32 Years of Public Service

Daryl Holt remembers borrowing a friend's pickup truck. When he was done with it, he had it washed and filled it up with gas before taking it back.

It's an analogy for life lesson he's always stood by: If you want things better, you have to leave them better than before.

That's what he hopes will happen when he officially steps away from politics on Dec. 3. Holt, a long-time Dwight village president, is leaving his post on the Livingston County Board as a District 2 representative, completing three decades serving the public.

"When I leave it I hope I leave it better than when I got it," Holt said.

Holt, 78, was recently recognized by the Livingston County Board for 32 years of public service. He was given a plaque as well as a certificate listing the various county committees he's served on over the years. His official last day is Dec. 3.

In 1969, Holt moved to Dwight from Willard, Ohio, where he worked at the RR Donnelley plant. He joined the Donnelley team in Dwight and spent 39 years there, retiring in 2002.

Holt has always been active in the community, but dove into politics in 1982 when he was elected as a Dwight village trustee. He served until 1991, when he decided to run for village president. He won, and served from 1993 to 2005, when he was defeated by Jim Mixen. But that didn't stop him. He ran for Livingston County Board in 2006 and has served ever since

During that time Holt said he has been involved in many things that have brightened the county's future. He helped bring the Dollar General store to Streator. He worked on a referendum to bring windmills to Fairbury and Forrest, which ultimately never came to fruition, but he was proud to see one welcomed in Odell. He was one of the board members who approved a hog farm in Saunemin.

"You were exposed to things happening in the whole county," he said.

During his time on the county board, he served as chairman of the IT committee, the personnel committee, ag committee, highway committee and also the Sheriff, Jail & License Committee when the new jail was built.

Holt is also proud to have been a part of the renovations to the old courthouse, a beautiful, historic structure that now houses nine departments and is where the county board and committees meet each month.

He's met lots of people and made many new friends being on the county board, people he never thought he'd meet from places such as Pontiac, Streator and Flanagan.

Holt will continue to volunteer with the Masonic Lodge and Lions Club. And although retired from Donnelley, he still oversees rental properties and helps a local farmer with his 1,700 acres in the spring and fall.

But now, at age 78, he's ready to retire from politics. He and his wife Betty of 54 years have two daughters and five grandchildren.

"I've been at it for 32 years," he said. "It's time for somebody else to pick it up and go with it."

Morris Funeral Home Offers 'Green Cremations'

The death of a loved one is something many of us don't like to talk about, but it's an inevitable part of life. And when a loved one passes, particularly when it's unexpected, the sadness can make it difficult for families to decide on a proper burial.

U.C. Davis-Callahan Funeral Home in Morris is helping to make that decision easier with a new method of cremation, one that is easier for families to embrace and is better for the environment.

It's called aqua cremation, or bio-cremation, and it breaks down a body primarily with water, said John Callahan

Flameless cremation offers families the opportunity to make a lasting contribution to the environment on behalf of their loved one by making a decision that saves energy and reduces pollution.

According to an article in The New Republic, more than four million gallons of toxic embalming fluids and

20 million feet of wood are put in the ground in the U.S. every year. A single fire cremation emits as much carbon dioxide as a 1,000-mile car trip.

Callahan has one of only two working aqua cremations units in the state, and they don't require a permit for use by the Illinois EPA. Aquagreen Dispositions in South Holland, which has the other unit, said bio-cremation uses 85 percent less energy than traditional methods.

There are no trees cut down for caskets or burial land, no burning of caskets or fossil fuels and no mercury pollution released from dental fillings. It leaves a carbon footprint less than one-tenth of a flame cremation.

"I think people are receptive to the idea that this is a more gentle approach to cremation," said John Callahan, owner/operator of the funeral home and also the Grundy County Coroner.

