Fallen Officers Recognized

Monday morning, October 21, the four heroes, who stood in harm’s way and were killed or wounded during a traffic stop in 1979, were recognized.
More than 200 gathered at the Paxton firehouse for the ceremony.
A shootout occurred along Interstate 57 near Paxton on April 7, 1979 during a traffic stop.
Trooper Michael McCarter, Patrolman William Caisse, and Trooper McCarter’s brother-in-law, Donald Vice, lost their lives.
Officer Larry Hale was wounded twice.
Two suspects were killed and a third, wounded.

Thomas Bennett, State Representative of the 106th District, states: “We came together in support of each other on this day of remembrance and gratefulness for these good men. I hope that this ceremony, this resolution, and the sign that is now in place marking the bridge as the McCarter-Caisse-Vice-Hale Overpass might in some small way help bring some sense of closure to the families from a grateful community and state of Illinois.”
He went on to say, “Let us not forget the sacrifice that all four men gave for their community and our state on April 7, 1979. May God bless them, their families and their community.”
The I-57 sign states: “**McCarter - Caisse - Vice - Hale Memorial Overpass.**”

Consolidating Accounts Leads to Clear Financial Strategy

None of us can completely control all the things that happen to us. Low Speed Vehicles Gain Additional Crossing Access

The Dwight Village Board of Trustees met on October 22. Following a recommendation from the Ordinance Committee, the Low Speed Vehicle Ordinance was amended to allow crossing at all points along Route 17. The Ordinance now reads: “A properly equipped Low Speed Vehicle shall be permitted to cross a State highway on IL State Route 17 at all intersections to gain north-south access, and on IL State Route 47 at all intersections to gain east-west access.” Previously, low speed vehicles could only cross at two points on Route 17.

A request by Brian Galbreath, owner of Unpossible Mead, to be allowed to sell alcohol in addition to mead at his business was also approved. The Class H license will be amended to read “The Class H license shall permit the sale of alcoholic liquor, including beer and wine for consumption on the premises only.”

Two requests received for additional stop signs in the village were reviewed by the Ordinance Committee. One was

for stop signs at William and Clinton and the other was for stop signs at Delaware and Chicago. It was noted that over the past five years there has been one accident at William and Clinton and two accidents at Delaware and Chicago. The committee made no recommendation to the Board to add stop signs and no action was taken. However, after discussion, the board agreed to further review the Delaware and Chicago stop sign request.

Mayor Jared Anderson extended condolences to the family of Vince Louis. Jean Louis, Vince’s wife, had served as Dwight’s Village Clerk for a number of years. Sympathies were also extended to Bob Young, Livingston County Board Chairman, regarding the passing of his wife.

Congratulations were given to the Dwight Mighty Mites football team on their outstanding undefeated season and Youth Football League Super Bowl Championship victory on October 20. Dwight’s Varsity Trojans were wished the best of luck in their playoffs.

Steve Kinkade, Director of Public Works, reported that the chipper will be put away at the end of the month. Residents are also reminded that the final leaf bag collection

will be November 26. It was also noted that the repairs on the street sweeper are complete.

Trustee Jim Mixen pointed out that several signs along village roads are no longer legible and requested that these be removed.

The board also approved:

- payment of bills totaling \$47,368.12.
- the September 2018 Treasurer’s Report with a balance of \$3,940,111.80.

Trustee Jennifer Johnson was absent from the October 22 session. Mayor Jared Anderson and all other trustees were in attendance.

The next meeting of the Dwight Village Board of Trustees will be at 6:30 p.m., Monday, November 5, in the Public Services Complex. Please note this is a special date due to the Veterans Day holiday falling on the regular meeting date. There will not be a meeting on November 12. All meetings are open to the public.

How Will You Vote? General Election Races

On Nov. 6, citizens in the General Election will vote for governor, a new attorney general, secretary of state, congressional and state representatives and more.

Locally, they will also elect new county board members, regional superintendents of schools, several referendums, the Grundy County sheriff and more.

Republican Bruce Rauner and Democrat JB Pritzker will square off for governor of course, and voters in Livingston and Grundy County will have to choose to either give Lindsay Parkhurst (R-Kankakee) another term

as the state representative for the 79th District or bring back Lisa Dugan (D-Bradley), who served as state rep for nearly a decade. It’s been a hot debate.

