Dwight Resident Gets the Sister She Always Wanted

Nancy Louis of Dwight always wanted a sister, but she was adopted and became an only child growing up on a farm in Kempton.

Her loving parents, James and Bernice Bergan, never kept the adoption a secret and everyone accepted it. Still, a sister would have been nice, someone to "girl talk" with, to share makeup and clothes and secrets -all those things that sisters bond over. The ultimate confidant.

Nancy was born Feb. 5, 1949, and adopted at 6 weeks through the Catholic Home Bureau in Chicago. She became daddy's

"I didn't know any other world," said Nancy, 69.

But as she grew older, she began to wonder about her biological mother, where she came from and what type of health issues she might have inherited. Last Christmas, her two boys bought her an Ancestry DNA

kit, but it sat in a drawer for several months.

Then one day she pulled it out, sent in the sample and waited for any matches to show up on the Ancestry DNA website.

Meanwhile, 1,800 miles away in Gilbert, Ariz., Terri Luce, 56, had been part of Ancestry DNA for several years and had found two close relatives through the database. She was interested in genealogy and was trying to fill up the family tree.

She grew up in Gurnee, one of five children. Like Nancy, she had had a wonderful childhood. When she married and had kids, her mother Marie taught her daughters to crochet and bake. They adored their grand-

In early August, Terri received a new match, but this one was different. It was the first time the match had been labeled as a "close relative." The match's username was Louis, but she didn't recognize the surname. Ancestry DNA predicted it was perhaps a parent or an aunt or uncle. Terri couldn't figure it out.

"I didn't know there was anyone out there to find," she said.

Until one day soon after she got an email through Ancestry DNA from the same username. Nancy Louis explained that she had been adopted out of Chicago, her mother's maiden name being Marie McGill, and wondered if she knew anything.

"I saw this email and said, 'Oh my god, that's mom," Terri said.

She responded back: "Nancy Please call me ASAP, Marie was my mom."

What transpired from there was both stunning and bewildering, an unexpected link that would change the two women's lives forever. Terri has stumbled upon a family secret she had never known. Nancy had found the sister she always wanted. Each was as astonished as the other.

Soon began a flurry of phone calls and emails, exchanging photos and each hearing her sister's voice for the first time. Terri booked a flight and she and Nancy planned to meet.

It was Sept. 2, at the Old Route 66 Family Restaurant in Dwight. One hug was all it took to understand they had the same blood. It was as natural as the first time they spoke on the phone. They talked for three hours, each learning about each other, about the grown children of their own, and their shared family history.

Nancy learned that her birth mother came from a very religious Roman Catholic family. Marie was one of nine children, and had a fraternal twin named Rose Mary. Marie gave birth to Nancy in 1949. Terri said she graduated from high school a year later than her twin, at age 19. Piecing history together, Terri said they believe Marie got pregnant with Nancy in high school, and since she wasn't married, had to make a heartbreaking choice to give her up. She then married in 1950 and had five more children.

"They pretended like these things didn't happen" back then, Terri said.

Also new is the bags tournament, which is sure to bring out the best cornholers around for some fierce competition. There is a guaranteed \$2,000 prize. For the kiddos, there's free face painting on Saturday from 10 a.m.-2 p.m., pumpkin painting, and the Kiddie Parade that morning. Kids 12 and younger, put on your best harvest-themed attire and prepare to strut your stuff to win prizes. When you're done, head over to the Kiddie Carnival. You might also see a surprise performance of Magic Mark or Sally the Clown.

There's also a new and complimentary photo booth Saturday. Snap some funny photos with your bestie and take home a commemorative strip of photos.

At 5 o'clock something else new takes place: adult bingo! No doubt tables will be packed with people hoping to yell "BINGO!"

Sunday begins to wind down but there's still plenty to come out for, perhaps the most fun being the long-standing Basset Waddle.

Cannabis, ecstacy and a handgun were recovered.



Marie, who died in 2011, never mentioned anything about Nancy's adoption to her five children. One day, in fact, after Marie was diagnosed with cancer, her children joked with her about any secrets they should know. At first she said no, then mentioned, "Well one ..." She said it was up to their father to give permission to tell. He had dementia, so everyone brushed it off.

Their time at the restaurant felt like they had known each other all their lives and were "just catching up," Nancy said. Terri couldn't believe the resemblance to her mom. Nancy looked more like Marie than nearly any of Terri 's siblings.

Photos of Marie, both as a young woman and an older adult, show the stark resemblance. Nancy has her mother's nose, her lips and, Terri said, her eyes. Being able to talk to her sister face to face was surreal.

"It was like talking to mom," Terri said. "I was completely comfortable and I felt like I had known her my whole life."

Nancy believes finding her sister was meant to be at this time in her life.

"Even though I have located my birth family, James and Bernice Bergan were and will always be my Dad and Mom. I couldn't have asked for more caring and loving parents and the wonderful life they provided for me. I consider locating my birth family an added bonus to what I already have," she

Terri feels the same. She never ques-



tioned her mother's decision to give Nancy up for adoption and hopes her other siblings will one day decide to meet Nancy.

"Who knows what the circumstances were with me and who's to judge because I don't know the whole story and there's no one alive who does," Nancy said.

Terri was a little upset that her mother didn't tell her children -- there have been so many lost years not knowing Nancy.

