" professionally.

Skeeter the Clown visited students at Dwight Grade School and Herscher Grade School, Tuesday, May 22, to herald the Culpepper & Merriweather Circus coming to those towns next week.

The Circus will be setting up on the morning of Friday, June 1, at Dwight Grade School starting at 9:30.

The circus performs at 5 and 7:30 in Dwight that night.

At Herscher it will be setting up at Pilot Park Soccer Fields.

She said the clown college closed 18 years ago with dwindling student populations for the lost art of clowning.

She said in the European tradition, circuses had just one main ring with an audience of less than 300. In America, there were circuses with four to seven rings, and audiences of thousands. For that reason, clowns began to do pantomime instead of talking because their voices could not be heard in such a large tent.

"In the '30s and '40s, Walt Disney hired circus clowns to learn about an animated character," Skeeter explained, saying clowns were the first "animated characters.'

She said she is the last "advance" clown that heralds the coming of a circus to towns.

She said the circus includes Leo, a clown in the show that started his career at the age of 18, 18 years

"He comes out of a two by two by two foot car," she said, having to tenderly squeeze his body into the tiny vehicle. "He can't hardily get his feet in there. He does a lot of slapstick."

She said there are unicycles, and the "wheel of destiny, which is like two Ferris wheels with people walking both inside and out of the wheel, trapeze artists, wire walkers, and animals.

The lion in the circus is a 500 pound black mane species.

"That is a big kitty cat," she said.

A stallion is in the show, 18 hands high, with a miniature pony that measures 26 inches high. The act is called the "Big and Little Act," she



What to do When a Tire Blows Out While Driving

Many frightening scenarios can unfold while driving. Inclement weather can affect visibility and the safety of roads, while distracted driving can put anyone on the road in harm's way.

One situation that can suddenly turn a Sunday drive into something scary is a blown out tire. No drivers or vehicles are immune to blown out tires. But savvy drivers who know what to do in such situations can greatly reduce their risk of a blown out tire turning into something far worse.

Recognizing a blown out **tire** The movies might make blown out tires seem as though drivers suddenly find themselves in wholly uncontrollable situations. But blown out tires won't imme-

diately send cars into the nearest roadside ditch. When a tire blows, the vehicle will immediately slow down and then begin pulling to the right or left, depending on which side of the car suffered the blowout. If a front tire blows out, drivers will feel the force in their steering wheels, while a rear tire blowout will be felt more in the seat and/or body of the vehicle.

Driving through a **blowout** Plenty of drivers have safely navigated their way through tire blowouts. When such a situation arises, drivers should avoid slamming on their brakes, instead allowing their vehicles to gradually decelerate, making sure to turn on their emergency flashing lights once

they are certain they have control of the vehicle. As the vehicle slows down, pull to the side of the road, calling for help if necessary.

When on the side of the road Drivers who do not have a spare tire or cannot change the tire themselves should wait patiently for assistance to arrive after they have called for help. Drivers who can change their tires should place reflective cones or triangles behind their vehicles before they begin working. Such devices warn oncoming drivers of stranded vehicles. If replacing the tire with a donut, remember that such replacement tires are not designed to travel long distances and will need to be replaced shortly after they are put on the vehicle.

Keep Summer Road Trips Safe

When the outdoors beckons, road trips can be the perfect way to see the countryside, escape the routine of daily life and enjoy short vacations.

When taking to the open road, it is important to focus on safety. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration says that planning and prevention can spare road-trippers from the consequences of breakdowns, traffic accidents or other road emergencies.

· Stock emergency preparedness items. Prior to a trip, drivers should make sure their vehicles are equipped with necessary safety items. Liberty Mutual Insurance New Beginnings Report warns that nearly half of Americans do not check that proper emergency items are stored in their vehicles prior to getting on the road. Before embarking on a road trip,

make sure vehicles have a first aid kit, flashlight, water bottles, phone chargers, tirerepair tools, flares, jumper cables, towels, and even an old backpack for storage.

