Pioneer Gothic Church Among Top 200

Dwight's Pioneer Gothic Church, 201 North Franklin St., home to the Dwight Township offices, has been selected by the American Institute of Architects as one Illinois' "200 Great Places" to visit on the occasion of Illinois' 200th Anniversary, 1818-2018.

In 2007, the AIA also selected Dwight's Pioneer Gothic Church as one of its "150 Great Places" to visit on the occasion of the AIA's 150th Anniversary.

- The AIA described the church thusly:

"Dwight's 1857 Pioneer Gothic Church is a rare example of wooden "Carpenter Gothic" architecture in Illinois. The Gothic revival is often associated with masonry buildings and cathedrals, but this wooden version reveals the skill of the builder in making the architecture translation from stone to wood.

"The use of board-andbatten siding instead of the typical clapboards places an emphasis on verticality, while using a material most often associated with barns. The window pediments and the chamfered corners of the tower are also carefully crafted details that reinforce verticality."

The building has served the area as both a church and township hall.

The Pioneer Gothic Church was added to the National Register of Historic Places in 1983.

The church was built by a Presbyterian congregation in the village in 1857. In 1860, Prince Edward of Wales visited Dwight on a hunting expedition for wild birds and attended a service at the church.

The church was rehabilitated during 2017, at a cost of about \$100,000 in township funds. Steeple beams were rebuilt/replaced, leaks were repaired, and siding was repaired and repainted.

Patti Rosenbaum, Dwight Township Supervisor, told The Paper a new roof is a future project, and possibly some window coverings.

The church may be rented for weddings, anniversaries, birthdays, parties, etc.

The 4th Wednesday of each month the church becomes the township's food pantry and distributes food to those eligible.

Free Little Library Donated to South Wilmington Grade School

On May 29th former students and colleagues of Roberta Corneglio met at South Wilmington Grade School for the dedication of the Free Little Library donated to the Grade School by former colleague Joel Micetich and his wife Linda

Roberta Corneglio, who passed away in December of 2016, taught Language Arts and Social Studies to Jr. High Students for 40 years at SWGS from 1966-2006.

Mrs. Corneglio was an avid reader, lover of children's literature, and collector of books passing this love of reading onto her students. At school she became a second mother to many of the younger teachers on staff, especially to Mr. Micetich who taught along-

side of Mrs. Corneglio for almost 30 years. Micetich spoke of Mrs. Corneglio and her leadership and friendship to all who worked at South Wilmington as well as her impact on her students. These students even today will always refer to her as "Mrs. Corneglio". She taught three generations of students at SWGS, and her legacy lives on as demonstrated by two-thirds of the current students attending SWGS placing books in the beautifully painted library, which were donated by former col-leagues, staff, friends, and family in her remembrance.

The motto on the Free Little Library reads, "If you have a Garden and a Library, you have Everything that you need." Mrs. Corneglio's

husband Richard worked in maintenance at SWGS, so this library is actually a tribute to both of these wonderful caring people in the community. While Mrs. Corneglio cultivated the love of reading, her husband was an avid gardener, sharing his bountiful harvest with friends and neighbors. Public Meeting on Proposed Certified Crop Land Assessed Values June 22 in Pontiac

meeting on the proposed certified crop land assessed values for the 2019 assessment year at 9:00 a.m. on Friday, June 22 in the Livingston County Historic Courthouse Assessment Office meeting room located on the 1st floor. The purpose of the meeting is to inform the public of the changes that will be occurring in 2019 based on the recent change in the law on farm land assessments.

The Farmland Assessment Law changed for the 2015 assessment year, as amended by Public Act 98-0109. 35 ILCS 200-10-115 now limits the annual change in farmland assessments to 10% from the preceding year's median soil productivity index certified assessed value with an addi-

There will be a public tional \$5.00 per acre reduction for the 2015 assessment year only. The median productivity index for the State of Illinois is 111. As a result, farmland assessed values, on a per parcel basis, can change by more than 10%, with soils that have lower productivity indexes than the median increasing more than 10% and those with higher productivity indexes than the median increasing by less than 10%. The goal for the change in law is to close the gap between the poorer soils and the better soils. For 2015 there was a 22:1 ratio between the highest and lowest PI. For 2019, the gap will be reduced to 6:1. The ultimate goal is to get that ratio to 2:1 by the year 2029.

For the 2019 assessment year, the Farmland Technical

Advisory Committee has adjusted the certified values to limit the change to 10% from the preceding year's median soil productivity index certified assessed value. The median soil productivity index is 111, which results in an increase in the assessed value for each productivity index of \$29.10/acre from the 2018 assessment.

The effect of this law is to increase those productivity indexes below 111 at a faster rate than those above 111 to create a more narrow range of certified crop land assessed values. The 10% limit in the past has distorted the ratio in assessed values over the range of productivity indexes.

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

Father's Day - Lessons About Money Can Be Priceless Gifts to Children

These lessons can include the following:

Setting goals - If you are contributing to an IRA and a 401(k) or similar employer-sponsored plan, explain how you build these accounts now, while you are working, so you'll have enough money to enjoy a comfortable retirement someday. And you can bring your children into the picture, too, by telling them that another financial goal is saving enough to help send them to college or to further their education in other ways.

