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Proposed Facility Would House 1,200 Male Detainees


A private firm is eyeing Dwight for a federal immigration detention center that would house more than 1,000 illegal immigrants.

The Dwight Village Board on January 14 approved sending an annexation agreement petitioned by Immigration Centers of America to the Dwight planning commission for consideration. The firm, headquartered in Farmville, Virginia, is interested in an 88-acre parcel of land situated east of Interstate 55, south of Illinois Route 17, west of Watters Subdivision and north of unincorporated real estate used for agricultural purposes.

A legal ad detailing the agreement appears on page 18 in today's *Paper*.

"They approached us if we'd be interested," Village President Jared Anderson said of the ICA.

According to the legal, 40 acres of the property would be used for the construction of a federal detention center that would house up to 1,200 adult males being detained by the Immigration and Customs Enforcement Agency, known as ICE, which



falls under the Department of Homeland Security.

A public hearing regarding the annexation petition, proposed use upon annexation, and application to establish zoning will be held at 6 p.m. February 19 at the Dwight Public Services Complex, 209 S. Prairie Ave.

The plan commission will make their recommendation to the full village board at that time. The board could vote on the annexation proposal as early as its February 25 regular meeting, according to the legal.

The Paper tried to reach several executives at ICA, including Chief Operating

Officer Duane Ragsdale, but was referred to ICE. An automatic reply from ICE's office of public affairs said they were unable to take media requests because of the government shut down.

Anderson said ICE wants to put a facility within 100 miles of Chicago. President Donald Trump's "zero tolerance" immigration policy has significantly increased the need for immigration detention facilities.

Anderson would not offer details on the center at this time, saying any plans are very much in infancy.

"All this is a conceptual design," he said. It could be several years before any formal decision is made. The annexation agreement is void after September 28, 2020.

Even if the annexation agreement is approved, Anderson said the federal government would still need to issue a formal bid for a new detention center, and Immigration Centers of America would have to successfully secure that contract to operate the center.

ICA operates one civil detention facility in Farmville, housing immigrants detained by Immigration and Customs Enforcement

who have not been charged with or convicted of criminal offenses, but instead are being held pending administrative hearing on issues such as deportation. The facility reportedly hold up to 650 male-only detainees and was built in 2010 at a cost of \$21 million, according to a 2018 Farmville Herald article.

In addition to Dwight, ICA is looking to build a federal detention center for illegal immigrants in the town of Ionia, Mich., 135 miles west of Detroit.

ICA reportedly made their pitch to Ionia's City Council on January 8 to approve the sale of a former correctional facility which would be demolished to make space for a new immigrant detention center. According to

Michigan Radio, an NPR station, ICA is planning to contract with ICE to detain up to 600 undocumented immigrants. ICA told the city council the detention center would bring more than 300 jobs to the area and add \$34 million to the local and state economy.

Dwight saw the job loss of some 350 people when the maximum security Dwight Correctional Center for 1,000 women inmates closed in 2013 after more than 80 years.

Dwight's Meadery Held Hostage by Government Shutdown

New Releases Put On Hold

Brian Galbreath owns one of the few meaderies in the state, and with a baby due in March, he'd like to start brewing his summer honey wine flavors. But he can't because of the government shutdown, which is causing the nation's craft brewers' taps to go dry.

"There are a lot of breweries that are hamstrung," said Galbreath, of Unpossible Mead in Dwight.

The partial shutdown halted operations at the Alcohol and Tobacco Tax and Trade Bureau, the federal agency that regulates alcohol production and distribution. That means government employees can't issue permits needed for the beer to flow.

Galbreath said that brewers must have all new formulas and labels approved by the TTB before production and serving to the public.

The bureau is closed and has directed employees not to come to work, leaving brewers increasingly nervous that they will lose money if brewery openings and seasonal beers are delayed much longer.

"I can't make anything new," said Galbreath, of Coal City. Meads, also called honey wine, combine water, yeast and honey, and as it ferments, the honey sugar turns into alcohol.

This is the time that Galbreath, along with hundreds of brewers across the country, start planning their seasonal brews. Galbreath had planned to roll out about a half dozen new flavors of mead, including blackberry, blueberry and vanilla, elderberry, strawberry and raspberry, and unveil them at a grand open house in late March or early April. He's not sure if that will happen.

