Hear Them Roar!

Tri-Point FFA Veterinary Science Team 3rd in Nation

Tri-Point High School's FFA veterinary science team is the cat's meow.

The team was named third best in the nation in veterinary science at the National FFA Veterinary Science Career Development Event held Oct. 24-26 in Indianapolis. It is the third third-place award in the nationals under the leadership of FFA advisor Diana Loschen, the agriculture teacher at TPHS.

The winning team was comprised of Amyjo Steichen, Jimmy Haag, Tara Hummel, and Gabrielle Spangler. Steichen was among top-placing individuals (4th), as was Haag (5th). Hummel was selected as the national winner for the National FFA Proficiency Award in Small Animal Production and Care. (See story page 3).

"Our team really took the bull by the horns," Loschen said. "I'm proud of all these kids."

The award was more than a year in the making, Loschen said. The veterinary science team won second at state in 2017 -- quite an honor but not enough to send them to nationals. But with hard work and determination, this past spring they won the state competition, propelling them to the nationals, representing Illinois and competing against the other 49 states, Puerto Rico and the U.S. Virgin Islands.

The National FFA Veterinary Science CDE is a competitive event that tests students' abilities to apply veterinary science knowledge and skill in practical settings as well as identify breeds, parasites and equipment, perform injections and more. Tri-Point worked outside the classroom all summer, practicing individually and also as a team, using their clinical skills on stuffed or mannequin animals as they would at nationals. The students had to be prepared to explain every step in these processes to the judges during competition.

The students also had to complete a written exam of anatomy and physiology, and respond to scenario questions about current topics in the veterinary industry. Teams presented to a panel of judges about the roles and responsibilities of the veterinary team in a variety of situations involving patients from companion animal to large animal

The written test asked them to solve a hypothetical scenario of a shortage of opioids in veterinary medicine. The team scenario was to come up with a plan for veterinary clinics to introduce better fear-free animal handling practices. Tri-Point presented ideas such as using pheromones or essential oils and utilizing separate entrances for dogs and cats. In fact, each of the team members earned their Fear

Free Certifications through researching the scenario, Loschen said.

Placement was based on a point system, she said. First place went to California; second to Washington. Only 1½ points separated Washington from first place, and only 7½ points separated Tri-Point from first place, Loschen said.

They were out to win, Loschen said. They were team T-shirts with a veterinary syringe and the slogan "We're out for blood."

"They worked so hard. They put in a tremendous amount of hours," she said.

The team received support from many people in the community to prepare for nationals, including Dr. Alan Whitman of Whitman Veterinary Clinic; Dr. Jill Janssen of River Valley Veterinary Clinic; and Brett Sorensen, the Clifton Central FFA Advisor.

"I will never forget the countless memories that we made along the way and there is no way I would have rather ended my FFA career than as a competitor," Haag said.

There are 42 young adults in Tri-Point's FFA chapter. Tri-Point has received two other third-place national awards, for its livestock team, Loschen said.



After 36 Years, Dr. Cichon Ready to Retire

Michael Cichon didn't necessarily intend to be a doctor. In college he first wanted to become a mechanical engineer but couldn't understand the course, he laughed. But he loved science so he took a biology course. The rest is history.

Dr. Cichon has spent the last 36 years practicing medicine in the Dwight community and now he's ready to hang up his stethoscope. His last day of practice at Dwight Healthcare Center of Morris Hospital is Nov. 30, and his patients can wish him a happy retirement at a reception Nov. 27 from 4-6 p.m. at St. Patrick's Parish Hall, 118 W. Mazon Ave., Dwight. The reception is being hosted by Morris Hospital, which bought Cichon's practice

two years ago.

Cichon is a 1980 graduate of Chicago College of Osteopathic Medicine in Downers Grove, where he received his Doctor of Osteopathy degree. In 1981, he completed an osteopathic internship at Martin Place Hospital in Madison Heights, Mich.

It was there that he saw a notice on a bulletin board advertising a free flight to Dwight, Ill., which was looking for a general practitioner. Why not, he thought. So he

took the flight, landed in Streator and not long after joined The Community Medical Center. After five years, he started his own practice providing primary care services to patients of all ages.

He's done a lot of good in his career, even if it meant hard work and long hours. His wife, Pam, worked as his billing manager for 35 years. Those were often late nights, the two of them working sometimes until 7 o'clock while raising two children. She retired two years ago, and Cichon said she's been waiting for him to do the same.

