Young Diabetes Patients Raise Funds For a Cure

Eleven-year-old Cici Groves can rattle off anything you want to know about type 1 diabetes. She can tell you how to read a food label and all about carbs. She can explain everything she carries in her silver backpack including juice, glucose tablets, extra needles and an emergency glucagon shot and why the bag needs to go with her every moment of the day. She can tell you how not-so-fun it is to have to visit the pediatric endocrinologist at OSF St. Francis Medical Center in Peoria every three months. And, of course, she can tell you how the disease has changed her life.

"The night I was diagnosed I cried so much," she said. "It's a horrible thing to have, but it has its perks," she said, such as being able to eat a granola bar in class to regulate her blood sugar.

Type 1 diabetes is an autoimmune disease in which the pancreas does not produce insulin, one of the main hormones that regulates blood glucose levels. With the help of insulin, your body breaks down carbohydrates into glucose (also called blood sugar), which it uses for energy. Without insulin, the body resorts to breaking down bodily tissue such as muscle and fat stores. It can also cause a build-up of ketones in the body, which can lead to muscle wasting, kidney failure, neuropathy and blindness.

Type 1 is different from type 2 diabetes, in which genetics and lifestyle contribute. Type 2 diabetics still produce insulin but are unable to use it effectively. There is nothing anyone can do to prevent type 1, but with lifestyle changes, type 2 diabetes can often be reversed.

"Ours will never be reversed until a cure is found," said Kim Trainor, a paraprofessional aide in special education at Dwight Common School.

They were one step closer on Sunday when she, Cici and several other Dwight Common students with type 1 diabetes and their families walked a 5k in East Peoria for the Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation. Walking proudly in neon-colored tie-dye T-shirts, Team Carbo Chameleon raised

\$2,521 -- \$1,521 more than their goal.

Of that, \$385 was raised last week on Hat Day, when students paid \$1 to wear a hat to school. It was a show of support for Team Carbo Chameleon, led by Trainor and four students with type 1 diabetes: Cici, who was diagnosed in November; Tyler Cox, 12, who was diagnosed at age 5; Kamren Olbrot, 5, who was diagnosed a year ago; and Ameryn Wiles, 7, who was diagnosed as a toddler.

It's hard enough being a kid these days with schoolwork, crazy schedules, extracurricular activities, and living in a world filled with war and school shootings. Add to that having a disease that basically controls your life.

Trainor, 52, understands. She was diagnosed with type 1 diabetes at age 11. She had many of the classic symptoms: unquenchable thirst, frequent urination, unexplained bedwetting, less energy and weight loss.

Several of the kids at Dwight Common wear continuous glucose monitors and insulin pumps that are changed every few days. Others, because of insurance reasons, have to get shots every day. The disease demands meticulous planning in order to avoid life-threatening situations, everything from meal planning to counting carbs (which raise blood sugar levels faster than any food). They have to check their blood sugar before eating anything and carry a bag like Cici's of supplies and medicine wherever they go. They visit the nurse several times a day. Glucose monitors beep in class when levels are low, they wear small insulin pumps on their arms or legs and they have to monitor blood sugar levels 24 hours a day, which means they often have to pull out devices or their smartphones to determine what their levels are. All this makes them different, Trainor said.

Technology has come a long way since she was diagnosed. Back then the only way to test blood sugar was with a urine test, something no kid would want to do, particularly at school. The finger prick test was a breakthrough but squeezing blood on a test strip several times a day isn't pleasant for anyone.

Untch purchased 15 tickets for \$50, just as she has for years, looking at it more of donation to the dog rescue than a chance at quick cash. She loves the work they do and also sends a monthly donation.

"The dogs are so lucky," she said.

Maybe that luck was just God's way of saying thanks for being a rescue mom.

Dwight Village Board September 27 Board Actions

The Dwight Village Board of Trustees met on Thursday, September 27 to address village business. The meeting, originally scheduled for September 24, had been rescheduled due to a posting technicality.

Maintenance items were on the agenda with street sweeper repairs discussed by the board. Following \$6,000 already spent on repairs of the village’s street sweeper, an additional \$13,500 in repairs has become necessary. Kevin McNamara, village administrator, and Steve Kinkade, director of Public Works, were directed to find alternative options such as sweeper rental or outsourcing the work. The options will be presented at the next board session.

Water treatment plant tank repair was another item given attention by the board. Repairs totaling \$44,150

are needed at the filtration plant on Route 66. The board approved moving forward with the necessary filtration plant tank repairs as presented.

In another matter, the board reviewed a recommendation by Etcheson Spa and Pool from Normal. Etcheson made repairs to cracks in the Stevenson Pool this spring and recommended that a sump-type pit be placed outside of the pool to help lessen ground water thereby reducing crack - causing ground water pressures. A similar type of project was done at Odell’s pool two years ago. Cost estimate for the work is \$7,000 to \$9,000. The board approved the project provided bids for the work do not exceed \$10,000. A CD from the Stevenson Pool Trust will provide funds needed for the project.

