Facelift for Dwight Healthcare Center

Welcomes New Physician to Replace Retiring Dr. Cichon

Dr. Michael Cichon has served the Dwight community for nearly four decades and now it's time for him to retire.

But patients will have a new doctor -- and soon a newly updated building -- waiting for them as Morris Hospital consolidates its two Dwight offices into one expanded location on South Prairie Avenue in Dwight.

"Since affiliating with Dr. Cichon in 2016, it

has been our goal to bring all of our Dwight services together in one location," said Pat Durkin, vice president Ambulatory Services at Morris Hospital Healthcare Centers.

Cichon, general practitioner, will officially retire on Nov. 30. Meanwhile, he has been working with Dr. Jaynee Pendergast, his successor, since Oct. 1 as part of the transition.

The Prairie Avenue location will temporarily close on Oct. 11 for the remainder of the year to allow for expan-

sion and renovations. Patients will be seen half a mile away, at 103 S. John St., until the renovated Dwight Healthcare Center re-opens on Prairie in January 2019. Pendergast, Dr. Mark Passerman,

family medicine, Dr. Athar Saeed, cardiology, and Kathy Ulivi, family nurse practitioner, will be available for appointments at the John Street location until that time.

Cichon was in the John Street office when he affiliated with Morris Hospital two years ago and he has remained there. The John Street location will close once the new Prairie Avenue building

"With Dr. Cichon's retirement and Dr. Pendergast's arrival, this is the perfect time to make facility improvements and bring our Dwight services together under one roof. We look forward to unveiling the new and improved Prairie Avenue office at the start of the new year," Durkin said.

Morris Hospital is investing \$300,000 to update the Prairie Aveune location. The building is 5,200 square feet, but only 3,500 square feet was being utilized. Once the renovation is complete all 5,200 square feet will be used. As the number of patients has increased, there will be an additional four exam rooms, bringing the total to nine. There will be more parking spaces, and the entire building is getting a fresh new makeover, said Janet Long, public relations manager for Morris Hospital & Healthcare Centers.

"Today, I can say with confidence that I am leaving my patients in great hands, as we have recruited a wonderful family medicine physician to oversee the continued care of my patients," Cichon said of Pendergast. "I feel she'll be a great fit for our community."

Morris Hospital & Healthcare Centers is hosting a retirement reception honoring Dr. Cichon on Nov. 28 from 4-6 p.m. The place is to be determined. Everyone is invited to wish him well and also have the opportunity to meet Dr. Pendergast. Refreshments will be served.

Meet Dr. Pendergast

Jaynee Pendergast is a board-certified family medicine physician. A Joliet native, Pendergast provides primary care for patients of all ages, from newborns to seniors. In addition to diagnosing and treating illness, she provides preventive care, routine check-ups, health risk assessments, immunizations, screening tests and personalized counseling on maintaining a healthy lifestyle. She has specific interest in preventive care, acute care, women's health and pediatrics.

"I'm so excited and thankful to be a part of the Morris Hospital team," said Pendergast. "Since being from the area, it was always a goal of mine to be able to serve the community that helped raise me."

Pendergast received her Doctor of Osteopathic Medicine from Midwestern University Chicago College of Osteopathic Medicine in Downers Grove. She is board certified by the American Board of Family Medicine and is a member of American Academy of Family Practice American College of Osteopathic Family Physicians.

Pendergast and her husband are the parents of a young daughter. Her husband is a history teacher at Minooka Community High School.



Ribbon Tree **Placed at Grundy County Administration Building**

If you've come into the Grundy County Administration building this week, you may think the building is getting ready for Christmas, but rest assured it's not a Christmas tree, rather a "Ribbon Tree."

The health department has placed a tree in the lobby of the County Administration Building at 1320 Union Street in Morris for the month of October that will be known as the Ribbon Tree. While October is most well-known for Breast Cancer Awareness, the Ribbon Tree will not only recognize those who've been affected by breast cancer, but all cancers.

The Ribbon Tree is meant to honor/remember all of those affected by cancer. The health department invites you to come place a ribbon on the tree in memory of a person who has lost their life to cancer, honor someone who is battling the disease, or is a survivor.

There are several different color ribbons available representing the different types of cancer. Pink represents breast cancer, teal represents ovarian cancer, white cancer,

leukemia, yellow sarcoma/ bone cancer, and light blue prostate cancer. There are many different ribbon colors available to represent all the different cancers. However, if the particular ribbon color you are looking for is not available, lavender is the color used to encompass all cancers.