• Schedule a service call. Regular maintenance can keep vehicles from breaking down. Drivers should take their cars in for tuneups before long road trips. Such tuneups should include an oil change, battery check, tire rotation, and any other necessary servicing.

• Plan your route. Map out the route before heading out. Be aware of potential road closures, obstacles or construction. Thanks to realtime GPS updates through mobile phones and other devices, some drivers like to rely on tech to get them through. But it's important to realize service may be spotty in rural areas. Mapping a trip out in advance can save drivers

from getting lost during mobile service interruptions.

• Join a roadside repair service. Breakdowns happen even if trips are carefully planned. Automotive clubs can help drivers when breakdowns occur. Some car manufacturers also include roadside assistance in warranty packages, so inquire about your coverage.

 Refresh defensive driving skills. A safe-driving course can remind drivers of the rules of the road. In some cases, courses also may qualify drivers for discounts on their auto insurance policies. One such class is the AARP Driver Safety course.

• Avoid distractions. Keep children and other passengers occupied so they are not a distraction to the driver. Set out with favorite music, books, video games, or even a pad and paper for doodling. Pack snacks to

keep everyone feeling full in between roadside pit stops. Drivers also can load their cars up with tissues, water and music to limit distrac-

· Plan fun breaks along the way. Breaks give drivers a reason to rest and passengers an opportunity to get out and stretch their legs.

The Roadside America smartphone app lists mustsee stops along any route, and drivers can plan their

contributing factor 100,000 accidents every year. Drive only when welleveryone is well-rested.

Road trips are all about fun, but drivers must emphasize safety before and during such excursions.

How Drivers Can Stay Safe in Bright Conditions

Weather often contributes to motor vehicle accidents. Snow, rain and other factors that compromise drivers' vision can make driving hazardous, but there's a dark

side to sunny skies as well. Glare from the sun can compromise drivers' vision and lead to driving mishaps, regardless of drivers' experience or skill level. The sun can pack a powerful punch any time during the day, but can be especially hazardous in the early morning sunrise and late-afternoon sunset.

A 2017 study published in the journal Medicine titled, "Life-threatening motor vehicle crashes in bright sunlight" looked at the risks posed by bright sunlight. Researchers found that the risk of a life-threatening crash was 16 percent higher during bright sunlight than during normal weather. Researchers concluded that bright sunlight may create visual illusions that lead to driver error, including poor distance judgement.

Plentiful sunlight is often a hallmark of spring and summer, but sun-blindness is a real concern for drivers. As anyone who has turned into blazing sun only to discover their windshield has been rendered opaque by sun glare can attest, driving on sunny days can be challenging. Unfortunately, the sun might create substantial glare during rush hour, making driving during these times more dangerous and accidents more likely.

While there might be no way to prevent glare, drivers can take steps to make driving safer during times of day when glare is prevalent.

· Make sure the windshield is clean. Water marks, dead insects, cracks, and road grime can make it even harder to see out of the windshield when the sun is blazing. Clean windshields regularly, and don't wait until you're head-on into the sun to engage the windshield washer spray. Doing so may only further compromise visibility.

• Observe speed limits. When glare is present, slow down and keep more space

between your vehicle and the vehicle in front of you. If someone in front of you needs to brake suddenly, the greater distance between vehicles can give you more time to react and avoid acci-

• Change your route. Try changing your commute so you're not driving head-on into eastern sun in the morning and western sun in the afternoon.

• Invest in new sunglasses. Special lenses that mitigate glare, UV rays and blue light can make it easier for drivers to handle glare when behind the wheel.


· Make sure the visor is functioning. Sun visors are there for a reason. Use it to the best of your ability, angling as needed.

• Pull over. If the glare is especially bad, Plymouth Rock Assurance suggests playing it safe and pulling over until the sun rises or sets. You also may want to change your driving time to avoid the glare.



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


