'150 years of building a prairie path to the kingdom of heaven'

A blessing from Pope Francis was perhaps the ultimate gift for Janet Neville and the sesquicentennial committee at St. Patrick's Catholic Church in Dwight. Neville, who spent nearly a year researching the history of the church, applied through mail and even by fax to no avail.

But as luck would have it, one of the parishioners, Mary Carpenter, was planning a trip to Rome. Nearly 5,000 miles later, she stepped foot in the official office in Vatican City and was able to get the parchment print sent to the church in recognition of its 150 years.

"You have a lot of amazing, dedicated parishioners," said Father Chris Haake, who came to St. Pat's five years ago from Earlville, Ill.

With the parchment in hand, it seems time to celebrate one of the oldest churches in Livingston County. Events will take place Aug. 9-12, with Bishop Daniel Jenky coming from the Peoria Diocese to lead the Aug. 12 Mass.


The church was appointed on Aug. 9, 1868, but you might say it started in 1861, when Richard P. Morgan, one of Dwight's founding fathers, donated a parcel of land for a Roman Catholic church. Dwight's settlers in the 1850s came from Ireland and Germany to farm the rich soil or build the railroad that would connect Chicago to Bloomington and southward. These early Catholics gathered in homes and buildings to worship, Neville said.

But numbers grew and a white frame church was nearly completed on the land Morgan donated when a windstorm swept it from its foundation. They started anew and the church was finally completed in 1862. More and more sought worship there, and six years later, on Aug. 9, 1868, Father Laurence Dunne was appointed pastor by the Archbishop of Chicago, Rev. James Duggan. St. Patrick Catholic Church was officially founded.

The need to accommodate even more growth was resurrected in the form of a red brick church built in 1896. It served the parish more than 70 years. In 1970 an even larger church was built and dedicated on June 21, St. Pat's current home on West Mazon Ave.

Haake said they have 250 families with the recent merging with Sacred Heart Catholic Church in Campus.

Neville, a lifelong member who like many parishoners was baptized, received the Holy Communion and was married at St.

- Thursday Aug. 9, the official date of St. Pat's inception, there will be a spiritual evening of music and adoration at the church at 6:30 p.m. Music will be led by Michael James Mette and his family, the MJM7 Band.
- 7 p.m. Saturday Aug. 11 will have family entertainment and an ice cream social in the parish hall. The program includes highlights from the church's history, interviews with longtime parishioners Peggy Fogarty, Theresa McNamara and Tom Tock, and concludes with singing by Mary Pfeifer. Photos chronicling the history of the parish will be on display.
- 10:30 a.m. Aug. 12 will be the anniversary Mass with Bishop Daniel Jenky and Father Chris Haake. A sesquicentennial book with history and photos will be handed out. A parish picnic in Renfrew Park, Dwight, begins at 1 p.m. for parishioners and quests

Pat's, has learned a lot about its history. Her husband Gary Neville's great-grandfather was one of the founding members. In fact, James Neville's marriage to Mary Kearns was the first recorded marriage, inscribed in Latin. Two other members, Peg Watters and Cathy Carlson, also have a founding great-grandfather.

Priests who have been assigned to St. Pat's have had lively histories. They came from Ireland, France, Montreal and the East Coast. Father James Halpin in the 1880s was a founding investor in Dwight's Keeley Institute; thousands of people from all over the country came to Dwight for the Keeley Cure for alcoholism. Father John Power (1907-1916) met three successive Popes in Rome.

The celebration will include a special Mass, entertainment, a picnic and more. One of the highlights will be a program with longtime members Peggy Fogarty, Theresa McNamara and Tom Tock. Young parishioners will ask them questions, with responses sure to bring out personal stories and memories of the church.

Tock has been a member his whole life, from the moment he was baptized there. His mother, Pearl Tock, took him to church every Sunday. He was an altar boy, and after he married Louise at St. Anthony in Streator in 1954 she became a member.

He remembers sisters from St. Paul in Odell coming to teach catechism every Saturday.

"You were exposed to your religion growing up" with continuing spiritual education, he said. "They drilled us pretty well and kept us organized as best they could," he laughed.

Back then, Mass was conducted in Latin, which changed to English after the Second Vatican Council in the '60s.