In honor of Breast Cancer Awareness month, the Grundy County Health Department would like to encourage women 45 years of age and older to speak with their doctor about scheduling a mammogram; earlier if there is a family history of breast cancer.

If you are a woman 35 years or older and living in Grundy or LaSalle counties with no insurance, please inquire at either LaSalle or Grundy County Health Department about the Illinois Breast and Cervical Cancer Program (IBCCP). Through the IBCCP program, qualified uninsured or underinsured individuals can receive help paying for mammogram and Pap smear screenings. Early detection is the key to having a fighting chance.












- Examine your breasts on a regular basis so you know how they normally look and feel. Report any changes to your healthcare provider.
 - Have a **clinical breast exam** every 1-3 years between ages 25-39. Beginning at age 40, have a breast exam by a healthcare provider every year.
 - For women at average risk without symptoms of breast cancer, talk to your provider about having an annual screening mammogram beginning at age 40.

Have You Scheduled Your Mammogram Yet?

Ridge Road Campus in Channahon are now offering one of the new advancements when it comes to breast cancer detection: breast tomosynthesis, also known as 3D mammog-

"With breast tomosynthesis, we're seeing a 3-dimensional image of the 3-dimensional breast," said Dr. Richard Symanski, a board certified radiologist at Morris Hospital. "We're actually able to see through the breast, and we can get a better look at areas that were once difficult to see.'

3D imaging allows radiologists to see lesions in the breast more clearly and detect breast cancers earlier, thus reducing anxiety, and reduce the number of callbacks for additional testing.

Radiologists are able to see multiple angled images in a matter of seconds, while an x-ray arm sweeps in an arc above the

Morris Hospital and the Morris Hospital breast. They get a 3-dimensional image of the breast and examine the breast tissue one thin layer at a time. Fine details of the inside of the breast – including small cancers -- are more visible and less likely to be hidden by overlapping tissue.

3D mammography is especially beneficial for women with dense breast tissue, Symanski said.

"From the radiologist's perspective, the images obtained through standard 2D mammography have been equated to looking at the cover of a book. 3D is like looking at the inside pages," said Symanski.

Studies show 3D mammography improves the overall early detection of breast cancer by 10 to 30 percent.

Are you at risk?

AGE: Two out of three women with invasive cancer are diagnosed after age 55.

RACE: Breast cancer is diagnosed more often in caucasian women than women of other races.

FAMILY HISTORY AND GENETIC: If your mother, sister, father or child has been diagnosed with breast or ovarian cancer, you have a higher risk of being diagnosed with breast cancer in the future. Your risk increases if your relative was diagnosed before the age of 50.

HEALTH HISTORY: If you have been diagnosed with breast cancer in one breast, you have an increased risk of being diagnosed with breast cancer in the other breast in the future.

MENSTRUAL AND REPRODUCTIVE HIS-**TORY**: Early menstruation (before age 12), late menopause (after 55), having your first child at an older age, or never having given birth can also increase your risk for breast cancer.

CERTAIN GENOME CHANGES: Mutations in certain genes, such as BRCA1 and BRCA2, can increase your risk for breast cancer. This is determined through a genetic test.



DENSE BREAST TIS-**SUE**: Having dense breast tissue can increase your risk for breast cancer and make lumps harder to detect. Illinois requires physicians to disclose to women if their mammogram indicates that they have dense breasts so that they are aware of this

LACK OF PHYSICAL ACTIVITY, poor diet, being overweight/obese.

ALCOHOL: Frequent consumption of alcohol can increase your risk for breast cancer. The more alcohol you consume, the greater the



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Single Mom Loves Farm Life

Top Chefs Prize Her Prime Cuts

Thirty-two acres would be a lot for any livestock farmer to maintain with good help. But Kim Snyder does it all by herself, seven days a week, 352 days a year.

The single mom is a second generation farmer, raising critically endangered and heritage livestock, which she sells to some of the finest restaurants in Chicago like The Publican, to shoppers at farmers' markets and to a handful of private customers, all of whom seek her out because her farm is run by the laws of nature, as it should be, she says.

"It really just morphed and evolved over the last 14 years," she said.

Her aunt had a ranch in Phoenix when she was growing up, and it was her favorite place to go. She always wanted to be a farmer, but her parents said, "We don't do that." So instead she went into the corporate world.

But when her daughter Abigail Faith was born 14 years ago, the then 36-year-old decided to follow her dreams and opened Faith's Farm in Dwight.

