It's Off to State We Go! Again.

Dwight Township High School finished second in the IHSA sectional tournament January 26 at Lemont High School, propelling them to the state finals this weekend.

Dwight, currently ranked third in the state among all divisions, competed in the small varsity division this past weekend, coached by Angela Campbell-Goley, a secretary at Dwight Common Grade School.

"We're not too bad," Campbell-Goley laughed.

Teams are judged based on a point system that includes motion, dance, tumbling and stunting in a routine under three minutes. Dwight finished with 86.36 points, just behind first place Wilmington. Herscher High School, with 81.54 points, finished third, a score that also allows them to compete this weekend at state, being held at the Grossinger Motors Arena in Bloomington.

Bishop McNamara in Kankakee and Eureka placed fourth and fifth, respectively.

The last time Herscher qualified for state was in 2014, when they finished 17th. The team is coached by Kathy Astrella, secretary at Herscher Intermediate School, and assistant coach Elizabeth Webb, her daughter, who works at Bonfield Grade School as a paraprofessional. These five teams head to the state preliminaries and compete on Friday. If they advance, they head to the final round on Saturday, when the top 10 teams from all divisions cheer

Goley has coached all levels since 2000. She has coached competitively since 2008 for most of 10 years. In that time, she's advanced to state preliminaries every year. In 2013, Dwight won the state championships. And they hope to

again this year. "This Friday the school will be sending fan buses down to the prelims so students and staff can join our families in the stands," said assistant coach Kathy Perry. "We are really hoping that they show everyone in the stands what they can do!"

Cheerleading isn't just a sport, it's a way to teach young women teamwork, community spirit and more, Perry said. The girls volunteer for community events such as the Christmas parade, they hold cheerleader camps, and perform not just for basketball and football, but for celebrations like Harvest Days. They even help the janitors clean up the bleachers after every home basketball game, Perry said.

We have worked very hard in this community to make sure that our girls understand the high standards we expect of them and that their sport requires. In addition to themselves, we help them understand that they are representing their teammates, their coaches, their parents and families, their school and their town," she said.

Detention Center for Immigrants Looks Like Financial Plus for Dwight

A detention center for illegal immigrants could be an economic boon for Dwight -- as much as \$1 million a year.

Last week The Paper reported that a private firm, Immigration Centers of America, headquartered in Farmville, Va., is looking at an 88-acre parcel of land near Interstate 55 and Illinois Route 17 to build a federal center that would house up to 1,200 men awaiting immigration hearings or visa status.

Village This week, President Jared Anderson spoke to The Paper about the potential impact if the center eventually came to

The center would employ about 280 people, mostly full-time, with an average salary of \$60,000. The center itself would cost between \$20 million and \$25 million to build. The sale price of the land is \$1.9 million, according to the Dwight Economic Alliance.

The U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement Agency, known as ICE, runs more than 100 detention facilities across the country and works with state and local jails along with private prisons to operate hundreds more. According to ICE's costs \$133.99 a day to maintain one adult detention bed.

Anderson said Immigration Centers of America would pay the village \$1 per detainee per day, up to 75 percent, meaning even if the center wasn't at capacity, they would still receive \$750 a day. That could amount to between \$273,000 and \$438,000 a year.

Based on a \$21 million facility, Anderson estimates the company would pay about \$100,000 a year in property taxes. The village would also receive water and sewer payments estimated at \$350,000 a year, he

And then there are salaries that could amount to \$30 million each year, Anderson said. These are living wages that could entice people to move to Dwight. Sales tax revenue would increase as people spent more money in town. New businesses could open.

Rodney Connor, who sits on the board of the Dwight Economic Alliance, said the reverse happened when the Dwight Correctional Center for women closed. Every prison job lost equated to additional job losses in the community.

"They're [ICA] going to award it to someone. Why not have your hat in the ring," Anderson said.

Anderson said the federal government would still need to issue a formal bid for a new detention center in Dwight, and ICA would have to win the contract before ground was ever broken. ICA would sign a five year contract with the government.

