## **Button Up for Harvest Days**

The 39th annual Harvest Days will be celebrated this weekend in Dwight, another year of fun, family and memories.

But one woman in town has those memories displayed on a pair of bright orange suspenders: 38 commemorative buttons that have been created for each year of the festival, a sort of time capsule of small town life that she wears over her shoulders.

Patsy Riber has called Dwight home for decades, and she has collected nearly every Harvest Days button since the festival

"I love Dwight. It's my town," she said. She moved here after she married her husband Paul, of 43 years, a hometown boy, and has fallen in love with the community, its people and the festival the town has become known for. Harvest Days has become one of the largest and most anticipated fairs in the area, welcoming some 10,000 visitors from miles away. It's just one of many things the town is proud of, brought together by an army of volunteers.

"It's something that you always look forward to," Riber said. "It's kind of a homecoming.

Riber has always been into things old and vintage and bought a button that first year in 1980, thinking she'd start a collection and someday have them all. "I just never thought some day would get here," she

As you follow the years and the buttons, they tell the story of Dwight, its people, its landmarks and the devotion to community. The town's historic windmill appeared on the first several buttons. The windmill had been restored by volunteers over the years.

The Danish Brotherhood's 100th anniversary was commemorated in 1989. Dwight was founded by Danish settlers, and the brotherhood holds an aebleskiver pancake breakfast to this day.

In 1997, the inaugural tractor show was featured. It's become one of the festival's most popular events. In 2001 a floppy-eared basset hound appeared on the button to represent the basset parade, which has brought hundreds of dogs adopted out by Dwight's Guardian Angel Basset Rescue back to town to waddle the streets in front of thousands of spectators.

Buttons have featured the historic Texaco the original stained glass windows in the Fox Center, which was home to the Keeley Institute, known for the Keeley Cure for alcoholism from 1879 to 1965.

The Dwight Woman's Club's 100th anniversary has been recognized, as has Pinecone Path and The Rocket in Renfrew Park, a piece of playground equipment that every kid who ever grew up here has climbed and slid down. In 2004, the button celebrated Harvest Days' 25th anniversary. It was the same year as Dwight's sesquicentennial. Last year's button was dedicated to Jerry "Kahuna" Beier, the longtime Harvest Days president who passed away the year

Riber has every one of them. There's just one space left on her suspenders, for this year's button, which will feature the Pioneer Gothic Church, which has graced the face of the buttons several times. It's especially meaningful to Riber, as her daughter McKenna is getting married there on Nov.

"As you look at all these [buttons], the volunteers of all these organizations make things happen in Dwight," she said.

The only button she didn't have was The

Rocket in 2016, the year her brother-in-law Jeff passed away. The Ribers were all "Dwight boys," she said, and even after Jeff moved to Jacksonville, Fla., he would always come back for Harvest Days. Barbara DeWaard, a well-known Dwight artist who has designed many of the buttons, was able to find one and gave it to Patsy.

If the buttons are any proof, Harvest Days has been a big part of her family. Riber remembers taking her three children, McKenna, Emily and Seth, to the tractor pull, getting up early and going to the flea market and craft show, eating corn

dogs and taking the kids to the carnival on Thursday, which used to be the cheapest night to

Now, she has five grandchildren aged 6 months to 5 years. "This is going to be a good Harvest Days," she said, one she'll once again see through bright young eyes. She looks forward to meeting up with people she hasn't seen in a while, as well as friends and neighbors she sees around town every week.

So if you're looking for her, just scout out the bright orange suspenders. She just might be wearing all those buttons to show her hometown spirit.

"It's a great town to be in," she said. "I'm proud of my town. I'm more proud of the people here."



#### **Women Business Owners:** Don't Forget About Your Retirement Plan

American Business Women's Day is celebrated on Sept. 22. And there is indeed cause for celebration, because, in recent decades, the number of women business owners has risen sharply, to the point where nearly 40 percent of all businesses are now women-owned, according to the U.S. Census Bureau. If you are one of these owners, or thinking about becoming one, you'll always have a lot to think about when running your business, but there's also an area you can't ignore – your retirement. Specifically, you need to consider establishing your own retirement plan.