"It was a church full of beautiful Catholics back when I was a person growing up," he said. And it still is, though, like so many other churches, it has seen its share of difficulties getting younger generations to follow Christ's teachings, Tock said.

According to the publication Scientific American, the number of Americans with no religious affiliation is rising. A 2013 Harris Poll of 2,250 American adults found that 23 percent have forsaken religion altogether.

"The church still stands very strongly for things that are under stress in our society," Tock said, such as the right to life. "I think it's difficult to keep the younger generation

Dwight Postal Carrier Wins National Award

Gloria Piccioli couldn't ignore the screams coming from the garage.

She had just delivered mail at the neighbors and was walking across the lawn when she heard the cries for help. Peeking through the window of the garage, she found a heavy-set man who had fallen on top of his wife, crushing her.

"Honestly, I was freaking out. I didn't know what to do," Piccioli said.

She called 9-1-1 and rolled the man off his wife, who was badly injured. But instinct and swift action helped save her, an act of heroism that earned Piccioli the grand prize in the 2018 National Postal Worker Day contest, sponsored by My Fed Benefits, a resource center that helps federal employees with benefit and retirement challenges. Winners were announced in early July.

Nearly 200 United States Postal Service workers from around the country entered the contest, but Piccioli's story struck a chord with judges.

"It was very heartfelt," Piccioli said, "getting that feeling of being appreciated."

The Dwight resident has worked for the village post office since 2009. She has a city route, walking 14 miles a day delivering to 792 places. She delivers *The Paper* every Wednesday.

The story that earned her recognition happened about four years ago with a couple named Woodward who lived on South Chicago Street. The wife was trying to get her crippled husband out of their SUV and into his wheelchair when he toppled over, pinning her leg to the stairs. She was unable to get up from underneath him.

"She was screaming for help," Piccioli recalled.

Thankfully, the garage door was unlocked. Piccioli set her mailbag down, grabbed the husband under his arms and rolled him to his side. Then she tended to his wife, whose leg had broken, and called an ambulance.

The woman recovered but her husband died a few years later, Piccioli said. She believes the woman now lives in the country with her family.

It wasn't the first time Piccioli has come across someone in need. Holly Nelson was decorating her home on North Clinton for Halloween in 2014 when she fell off a step stool while her husband was at work. A neighbor was trying to get her into the car without success. Piccioli saw the commotion and helped get her into the seat and lay the seat down flat.

Nelson sustained a severely broken

leg and busted a knee cap. She had plates and screws implanted and endured a six-month recovery.

She and Piccioli have been friends ever since. In fact, when Nelson saw that Piccioli had entered the contest with the Woodward's story and needed votes on Facebook, Nelson went to work spreading the word and racking

Piccioli has special bonds with many of the people on her route. A 92-year-old man bakes her cookies. Every. Single. Day. Kids who live on Mazon Ave. leave her notes and cold water in the mailbox. Others leave her bath bombs and candy bars.

Piccioli won \$50 for placing in the top 12 of the contest. Her grand prize was a \$250 gift card, which she is donating to St. Jude Children's Research Hospital in Chicago. Before working for the post office, she worked for Medical Outsourcing Services in Naperville, hearing many first-hand accounts from cancer patients.

And that remaining \$50 gift card? Well, she plans to splurge on some T-bone steaks and beer, kick up her feet and have a cookout with her mother and 18-year-old son, Steven Harris, whom she raised as a single mother.

"I'm real happy for her," Nelson said.

Don't Fall for Utility Imposter Scams

In this con, scammers impersonate water, electric, and gas company representatives. They frequently threaten residents and business owners with deactivation of service if they don't pay up immediately.

How the Scam Works:

Utility company imposters will typically reach you with a telephone call or knock on your door claiming to be a representative from the local water, electric, or gas company. In the most common scenario,

the scammer informs vou that payment is overdue and the utility will be shut off if you don't pay up immediate-

Scammers use a variety of other tricks to prey on utility customers. A "representative" may appear at your door in a plausible work uniform claiming that the electric meter is not working properly and must be immediately replaced at your expense. In a particularly alarming form of this con, the scammer may gain

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access to your home to perform "repairs" or an "energy audit" with the intent of stealing your valuables. These cons may also involve promises of energy discounts with the aim of taking your money, personal information, or possibly the account details needed to switch you to another utility provider without your consent (an illegal practice known as "slamming").