He said it typically takes about a week for the TTB to approve a new formula. Even if the shutdown ends soon and the agency reopens, they will be sitting on more than a month's backlog of applications from the nation's craft breweries that could take weeks to approve.

The U.S. government has been in a partial shutdown for more than 30 days, the longest in history as President Donald Trump wrestles with Democrats over a taxpayer-funded wall at the border with Mexico.

The shutdown is not good for a growing business like Galbreath's meadery. He had a soft opening during last year's Harvest Days and ever since has been quenching thirsty crowds at 111 E. Chippewa and beyond. Since *The Paper* first brought you his story in September, he has installed bottling equipment and self-distributes his product, shipping several flavors to more than a dozen bottle shops in the region and kegs to craft taprooms from Champaign to Chicago, each asking for three to five kegs a week, he said.

Once bottled or kegged, meads can last several years, but it takes about a month to make. And while Galbreath has six 240-gallon tanks and one 180-gallon steel fermenter, brewing some 1,200 gallons at a time, the backlog at the TTB could hamper new flavors for his meadery.

"We're all concerned. This is our livelihoods," he said about the craft brew community.

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

December Video Gaming

\$634,257 was gambled in Dwight's 48 video gaming terminals during December, some \$32,732 less than in November, but the village share was \$9,408, some \$1,483 more than a month ago.

The state earned \$47,043 from the Dwight action in December. Statewide, video gaming terminals decreased 41 to a new total of 30,694 in 6,773 establishments, 22 fewer than in November.

Video Gaming a 'Bad Bet'

The first in a series of stories concerning how Illinois allegedly made a grievous mistake by fostering video gambling ("The bad bet: How Illinois bet on video gambling and lost") was published in the Chicago Sun-Times January 16. The Sun-Times story was developed in collaboration with ProPublica Illinois and radio station WBEZ.

Illinois now has more locations to legally place a bet than the state of Nevada.

That sounds interesting -- perhaps even impressive. It's true because Illinois now has some 30,694 video gaming machines in operation at 6,773 establishments.

Those machines were to provide the state \$300-million each year, proponents said in 2009 when the video gaming bill was passed with support from both sides of the political aisle, enough to cover a new \$31-billion building program to upgrade Illinois' infrastructure.

Video gambling didn't come online until 2012 and the \$300-million mark wasn't reached until 2017, leaving the state \$1.3-billion short of what lawmakers anticipated, according to the Sun-Times story.

There were other prob-

lems. Regulatory and social costs had been ignored, as well as the extent to which the gaming machines would cut into the profits from Illinois' casinos.

When the five part-time members of the Illinois Gaming Board appealed for more funding and eventually got it, according to the Sun-Times, the state was forced to divert \$83-million from casino taxes to support regulatory expenses. This diversion of casino tax money allegedly cut into the state's school funding by \$70-million between 2013 and 2017.

"The net effect," according to the Sun-Times, was "people in Illinois gambled a lot more, but most of the additional money ended up in the coffers of the companies behind video gambling."

Communities like Dwight receive 5% of the net terminal income; the state 25%; while location owners and terminal operators (the companies that own and operate the machines) split most of the remaining 70%. Scientific Games gets .7275% for building and maintaining a Central Communications System.

Problem gambling increased as the number of machines increased, but Illinois is one of only two

Lying on the new General Assembly's table in Springfield for consideration are "sports gambling, six new casinos, and for the video gaming industry, higher wagering, bigger payouts and even more machines."

During a hearing last fall on a new gambling expansion bill, "there was no discussion about whether the gaming board can handle a larger workload and little acknowledgment of the social costs of gambling," according to the Sun-Times.

The Paper sought Ivan Fernandez, Executive Director of the Illinois Gaming Machine Operators Association, to ask if he would like to comment on the Sun-Times story. The answer was that the Association chose not to respond at this time.

Cervical cancer is most often diagnosed in middle-aged women, with half of those diagnosed between the ages of 35 and 55. The five year survival rate of invasive cervical cancer is currently 67 percent and improvements in screening and the development of prophylactic vaccines have decreased the incidence of late-stage cancer.


