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'Tis the Season at Dwight High School

Students Create Ornaments for White House Tree

Today might be Halloween, but art students at Dwight Township High School have been busy decorating for Christmas -- specifically for the National Christmas Tree in Washington, D.C.

When President Donald Trump lights up the national tree on Nov. 30, Dwight will represent Illinois, one of 56 states, districts and territories that will showcase handmade ornaments. Twenty-seven students are sending 24 ornaments to the White House to be on display as part of the annual event. More than 1,500 students participated in this year's project.

One of them was senior Amber Gajda, daughter of Lisa and Jason Gajda of Dwight. She painted the White House with two white oaks (the state tree), a field of violets (the state flower), a white-tailed deer (the state animal) and cardinals flying overhead (the state bird).

Amber has been in art all four years, so when art teacher Patricia Farrell-Levange announced Dwight was chosen to create ornaments for the White House by Lindsey Jensen, a Dwight Township High School teacher and 2018 Teacher of the Year, Amber was one of the first to raise her hands.

"This is a huge accomplishment for a [teenager's art] to be at the White House," said Farrell-Levange.

Students received the ornaments Oct. 22 and only a week to conceptualize and follow through with their design. The ornaments are being shipped to the White House today.

"The thing about my kids is their self motiva-



paint, then stuck tiny styrofoam balls on it for a 3-D snow effect. She covered the inside in silver glitter, then painted snowflakes on the front side, along with brown branches, upon which two cardinals were attached.

Kendahl Weller, a freshman, glued cotton balls on the inside of the ornament, then tucked a tiny wire tree inside.

Others, like Zachary Huffaker, chose abstract design. He used a marbling technique by twisting his paint brush on the inside in colors of red and two shades of green.

The students' ornaments will be part of 56 6foot-tall trees that will surround the National Christmas tree, a living Colorado blue spruce from Virginia in President's Park. The trees will be on display from Nov. 28-Jan. 1. There are live concerts and special guests.

Farrell-Levange, an art teacher for 13 years, three in Dwight, said many of the students will use their pieces in their portfolios. There are students who want to go into art therapy, graphic design or art teaching careers.

Amber Gajda will use her ornament in her advanced placement portfolio to help with scholarships and to get into the American Academy of



tion," Farrell-Levange said. When they found out they were chosen they got right to work.

The students were allowed to use their creativity in any way they wanted to decorate the large plastic globes. Their only restrictions were they couldn't use words or anything of political nature. Students also couldn't openly sign their work, but Farrell-Levange said that some of the students hid their names or a message inside where no one would see.

The work is beautiful. Brianna London, a junior, dipped the bottom of her ornament in white Art in Chicago. She plans to major in painting and become an art teacher.

This is the second time this year that Dwight high school has been represented at the White House. In the spring they decorated a 4-foot egg for the annual egg roll.

It all brings a smile to Farrell-Levange.

"They are a great group of kids. All their brilliant ideas coming together," she said. "I'm just really proud of them."

Local Pot Plant Purchased by Marijuana Giant MedMen

MedMen Inc. recently agreed to a \$682 million purchase of PharmaCann LLC and includes Dwight's medical marijuana production facility.

PharmaCann's plant, located at 1200 East Mazon, employs 35 people in various cultivation operations. Its state-of-the-art facility encompasses 46,000 square feet, 21,000 of which is used for growing and cultivating some 200 plants per week, said Kate Walden, director of communications for PharmaCann, headquartered in Oak Park.

The all-stock purchase is the largest acquisition transaction in U.S. cannabis history. Combined, MedMen and PharmaCann will be licensed for 66 dispensaries and 13 cultivation/production facilities in 12 states.

Not much will change at the Dwight plant other than its name to MedMen, in time. There are no plans for expansion, Walden said. They do have three full-time position openings, including an extractor, food tech and maintenance.

The sale, she explained, was more about growth. MedMen, headquartered in L.A., is known for its retail operations, whereas PharmaCann is known for its state-of-the-art cultivation. "It kind of creates that synergy," she said.

"MedMen and PharmaCann are rapidly growing," she said. "... There are a lot of people that need this medical marijuana."


Dwight is PharmaCann's premier production facility in Illinois. Both PharmaCann and MedMen are "very impressed with the talent" at Dwight.

PharmaCann has another production facility in Hillcrest. PharmaCann also operates production plants and dispensaries in Maryland, Massachusetts and New York.

At Dwight, they grow and manufacture medical cannabis that is distributed to PharmaCann's four dispensaries in Illinois: Arlington Heights, Evanston, North Aurora and Ottawa. The cannabis grown and produced in Dwight stays in Illinois, per law.

PharmaCann's Illinois dispensaries sell medical marijuana in the form of dried flowers, capsules, concentrates, creams, oils and vapes.

The sale is timely, coming just a month after Gov. Bruce Rauner signed Senate Bill 336, which allows medical marijuana to be prescribed as an alternative for opioid prescriptions. It not only expands access to medical marijuana but also expedites the application process.

Monday morning, October 21, the four heroes, who stood in harm's way and were killed or wounded during a traffic stop in 1979, were recognized.