Grundy and Livingston county voters will vote to elect Sara Dady (D-Rockford) or longtime Republican incumbent Adam Kinzinger in the 16th Congressional District. Statewide, Senator Heidi Henry (D-Marseilles) faces incumbent Sue Rezin (R-Morris) for 38th District. In the 53rd District, Jason Barickman (R-Bloomington) remains unopposed. In the 75th District, State Rep. David Allen Welter (R-Morris) is unopposed too.

There will also be a referendum for voters in the Gardner Fire Protection District to increase property taxes in

order to give their firefighters and EMTs a raise. In Livingston, voters will be asked whether to establish a tax levy for the senior citizen home health-care program and another to maintain a public health budget.

In Grundy County, Democrat Kevin Callahan is fighting to retain his role as the Grundy County Sheriff. Callahan faces Republican opponent Ken Briley (R-Morris).

John Hunt, Boy Scout Troop 459, Earns Eagle Scout Honors

Boy Scout Troop 459, chartered by Godley Park District, has announced John Hunt as the newest Eagle Scout to the troop.

Throughout John's journey through Boy Scouts, his responsibilities increased with his ranks. His positions included Den Chief, where he went to his old Cub Scout Pack and helped with the younger scouts with their weekly meetings, Troop Scribe, where weekly dues and attendance was taken, Senior Patrol Leader, where he was in charge of two patrols within the troop, and finally, Order of the Arrow Representative, where he would communicate events and important messages between the Order of the Arrow and the Troop.

John went to 11 weeks of summer campouts which included going to different camps two or three weeks per summer. Some of the scout camps he went to are, Rainbow Scout Reservation in Morris, IL, Camp Bunn in Hettick, IL, and Camp Ransburg in Bloomington, IN. During his summer camp at Camp Bunn, John learned boat safety and was able to ride a jet ski all week long.

In 2017 with Troop 459, John earned the 50-miler award for Canoeing by canoeing fifty miles over a five day period starting from the Illinois-Indiana border of the Kankakee and finishing at Wilmington. In 2018 with Troop 459, John whitewater rafted the upper half of the Pigeon River in Tennessee and kayaked the lower half. He also hiked in the Smokey Mountains.

John's Eagle Scout project was the building and installation of two bat houses at the Reed-Custer High School. The two bat houses can hold up to 2000 bats total. The bats will control the insect population around the sports fields instead of using pesticides. John officially became an Eagle Scout on July 31, and his Eagle Court of Honor was held October 13 at the Mars Theater in Wilmington, where John was presented the Eagle Scout Medal. After the presentation, everyone got popcorn and watched John's favorite movie, Jurassic Park.

Only four percent of Boy Scouts are granted the rank of Eagle after a lengthy review process. The requirements necessary to achieve this rank take many years to fulfill. Since its founding in 1910, the Eagle Scout rank has been earned by almost 2.5 million young men.

John graduated from Reed-Custer this past year and is currently attending Joliet Junior College.

Detroit

If two weeks ago you would have told me that on October 27th I would be in Detroit watching the Detroit Pistons take on the Boston Celtics, I probably would've told you that makes no sense.

I am not a Celtics fan, although they are fun to watch, and I'm not a fan of the Detroit Pistons, they wrote "The Jordan Rules", for that reason alone I can never enjoy watching them, sorry Detroit.

But, as fate would have it, I ended up going to Detroit, and experiencing this very thing that on the surface seemed relatively improbable. Most of it stems from my roommate being a big Boston Celtics fan. (Not sure what went wrong with him there.)

The drive to Detroit, for those who have never done it, is cool. There's a lot of foliage (is that the right word?) trees and stuff, and not corn fields, it was a little more aesthetically pleasing than driving up and down interstate 55. No disrespect to the cornfields, of course. BUT, sometimes it's nice to have something a little different to look at, and I must give it up to the trees, huge fan of them.

The trip itself was nice, aside from the drive time, Chicago to Detroit can be done in just under 4 hours, so it's a little bit lengthy on that side of things, but then again that's MoTown! There's a lot of history there. I didn't even realize the Fox Theatre was there, and they've had artists like Elvis, Sinatra, and Sammy Davis Jr perform there, and I walked right by it.

Perrott presented on the following old business:

Dwight Falls to Lisle in Play-off

After ending a 12-year play-off drought, the Dwight Trojans squared off against the Lions from Lisle Friday night on the road – falling by a score of 38-14.

It was the Trojans who hit the scoreboard first, scoring on a six-yard Logan Graham TD in the first. Following a successful extra point by J.C. Santos, Dwight held the 7-0 advantage early on.

Less than five minutes later, however, Lisle would make good on an 18-yard rush by Jay McGrath – knotting things up at 7-7 after the extra point.

