Dwight Enjoys Its 39th Harvest Days Celebration

The carnival equipment has been taken down, the tents have been put away and downtown Dwight is beginning to look more like normal.

But just because the 39th annual Harvest Days is done doesn't mean it's really over, said Randy Irvin, president of the organization. Volunteers and organizers have a few weeks to rest, but planning for the next year's 40th anniversary will begin soon. It'll be here before you know it.

For now, they can celebrate another awesome year.

"I think it was a pretty big success," Irvin said about this year's event. "We had a good crowd of over 10,000 people." What started as a small community festival has grown

into a massive production that brings in people from near and far -- even from other states.

The carnival heer tent children's activities and parade

The carnival, beer tent, children's activities and parade are always a big draw. But this year saw new and bigger things to do.

The fine arts and vendor show flea market was the biggest in years with more than 200 vendors. The car show was also bigger this year, Irvin said.

New activities proved to be a huge success. The cornhole tournament had 36 teams and even drew a professional bags player from out of state who has been featured on ESPN. But the winning team was Isidro Herrera and David Morse, who took home a \$1,000 prize.

Bingo was new, too, and had more than 60 players. Team Trivia had 13 teams and even spectators were getting into the action interacting with each other to try to guess the right answers, Irvin said.



The kids had plenty of activities, with the tractor pull, movie night and Kiddie Parade. Free face painting was a huge hit. They had two painters and "they didn't stop painting for four hours," Irvin said. Kids painted 220 of the 250 pumpkins set aside to decorate. And Sally the Clown and Magic Mark had full crowds inside their performance tents and will definitely be back next year.

For the adults the big draws were the the beer tent and Friday and Saturday's music headliners Hot Sauce Universe and Mike & Joe.

And the parade was the biggest in years. There were 13 bands and more than 100 entrants. People came out in droves to watch thre famous Basset Waddle. Some of the dogs got tuckered out pretty quickly while others were roaring and ready to go.

People also enjoyed the scarecrows that were placed at Fox Center along Rt. 17 that were put together by students and teachers at Dwight Elementary School. Those will be left up until Halloween.

The split the pot winner will be announced Wednesday at 5 o'clock so if you bought tickets, make sure you're by your phone.

Harvest Days is a self-supported non-profit organization that takes more than 200 volunteers who put in hundreds of hours over the course of many months, Irvin said. They've been fortunate that so many local businesses have stepped up to sponsor different events.

"We count on the community to come out and support what we put on," he said. "Thirty-eight years is really remarkable considering what we earn and what we put in every year."

They can rest for a few weeks until their 2018 wrap-up meeting next month. Then planning for 2019 begins in November.

"Next year is our 40th anniversary and we want to showcase Dwight and we want to showcase the community," he said.

And it's going to be bigger and better than ever. What do they have cooking? Irvin wouldn't let on. "We definitely are pulling out some old tricks."

DTHS Approves FY19 Budget

Fieldhouse Concepts Reviewed/ September Board Actions

The Dwight Township High School Board of Education approved the FY19 budget as presented when the DTHS Board of Education met on September 19

Following a Public Hearing, Superintendent Dr. Richard Jancek presented the 2018-2019 budget with a starting balance \$6,225,984. The Education Fund continues to be very healthy with a projected positive FY19 revenue and expenditure difference of \$205,161 and a projected FY19 end balance of \$4,149,520. Proposed FY19 revenues across all funds are expected to be \$5,643,562 with proposed expenditures across all funds totaling \$5,502,182, for a positive difference of \$141,380. The projected FY19 end balance all funds

\$6,367,364.

Also in financials, it was reported that the State of Illinois currently owes the District \$86,974.64 in financial reimbursements for the 2017 – 18 school year.

In another matter, Dr. presented Jancek Building Exploratory Committee Report and outlined three concepts developed by Dewberry Architects for a potential fieldhouse. Since last fall, a committee has been investigating the feasibility of building a fieldhouse that would be used by both the school and community providing additional gym space for sports, fitness, and events along with an indoor walking track. Committee meminclude Justin Eggenberger, Ryan Hansen, Bill Flott, Deb Karch, Chuck Trainor, Tim Henson, Kim Rodosky and Richard Jancek. Presented as being funded through the High

School District without increasing tax rates, the idea is to create a community facility for all. In June, Dewberry Architects, Inc. was hired to begin their analysis to determine the feasibility of building such a facility.