But he said he loves living, and practicing, in a small town. He said he really got to know his patients. Their health always came first, but he enjoyed hearing about their jobs and their families. He said appointments were always 50/50 doctor talk and personal talk. He has also served as the medical director for Dwight Heritage Health for 15 years.

Dr. Jaynee Pendergast will be taking over Cichon's patients. Beyond that, retirement will be whatever it brings.

"I don't really have any hot plans," he said. He'll dabble in woodworking and spend time with his three grandkids (there's another on the way). He and Pam already have a trip planned to Alaska next year. Either way, they plan on staying put.

"I've always liked being in Dwight," he

Sales Tax Tax

The State of Illinois Department of Revenue has been taking a 2% cut out of local sales tax collections during the state's past fiscal year (July 1, 2017 - June 30, 2018).

Dwight Village Administrator Kevin McNamara said that during that period the new fee had cost the village about \$8,730.

The Illinois budget that

was approved last year okayed the new tax in order to allegedly defray the cost of collecting and distributing sales tax revenue earned by communities.

Complaints were lodged that the fee was not announced before the budget was passed. Bills have been introduced in both the House and Senate to lower the fee to 1%, but have not been voted on.

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Romping with the Big Cats Earns Cabery Senior National FFA Honors

Tara Hummel has one of the best jobs in the world: She gets to play with kittens. But not just any kittens. Exotic kittens worth thou-

As part of the Select Exotics team in Cabery, she also has learned to deliver rare cats, manage health protocols, facilitating deliveries of kittens to their new homes, training new employees and even vaccinating and administering medicine to the animals.

All this and just a senior at Tri-Point High School. And now she is a nationallyrecognized student.

Hummel was selected as the national winner for the National FFA Proficiency Award in Small Animal Production and Care. She was one of only four chosen to compete at the finals in Indianapolis last month.

Agricultural Proficiency Awards honor FFA members who, through supervised agricultural experiences, have developed specialized skills that they can apply toward their future careers.

She was recognized for her extraordinary work with the rare and exotic cat breeding operation owned by Dale and Holly Hummel. She is the daughter of Dale and Holly, and Tom and Colleen Hanson.

"I enjoy working with these exotic cats because they all have their own personalities. They are all gorgeous with their prominent spots," Hummel said. "I plan to go on to college and major in animal science, so this has set a good foundation for me to work off of."

Hummel has been a part of the business since she was young, but she didn't start working until high school. The family began the business in 1988 as pioneers in the Bengal breed.

They now breed the extremely popular Savannah, a hybrid of the African Serval with its exotic characteristics and large size and the domestic cat with its ease and managea-

Savannahs are said to be

almost dog-like, waiting for their owners at the door, loving water, and extremely intelligent and playful. And because of that they're extremely expensive. Kittens start around \$1,000 but can cost as much as \$20,000 for a prized pet or breeder. Select Exotics is the



longest standing, one owner/breeder Savannah cat.

Initially assigned to basic cleaning and feeding tasks, Hummel has become an integral part of the business, and she said she loves it, even with the hard work it brings.

With those big personalities comes some struggle on my end dealing with some protective mothers sometimes, but we take many precautions to prevent any injuries. Socializing kittens is definitely my favorite part of the job as it is basically just playing with kittens prior to them being sent to their new homes to get them acquainted to new environments with new people," she said.

Hummel became eligible for the national award after being selected as one of four national finalists during the 2018 National FFA National Finalist Selection Process earlier this summer. In recognition of being a national winner, Hummel

received a national winner plaque and \$500.

After college she plans to come back home and take over the family business.

"Being chosen as the national proficiency winner on stage in front of almost 70,000 people was exhilarating," she said.

PUBLIC NOTICE is hereby given that on the 15th day of November, 2018, the Board of Education (the "Board") of Community Consolidated School District Number 72-C, Grundy County, Illinois (the "District"), adopted a resolution declaring its intention and determination to issue bonds in the aggregate amount of \$300,000 for the purpose of increasing the Working Cash Fund of the District, and it is the intention of the Board to avail of the provisions of Article 20 of the School Code of the State of Illinois, and all laws amendatory thereof and supplementary thereto, and to issue said bonds for the purpose of increasing said Working Cash Fund. Said Working Cash Fund is to be maintained in accordance with the provisions of said Article and shall be used for the purpose of enabling the District to have in its treasury at all time sufficient money to meet demands thereon for expenditures for corporate purposes.