A boy!

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

You don't have to travel far from home to have an amazing wedding reception. Two restaurants in Dwight have opened up space for couples with any size budget.

Station 343, 140 E. Main St., recently renovated the second floor of its building, opening up 4,000 square feet for wedding receptions, birthdays, anniversary parties and showers.

Owner Pete Meister has created a storybook rustic, farmhouse-style venue that can accommodate up to 200 guests.

The space opened in November and Meister said they have hosted two wedding receptions there, with another five already booked. The venue cost is \$1,500 to rent for 5 1/2 hours.

Station 343 is known for its modern, upscale cuisine served inside a historic building Meister has dedicated to the 343 brave New York City firefighters and paramedics who lost their lives on September 11, 2001. He said they offer both buffet and plated service and are currently working on new packages. They will start at \$25 per person, with separate bar packages as an option.

If you're looking for fun and adventure, Cherry Red Roasters, 200 S. Franklin St., is a popular barbecue restaurant and bar located in an old car dealership. Rusted iron railroad arches define the curved ceiling and wooden rafter beams complement the space.

"This is interesting and homey," said owner and chef Duncan Miiller.

Miiller has up to 10,000 square feet across three rooms that are available for receptions, enough to seat as many as 300 (there is plenty of parking). One room has a large stage. Rental prices range from \$500-\$1,800 depending on the day and how private an event you want. There is also the

option of renting the trendy outdoor beer garden, where the wedding ceremony can be held on the lawn.

Cherry Reds has actually catered more weddings outside their facility, but are finding more and more couples want a fun, unique space for their big day. They offer their classic Kansas City barbecue buffet style, but can accommodate couples any way they want, whether it's pasta, roast chicken or Italian beef. Everything is made from scratch, many of them family recipes.

Miiller said they are currently in the process of upgrading their food packages, adding more traditional, non-barbecue options and upgraded food and liquor tiers. But what could be more fun at a wedding than sticky fingers and 40 craft beers on tap?

Our wedding day was May 19, 2018, at St. John's Catholic Church in Cullom, officiated by Father Adam Cesarek.





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

Uniforms are ordered as soon as teams are chosen, so it is important to be registered on time. If you register late, there is a chance your child may not be able to get on a team.


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Village of Dwight Hires Officer

Public Hearing Set for Possible Detention Center

The Dwight Village Board of Trustees convened on January 14 following a lengthy break due to the holidays.

The addition of two village employees was approved by the board following discussions about hiring requirements and ensuring that the best candidates are selected for open positions.

It was noted that starting wages for Village of Dwight employees is low by comparison, making the candidate pool smaller.

Alex Butts will join the Dwight Police Department as a patrol officer with a starting salary base of \$43,944. Butts is formerly from Dwight and now lives in Channahon which is inside of the 30-mile residency requirement. Butts' hire is effective February 1 pending successful passing of all required physical and drug testing.

Jayson Powell was approved as a new Public Works employee with a starting base salary of \$37,936. Powell has previously worked for the village in a part-time summer capacity. Powell's hire is effective February 1 pending passing of required physical and drug testing. Trustee Jim Mixen opposed this hiring move.

In new business, the board approved referring a Petition for Annexation Zoning and Proposed Use to the Plan Commission. Immigration Centers of America is interested in the parcel which is situated East of Interstate 55, South of Illinois Route 17, West of Watters Subdivision, and North of unincorporated real estate used for agricultural purposes.

The proposed development on the property would be for the construction of a Federal Detention Center that would house up to 1,200 male adult illegal immigrant detainees. A Public Hearing regarding this petition for annexation, proposed use upon annexation, and application to establish zoning will be held on Tuesday, February 19, at 6 p.m. at the Dwight Public Services Complex.

In old business, the board approved a request from attorneys representing Dwight Restaurant Group with regard to the repayment schedule of an outstanding loan.

May 10, 2010, the Dwight Village Board approved a

\$75,000 loan request from Dwight Restaurant Group at an interest rate of three percent over five and one-half years using money from the Village's Revolving Loan Fund. The five-year loan was effective January 2011.