If built, ICA would be among Dwight's three largest employers, and one of its top paying employers. Anderson said he understands ICA would need drivers for transportation, but also professionals, such as sociologists, psychologists and educators. ICA provides a high level of medical, mental, spiritual, educational, and vocational programs that enable detainees to return to the appropriate societies as better citizens, according to its website.

There are other private companies ICE contracts with, but Anderson said Immigration Centers of America has a good reputation of giving detainees as normal a life as they can while illegal aliens are being detained for up to 90 days. ICA scored on the high end An annexation agreement when reviewed by the federgovernment. explained.

Detainees would not have

immigrants who have committed crimes, like anyone else, are held in a county or federal jail facility.

This is not a jail, thus detainees would have unlocked rooms, access to commissary areas, a gymnasium and outdoor facility for and exercise sports, Anderson said. There are also no time limits when family can visit.

Many spoke out against the proposed center on The Paper's Facebook page, but when we asked for signed letters to the editor, we received only two.

"This isn't about Dwight changing immigration laws," said Max Sulzberger, president of the economic alliance board. "It's about helping people's lives. ... This provides a better spot for these individuals."

ICA provides "as free and pleasant an environment as possible for civil detention while effectively managing safety and security concerns," according to its website.

With the recent government shutdown President Donald Trump's border wall, the arguments will continue. Others are trying to look on the bright side.

Said Connor: "Personlly, barring any real safety concerns, it's hard for rural America to pass up that

Snow Days, Learning and Mail Issues

Kids used to dream about school being called off because of winter. They imagined hot cocoa, sledding and no homework.

But it's the beginning of the end of snow days as more and more schools are adopting remote learning. Kids, you can thank the Internet for that.

Kathy Stewart, a fifth-grade teacher at Dwight Common School, said a relatively new state law allows students to complete work from home when school is called off because of weather -- without having to make it up in the spring. Students know to check their virtual classroom for any assignments, and teachers are available through text and emails.

It's part of the Evidence-Based Funding for Student Success Act of 2017. The law made sweeping changes to education funding in Illinois, basing state funding on student enrollment, rather than attendance.

The act also eliminated Section 18-8.05 of the school code, which had defined a day of attendance as a minimum of five instructional hours. A notable change identified in the ISBE guidance is that instruction need not be classroom-based to count as a day of attendance. That means districts can define what is an instructional day, and many are turning to remote learning.

Monday was the first day Dwight public schools utilized remote learning on a snow day, and Stewart was pleasantly pleased by the results.

online, website links that students should visit, and give instruction and

So when school got called off Monday, Stewart logged on and posted three assignments: a reading chapter accompanied by a question related to the book; 10 fraction problems; and a diagram of a cell structure, all due by the next time school was in session.

How much homework is left up to individual districts. In Dwight, administrators suggested teachers give students 15 to 20 minutes of work per subject.

It's a convenient way for kids to learn when weather does not cooperate, for instance this week, when winter storm warnings were issued with wind chills predicted to be 30 to 50 degrees below zero Tuesday evening through Thursday morning.

It also helps avoid end of the year excitement that can derail some students. Tacking on extra days in the spring to make up for snow days can make it difficult to keep the educational momentum going, Stewart said.

"I know in my 21 years of teaching when we have to come back after Memorial Day ... the students are not engaged for learning. They are ready to be done."

Some argue that kids should be allowed to enjoy a fun mental health day every once in a while, but Stewart (continued on page 3)





said it can be hard for teachers and students to catch up once school is back in session. Last week, Dwight students were in school just 1 ½ days. January 21 was Martin Luther King Jr. Day. School was dismissed early because of weather on Tuesday, and ice and snow canceled school on Wednesday and

On Monday she loved seeing work being turned in as she watched remotely from home. She was thrilled to receive many texts and emails from students asking questions about assignments.

"There's got to be some accountability. ... for everyone's benefit," she said.

How do kids like it? Here's what this writer's daughter had to say: "Some people don't like it, but it's way better than school. At least you get to sleep in."

"Neither snow nor rain nor heat nor gloom of night stays these couriers from the swift completion of their appointed rounds."

This phrase has long been associated with the U.S. Postal Service, but nowhere in that unofficial motto does it mention minus 50 degree wind chills.