A petition may be filed with the Secretary of the Board (the "Secretary") within thirty (30) days after the date of publication of this notice, signed by not less than 113 voters of the District, said number of voters being equal to ten percent (10%) of the registered voters of the District, requesting that the proposition to issue said bonds as authorized by the provisions of said Article 20 be submitted to the voters of the District. If such petition is filed with the Secretary on or before the 26th day of November, 2018, an election on the proposition to issue said bonds shall be held on the 26th day of February, 2019, unless none of the voters of the District are scheduled to cast votes for any candidates for nomination for, election to or retention in public office at said election, in which case an election on the proposition to issue said bonds shall be held on the 2nd day of April, 2019. If such petition is filed with the Secretary within thirty (30) days of this notice and after the 26th day of November, 2018, an election on the proposition to issue said bonds shall be held on the 2nd day of April, 2019. The Circuit Court may declare that an emergency referendum should be held prior to either of said election dates pursuant to the provisions of Section 2A1.4 of the Election Code of the State of Illinois, as amended. If no such petition is filed within said thirty (30) day period, then the District shall thereafter be authorized to issue said bonds for the purpose hereinabove provided.

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Dwight Grade School District Prepares 2018 Tax Levy

New Teacher/Section Added to First Grade

Dwight Common School District #232 Board of Education met on November 14 when District Superintendent Dr. Richard Jancek gave the BOE a financial presentation which included the projected 2018 EAV and recommendations for the upcoming tax levy.

According the Livingston and Grundy County Assessors, the proiected 2018 EAV for the Dwight Grade School District is expected to have risen approximately \$8 million over last year for a 7.55 percent increase. This increase is largely due to increased assessed valuations in Livingston County with its projected EAV up 9.47 percent while Grundy County projects a 1.11 percent increase.

Using the projected 2018 EAV, Dr. Jancek presented his recommendations for the 2018 tax levy rate and extension. The 2017 tax levy rate was \$3.3980 with an extension of \$3,734,861. The recommended 2018 tax rate is \$3.2743 and with an extension of \$3,881,001. Dr. Jancek explained that while this is a 12 cent tax abatement of the overall rate, with this recommended scenario the extension would be projected to increase by approximately \$146,000 or 3.91 percent due to the increased EAV.

No action was taken. The BOE will review then discuss and adopt the final 2018 Tax Levy at its December meeting.

In another matter, the BOE approved the addition of a first grade section. The administration's recommendation for the unusual move to add a section in the middle of a year was deemed necessary due to developing concerns that more support is needed to address behavior, social-emotional, and academic needs. While it

was acknowledged that separating students and introducing a new teacher midyear is not ideal, it was determined that the benefits of reducing the student-toteacher ratio would outweigh concerns regarding any interruption during the transition.

"It is definitely worth the mild disruption," stated Assistant Principal Mrs. Julie Schultz.

The current first grade class has a total of 54 students. The addition of the third section of first grade will allow the class size to fall within a moderate 17 – 18 student range.

A controlled transition is planned with the new first grade teacher starting immediately working initially in a supporting / co-teaching role to learn curriculum and build a relationship with the stu-

In a separate but related action, the BOE approved the hiring of Kristen Lamps as the new First Grade teacher.

In unfinished business, Dr. Jancek gave an update on the air conditioning project status. A rooftop cooling solution which would allow the cooling of four classroom sections at a time is currently being reviewed. The preliminary estimated cost for this type of cooling solution for the building is \$700,000 and could be completed during the summer of 2019. A cooling solution professional will be present at the December BOE meeting to discuss the option with the board and answer questions. No decision has been made with regard to moving forward with this cooling option.

The board approved Dwight Grade School entering into a Cooperative Wrestling Program Agreement with Pontiac High Junior School. Saunemin is also included in the co-op agreement. With small numbers and no coach, the district had been looking for ways to keep the wrestling program alive. The decision will include transportation to and from Pontiac for the approximately five athletes wishing to participate. The squad will be known as the Pontiac Jr. High School Warriors. The

agreement is for two years. In his report, Dr. Jancek thanked community member Jennifer Johnson for organizing Coats for Kids which helped supply winter coats to many kids in Dwight and Livingston County.