All three concept variations presented to the DTHS BOE on September 19 outlined a building addition to the existing DTHS gymnasium, extending into the west parking lot with preliminary cost estimates ranging from \$8.3 million to \$10.7 million. Funds would come from multiple areas including, primarily, current District #230 Funds and by securing a \$5 million Alternative Revenue bond.

committee provide a concept
and cost estimate for a standalone facility. Concerns

After Willem passed away, the society decided to raise funds to have some of the replicas sent to the towns of the stations. Of the 36 replicas, enough money was raised to send 14 – of which Dwight was lucky enough to become one. The replicas were enclosed in glass before being mailed.

Claas was thrilled to see the replica nicely displayed and told them that he owns what is called "The Mill" in Lincoln. It was once a restaurant, but now is a museum.



Understanding Risk Tolerance

To succeed as an investor, you might think you need to know about the economy, interest rates and the fundamentals of companies in which you'd like to invest. And all these things are indeed important. But it's most essential to know yourself. Specifically, you need to know how much risk you are willing to

Of course, you've lived with yourself your entire life, so you probably have a pretty good idea of your likes and dislikes and what makes you comfortable or uncomfortable. But investing

Initially, you may believe you have a high tolerance for risk, but if the financial markets drop sharply, and you see that you've sustained some sizable losses (at least on paper - you haven't really "lost" anything until you sell investments for less than what you paid for them), how will you feel? If you find yourself constantly fretting over these losses, perhaps even losing sleep over them, you might realize your risk tolerance is not as high as you thought. In this case, you may need to scale back the part of your portfolio devoted to growth in favor of a more balanced

On the other hand, if you believe yourself to have a low risk tolerance, and you start off investing in a conservative manner, you may indeed minimize short-term losses – but you also might find yourself frustrated over the slow growth of your portfolio. So you may decide that being highly risk-averse carries its own risk – the risk of not making enough progress to achieve your long-term financial goals. To reduce this risk, you may need to tilt your portfolio somewhat toward more growth opportunities.

When you are first starting out in your career, and for many years after, you are probably investing primarily to accumulate assets for retirement. Consequently, you may need to include a relatively high proportion of growth-oriented vehicles, such as stocks, in your portfolio. While stock prices will always fluctuate, you will have many years, perhaps decades, to overcome short-term losses, so you can possibly afford to take on a greater risk level in exchange for the potentially higher returns offered by stocks and stock-based investments.

However, things can change once you reach retirement. At this stage of your life, your overall investment focus may shift from accumulation to income. This means you will need to start selling some investments to boost your cash flow - and you won't want to sell when prices are down. (Remember the first rule of investing: "Buy low and sell high.") To help avoid these "fire sales," you may want to adjust your investment mix by adding more income-producing vehicles and reducing your holdings in growth-oriented ones. By doing so, you will be lowering your overall risk level. Keep in mind, though, that even in retirement, you will need some exposure to growth investments to help you stay ahead of inflation.

'Close To Home' Gallery in October

"Close To Home" will be the featured show in the Joe Bailey Gallery at the Pontiac Community Art Center during the month of October, and features the works of ceramic artist, Tim Kowalczyk.

Using the technique of trompe l'oeil, Tim says of his work, "I make stuff out of stuff that looks like other stuff. Pathetic, absurd, antiquated, banal, or even garbage are words that best describe the objects I am drawn to. These types of objects hold my attention because of the stories they can tell and what they can mean. Many times, I find objects at thrift stores, yard sales, or the side of the road. I am collector, picker, and poet that sculpts, forms, designs, and constructs sculptures with sense of purpose, priority, and preciousness. I want people to see the beauty and narrative that is held within simple, overlooked objects."

Tim will demonstrate his techniques in making pottery that looks like it is made from cardboard and using stencils to embellish his art from 3:00-5:00 p.m. on September 29, followed by his show opening from 5:00-7:00 p.m. – with the show running through Saturday, October 27. The demo is free to members and the public. Seating is limited.

The Pontiac Community Art Center and Gallery is now located at 209 W. Madison St. (about one block west of their previous location). 