Mail in Dwight could be late this week because of the weather, said Postmaster Regina Dickover.

On Monday, mail was delivered late and

even delayed until Tuesday because of staffing issues. The Dwight Post Office has four carriers for its three city routes but two people called in and another is on light duty and can't deliver the mail, which left one carrier to handle all three routes.


And since all city carriers walk their route, Wednesday and Thursday's wind chills could prove dangerous for them, Dickover said. Packages will be delivered both days on both rural and city routes, but the weather could prevent city carriers from delivering letters.

Another problem that could affect mail delivery this week is the fact that the post office's fleet from the regional hub in Bedford Park runs on diesel, which can gel during severe cold.

Some Dwight residents in the city and rural areas called the post office and requested they bypass their mail altogether. "That they care about their [mail] carriers is very nice," Dickover said.

OTHER WEATHER RELATED NEWS: Heritage Woods of Dwight is an official warming center. Those seeking refuge from the cold can also go to the Dwight Village Hall during regular business hours.

There will be no garbage pickup in Dwight on Wednesday this week due to the wind and cold. The whole town will have garbage pickup on Thursday.







IHSA Change Puts DTHS Football Co-op with GSW in Jeopardy January Board Actions

The fate of Dwight's longtime football co-op with Gardner-South Wilmington High School could be bleak. At the January 16 meeting of the Dwight Township High School Board of Education, Athletic Director Andrew Pittenger notified the board that at the conclusion of this school year, all co-op sport agreements with GSW are up for renewal and the continuation of the football co-op will have to be reviewed following the recent passing of an IHSA districting proposal.

According to the information presented, the IHSA will require that all co-ops be renewed at the conclusion of this year across all school districts in an effort to get all coops for all sports on the same two- year cycle. Once a co-op agreement has been reached, it cannot be broken for the two year period. In the new football districting proposal, conferences will no longer exist. Districts will be determined by average enrollment and geography with district enrollment run in two-year cycles. The new format will still have eight classes. However, at this time, the enrollment cutoff for the class designation has not been announced.

With IHSA football districting to begin in 2021, enrollments from 2019 and 2020 will be used to determine the 2021 districts. If Dwight were to renew its co-op agreement with GSW for football, the total enrollment of both districts would be combined and used for the new districting designation. With no information being presented by the IHSA on where the enrollment cutoff will occur, best guesses based on projected mockup models are being used as schools decide how to proceed. In Dwight's case, it is thought that by taking on the GSW enrollment it could push Trojan football into a Class 3A District similar to the former Interstate 8 Conference. Speculation only, it is thought that possible schools in a Class 3A District could include schools such as Bloomington Central Catholic, Reed-Custer, Eureka, Peoria Heights, Peotone, Seneca, Midland and Wilmington. A Class 2A District designation might include schools such as Chicago Ellison, Chicago Corliss, Chicago Woodlawn, Clifton, Momence, Chicago Christian, Watseka Westchester. A Class 1A District would assume smaller schools similar to Ridge View, Farmer City Blue Ridge, Fisher, Iroquois West, Heyworth, and Leroy as possible competitors. Without the GSW enrollment, Dwight would anticipate being a 1A District.

Currently, there are expected to be just two returning GSW football players next season. Regardless, Dwight would be required to take on the entire GSW enrollment numbers. With a steady decline of football athletes from Gardner, taking on the GSW enrollment for a small return of players is cause for Dwight to reevaluate the benefit of the co-op.

"We went through quite a bit to switch conferences a few years back to give our teams the ability to compete and, from a football point of view, I think we would be reverting back to not being able to compete very well." Pittenger told the board.

"My personal recommendation would be that we do not renew the football co-op, but renew all of the others," stated Pittenger.

It was noted that the new IHSA districting plan only affects football and does not affect the other sports that are currently coop sports with GSW including golf, track, wrestling, and cross country.

No action was taken. More information is expected at the February meeting with possible action at that time.