The Revolving Loan Fund was established many years ago offering an under market interest rate loan option to businesses for the purpose of low to moderate income job creation.

Dwight Restaurant Group's Bill Ohlendorf, owner of The Country Mansion Restaurant, earmarked the loan money for renovations that subsequently took place on the front porch of the historic building creating a patio for use as an outside dining area.

In December of 2017, the Country Mansion announced its immediate closure. In January 2018, with \$43,000 still owed, the board agreed to extend the contract to Feb. 1, 2019 to allow for the sale of the property with the condition that Mr. Ohlendorf renew his personal guarantee on the loan and with interest payments to be made.

With no payments missed in 2018, the board approved an extension with a payment schedule of \$6,500 due February 1; \$3,500 due May 1; and the approximate \$31,000 balance due October 1, 2019. Any payment default would be cause for immediate calling of the loan.

In another matter, recent heavy snow has seen Dwight Public Works taking to the streets with plows to keep village roadways clear. However, parked cars present challenges. Dwight Police have been issuing tickets to car owners who do not abide by the snowfall rules. Residents are reminded that, per village ordinance, overnight parking is prohibited on all village streets from Dec. 1 to March 1 or for a period of 12 hours at any time after any snowfall that is more than two inches. Those that do not adhere could be subject to a fine and towing of their vehicle.

In Public Comment, resident Tom Tock inquired about the status of the East Main Street construction project which had been slated for last year then moved to 2019. Mayor Jared Anderson explained some of the obstacles that were addressed and did indicate that the project is still being planned for this summer. Tock also ques-

tioned the plan for vacant lots currently held by the village as excess property. Village Attorney Irv Masching is currently working on an ordinance with regard to excess property. It was noted that the village does not pay taxes nor collect taxes on vacant lots as excess property.

The board also approved:

- payment of bills totaling \$53,373.99.
- the November and December Treasurer's Report.

Present at the December 10 session were Mayor Jared Anderson and Trustees Randy Irvin, Jerry Curtis, Marla Kinkade, Jim Mixen and Jennifer Johnson. Absent was Justin Eggenberger.

The next meeting of the Dwight Village Board will be Monday, January 28, at 6:30 p.m. in the Public Services Complex.

Farm to School Family Reading Night at OGS January 29

A free Farm to School Family Reading Night will be held Tuesday, January 29, from 6:00-7:30 p.m. in the Odell Grade School cafeteria, and will be open to the community.

The story of *The Little Red Hen* is a classic folk tale filled with important life lessons. It tells how a hard-working chicken grows, harvests, and mills wheat in order to make bread.

Following a Reader's Theater skit of *The Little Red Hen*, a local grain farming family will explain the process. The Seversons have a small family farm in Grundy County. They started transitioning 20 acres into organic production in 2004 and now have 225 acres certified organic by Oregon Tilth, with more transitioning to organic every year.

All their products have been grown, harvested, cleaned, stored, and milled on the farm. All are non-GMO, and many are organic and heirloom varieties.

They raise oats, wheat, specialty corn, yellow corn, popcorn, peas, soybeans, sunflowers, and buckwheat.

They stone grind flours, meals, and grits (roll oats) in small batches on the farm so the supply is fresh. They have products being sold in restaurants, stores, farmer's markets, and online at www.qualityorganic.com.

Their products will be available for purchase the evening of the 29th.

Following the presentation, those attending will investigate and explore what they've learned by using a grain mill to stone grind wheat into flour, roll oats, knead dough, taste test samples, plant wheat, read and act out different versions of *The Little Red Hen*, and meet real red hens.

After due consideration, and upon a Motion made and seconded, an Ordinance annexing the "Property", consistent with the Petition for Annexation, Application to Establish Zoning and Approval of Proposed Use and approving the Annexation Agreement and authorizing the execution thereof by the appropriate Village Officials shall be voted upon by the President and Village Board of Trustees of the Village of Dwight at the regularly scheduled meeting of the Board of Trustees on February 25, 2019, or thereafter if the matter is continued. If approved, appropriate recordings shall be filed for public record, and such other actions as may be appropriate and/or as required by law.