Tips to Spot This Scam:

Prepaid debit cards and wire transfers are a red flag. If a caller specifically asks you to pay by prepaid debit card or wire transfer, this is a huge warning sign. Your utility company will accept a check or credit card.

Pressure to pay immediately. Scammers will press for immediate payment and may try to intimidate you

Protect Yourself Against This Scam: Call customer service. If you feel pressured caller, hang up the phone and call the customer service number on your utility bill. A dispute between business neighbors came to the Dwight Village Board of Trustees when it met on July

In February, the board approved a beer garden request from Paul Ferrari, owner of Aly Anne's, to be located in a fenced area behind the premises at 122 E Main Street in Dwight. Ferrari, who at meeting time was in the process of also acquiring the neighboring property at 124 E Main Street, plans to extend the beer garden and outdoor eating area behind this newly acquired property as well. Ferrari was set to close on the adjacent property July

Due to a miscommunication by Village Hall, Ferrari moved forward with extending his outdoor seating area, which includes a fence type wall, before receiving official board approval. The outdoor area and planned wall nearly butt up next to the neighboring property at 126 East Main Street. Roberto Rodriguez, owner of the neighboring property, was present at the meeting to express concerns as the wall will block windows, and more importantly, a second entrance/egress to an apartment located in the center of

"My concern, the biggest and main thing, is for the safety of the tenants," said Rodriguez explaining that a fire in the front of the building would essentially trap the middle apartment tenants without this secondary exit. He expressed that he was willing to work with Ferrari for a solution.

However, the property at 126 E Main has never had legal easement rights onto what is now Ferrari's neighboring property and Ferrari contends that he should be able to make use of his property in whatever manner is suitable for his needs.

"It's my property, it's a commercial property. I can build a building there if I want," said Ferrari countering that using his property for neighboring building access is trespassing.

"There is no written easement - no easement has ever been issued for easement onto the property," said Ferrari. "I need to use the property."

Ferrari plans to use the front of his newly acquired 124 E Main property to expand the seating area of Aly Anne's and wants to use the back outdoor area for the business as well. The wall in question is planned to be used for a decorative mural.

While Village Attorney Irv Masching directed the board that the fence/wall issue was actually a private dispute between property/ land owners, he also advised that extending the liquor license for the additional outdoor area was up to the Liquor Commissioner. Mayor Jared Anderson, Liquor Commissioner, was not present at the meeting. The matter was tabled until Mayor Anderson can review.

A July 16 meeting of the Dwight Utilities Committee resulted in three recommendations to the Village Board. With bids received for the sewer plant excess flow generator, the board approved a recommendation to purchase a 200 kw Koehler all-inclusive generator from Popejoy, Inc. at a cost of \$64,200.00 with an annual service agreement of \$695.00 and a full five-year factory warranty, parts and labor for \$1,200.00. The board also approved a recommendation to order a 2018 Ford pick-up truck complete with a plow package and electric spreader box as budgeted. A third recommendation to replace the four-inch water line from James Street to South Street, while the road is under construction, was approved.

replacement is \$103,275.00.

A review of the discussion that took place at a Services, Health & Safety Committee meeting on July 23 was provided by Police Chief Tim Henson and EMS Director Al Metzke. According to Henson, the new police canine has graduated from training and is now on the street with Officer McKee. Al Metzke commented that charging a \$200 out of district fee for refusal of ambulance service is being considered. Metzke also indicated that a proposal to approve a five year contract with Kurtz Paramedic was discussed. A full recap of the Services meeting will be available at the next village board meeting.

Dwight residents are reminded that blowing grass clippings into village streets when mowing is a violation of village ordinance carrying a substantial fine. Any grass accidently blown into the street should be immediately blown from the street and gutters in an effort to keep storm drains



Almost every product in 2018 is pushed upon us with the idea of speed in mind. Whether it be the delivery of things online, the self-checkout lane at the grocery store, the apps which allow you to order ahead at places, it's all about valuing peoples' time, and cutting down on the overall wait that is required of whatever task they're looking to get done.