AN ORDINANCE LEVYING AND ASSESSING TAX FOR THE PRAIRIE CREEK PUBLIC LIBRARY DISTRICT OF THE COUNTIES OF GRUNDY, LASALLE AND LIVINGSTON STATE OF ILLINOIS, FOR THE FISCAL YEAR BEGINNING THE 1st DAY OF JULY 2018 AND ENDING THE 30th DAY OF JUNE 2019

WHEREAS, the President and the Board of Trustees of the Prairie Creek Public Library District in the counties of Grundy, LaSalle, and Livingston and the State of Illinois, did on the 11th day of September, 2018 adopt the Annual Budget and Appropriation Ordinance (Ordinance No. 2018-04) for said Library District for the fiscal year commencing on July 1, 2018 and ending June 30, 2019; and

WHEREAS, said Annual Budget and Appropriation Ordinance was duly published as provided by law after its adoption.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE PRESIDENT AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE PRAIRIE CREEK PUBLIC LIBRARY DISTRICT, IN THE COUNTIES OF GRUNDY, LASALLE, AND LIVINGSTON, AND THE STATE OF **ILLINOIS**, as follows:

Section One: That the total sum of TWO HUNDRED AND FIVE THOUSAND, FIFTY-THREE DOLLARS (\$205,053.00) composed as follows: the sum of ONE HUN-DRED SEVENTY THOUSAND, ONE HUNDRED EIGHTY FIVE DOLLARS (\$170,185.00), being the amount required for the necessary Corporate purposes of the Prairie Creek Public Library District, Grundy, LaSalle and Livingston Counties, Illinois; the sum of SEVEN THOUSAND, THREE HUNDRED THIRTY-THREE DOLLARS AND ZERO CENTS (\$7,333.00) being required for payment of employer contributions of Prairie Creek Public Library District to the Social Security Fund; the sum of TWO THOUSAND, EIGHT HUNDRED EIGHTY DOLLARS AND ZERO CENTS (\$2,880.00), being required for the payment of employer contributions of Prairie Creek Public Library District for the Illinois Municipal Retirement Fund; the sum of ONE THOUSAND, NINE HUNDRED DOLLARS AND ZERO CENTS (\$1,900.00) being required for the payment of the professional opinion of an accountant and other auditing expenses from an Audit Fund; the sum of SEVEN THOUSAND SEVEN HUN-DRED FIFTY-FIVE DOLLARS AND ZERO CENTS (\$7,755.00) for the purpose of payments of premiums due for the purchase of liability insurance, property damage (e.g. fire) insurance, worker's compensations, unemployment compensations, and legal fees for defending or other protecting itself against liability from a Liability Fund; the sum of FIFTEEN THOUSAND DOLLARS AND ZERO CENTS (\$15,000.00) being required for the maintenance, repairs and alterations of library building and equipment from a Maintenance fund be and the same is hereby levied and assessed upon and against all taxable property within this Public Library District according to the full fair value established and ascertained for the State and County purposes for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2018 and ending June 30, 2019 and the Board of Trustees of the Prairie Creek Public Library District having on the 11th day of September duly passed and adopted the Annual Budget and Appropriation Ordinance for fiscal year beginning July 1, 2018 and ending June 30, 2019 and said Ordinance having been duly published in a newspaper of general circulation within the Public Library District, this Board find that the specific purposes and the specific amounts provided for in said Annual Budget and Appropriation Ordinance, a copy of which is attached hereto and by this reference made a part thereof, are required to be levied for the necessary purposes of the Prairie Creek **Public Library District.**

Section Two: The Secretary of the Board of Trustees of the Prairie Creek Public Library District is hereby directed to file a duly certified copy of the Ordinance with County Clerks of Grundy, LaSalle and Livingston Counties, in accordance with the laws of the State of Illinois, on or before the last Tuesday of December, 2018; and said County Clerks are hereby authorized and directed to extend the said tax so levied by this Ordinance, according to law, against all taxable property within the Prairie Creek Public Library District. The Secretary of the Prairie Creek Public Library District shall also file on or before the last Tuesday of December 2018, duly certified copies of the Annual Budget and Appropriation Ordinance and this Ordinance with the Prairie Creek Public Library District, where they shall be available for public inspection as provided by law.

Section Three: This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval as provided by law.

Grundy County through Dwight's downtown area, then southward to include the Grade and High Schools, was established in April of 2009 "to create an economic development tool intended to help a local government finance improvements to blighted areas in an effort to attract private development and new business."

A TIF District has a life of 23 years, although it can be retired after seven years if it isn't working out.