MAKING SENSE OF INVESTING

Take Advantage of Tax Diversification

As an investor, you will have access to accounts that are taxed differently from one another. And it's possible you could benefit from tax diversification by owning accounts in these three categories:

Tax-deferred – Tax-deferred accounts include the traditional IRA and a 401(k) or similar employer-sponsored retirement plan. When you invest in tax-deferred vehicles, your money can grow faster than if it were placed in an account on which you paid taxes every year. You also may get a tax deduction for contributions you make today. When you start taking withdrawals from these tax-deferred accounts, typically during retirement, the money is usually taxed at your ordinary income tax rate.

Taxable - Taxable investments are those held in a standard brokerage account, outside your IRA or 401(k). While you can put virtually all types of investments into a taxable account, you may want to focus on those considered to be most tax-efficient. So, you could include individual stocks that you plan to hold, rather than actively trade, because you will not get taxed on the capital gains until you sell. You also might consider mutual funds that do little trading and generate fewer capital gain distributions. This is important not only in terms of controlling taxes, but also because the taxes on these distributions can reduce your investments' real rate of return.

Tax-free – When you invest in a Roth IRA/Roth 401(k), you don't get an immediate tax deduction, but your earnings, as well as your withdrawals, are tax-free, provided you do not start taking withdrawals until you're 59 1/2 and you have had your account at least five years. (However, income restrictions do apply to

So, given the difference in how taxes are treated in these accounts, how can you choose where to put your money? For example, when would you contribute to a Roth IRA or Roth 401(k), rather than a traditional, tax-deferred IRA or 401(k)? If you are in a high tax rate now and expect it to be lower in retirement, a traditional IRA may make more sense, as you potentially get a sizable benefit from the tax deduction. But if you are in a lower tax rate now, you have most of your retirement investments in tax-deferred accounts, and/or you can afford to forego the immediate tax deduction, you might find that the Roth IRA/Roth 401(k), with its tax-free withdrawals and earnings, ultimately will make more sense for you. But since no one can predict where tax rates will go in the future, having money in different types of accounts - i.e., tax diversification - can be beneficial.

If you only focus on traditional, tax-deferred accounts, you could end up with larger tax bills than you anticipated when you retire and start tapping into these accounts, particularly when you must start taking withdrawals - called "required minimum distributions" - when you reach 70 1/2. By having money in accounts with different tax treatments, you may have more flexibility in structuring your withdrawals during retirement, based on your year-to-year tax situation.

There's no formula for achieving an ideal tax diversification. You'll want to consider your own needs and circumstances in choosing the right mix of taxable, tax-deferred and tax-free accounts. Ultimately, taxes should not drive all your investment decisions – but they should not be ignored, either.

This type of work has been grouped by media as "gig economy", the name is straightforward on this one. They are incredibly specific and of something always in need. Almost every job has a spin-off into one of these gig, or one-

The most recent one I utilized was Rover. Rover is essentially Uber to find people to watch your dog instead of giving you a ride, obviously. There are several options when signing up, you can offer to board the dogs, stop in to someone else's residence and let the dog out there, or just simply dog walking. You can sign up to offer all 3 or just 1.

The idea is to allow people like myself, to enjoy dogs, but don't have the capacity to have one full time. This offers a chance to get paid for it as well.

My feedback after the weekend, is that having a dog full time would be an incredible amount of responsibility and a lot of work. Even only having to do it over a 48 hour timeline made me realize how much work goes into taking care of and owning a dog. Nonetheless, it was a fun weekend, different from the normal one, and fun to have a dog around for a brief time.

I think when you can keep the "gig" jobs at a minimum is when they're most enjoyable. I would say the same about driving with Uber. They can be good to get out and drive for a few hours to provide a change to the schedule and offer something new. When it is done over and over, it very much starts to feel like just a job, and not a change of pace.

Rover, was a fun experience, though somewhat stressful, but that's what the monetary compensation is for. I would recommend it for anyone who enjoys dogs but can't maintain a schedule to have one all the time, plus it's a chance to earn some extra income!

Ridgeview, however, would tighten up their defense and capture the lead at the half, 25-24.


The game would continue to go back-and-forth in the second half, with the Mustangs extending their lead to 36-33 heading into the final quarter.