In his report to the board, Harvest Days President Randy Irvin thanked Dwight police, ambulance personnel and Dwight Public Works for all of

their help during the recent Harvest Days celebration. Mayor Jared Anderson also commended everyone involved in making the event a success.

Resident Barb Christensen addressed the board in regard to an excessively high water bill. Christensen felt that had she been notified by the village of a consumption out of normal range following the meter reading, she might have been able to address the problem sooner, thereby preventing additional water loss.

Anne Rodosky, representing Dwight’s Football Fanatics, was present to inform the board that fireworks will be used during the Trojan homecoming football game on Friday night, October 5.

The board also approved:

- Payment of 9/24/18 bills totaling \$54,449.50.
- The August treasurer’s report.
- A Streator area enterprise zone intergovernmental agreement.

- A Streator area Enterprise zone ordinance including enterprise Zone designation; adding territory within the Village of Dwight; and property tax abatement.
- The closure of the Julie Drive cul-de-sac on October 13 for a private party starting at 5 p.m.
- A SOCU Trunk or Treat event on October 19 starting at 5 p.m. in the south parking lot on East Main Street.

Trustees Jim Mixen and Jerry Curtis were absent from the September 27 session. Mayor Jared Anderson, Trustees Randy Irvin, Jerry Curtis, Marla Kinkade, Jennifer Johnson and Justin Eggenberger were all in attendance.

The next meeting of the Dwight Village Board of Trustees will be at 6:30 p.m., Tuesday, October 9, in the Public Services Complex. This meeting date is being moved from its normal Monday date due to the Columbus Day holiday. Meetings are open to the public.

Today, Trainor, like the kids at Dwight Common School, have monitoring at their fingertips with special devices and apps on their phones and a press of a button can give a diabetic a boost of insulin through a catheter. It makes it easier, but will never change the fact that they have to live with diabetes every day for the rest of their lives.

That’s why Trainor started a support group for the children at Dwight Common School and their families. They meet once a month at the Dwight library to lean on each other, share ideas on how to manage the disease and allow the kids to be around those like them. She and school nurse Jane Fritsch came up with the idea last year. Fritsch plays an important part in helping

the children monitor their glucose levels throughout the school day.

Trainor wants to help educate the community on type 1 diabetes. Type 2 is the most common form of diabetes; 29.1 million people in the United States have it. About 1.25 million Americans live with type 1, 200,000 of them under the age of 20, according to the Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation.

She says there are still so many misconceptions about it, particularly when it comes to kids. Some think type 1 diabetics are lazy or eat too much, or they scrutinize what’s for lunch in the cafeteria.

November is Diabetes Awareness Month. Trainor said it’s time to put an end to the disease. There are studies being done with pancreatic islet transplantation but it still faces several chal-

lenges. Managing the disease is big money for medical companies, which makes her even more determined to continue educating people and raising funds for research.

“It changes your life, so a cure would be awesome,” Trainor said. “They can find cures for everything else. Why can’t they find a cure for this?”

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Can You Count on a Bountiful Investment "Harvest"?

We're officially in autumn – the season when we bring in what we planted in the spring. But the concept of planting and gathering isn't confined to agriculture. In fact, it can be used in many walks of life, including investing. So what can you do to help work toward a successful investment "harvest"?

Here is (not quite) a bushel of ideas:

"Plant the right "seeds." When farmers plant specific crops, they know about what to expect – how long it will take for them to grow, how much yield they'll produce, and so on. When you invest, you too need to plant "seeds" by choosing investments that are designed to help meet your goals. For example, to accumulate enough money for a comfortable retirement, you will probably need to own a reasonable percentage of growth-oriented vehicles, such as stocks – you generally can't expect the type of growth you need by investing solely in fixed-income investments, such as bonds and certificates of deposit.

"Nurture your "crops." Agricultural workers are diligent about cultivating their crops through proper irrigation, fertilization and weed control. And if you want to keep your investment portfolio healthy, you also must find ways to nurture it. First of all, you will need to keep adding new dollars regularly, because the larger your overall investment base, the more you can expand its growth potential. But you might also need to do some "weeding" of your own, because over the years, you may have purchased some investments that, for one reason or another, are now no longer suitable for your needs. If that's the case, you might be better off by selling these investments and using the proceeds for new ones that could fill gaps in your portfolio.

Diversify. Farmers may plant a mix of crops: corn, soybeans, flax, legumes, fruits, and so on. Consequently, if one crop fails, it won't sink the farmer's entire business. As an investor, you, too, need to diversify, because if you only own one type of asset class, and a financial downturn hits that asset, your portfolio can take a big hit. But spreading your dollars among stocks, bonds, cash and other investments can help reduce the impact of market volatility on your holdings. (However, diversification can't guarantee profits or protect against all losses.)