I know this might be a crazy take to have, but I think there might be times when I enjoy waiting in line. My initial reason as to why this would be something, is that waiting creates this idea that what you're waiting for is good enough to be deserving of a wait time.

If you can walk in and have something instantly, no wait time, it's so available that it can be had by anyone in a matter of moments, but if you have to put in that wait time, to get that sandwich, to get that piece of pizza, to get your oil changed (kidding about the oil change, no one likes to wait for that.)

The point being is it creates a semblance of importance, a want of the product.

There are of course excessive examples of this, where it backfires, and the wait is just too long. For example, there's a Bagel place that I frequently visit, and the wait is always incredibly intolerable, a Yelp review that I came across sums it best.

"Yesterday was my son's high school graduation. I truly love my son and it breaks my heart that I missed the first 18 years of his life waiting in line at 'Bagel Place to Remain Unnamed'."

You'll have places like that, where it feels like you're waiting 18 years. I get that, but there are times, maybe a lot of times for me, where I enjoy that 5-10-minute wait, for that sandwich, for the coffee, for whatever it is I'm waiting for. It makes the result just a little bit more enjoyable. There's an art to waiting in line.





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Storied high school football rivalry continues this year

At the end of 2016-17 school year, there were only four schools in Illinois that had won more than 700 football games in their team's history. And two of them are smallschool rivals just 8 miles apart.

Tuscola, population 4,391, and Arcola, population 2,864, have been battling it out on the gridiron since the 1890s. At times, including present day, their conferences have kept them apart, but the "Cola Wars" are set to resume Aug. 31, 2018, during the Illinois' Bicentennial.

They narrowly missed facing off in 2017, as both teams climbed the brackets in the state Class 1A playoffs. Arcola, which has four championship titles, was eliminated in the first round while Tuscola was runner-up in the Final.

The Arcola Purple Riders have title bragging rights with four championships — the most recent was 2015. They also won the state title in 1978, 1985 and 1988. The Tuscola Warriors won in 2006 and 2009.

Their rivalry extends beyond athletics. Retired Circuit Judge Mike Carroll, a 1964 graduate of Tuscola High School, said the rub between the two Douglas County farm communities is as old as the county itself, which was formed in 1859 from Coles County. Local history books confirm the first election for county seat saw 10 times as many ballots cast as there were residents. A second election resulted in Tuscola winning. "Arcola was bitter over the county seat vote," Carroll said. "They never got over it." Both towns' high schools started playing football in the mid-1890s. The rivalry extended to football but wasn't created by it. Tuscola leads the cumulative wins title, but Arcola was ahead by 1 at the end of the 2015-16 season. Tuscola led by one at the end of the 2016-17 season. But a couple of game scores remain in question.

In 1961, Tuscola beat Arcola 13-9 and "the jubilant Tuscola players ran into the locker room," according to Carroll. But a referee had thrown a flag on the last play for a roughing-the-passer penalty.

'The referees had to go into the dressing rooms and inform the teams about the penal-

The teams came back onto the field and continued the game with few fans left to watch. Arcola scored on a passing play and was declared the winner.

In another game in the 1920s, both towns believe the other forfeited.

"Arcola thinks they won it, and Tuscola

thinks it won," said Randy Rothrock, a former Arcola coach, alumnus and football historian. "Each claimed the other walked off

The 1961 game is etched in lore as a vengeful victory for Arcola. The story is told that prior to the game, Tuscola students fed laxative to several chickens and then placed them inside the Arcola school. Other pranks over the years include graffiti written on the Tuscola press box and a large "T" burned into the Arcola field with weed killer

The hijinks were nothing compared to the earlier years, according to Rothrock. The early 1900s were "pretty rough," he said. Headlines in the local papers would explain whether fisticuffs had broken out. "Very little slugging," an 1897 headline read. In 1910: "No fistic exhibitions."

The rival match was traditionally played on Thanksgiving Day. Duff Hoel, a banker and a 1983 graduate of Tuscola High School, said: "St. Teresa (in Decatur) was a bigger rival for us," he said while still cringing at the color purple — Arcola's school

Arcola and Tuscola had resumed playing each other in 1982 after a five-year hiatus. Arcola won that year 43–6. Then, with Hoel as quarterback, Tuscola won 33-0. Arcola would go on to win the next seven contests. Tuscola leads the series against Arcola 54 games to 44, with 6 ties. But Hoel and Carroll agreed that the achievement is greater for Arcola because the school population is considerably smaller.