Gardner-South Wilmington High School District #73 Board held a budget hearing and met in regular session Wednesday, September 19.

Superintendent Perrott presented the FY19 District Budget to the Board members and with a few small number changes since the August meeting the Board had no questions.

During the public comment part of the budget hear-Mrs. Jennifer ing, Smykowski asked for an explanation of the Life Safety funds. Mr. Perrott explained that certain building projects are considered "life safety," and the funds in that particular account can be used instead of coming from the Operations & Maintenance account. The architect would inspect the building and make recommendations for projects to be considered "life safety." The state then has to approve the project as "life and then "Life safety," Safety" monies may be spent.

An example given was the hand room exterior stairway which was crumbling. GSW used Life Safety money to pay for the project after the state approved the architect's assessment of the condition of the project.

At the regular board meeting, Janet Brown, Auditor, reviewed the FY18 Audit and informed them that she received all requested information from GSW in a timely matter; all bills are paid on time; all board minutes were available; and the books are in really good shape. She praised the board for being very involved in making sure monies are spent wisely, and told them they do a good job budgeting and using personal property taxes correctly.

The tax levy rate is down to rates as low as before 2010. When GSW levies less, it is good for tax-

Mrs. Smykowski presented several concerns to the board during the regular meeting:

 School safety – Kids making threats at school.

She stated there were two incidents already this school year; and questioned how many threats are made each school year; how many last year; and does the Board

keep track of this. • *Metal detector* – asked if the board had ever considered purchasing and using a metal detector. She stated she would get involved, and with the communities' help, raise money to help pay for

It would cost \$5-\$7,000 for one the size needed to accommodate the number of students at GSW HS. Mrs. Smykowski told the board she is concerned with safety and mental health issues, an epidemic in our country that needs to be addressed. She would help in any way she

• Air conditioning – She asked if the project was completed within the entire school and the Board members responded that "yes, the project is finished and every room in the building has air conditioning with the exception of the gym and hall-

• Transportation for foot*ball* – The verbal agreement between Dwight High School and GSW is that Gardner would provide transportation on Panther bus to and from Dwight. This is how it has been in the past. This year, students are providing their own transportation.

Mr. Perrott stated that GSW does not have staff to drive the bus this school year. Mrs. Smykowski stated that she would make herself available for the school to use her to drive the Panther bus. She said she would drive for football, wrestling and any other coop sport.

In the Principal's Report, Mr. Engelman presented the following:

· Richard Vana, temporary driver's education instructor who worked at GSW the first three weeks of school, reported a number of positive things – the kids were very nice, teachers and staff were helpful, community was welcoming, and he enjoyed coming to work at

Mr. Engelman told of the August 29 Rhythm of Youth Cardiac Screening which tested students during their PE class and/or Learning Lab. Almost every student participated and the testing will take place every two

The board discussed having "cuts" at the varsity level for the boys basketball and baseball teams. Athletic Director Matthew Eggert will be invited to the October board meeting for further discussion.

Board members were in agreement with cuts at the varsity level since coaches were expecting 20 to 25 on the varsity teams, more than one coach to have at practices and games. Such a high number would hurt the team's overall ability to improve.

The board discussed providing as many opportunities for students to participate in activities as possible, but also wants varsity teams to be competitive.

Varsity teams may be cut to 12-15 players, at the coach's discretion.

Mr. Perrott stated that the air conditioning was completed in two phases – last summer the first phase (second floor) and in 2018 the second phase (first floor). Almost all was installed and completed by district employees. which saved the district a great deal of money. GSW purchased system components and engineering from Thermo-Systems.

Since the gym and hallways were not air conditioned, they can be used for a "little heat - just to take the chill out of the rooms' before the boiler system is turned on. Each room has its own thermostat and can be individually regulated.

• Work is continuing on the first floor wall where lockers were removed.

• Panther Wall of Fame trophy case will be built to host images of the nominees. The W of F committee is being formed and will have one rep from each era, with four to eight nominations already received.

• Diaper-changing stations are installed in the male and female restrooms in the gym hallway.



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

· Avoid distractions while driving: texting, talking on hand-held phone, etc.


 Motorists should attempt to pass farm equipment unless it is both legal and safe to do so; even if the equipment operator waves you around.