Today, she dutifully and lovingly looks after 18 heads of cattle, 30 hogs, two sheep, three donkeys and flocks of turkeys, ducks and chickens.

They all live outdoors, are free range and eat organic feed and grass she grows that

provide a good, balanced diet. They are also treated with lots of love.

Because of this, the animals are healthier and stronger, which in turn breed healthy and strong babies that continue to get stronger with every generation. She refuses to overbreed her animals, letting things happen naturally as opposed to artificial insemination. That may mean lower yields -- typically six to eight calves and 30-40 hogs are born each year -- but her prime cuts are tastier and diners know they've come from humane practices.

Her meat is so sought after, she estimates that more than 200 Chicago and suburban chefs have found their way to her farm to learn more about what they serve.

"Everything has to have good balance and energy," she said about the animals and her farm

She recently raised and harvested 20 rare and expensive Swedish black hens, which are prized in Chinese medicine. The chickens are completely black, even their meat and skin, and the bone broth is coveted for kidney patients. A friend will use the bones for broth, and the meat will be served at a special five-course meal this week at Twain restaurant in Chicago's Logan Square neighborhood.

Being a boutique farmer isn't easy. "It's hard work and it doesn't pay the bills," she said. "Quite honestly it's just getting harder and harder."

Take this year. The hot, dry weather affected the hay harvest and she worries how she will feed her cows this winter.

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

may also never go outside). She holds chef retreats and an annual kids camp where children, mostly from

Chicago, spend a week at the farm. "I get to touch these children's lives and teach them things they won't learn anywhere

She has also held a Farm Fall Fest for the past nine years. It's an opportunity for people to throw down a blanket, relax and learn more about Faith's Farm. This year's event will be held from 11 a.m.-3 p.m. October 14. There will be music, hay rides, a vendor farmers market and a chef from Chicago's Antique Taco, named one of the 50 best tacos in America, serving up delicious snacks for purchase. There is no admission charge.

She also hopes her new Farm Store will be open for visitors that day. The store will have regular hours and also be open by appointment. She'll be selling her natural handmade products such as laundry soap and stain remover, lotion bars and lip balm. (Snyder's bacon lip balm is the bomb -- take it from this reporter). She will also sell natural products made by locals such as honey, maple syrup, tea blends and ice cream made from local milk and berries.

It's tough work but she does it all for the love of her daughter, the land and the animals that are so precious to her. "I love the life. It's my daughter's home," she said. "I

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love the land. I love my animals. I love what I do."

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Tips for Harvest Management & Preserving Grain Quality in Corn about 1 bu./acre. at the appropriate moisture con-

With harvest upon us, it's important to be thinking about best management practices that will allow you to get the most out of harvest while preserving grain quality throughout the harvest and storage process. Here are a few tips.

1. Make sure that your combine settings are appropriately adjusted to minimize grain damage and fines, as both fines and damaged kernels are a haven for mold growth and insects. Continue to check field losses throughout harvest in order to adjust your speed and equipment. You can do this by going back to an area that was just harvested, and throwing a 1 sq. ft. frame several times throughout the area. You can then count the number of kernels within the square, noting that for every two-kernels you find per sq. ft., you're losing

2. Before you harvest a particular field, document any problems you see. This includes the weeds that are present or any signs of insect and disease. Record when and where you made these observations so that you can appropriately adjust your management strategy. It's also important to pay attention to fields or areas in a field that appear to have mold issues, so as not to mix contaminated grain with clean grain during

3. You will want to store clean grain separately from damaged or contaminated grain. Additionally, any grain that may be remaining from last year's harvest should be consolidated into the same bin, and kept separate from this year's

4. Make sure to store grain

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tent. It is dependent on the period of time you plan to store the grain, the storage temperature, and the initial quality of the grain. If you're only planning on storing corn until early/midsummer, 14-15% moisture is typically recommended. If you plan on storing corn for longer periods, the grain should be stored at a lower moisture level to keep it in better condition and to help prevent mold growth. If the grain is of lower quality, it should also be stored at a lower moisture content, typically 1% lower than recommended mois-

ture contents. 5. Continue checking grain temperatures and moisture content bi-weekly throughout the Fall, and once a month in the Winter, to take into account changing weather and potential moisture movement into the bin. At each inspection, remember to keep record of the grain temperature and moisture content, as well as any signs of potential issues. This includes any signs of crusting, condensation, mold, leaks, and any musty or unusual odors.