Local legends

Tuscola and Arcola teams have given rise to dozens of local legends. Many of the last names over the past 100 years are the same, too, in each community.

Each town has sent one player to the National Football League. Terry Miller, Arcola Class of 1964, was the first. The former high school guard, quarterback and running back, played for University of Illinois and was drafted by the Detroit Lions in 1968. He was signed by the St. Louis Cardinals in 1970. A knee injury ended his football career a few years later.

Fred Wakefield, a 1996 Tuscola graduate, also played for U of I, one of five Tuscolians to earn a football scholarship there. He played for the Arizona Cardinals and the Oakland Raiders.

As good as Miller and Wakefield were, Carroll and Rothrock agreed that the greatest athlete to come out of Douglas County was probably Arcola's Robert "Popeye' Pullen. In the four years that Pullen played football for the Purple Riders, the Tuscola Warriors didn't score a point. He was a fouryear standout in a club that posted a 32–1–1 record from 1934-37. Pullen scored 34 touchdowns and 20 extra points.

"I asked my mom who the best football player was in the history of Tuscola and Arcola, thinking she'd say me. She said 'Popeye Pullen.' She didn't even hesitate," Carroll said.


"She said, 'When some people hit you, you get hurt. When Popeye hit you, you got brain damage.' I said, 'Didn't Dad play against Popeye?" She said, 'Your father was a smart man. When he saw Popeye coming, he just laid down."

Pullen didn't get the chance to play college or pro ball. He enlisted in the U.S. Navy in 1940 and was aboard the USS Houston when it was sunk in 1942. Nearly 700 sailors were killed. Pullen was one of 368 who managed to swim to shore. He was sent to a POW camp in Burma, where he reportedly refused medication for a minor leg injury because he thought other prisoners needed it more. He died in the camp on Aug. 31, 1943, of blood poisoning.

A hand in the NFL

Arcola lays claim to helping the NFL get started — through a game that was never

It was common in the early 1900s for communities to have adult football teams. In 1919, Arcola's community team had been

defeated by the Decatur Staleys, which was sponsored by A.E. Staley Manufacturing, now Staley Continental, which processes corn and soybeans.

The Arcola team plotted its revenge by hiring Dutch Sternaman, a star quarterback for U of I, who recruited top college players throughout the Midwest. Staley learned of the plan and bowed out of the game. He then asked Sternaman and his pal George Halas to recruit players for the Decatur team.

Halas bought the Staleys and moved the team to Chicago. A year later, he changed the name to the Chicago Bears, which was instrumental in the formation of the NFL.

Arcola and Tuscola are economic competitors as well with Tuscola advancing in the 1950s with large chemical plants to the west and in the 1990s with an outlet mall. Its main thoroughfares are marked by wide, paved streets and stop lights.

Arcola, by contrast, still has its original brick street downtown, where antique stores dominate the landscape and a hitching post for Amish buggies sits behind the newspaper office. It celebrates its broom corn history with an annual festival that draws thousands of visitors, and its larger industries stem from its broom-making past. Today, 40 percent of Arcola's population is Latino another result of its broom corn history. Its most famous resident is Raggedy Ann, whose creator, Johnny Gruelle, was born

They're both farming communities located in the flattest county in Illinois. They're tied together by Interstate 57 on the east and U.S. Route 45 on the west. A remnant of the Chicago-to-Cairo highway, the Egyptian Trail, connects them between the two high-

And they remain tied by a once fierce duel that helps maintain their independent identities. "It's a friendly rivalry now," Carroll said. "It's just fun."

Both Carroll and Rothrock agreed that the competition has been good for the towns. It stirs interest in the football programs and builds friendships.

"I've always had a lot of friends in Tuscola," Rothrock said.

Carroll echoed the sentiment. "When I ran for judge, Arcola carried me," he said.

The rivalry no longer includes burning each others' fields or feeding laxatives to chickens, but it still gives fans on both sides a reason to cheer.


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