More than 200 gathered at the Paxton firehouse for the ceremony.

A shootout occurred along Interstate 57 near Paxton on April 7, 1979 during a traffic stop.

Trooper Michael McCarter, Patrolman William Caisse, and Trooper McCarter's brother-in-law, Donald Vice, lost their lives.

Officer Larry Hale was wounded twice.

Two suspects were killed and a third, wounded.

Thomas Bennett, State Representative of the 106th District, states: "We came together in support of each other on this day of remembrance and gratefulness for these good men. He went on to say, "Let us not forget the sacrifice that all four men gave for their community and our state on April 7, 1979. May God bless them, their families and their community."

Consolidating Accounts Leads to Clear Financial Strategy

None of us can completely control all the things that happen to us. Yet, when it comes to achieving your long-term financial goals, including a comfortable retirement, you do have a great deal of power - as long as you follow a clear, well-defined financial strategy. 

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The Dwight Village Board of Trustees met on October 22. Following a recommendation from the Ordinance Committee, the Low Speed Vehicle Ordinance was amended to allow crossing at all points along Route 17. The Ordinance now reads: "A properly equipped Low Speed Vehicle shall be permitted to cross a State highway on IL State Route 17 at all intersections to gain north-south access, and on IL State Route 47 at all intersections to gain east-west access." Previously, low speed vehicles could only cross at two points on Route 17.

On Nov. 6, citizens in the General Election will vote for governor, a new attorney general, secretary of state, congressional and state representatives and more.

Locally, they will also elect new county board members, regional superintendents of schools, several referendums, the Grundy County sheriff and more.

Republican Bruce Rauner and Democrat JB Pritzker will square off for governor of course, and voters in Livingston and Grundy County will have to choose to either give Lindsay Parkhurst (R-Kankakee) another term

as the state representative for the 79th order to give their firefighters and District or bring back Lisa Dugan (D-Bradley), who served as state rep for nearly a decade. It's been a hot debate.

Grundy and Livingston county voters will vote to elect Sara Dady (D-Rockford) or longtime Republican incumbent Adam Kinzinger in the 16th Congressional District. There will also be a referendum for voters in the Gardner Fire Protection District to increase property taxes in



JJC is proposing some changes to dual credit. Right now there is no fee to the students. JJC is proposing a \$50 fee per class, which would be reimbursed if the student chooses to attend JJC for any college classes for up to 18-months after they graduate from high school. Students on free or reduced lunch will not be required to pay the fee. Students receiving JJC credit through GAVC will not be required to pay the fee.

Panther Hall of Fame -The first Selection Committee meeting was held on Oct. 18, with one committee member representing every decade 1950 through 2010. They have received five nominations for the Panther Hall of Fame.



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
TEAMSTERS LOCAL 700 DOES NOT SPEAK FOR ALL OF US!



Morris Hospital Announces \$60 Million Master Facility Plan

Morris Hospital & Healthcare Centers has announced a \$60 million master facility plan that includes modernization of the main hospital campus and the addition of two new medical facilities over the next three years.

The hospital modernization project will involve renovation and redesign of over 56,000 square feet of existing space that will result in a new emergency department, a new cardiac diagnostic department, new lab draw and infusion therapy areas, a renovated imaging services department that includes a women's imaging center, a new surgical waiting room, and a new patient registration area. The target completion date for the hospital modernization project is March 2021.

According to Mark Steadham, President & CEO of Morris Hospital & Healthcare Centers, modernization of Morris Hospital's main campus will help address increased volumes in the emergency department and aging facilities while enhancing patient privacy and the overall patient experience.

As required for projects of this level, Morris Hospital has submitted the \$33.5 million main campus modernization plans to the Illinois Health Facilities and Services Review Board for approval at its December 4 meeting. Phase 1 of the main campus modernization project, which involves construction of the new emergency department and relocation of infusion therapy, could begin as early as second quarter 2019.

Other significant components of Morris Hospital's master facility plan include construction of a Diamond-Coal City Campus that will include immediate care, diagnostic lab and imaging, occupational medicine and physical therapy services, along with physician office space. Construction is scheduled to begin in November on property located at 1450 E. Division Street immediately west of McGinty Road on the north side of Route 113, with an estimated completion by fall 2019.

In Ottawa, Morris Hospital currently provides physician services in three different office locations. The master facility plan calls for constructing a new facility in Ottawa that will consolidate the three offices and bring expanded offerings, with a tentative 2020 completion. The future Ottawa location has not yet been finalized.

The \$60 million master facility plan also includes a \$3 million investment in renovations at Deerpath Surgery Center, which was converted from an orthopedic surgery center to a multi-specialty ambulatory surgery center earlier this year. Deerpath is a joint venture between Morris Hospital and independent physicians. As a result of the expansion to a multi-specialty surgery center, many outpatient ophthalmology surgeries and gastrointestinal procedures that were previously performed at Morris Hospital are now being done at Deerpath.

Steadham says the master facility plan is the culmination of more than three years of planning that has included reviewing data, trends in healthcare, and a number of options with the hospital Board of Directors.