Most plans available to you are fairly easy to establish and maintain, and are not terribly costly to administer. Here are some popular options:

Owner-only 401(k) - This plan, also known as an individual or solo 401(k), is available to self-employed individuals and business owners with no full-time employees other than themselves or a spouse. For 2018, you can put in up to 25 percent of your annual income as an "employer" contribution, and you can defer up to \$18,500 (or \$24,500 if you're 50 or older). The sum of your employer contribution and your salary deferrals cannot exceed \$55,000, or \$61,000 if you're 50 or older. You can make elective contributions on a pre- or post-tax (Roth) basis. Pre-tax contributions reduce your taxable income for the current year. Roth contributions don't offer any immediate tax benefit, but any qualified withdrawals will be 100% tax-free.

SEP IRA - If you have just a few employees or are selfemployed with no employees, you may want to consider a SEP IRA. You'll fund the plan with tax-deductible contributions, and you must cover all eligible employees. As an employer, you can contribute the lesser of 25% of your compensation (if you're also an employee of your own business) or \$55,000.

Solo defined benefit plan – Pension plans, also known as defined benefit plans, are less common than in previous years, but you can still set one up for yourself if you're self-employed or own your own business. This plan has high contribution limits, which are determined by an actuarial calculation, and your contributions are typically tax-deductible.

**SIMPLE IRA** — A SIMPLE IRA, as its name suggests, is easy to set up and maintain, and it can be a good plan if your business has fewer than 10 employees.

However, while a SIMPLE IRA may be advantageous for your employees, it's less generous to you, as far as allowable contributions go, than an owner-only 401(k), a SEP IRA or a defined benefit plan. For 2018, your annual contributions are generally limited to \$12,500, or \$15,500 if you're 50 or older by the end of the year. You can also make a matching contribution of up to 3% of your compensation. As an employer, your contributions are fully deductible as a business expense up to certain limits; as an employee, your pretax contributions reduce the amount of your taxable income for the same tax year.

Before opening any of these plans, you'll want to consult with your tax advisor on the tax issues and a financial professional on the investment aspects. But don't wait too long. You will need to work hard to keep your business thriving - so choose a retirement plan that works just as hard for you.

#### **Dwight Sets Trick-or-Treat Hours**

Petitions Available for Trustee Seats/ September 10 Board Actions

The Dwight Village Board of Trustees met on September 10 when it set Dwight's Trick or Treat hours from 4 p.m. to 7 p.m. on Wednesday, October 31.

Addressing other matters, anyone wishing to run for a Dwight Village Trustee position is reminded that Tuesday, September 18 was the first day to pick up a petition from the village hall. Three four-year trustee seats will open as terms for Randy Irvin, Jim Mixen and Marla Kinkade expire. The election is April 2, 2019. Trustees must be residents of the village.

A DTHS Homecoming parade route request was approved. The parade will be held on Friday, October 5, beginning at 2:30 p.m. The parade route has been designed to avoid crossing railroad tracks. The parade will begin on Columbia Street traveling north to South Street. The route will continue east on South Street to Prairie Ave; north on Prairie to Chippewa Street; east on Chippewa to Chicago Street; south on Chicago to Philmar Street; west on Philmar to Franklin Street and ending at DTHS.

A liquor license change request was approved for Berkot's Super Foods moving from a Class A liquor license allowing the sale of packaged liquor to a Class C liquor license allowing the sale of liquor and consumption on premises. Jennifer Johnson opposed the move with all other board members present approving.

Mayor Jared Anderson noted that Dwight's Harvest Days celebration is just around the corner. Harvest Days kicks off with a carnival starting on Thursday evening, September 20, followed by three fun filled days of events from September 21 - 23.

In his report to the board, Dwight's Chief of Police Tim Henson noted that several stolen cars have been reported in the area and advised residents to always remove keys and lock vehicles. Regarding police staff, Chief Henson reported that retiring Officer Mark Scott and part-time Officer Wayne Haley will be done with their service by month's end. Part-time officer Steve Mead has graduated from the academy. The Village of Dwight will be taking applications for a full-time officer through the end of the

Village Engineer Ryan Hansen summarized the status of current projects indicating that recently "the weather has not been our friend." Per Hansen, the Clinton Street pavement project is nearing completion. MFT concrete work will be starting this week. D Construction punch list items will be addressed. And, painting at the historic depot is taking place with money received from an ITEP grant.