Dwight's TIF was created after the other taxing bodies in the village agreed to have their assessed valuations of property within the TIF boundaries frozen as of the

2008 tax year, with any prop-Dwight's TIF District, erty tax increases generated thereafter going to the vil-

> It became a contentious issue, but the village council okayed the new district with Mayor Jim Mixen casting a "yes" vote to break a 3-3 tie vote among the council members.

> Dwight's annual TIF Joint Review Board meeting was held Thursday, November 15, in the Public Services Complex, with Village Administrator Kevin Mc-Namara as Chairperson; Rudy Piskule, representing Dwight Township; Jerry Curtis, Public Member; and Tricia Marino Ruffolo, Ehlers & Associates, Inc. in attendance. Representatives from the eight other taxing bodies in the TIF District were absent.

2018 (April 1, 2017 - March 31, 2018) was presented by McNamara, which showed the Dwight TIF District generated \$166,689 for the village during the most recent year. Since its inception in 2009, the TIF has produced a total of \$752,297.

McNamara also noted that the most recent fiscal year was the first in which the TIF District had shown any growth in equalized assessed valuation. The recession that took hold in 2007-2009 lowered assessed valuations within the TIF for

years. Love's Travel Stop, established in December of 2011, was not a direct result of the Dwight TIF District being formed, but it was the first property within the TIF that showed a significant increase in valuation. The village used TIF money to reimburse Love's for the cost of stoplights at Rt. 47 and Northbrook Drive, adjacent to Love's.


Love's and the Downtown Rebuild Project are the only developments that have taken place in the TIF since its formation.

\$1,970,000 in 17-year bonds has been issued by the village for downtown improvements, to be repaid with TIF funds. \$902,776 has been expended through the end of fiscal year 2018 for the improvements.

Planned for 2019 are the paving of East Main Street, Park Street, Delaware Street from Franklin Street east to the bridge, and associated sidewalk, water and sewer lines, and street lights.

No TIF funds are being expended for downtown building improvements.

The Dwight Township High School Board of Education met on November 14 when a financial presentation including the projected 2018 EAV was provided by District Superintendent Dr. Richard Jancek with a discussion around the proposed 2018 tax levy and possible scenarios.

According to the three county assessors Livingston, Grundy and LaSalle Counties, which make up the Dwight Township High School District, the 2018 EAV is projected to \$139,458,727. This reflects an increase of approximately \$9 million over last year, with Livingston County showing a significant 9.08% increase, Grundy County showing a 2.47% increase, and LaSalle County flat with 0% increase. The 2017 actual EAV was \$130,680,142.

Acknowledging a healthy overall financial standing and with a substantial \$3.9 million balance at the end of FY18 in the District's Education Fund and \$6.2 million over all funds, Dr. Jancek recommended lowering the tax rate. The board had discussion, with varying opinions, on where the rate and extension should be and there will be more discussion in December before final adoption of the 2018 Tax Levy. The final tax levy must be agreed upon by the BOE at its December meeting in order to meet the required filing date with the County Clerk's offices.

In other financials, Dr. Jancek reported that the State of Illinois owes mandated payments to the Dwight High School District totaling \$44,717.60 from Fiscal Year 2017-18 and currently owes the DTHS District \$27,199.51 for FY 2018-19.

In unfinished business. Dr. Jancek gave a status update on the proposed fieldhouse project indicating that the committee is currently in limbo with not much headway recently made. However, Committee members and Board members are being invited to tour a newly-completed \$7.8 million 32,000 square foot recreation center in Joliet. The 20,000 square foot fieldhouse has two basketball and two volleyball courts, a two lane walking track, a 3,000 square foot fitness center, and muti-purpose room. The stand-alone detached facility is very similar in concept to what the Dwight committee has proposed. The group will tour and be able to ask questions regarding the facility on November 28. No decision on moving forward with the

project has been made. In reports, Dr. Jancek reported that Sancken Sole Realty will be sponsoring an annual \$500 scholarship to a DTHS graduating senior pursuing a degree in Fine Arts or Theater. 2019 will be the first year for this new scholarship opportunity.

Principal Dan Kaiser informed the board that the first Trojan Pride Assembly of the year was held on November 1 recognizing 160 students, 71% of the student body, who had a 3.0 or better GPA, no office referrals, and no late-toschool tardies during the first nine weeks of school.

Mr. Kaiser also reported on a very successful Veterans Day Ceremony held on Friday, November 9. A letter from one family member of an honored veteran offered thanks for "such a wonderful event" and acknowledged the great respect DTHS students showed at the event.