Value of understanding the financial markets – You may actually be quite surprised at how interested your kids are in investing, especially the concept of "owning" companies through stocks and stock-based vehicles. Depending on their ages, you might even want to show them the progress of your own investments and describe, in general terms, how different events can cause the markets to rise and fall, especially in the short term. You could even discuss the difference between the basic types of investments, such as stocks and bonds.


Putting time on your side – You might want to emphasize the importance of patience, and how investing is not a "get-rich-quick" scheme, but a process that requires decades of diligence and persistence. Let your children know that it's of great value to start investing as early as possible, so you can put time on your side, giving investments a chance to grow.

Living within your means - We all know that you can't always get what you want. Stress to your children that you can't just splurge on big purchases whenever you feel like it, because such behavior can lead to bad outcomes. Use concrete examples: If you have a car that's several years old, tell your children that it would be nice to have a new one, but you simply must wait until you can afford it.

Paying debts on time – Tell your children that, no matter how good a saver you are, or how thrifty you try to be, you still have debts, such as your mortgage payment, and it's important to pay these debts on time. You may not want to get too detailed about the consequences of missing debt payments – bad credit scores may not be that easy for children to understand - but you can certainly mention that if you're always late on payments, you might find it harder to borrow money when you really need it.

By sharing these principles with your children, you will, at the least, give them something to think about, and you may well find that you've helped start them on the path to a lifetime of making solid financial moves. And who knows? If they truly master the ideas you've taught them, one day they might give you some really nice Father's Day gifts.



Working to Get Advisory Referendum on Ballot

A group of citizens has been working to get a non-partisan, advisory referendum on the November 2018 ballot.

There is a need for more than 900 signatures by early

This action was inspired by the County Board's vote to eliminate the Livingston County Community Health Care program in November of 2018, a program that provides some home nursing and housekeeping assistance at a sliding scale rate, for citizens who are not served by other programs and who wish to stay in their

This program has been running since 2009, after the board determined to close the county nursing home. This was after a 2005 advisory referendum when more than 70% of the county residents voted to maintain and/or build a new nursing home, to care for Livingston County citizens' needs.

Community Care was intended to provide services for those who did not need nursing home care.

Currently, this home care assistance is the growing trend for senior and disabled care. This permits citizens to remain in their homes, paying taxes, using local businesses and services, and maintaining the lifestyle to which they are accustomed.

The advisory referendum, worded as:

"Should the Livingston County Board maintain an adequate budget to provide county residents with the support they need to experience and maintain independent living?" answered by "yes" or "no."

This question on the ballot provides a non-partisan means of showing the County Board feelings - pro or con - about how tax dollars should be spent. It is an opportunity to express yourself on this topic.


Dwight Garden Walk Sunday, June 24

Happy Anniversary, Charlie Palmer

With all the attention being placed this year on one anniversary or another – the 200th of our State of Illinois being the most notable – it slipped this writer's attention that it has been 150 years since Editor/Publisher Charlie Palmer printed the first edition of a weekly newspaper in Dwight, "The Star," on May 5, 1868.

Mr. Palmer could not keyboard his thoughts in 1868 – instead he would open a typecase and assemble words, letter by letter, to compose the text of his first 6"x9" 4-page newspaper.

There are no words to adequately describe the rapture that must have existed in the printing world when Ottmar Merganthaler invented the Linotype in 1885. The Linotype could assemble a line of type in brass matrices, then cast a complete line from molten lead. Look it up.

This writer was introduced to the Linotype/letterpress era in about 1946, when it was determined I was old enough to be a "printer's devil." A "printer's devil" did such important things as wipe, with gassoaked rags, the ink off rollers from the presses, and remove lead plates from their wooden bases.

But I digress.

Charlie Palmer was editor of The Star 1868-1888.

C. A. Stuck became owner in 1888, and changed the name to the North Star.

In 1889, C. D. Plummer was asked to change the name of his competing Dwight Herald to Dwight Star & Herald, assuming the original volume and number of the Dwight Star. This was

Other publishers followed:

Wm. Dustin, Allan Holbrook, and Arthur Tock, who had worked his way from printer to sole publisher shortly before he died in 1953. The business transferred ownership to Mrs. Tock and son Tom.

Mrs. Tock died in 1968. Pat Cleary, who had become a partner in 1961, died in 1980.

The Dwight Star & Herald completed a move from 112 West St. to 204 E. Chippewa St. and converted from letterpress to the offset printing process and electronic typesetting.

The business became Star Newspapers after acquiring several area weekly papers, and was sold in 1994 to Scott McGraw of Michigan. Subsequently, McGraw sold Star Newspapers to Liberty Publishing in 1998. Liberty terminated publication of the papers in 2002.

Charlie Palmer must have cried. Along with others.


Mary Tock Boma and her husband, Mark, began publishing a free weekly newspaper, *The Paper*, in 1999, and eventually moved that operation into the vacated building at 204 E. Chippewa.

The 100th anniversary of the Dwight Star & Herald was observed in a May 2, 1968, edition of the paper, which included copies of Charlie Palmer's first edi-

That 100th edition contained the following paragraph that was reprinted from the paper's 75th anniversary edition:

"The history of the past teaches us that our fathers had faith in their God, their country, and their fellowmen. They have handed down and entrusted to our stewardship such a country and with such blessings as were known in no other land, but with the admonition that we in turn are to pass it on to the coming generation and with greatly improved conditions and privileges. If we are true to ourselves and to our heritage, we will continue in our efforts to improve and build up our communities, morally, spiritually, and in every other way, to the benefit of those who follow."