Prior to the regular board session, the Administration Committee met where a representative from Republic Services was on hand to talk about recycling concerns and the need for change from the current "fundamentally broken business model." According to information presented, for

decades, China has been the largest importer of the world's recycled commodity, and material from the U.S. has been 40 percent of the inbound stream. In 2017, China announced efforts to clean up the country, which included dramatic change for accepting imported recyclables and closing its doors to the product, driving a need for change here. Republic expressed public education is needed on what and how to recycle since contaminated (not properly cleaned and dried) product are non-recyclable which ends up in landfills. Republic is proposing a 69 cent increase per household to help manage the change. No decisions were made. Discussions with Republic are expected to continue.

The board also approved:

Trustee Jim Mixen was absent from the September 10 session. Mayor Jared Anderson, Trustees Randy Irvin, Jerry Curtis, Marla Kinkade, Jennifer Johnson and Justin Eggenberger were all in attendance.

The next meeting of the Dwight Village Board of Trustees will be at 6:30 p.m., Monday, September 24, in the Public Services Complex. Meetings are open to the public.

Sgt. Mitchell from the Sheriff's Department reported that recent cases have been closed except for Jensen's.

The Finance Committee reported the continuation of updating the employment policy.

Water and debt rates were discussed, but tabled until a special Water and Sewer Committee meeting August 27.

The train horn issue is still being researched, and there are no further updates on the Clearwell litigation. It was reported by Mr. Biernat that the recorder on the outside of the gas station is not working.

Attorney Legner reported that his office is still reviewing the Master Pole Attachment Agreement, but hopes to have it ready in September.

Under old business discussed: the softball team is painting at the ballfield; Lovell should have an estimate for replacing the sidewalk in front of Village Hall by next month; Eppel has been contacted to bore holes in Old Route 66 so pavilions can be built; and the broken tile on 66 will be cleaned out when the lift stations are cleaned.

Jim Pozzi of Republic

Services reported that China, as of Jan. 1 of this year, is not accepting recycling imports. Republic Services is experiencing an increased cost which will be passed on to the customer. He distributed literature on educating residents what can and cannot be recycled and asked the village to post this information on their web-

Mr. Pozzi presented an addendum to the contract and asked that it be reviewed and considered by the village. Attorney Legner took the addendum for review, and the issue was tabled.

Linda Dawson is requesting the village provide a culvert to access the back of their property off of N. West St. (Old Route 66). The village will review the culvert ordinance.

Brian Hoffmeyer said the 2019 5K run will be May 18, and may take place on the bike path.

Trustee Mills motioned to purchase a new locator which the village needs, at a price of \$4,098, and all approved.

The Acting Mayor will gather estimates on new generators for the lift station before the September meeting.

The meeting adjourned at 8:51 p.m., just under the two hour mark.

#### **Dwight Grade School Adopts Positive FY19 Budget**

Cooling Options Investigated

Dwight Common School District #232 Board of Education approved its FY19 budget as presented when it met on September

Following a Public Hearing, Superintendent Dr. Jancek presented the 2018-2019 budget with a starting balance of \$3,461,791. Proposed FY19 revenues across all funds are expected to be \$5,904,553 with proposed expenditures of \$5,475,001 resulting in a positive difference of \$429,552 and an expected FY19 end balance of \$3,891,343. All indications point toward all fund balances continuing to be healthy for another year. Increased EAV and additional state money have helped to provide the positive out-

"I don't necessarily want to say we are totally healthy," Dr. Jancek stated. "But, we are in a better financial situation than we have been in the past several years and, as long as the state maintains and meets their financial obligations, then we will have a good financial school year.'

Dr. Jancek also reported that the State of Illinois currently owes the District \$67,810.76 in financial reimbursements for the 2017 – 18 school year.