McGrath would once again score before the first quarter clock ran out, taking it in from 25 yards out to put the Lions up 14-7 after one.

In the second quarter, the Trojans would tie it back up with a two-yard touchdown run by Graham. Putting the contest at 14-14 after a Santos XP.

That would be the last

time Dwight would score in the game.

Lisle's McGrath would add another touchdown, and a 28-yard field goal, before the first half ended – giving the Lions a 24-14 lead at halftime.

In the second half, it was McGrath again taking charge, as he made a 25-yard pass completion for a score, and a 48-yard touchdown run to boot – as Lisle took a commanding 38-14 lead. And that is how it would end.

Colton Holm passed for 100 yards on 9-14 passing, throwing a pick. Graham made a 38-yard completion, with Carson Crouch tossing an interception on his only pass attempt.

Graham found himself in unfamiliar territory in the stat column, as he racked up the *second* most yards in the game on the ground, tallying 126 yards and two touchdowns on 24 carries. Crouch ran it three times for nine yards total, followed by eight yards on five rushes by

Cal Schultz. Will Bergstrom had a two-yard run.

Chris Bement made three grabs for 54 yards in the contest, with Dakota Wahl and Graham making three grabs each – good for 44 and 22 yards, respectively. Schultz made an 18-yard catch.

The Trojans committed three turnovers in the game.

On the defensive side, Graham led with eight tackles, followed by Crouch and Bement with four each, including a tackle for a loss from both boys. Schultz made 3.5 tackles, with Cade Enerson racking up three to go with an interception. Dane Rodosky had three tackles, with one for a loss. Wahl would tally 2.5 tackles, while Lucas Bregin added two, including one for a loss. Wilton Jackman chipped in with 1.5 tackles. Daniel Gutierrez and Logan Hatfield had one tackle each. Tyler Bryant assisted on a tackle.

Dwight ends their 2018 campaign with a 6-4 record.

Morris Hospital Announces \$60 Million Master Facility Plan

Morris Hospital & Healthcare Centers has announced a \$60 million master facility plan that includes modernization of the main hospital campus and the addition of two new medical facilities over the next three years.

The hospital modernization project will involve renovation and redesign of over 56,000 square feet of existing space that will result in a new emergency department, a new cardiac diagnostic department, new lab draw and infusion therapy areas, a renovated imaging services department that includes a women's imaging center, a new surgical waiting room, and a new patient registration area. The target completion date for the hospital modernization project is March 2021.

According to Mark Steadham, President & CEO of Morris Hospital & Healthcare Centers, modernization of Morris Hospital's main campus will help address increased volumes in the emergency department and aging facilities while enhancing patient privacy and the overall patient experience.

As required for projects of this level, Morris Hospital has submitted the \$33.5 million main campus modernization plans to the Illinois Health Facilities and Services Review Board for approval at its December 4 meeting. Phase 1 of the main campus modernization project, which involves construction of the new emergency department and relocation of infusion therapy, could begin as early as second quarter 2019.

Other significant components of Morris Hospital's master facility plan include construction of a Diamond-Coal City Campus that

will include immediate care, diagnostic lab and imaging, occupational medicine and physical therapy services, along with physician office space. Construction is scheduled to begin in November on property located at 1450 E. Division Street immediately west of McGinty Road on the north side of Route 113, with an estimated completion by fall 2019.

In Ottawa, Morris Hospital currently provides physician services in three different office locations. The master facility plan calls for constructing a new facility in Ottawa that will consolidate the three offices and bring expanded offerings, with a tentative 2020 completion. The future Ottawa location has not yet been finalized.

The \$60 million master facility plan also includes a \$3 million investment in renovations at Deerpath Surgery Center, which was converted from an orthopedic surgery center to a multi-specialty ambulatory surgery center earlier this year. Deerpath is a joint venture between Morris Hospital and independent physicians. As a result of the expansion to a multi-specialty surgery center, many outpatient ophthalmology surgeries and gastrointestinal procedures that were previously performed at Morris Hospital are now being done at Deerpath.

Steadham says the master facility plan is the culmination of more than three years of planning that has included reviewing data, trends in healthcare, and a number of options with the hospital Board of Directors.

Association of Illinois and the executive director of the Illinois Route 66 Scenic Byway, or their designees.

Rounding out the commission are seven ex-officio members to include the following officials or their designees: the governor; the secretary of the Department of Transportation; the director of the Illinois Historic Preservation Agency; the Department of Natural Resources director; the director of the Office of Tourism; the Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity director; and the director of the State Archives.