Dwight Township High School Board of Education is seeking bids for an elevator project to address ADA concerns with the two story building. The district will be seeking a performance contract with the primary focus being the addition of an elevator, but also will be seeking bids for additional projects such as ADA compliant bathrooms and HVAC quotes to address the gym, locker rooms and Industrial Arts area. A mandatory meeting takes place on January 30 at the High School for all contractors with RFPs to be opened on February 25 at 10 a.m.

Discussion continued on the proposed fieldhouse project. Over the past year, a committee has investigated both an addition to the existing school building and a standalone detached facility to provide additional gym space. Last September, three concept variations were presented to the DTHS BOE outlining a building addition to the existing DTHS gymnasium, extending into the west parking lot with preliminary cost estimates ranging from \$8.3 million to \$10.7 million. A preliminary estimate for a Dwight standalone facility is \$6.5 million.

However, at the January meeting, Dr. Jancek informed the BOE that he has been advised that a referendum is required to build a stand-alone facility if that facility is used in any way in an educational capacity. However, an attached building addition could move forward with board approval. Funding for the project is expected to come from multiple areas including, primarily, current District #230 Funds and by securing a \$5 million Alternative Revenue bond. It is expected that no tax increase would be incurred to fund the project.

The board agreed that it is at a crossroad

in the decision-making process and decided that project concepts should be presented to the community in a forum to provide information and answer questions to help determine community interest in the project before taking any further action. A fieldhouse community forum is being planned for late winter or early spring. Notice to the community will be given once a date has been established.

Following up from a presentation in January, District Office Assistant Jill Haacke presented additional information on activity fundraising and a plan being developed to eliminate door-to-door type product sales as the method used for sport and club fundraisers. Funds raised through service or entertainment along with increased participation fees and additional financial support from the district is the direction being proposed.

The 2018-19 teacher seniority list was approved as presented. Dwight Township High School District #230 currently has 26 teachers with two teachers having served DTHS for 20 years or more. Tenure status (five or more years in the district) is held by 16 teachers.



Depression & Neuromuscular Anxiety Function Are You Feeling the

Effects of Vitamin D Deficiency Feeling the need for some sunshine this winter? Well, your body may be feeling

the same need. Many people run low on vitamin D during the dark, colder months of the year, as we huddle inside our homes exposed to fewer of those vitamin D-producing rays from the sun. Even those who do go outside for regular exercise are likely to bundle up, effectively blocking out what little sunshine there is.

This important vitamin is necessary for several reasons, according to Dr. Paulo Aranas, family medicine physician at the Morris Hospital Ottawa Campus.

"A lot of people know that vitamin D plays a big role in working with calcium to give you strong, healthy bones," Dr Aranas said. "However, studies coming out also suggest that Vitamin D provides benefits to your immune and cardiovascular systems, as well."

Dr. Aranas said anecdotal studies suggest vitamin D might also increase cognition in older adults.

Vitamin D also plays a role in our mental health, 20 percent of Americans suffering from fatigue and depression each winter as a result of low vitamin D levels.

So just how much vitamin D do we need? Between ages one through 70, the recommended daily intake is 600 IU. Those over age 70 should get at least 800 IU of vitamin D each day.

Not many foods are naturally rich in the vitamin, but such fatty fishes as swordfish and salmon are particularly good sources, with approximately 566 and 477 IU, respectively, in three ounces. Cod liver oil is another especially rich source, containing 1,360 IU per tablespoon.

Three ounces of canned tuna comes in at 154 IU; two sardines from cans have 46 IU; three ounces of beef liver have 42 IU; and one egg yolk has 41 IU. Many foods have vitamin D added to them.

You may be at higher risk for low vitamin D if you have dark skin, are obese,

spend excess time indoors, take certain medications, had gastric bypass surgery, or have kidney or liver disease or a condition that limits absorption by the intes-

While Vitamin D supplements may be taken, be careful not to overdo it. Too much of this fat-soluble vitamin can cause nausea, vomiting, itching, weakness, confusion, heart rhythm problems and kidney dam-

Dr. Aranas said those experiencing symptoms of vitamin D deficiency – such as persistent joint pain, muscle aches and fatigue - can have a simple blood test at their doctors' office to test that level.