In other business, following a warm start to the school year, providing air conditioning options was once again discussed. Dr. Jancek noted that the cost estimate to provide a building wide A/C system was \$1.6 million in 2016 and now has risen to an estimated \$1.8 to \$2 million price tag. With the extreme cost, Dr. Jancek recommended looking at alternative options other than an all air system. Due to a student need, one classroom this year was equipped with a window unit at a cost of approximately \$2,000 complete which included adding the electrical power needed. Dr. Jancek estimated that, at a cost of \$110,000 to \$115,000, each classroom could be equipped with an individual air unit. The addition of exhaust fans could also help move and ease the warm air in the gym and cafeteria. Jancek will continue to investigate alternative cooling options to present to the board.

DGS will upgrade its look with the purchase and installation of a new, digital sign in front of the school. Friendly Signs, Inc., of Kankakee, will provide and install the full color Electronic Message Center (EMC) at a cost of \$18,960. Board members were split on the proposal with concerns regarding cost and digital quality being the main concern, while others felt it was time to take that plunge.

"It's time to update the school and make it more welcoming," said BOE member Cathy Ferguson.

Board members Nick Stipanovich and Eugene Mortensen opposed the move to purchase the new digital sign, while Bo Partney, Cathy Ferguson, Michael Cornale, and Marc Ellis approved. Joel Funk was not present.

In her report to the board, Assistant Principal / AD Julie Schultz shared

wrestling program numbers and concerns stating that the program is "kind of at an impasse right now." Current wrestling signup numbers are at seven, and co-op interest with Saunemin, Odell and GSW is being investigated. Also, the program is still in need of a coach. Mrs. Schultz is hoping to bring a wrestling co-op plan to the board in October so decisions regarding moving forward can be made.

"If we don't have it [wrestling] here, it will die at the high school as well," Schultz told the board. "So we are looking at all avenues we can to keep it going."

Discussion took place around pulling younger players up if numbers are low, specifically pulling 7th grade boys basketball players up to the 8th grade team. School policy is that if there are 10 players, pulling up younger players would not be allowed. Preliminary signups show that the basketball numbers are healthy with fourteen 8th graders, thirteen 7th graders, and twelve 6th graders. Mrs. Schultz indicated that, in her opinion, pulling up players to just build a more competitive team should be a high school level opportunity, but not done at the junior high Board member Ferguson agreed.

"Let the kids grow and mature and play at their own level at this point," said Ferguson.



### Dwight Fire Department Encourages Residents to 'Look. Listen. Learn.' as Fire Prevention Week Approaches

Today's home fires burn faster than ever. In a typical home fire, you may have as little as one or two minutes to escape safely from the time the smoke alarm sounds. Knowing how to use that time wisely takes planning and practice.

The Dwight Fire Department is teaming up with the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) – the official sponsor of Fire Prevention Week for more than 90 years - to promote this year's Fire Prevention Week campaign, "Look. Listen. Learn. Be aware. Fire can happen anywhere," which works to educate the public about basic but essential ways to quickly and safely escape a home fire.

NFPA statistics show the number of U.S. house fires has been steadily declining over the past few decades. However, the death rate per 100 home fires that are reported to fire departments was 10% higher in 2016 than in 1980.

Although people feel safest in their home, it is also the place people are at

greatest risk to fire, with four out of five U.S. fire deaths occurring at home. That over-confidence contributes to a complacency toward home escape planning and practice.

"Working in the fire service for many years, we know that people often make choices in fire situations that ieopardize their safety or even cost them their lives," said Lt. Steven Bradley of the Dwight Fire Department. "We need to do a better job teaching people about the potentially lifesaving difference escape planning and practice can make motivating them to action."

Lt. Bradley says this year's "Look. Listen. Learn." campaign highlights three steps people can take to help quickly and

- safely escape from a fire: • Look for places fire could start
- Listen for the sound of the smoke alarm
- Learn two ways out of every room

While NFPA and the DFD are focusing on home fires, these safety messages apply to virtually anywhere.

"Situational awareness is a skill people need to use wherever they go," said Lt. Bradley. "No matter where you are, look for available exits. If the alarm system sounds, take it seriously and exit the building immediately."

The DFD is hosting a series of events in support of this year's Fire Prevention Week campaign, including:

· Dwight Grade School talks and fire station tours – October 7-13

· signing Dwight residents up for free smoke detector installs - provided by the fire department

· educating the community about the campaign through public events - such as Harvest Days