"All I can do is embrace Nancy and make up for the lost time as much as I can," Terri


Dwight Harvest Days Button Features Gothic Church

Various events in Dwight continued to delay its use. In 2013, the anniversary of the Keeley Institute was celebrated and the beautiful stained-glass windows were spotlighted. The Dwight Woman's Club achieved

By 2016, the construction in preparation of the highspeed rail necessitated moving Harvest Days to Renfrew Park. The Rocket, a favorite memory of all 'kids' of Dwight, became symbolic of the 2016 Harvest Days. With the passing of long-time Harvest Days president Jerry Beier, the committee honored his memory in 2017 with a button design.

- If an elderly or disabled voter has difficulty in reading the bal-2. lot sheet he or she may ask for assistance at the polling place, or may bring a friend or relative to assist. After filling out the proper affidavit, the friend or relative or two judges of opposite parties, can assist you.
- A request can be made by phone or by mail to the County 3. Clerk's Office for a Vote By Mail ballot. When the request is received, an application for a Vote By Mail ballot will be mailed to the voter. You can download an application on line by going to: livingstoncountyil.gov. This application must be filled out and mailed or hand delivered to the County Clerk, who will then mail the Vote By Mail ballot to the voter. After voting the Vote By Mail ballot it must be mailed or hand delivered back to the County Clerk's Office, so it can be counted on Election Day. Application may also be made by email from the Livingston County Official website by going to County Services, County Clerk, Elections, and Emailable Vote By Mail Ballot Application Request.
- Illinois election law allows for early, grace period voting to be 4. conducted in the County Clerk's Office. The clerk's office will be open from 9:00 AM to 12:00 Noon on Saturday, October 6, 2018 for voter registration and early voting, and on Saturday, October 27 and Saturday, Nov. 3 for early and grace period registration and voting from 9:00 AM to 12 Noon. Voting will take place during the regular office hours Monday through Friday from 8:00 AM to 4:30 PM with extended hours on Wednesday, October 30 from 8:00 AM until 6:00 PM.
- The County Clerk's office will offer two methods of voting, the 5. AccuVote optical scan unit and TSX electronic voting system.

According to BBB investigators, this scam is targeting Central Illinois residents. Specifically, the Better Business Bureau has received reports from the cities of Springfield, Champaign, and Macomb. The scammers are utilizing robo-calling and are spoofing several numbers, so the number on the caller ID will continue to change.

In the case that you receive one of

these calls, do not release your Social Security Number to the caller. The Social Security Administration will never request your Social Security Number over the phone. If you are questioning that the Social Security Administration is indeed requesting information from you, contact your local office or the administration's direct line at 1-800-772-1213. Jessica Tharp, President/CEO of the Central Illinois BBB, is quoted in a Facebook Live video saying, "If you believe your Social Security Number has been compromised, contact your local police department to file a police report. This will help you document the fraudulent activity with your Social Security Number."

Furthermore, if you have received one of these calls and released your Social Security information to the caller, please also contact the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) at identitytheft.gov to report that your identity has been stolen. You may check your credit score for free (once per year) at annualcreditreport.com which is also monitored by the FTC. Another way to protect yourself is to implement a credit freeze. By doing so, no new lines of credit may be opened in your name until you are certain that you are not a victim of the scam.





Keep Exercising Despite Chronic Pain

Pain is a great excuse if you don't like to exercise, and it's certainly something many people with chronic pain would just as soon avoid.

Yet at the same time, exercise is one of the things that can help make that pain go away.

"It can become a Catch-22 situation," says Dr. Victor M. Romano, a board certified orthopaedic surgeon and author of Finding The Source: Maximizing Your Results -With and Without Orthopaedic Surgery (www.romanomd.com). "We don't want to exercise because we have pain, and yet exercise will usually help you reduce the pain over the long run.

Research has shown that exercise is an essential aspect in the treatment of chronic pain. Lack of exercise can cause a downward cycle of deconditioning and worsening pain. But exercise can help those with chronic pain engage in enjoyable and essential activities of daily living with greater ease. Cardio exercise, interval training, and weight lifting are the three types of exercise most people should include once a week in their workouts. Stretching should be included in every workout, Romano says.

Doctors generally ask patients to rate their pain on a scale of one to ten. The average intensity of pain experienced for 12 or more hours over a 24-hour period is considered their baseline pain. Romano says if, during exercise, pain levels increase by more than 2 points from the baseline you should stop and modify that exercise to ensure you do not cause a flare up of your pain. Of course, a good diet is also important.

Furthermore, obstructed breathing, from a deviated septum, allergies or a cold, will impair your balance and strength. Restoring clear nasal breathing will improve your performance.

For people who suffer from chronic pain, Dr. Romano offers these exercise tips:

- Try shorter exercise periods. Interval training is very helpful in patients with chronic pain. Short bursts of exercise can be more beneficial and less stressful than one long workout. Even five minutes is better than nothing. Everything counts.
- Weight training is also important for seniors and women to strengthen bones. Research has proven that weight training is good for everyone, regardless of sex or age. Make sure to incorporate it into your exercise program.
- Stretching is important. Go to Facebook, download our Romano Stretches, and incorporate them into your daily routine, even if you don't exercise that day.
- Try yoga or tai chi. These programs have shown success with people with chronic pain.
- Clear your sinuses. If your breathing is obstructed, use nasal sprays or get nasal strips that will open your breathing and further improve your strength and balance.
- Mind over matter. If you need to do an exercise that you know is going to be painful, start by taking some deep breaths and focus your energy. Take your time.

"Even though exercise for somebody with chronic pain sounds counterintuitive,' Romano says, "it is very important as part of recovery therapy."

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