Thus far, we've looked at ideas on how you can create a healthy investment crop. But once it's time to actually start harvesting your portfolio – that is, once you begin liquidating parts of it to support yourself during your retirement years – you also need to act carefully. Specifically, you need to establish a withdrawal rate that's appropriate for your situation, based on your age, lifestyle, income sources and other factors. You could be retired for two or three decades, so it's essential you don't withdraw so much during your early years of retirement that you risk outliving your money. A financial professional can help you determine the rate that's right for you.

The agricultural harvest season only lasts a few weeks. But doing a good job of growing and managing your investment crop can help you reap the rewards far into the future.

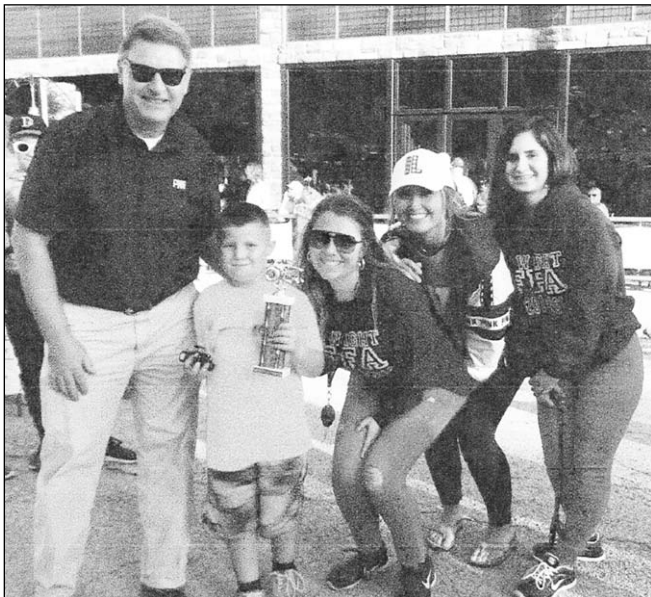

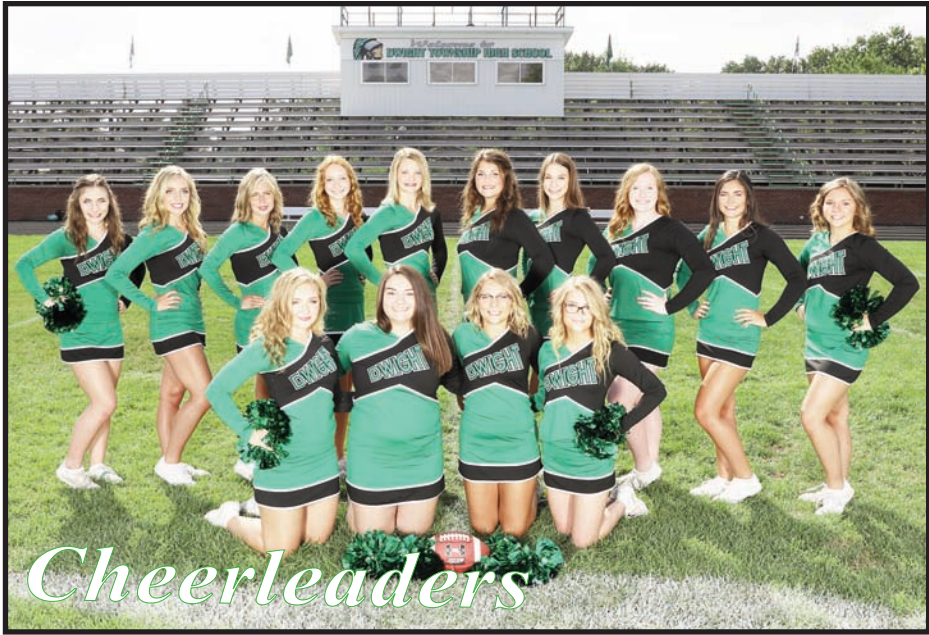

The Grundy County Health Department is now offering adult influenza vaccinations by appointment. Flu vaccine by appointment is available for adults on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays weekly. This year the Health Department has Fluzone High Dose quadri-

valent flu vaccine for persons 65 years of age and older. This flu vaccine was made just for senior citizens to give them better protection from the flu while covering four common strains of the flu virus. The High Dose is covered with a Medicare Part B with no cost to the senior.

The health department also offers Flublok quadrivalent adult flu vaccine for adults 19 years of age and up for a fee. This dose covers four common strains of the flu and through studies has been shown to provide increased protection compared to other adult flu vaccines.

Take your insurance card with you to the clinic on the day of your appointment.