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

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Cremation That Uses Water, Not Flames

It's possible at U.C. Davis-Callahan Funeral Home

When a loved one dies, you have two choices: burial or cremation. But U.C. Davis-Callahan Funeral Home in Morris is offering a new option, one that is gaining appeal for the grieving:

aqua cremation.

Humans have long used fire to dispose of the dead, but the thought of burning a loved one as an end of life option can be upsetting. The new process is done in a chamber using mostly water.

"I think people are receptive to the idea that this is a more gentle approach to cremation," said John Callahan, owner/operator of the funeral home and also the Grundy County Coroner. His unit is one of only two in the state.

Traditional cremation uses fire to burn away soft tissue; aqua cremation uses chemicals. Bodies are put into a stainless steel vessel and water is flushed inside with a combination of alkalis, a ratio of about 5 percent alkalis to 95 percent water.

Callahan said bodies are 65 percent water to begin with.

The process uses a combination of sodium hydroxide (also known as lye or caustic soda) and potassium hydroxide (also known as potash). Traditional cremation burns a body at 1,800 degrees, whereas in flameless cremation, the

lye heats the water inside the vessel to about 200 degrees,

Alkalies are not acids, but they are just as caustic, making them capable of destroying living tissue. But the same alkalies used in aqua cremation are used to make common products such as soap and shaving creams. They are even in food preparation. Black olives, for instance, result from green olives being put through lye bath. Pretzels are also

dipped in lye solution before they are baked.

After a few hours of being in the vessel, the lye water has broken down all the body's soft tissue, leaving behind just the bones, which are dried and then processed into ash.



ASHES THAT RESULT FROM AQUA CREMATION are whiter since they are not exposed to fire. Loved ones also receive 100 percent of the ashes compared to 80 percent in a traditional cremation. Aqua cremation, or biocremation, is now being offered on site at U.C. Davis-Callahan Funeral Home in Morris.

Because the body is contained inside the vessel, families get 100 percent of the body's remains, compared to 80 percent with traditional cremation, Callahan said.

Aqua cremation is also known as bio-cremation because it is a more eco-friendly choice. Once the machine is closed, it uses about 300 gallons of water from start to finish, Callahan said. The effluent liquid from the cremation chamber is safely disposed of through the local wastewater supply. The extreme heat and alkalies used during the process create effluent that is completely sterilized.

The Illinois Environmental Protection Association sees aqua cremation as an environmental alternative. Callahan said they don't need a permit like they do with traditional cremations, which release fossil fuels into the air.

"I believe many people, especially young people, are looking at living a more healthier lifestyle, but also [looking at] how to protect the environment," Callahan said.

Families can still have their loved one embalmed for a

traditional wake with an open casket service prior to flameless cremation, he noted. Callahan said the units are much more expensive, but the price for a flameless cremation is roughly the same as a traditional one. Cremation Research Council notes that the average cremation cost about \$1,100 in 2017 (memorial services, urns or other optional items not included). A simple aqua cremation at U.C. Davis-Callahan is \$1,950, according to its website.

Cremation as a whole is on the rise. The Funeral and Memorialization Information Council projects an 85 percent increase from 2000 to 2020. Rising costs for inground burial, relaxing of certain religious and cultural constraints, awareness of the impact on the environment, and society's mobility, are all elements driving popularity.

Callahan said his funeral home has offered bio-cremation for many years, but they have had to send bodies away for the process. The

chamber he purchased is now on site in Morris and Callahan has been receiving bodies from other funeral homes whose clients prefer the new option. The only other working unit in the state can be found at AquaGreen Dispositions LLC in South Holland.

Aqua cremation isn't necessarily new -- it's been used for decades -- but it is new to the consumer. Since 2006, the Department of Anatomy at MAYO Clinic, for instance, has been using alkaline hydrolysis to dispose of bodies donated to medical science because the sterile process prevents the release of emissions and helps protect the earth's natural resources.

At U.C. Davis-Callahan it's been a popular choice, and Callahan said he is using pamphlets and visiting local churches and clubs in an effort to educate people about the new process.

"I think it's been very well received," he said.

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
